

C. Dual Employment

Article XVI, Section 40, of the Constitutions provides in pertinent part that:

" ... A nonelective State officer may hold other nonelective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary of compensation ... "

Additionally, Article 6252-9a, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes, provides in part:

Section 1. A nonelective state officer or employee may hold other nonelective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if his holding the other offices or positions is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by state or federal law, and if there is no conflict between his holding the office or position for which the officer or employee receives salary or compensation.

Section 2. Before a nonelective state officer or employee may accept an offer to serve in other nonelective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit, the officer or employee must obtain from the governing body, or if there is no governing body, the executive head of the agency, division, department, or institution with which he is associated or employed, a finding that the requirements of Section 1 of this Act have been fulfilled. The governing body or executive head shall make an official record of the finding and of the compensation to be received by the nonelective officer or employee from such additional nonelective office or position of honor, trust, or profit including specifically salary, bonus, per diem or other type of compensation.

The persons listed in the following table have expertise in the area of their employment that is needed in the instructional program at Southwest Texas State University, and the University proposes utilizing the services of these persons who either already hold, or prospectively will hold, another non-elective position with a tax-supported agency. In those cases in which the person is already employed, and Southwest Texas State University is the prospective employer, we have received a finding from the executive head or governing body with which the person is already associated that the requirements of Section 1 of Article 6252-9a have been fulfilled.

Dr. Houston was made a Distinguished Professor Emeritus by the Board of Regents, Texas State University System, on August 25, 1978. He is a highly competent teacher.

Dr. Empress Y. Zedler has served Southwest Texas State University since 1948. She has served as Chairman of the Department of Special Education and is the founder of the Special Education Clinic. She served as its director until August, 1979. Dr. Zedler is a highly competent teacher.

B. Authorization to Make Budget Adjustments at the End of the Fiscal Year, August 31, 1980

Similar orders have been passed by the Board in previous years authorizing the University to make budgetary adjustments needed to cover the overdrafts of various departmental budgets at the close of the fiscal year. All transfers and reallocations of funds will be in accordance with stated regulations.

C. Approval of Biennial Legislative Appropriations Request

The University is submitting the Request for Legislative Appropriations for the FY 1982 and FY 1983 biennium for the Board's consideration. This request has been prepared in accordance with instructions of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System; the Legislative Budget Board; and the Governor's Budget and Planning Office.

III. MISCELLANEOUS

A. Allocation and Rules and Regulations for Line Item Scholarships

The University administration believes that these funds, used as work scholarships, will assist a larger cross-section and number of students and will stimulate and promote part-time employment in order to pursue a course of study at this institution. In addition, the funds will provide financial aid for eligible students through combining the earnings from part-time employment with other forms of financial assistance to enable students to meet their educational expenses without the necessity of incurring an unduly heavy burden of indebtedness.

We recommend that Southwest Texas State University be authorized to allocate and expend \$21,600.00 for work scholarships for fiscal year 1981 from the Special Item appropriation for "Scholarships" referred to in Section 14 of Article IV of House Bill 558, 66th Legislature, Regular Session, 1979, in accordance with rules and regulations shown below:

I. WORK SCHOLARSHIPS

A. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS:

1. Applicants must be residents of Texas for tuition purposes.
2. Applicants must show a need for employment in order to defray expenses related to their education.
3. Applicants must have established a record of academic achievements in high school or previous college work and be capable of maintaining good standing while employed under this program.
4. Recipients must enroll as full-time students (twelve hours for undergraduates and nine hours for graduates).

B. SELECTION PROCESS: In determining eligible students for the Work Scholarship Program, the Director of Student Financial Aids will consider the following factors:

- financial need
- academic qualifications of the applicant
- references
- work experience, skills, and general interest

Where possible, final approval will be given to those students who demonstrate a need, have the best qualifications, and would benefit the most through the work experience under this program.

- C. DURATION OF EMPLOYMENT: Students will normally be employed under the Work Scholarship Program for a full academic year (fall and spring semester) provided eligibility requirements are maintained and must reapply for Summer Sessions I and II.
- D. RENEWAL OF SCHOLARSHIPS: Work Scholarships will be awarded for one academic year, and the student will reapply for additional awards. Additional awards will be based on availability of funds and eligibility of all applicants.
- E. APPLICATION AND PAYROLL PROCESS:
1. Applicants desiring to be employed under the Work Scholarship Program must complete an Application for Financial Aid and submit it to the Office of Student Financial Aids.
 2. Employment approval will be issued by the Office of Student Financial Aids prior to the beginning of the unemployment period.
 3. The number of students employed on Work Scholarships will be determined by the line item funds appropriated for scholarships and the funds allocated by the Board of Regents for this program.
 4. Students will be required to maintain individual time sheets and will be paid in a manner similar to those students employed under other work programs.

B. Approval to Sell Frame Buildings

There is an old frame house located on the University farm which is not worth trying to relocate or rehabilitate.

There are also three small sheds close to the frame house. The farm property upon which the structures are located was acquired in 1971. At that time, it was determined that there was no value to the structures, and they were not brought on the University's inventory records. The University desires to remove the dilapidated structures from the farm property. Authority from the Board is recommended to dispose of the facilities through (1) bid or negotiation if no bid is received, (2) University's maintenance force, or (3) contract with an outside firm.

C. Grants and Agreements with Federal Government, State Government, and Foundations Involving Furnishing of Educational Services

From time to time, various grants and agreements for furnishing educational services to agencies of the Federal and State Governments and Foundations become available to the University. When these grants and agreements became increasingly available, the Board passed an order in each of the preceding fiscal years authorizing the President of the University to accept such grants from or enter into contracts with such agencies provided the acceptance did not entail any nonrecoverable costs. This order would extend this authority for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1980.

D. Acceptance of the New Roofing on the Science Building

Southwest Texas State University has supplied the Building Committee with the required information upon the completion of the new roofing project. The project has been visited by Dr. Eugene E. Payne, Vice President for Finance and Management, SWTSU; Mr. Lamar Urbanovsky, Executive Director, Board Office; Mr. William D. Jones, Director of Campus Facilities, SWTSU; along with representatives of the contractor and architect. The project was found to be substantially completed with the exception of certain minor items which are yet to be completed or corrected. Final payment is being withheld from the contractor pending completion of these items.

E. Acceptance of the Energy Management System

Southwest Texas State University has supplied the Building Committee with the required information upon the completion of the construction project. The project has been visited by Dr. Eugene E. Payne, Vice President for Finance and Management, SWTSU; Mr. Lamar Urbanovsky, Executive Director, Board Office; Mr. William D. Jones, Director of Campus Facilities, SWTSU; Mr. E. M. Fauver, Jr., Director of Physical Plant, SWTSU; along with representatives of the contractor and architect. The project was found to be substantially completed with the exception of certain minor items which are yet to be completed or corrected. Final payment is being withheld from the contractor pending completion of these items.

F. Reimbursement of Travel Expenses from Research Contracts and Grant Funds or Gift Funds

State funds may be used to reimburse University employees when traveling on University business up to a maximum of \$40.00 per day. This reimbursement is frequently insufficient to cover actual expenses. However, many departments have available gift funds or funds from research contracts and grants. It is not necessary to place an arbitrary \$40.00 per day limit on these funds.

We recommend that, for these non-state funds, employees be reimbursed actual expenses up to \$60.00 per day. This proposal has been cleared with the State Auditor's Office.

G. Legislative Authorization to Amend Student Bus Fee

In 1975, the 64th Legislature passed Senate Bill 1098 allowing the University to establish a student shuttle bus funded by a student fee, with such a fee not to exceed \$10.00 per semester or \$5.00 per six-week summer term. In 1976, the Board approved an initial fee of \$6.00 per regular semester and \$3.00 per six-week summer term. The bill limited the increase in the fee to an amount not to

exceed \$1.00 per student during any one academic year. Shortly after this legislation was passed (see Section 96.42 of the Texas Education Code), a very rapid increase in the cost of fuel occurred. In the fall of 1980, the fee will be increased to \$8.00 per semester, and it will need to be increased to \$9.00 in the fall of 1981. The maximum fee of \$10.00 and the maximum increase of \$1.00 per academic year might not provide funds to keep up with the rising fuel costs.

It is recommended that approval be granted for the introduction of legislation, substantially as shown in Enclosure II of this Report, at the next session of the Texas Legislature providing for an increase in the mandatory student bus fee of \$10.00 per semester and \$5.00 per six-week summer term. This fee is pledged for the sole purpose of meeting the operating expense of the student bus service. This fee is charged in addition to student service fees. This legislation will also provide funds for increased operating costs by permitting the Board of Regents to increase the fee by an amount not to exceed \$2.00 per student at any one regular semester or \$1.00 per student for any six-week summer term. All funds received by the University from this fee in excess of those necessary to meet the operating expenses of the bus service shall be held by the University in reserve and applied only to future operating expenses of the bus service.

The University's Student Senate has passed a resolution supporting the increased fee, also shown in Enclosure II.

H. Academic Programs

1. We recommend that the Master of Education Degree with a major in Agricultural Education, as submitted in Enclosure III of this Report, be approved subject to subsequent approval by the Coordinating Board.

This degree program is essentially the same as the program that was approved by the Texas State University System Board of Regents on August 8, 1975. After discussions with the Coordinating Board staff, it became apparent that at that time the Coordinating Board was going to disapprove the program; hence, we withdrew it from consideration on November 22, 1976. This accounts for our current re-submission of this program.

We further recommend that permission be granted (subject to Coordinating Board approval) to offer a Non-Thesis Option for the Master of Arts Degree in Speech Communication and Theatre Arts as submitted in Enclosure III of this Report.

2. We recommend approval to make the minor in Computer Science, as structured for the Bachelor of Science Degree, available as a minor for use with the Bachelor of Arts Degree.

Presently, Southwest Texas State University is authorized to offer a Master of Arts Degree, a Master of Science Degree, and a Bachelor of Science Degree with a Major in Computer Science. A minor in computer science is also available with any of these degrees. Since we are not authorized to offer a computer science major with the Bachelor of Arts Degree, the computer science minor with the degree is not now available.

It would be advantageous for us to have the computer science minor available with the Bachelor of Arts Degree as this would provide additional options (in a discipline which is much in demand in the market place) for some of our students.

I. Administrative Change - Departments of Political Science and Criminal Justice:

We recommend approval to change the administrative responsibility for the Criminal Justice Resource Area of the Master of Public Administration Degree from the Department of Political Science to the Department of Criminal Justice.

Southwest Texas State University offers a Master of Public Administration Degree, which consists of a core curriculum and various resource areas.

One of the resource areas is "Administration of Criminal Justice Systems."

Presently, this resource area is administered by the Department of Political Science and consists of three courses; Political Science 5330, Political Science 5331, and Political Science 5332. Two of these courses are usually taught by faculty members from the Department of Criminal Justice.

Authority is requested to transfer administrative control of this resource area from the Department of Political Science to the Department of Criminal Justice.

Simultaneously, approval is requested to change the prefix and title of the following two courses:

From: Political Science 5331, Police Administration.
Political Science 5332, Police Administration
Decision Making.

To : Criminal Justice 5331, Human Factors in
Criminal Justice Administration.
Criminal Justice 5332, Decision Making
in Criminal Justice Organizations.

J. Resolution of Gratitude to H. Arlin Turner (Deceased)

WHEREAS, Dr. Turner served at Southwest Texas State University during the 1979-80 academic year as the first holder of the Therese Kayser Lindsey Chair of Literature; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Turner effectively taught both graduate and undergraduate students in American literature, especially the works of Nathaniel Hawthorne and the literature of the contemporary South; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Turner well and faithfully represented the University and the Department of English on many campuses in the region and at national, regional, and state meetings, often presenting papers in sessions attended by many colleagues; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Turner, during his year as holder of the Chair of Literature, completed the last phases of two published works of significance, the subject of one being George Washington Cable and of the other, Nathaniel Hawthorne; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Turner completed numerous other projects which will benefit scholars of American literature and which provided invaluable experience for a post-graduate student at Southwest Texas State University who served as his research assistant; and

RESOLVED, that Dr. Craddock be formally designated a DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR OF HISTORY EMERITUS at Southwest Texas State University and hold that title in perpetuity.

N. Southwest Texas State University Development Foundation and Support Foundation - Recurring Reports to the Board of Regents

It is proposed that the President, Southwest Texas State University, submit to the Board an annual report on both the Southwest Texas State University Development Foundation and Support Foundation, as of the end of each Foundation's fiscal year. The fiscal year of each Foundation is determined by the respective Board of Trustees and is subject to change. Currently, the fiscal year of both Foundations is September 1 to August 31. The reports will include an annual financial statement and appropriate supplementary material.

It is additionally proposed that the President submit to the Board quarterly income statements from both Foundations.

It is additionally proposed that the President submit to the Executive Director of the System Office, for the information of the System staff, copies of official minutes of the meetings of both Foundations.

O. Development Leaves

Southwest Texas State University is requesting approval in advance to grant development leaves to no more than three faculty members. These faculty members will teach at Huston-Tillotson College for one or two semesters. Several major benefits will accrue to SWTSU:

1. It will enhance our ability to recruit additional, qualified minority faculty members.
2. When our faculty return to our campus, they will be able to assist the administration in affecting a more positive attitude with regard to the recruitment of minority faculty.
3. This project will be received by EEOC as a good faith effort on our part to improve our overall affirmative action efforts.

The Program of Requirements for this renovation project was presented and approved at the August 1979 meeting of the Board.

E. Authorization to Issue a Purchase Order for the Reroofing of Jones Dining Hall

We recommend that Southwest Texas State University be authorized to issue a purchase order to A. A. Shepherd Roofing and Remodeling of San Antonio, Texas, in the amount of \$28,552.00 for the lowest bid for the reroofing of the Jones Dining Hall. The cost of such work will be paid from available Auxiliary Pledged funds.

F. San Marcos Consolidated Independent School District Contract -- Use of School District Facilities

The recommended contract, as submitted as Enclosure VII provides that the services of the staff and the facilities of the San Marcos Consolidated Independent School District shall be available to Southwest Texas State University students for observation in connection with the University's program of professional training for teacher education.

G. Right-of-Way License to Pedernales Electric Cooperative, Incorporated

We recommend approval of the proposed right-of-way license to the Pedernales Electric Cooperative, Incorporated. The Pedernales Electric Cooperative, Incorporated, has requested a right-of-way license for the construction of an underground electrical distribution system to provide electrical service to a Very High Frequency Omni-Directional Range with Tactical Air Navigation Aid (VORTAC) proposed by the Federal Aviation Administration at the San Marcos Municipal Airport which is adjacent to the University's property. The right-of-way consists of a ten-foot-wide area as described in the licensing agreement.

The right-of-way would be for the benefit of the City of San Marcos to improve the City's airport facility; therefore the City of San Marcos has joined with the Pedernales Electric Cooperative, Incorporated, in requesting that this license be approved. The City of San Marcos has been most cooperative with the University in all activities; therefore, it is recommended that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign the conveyance of the right-of-way license as presented in Enclosure VIII.

H. Southwest Texas State University Development Foundation Contract

The recommended contract, as submitted in Enclosure IX, provides that the University will help the Foundation solicit funds and maintain its records in return for the Foundation's agreeing to solicit and secure donations, gifts, and grants of money and property to assist the University pursuant to its Articles of Incorporation. A similar contract was previously approved in substance by the Board of Regents in May, 1979 (Board Order No. 79-255). In that Board Order the President of the University was authorized to sign a contract substantially the same as the one approved. Subsequent negotiations with the Foundation Trustees, and consultation with the Attorney General's Office, resulted in modification to Section 3 of the original contract. The contract in Enclosure IX has been approved by both the University

and the Development Foundation and is being submitted for final Board of Regents' approval. As provided for in Section 1, the contract will be cancelled within 30 days if not approved by the Board of Regents.

I. Support Foundation Contract

The Administrative Services Agreement between Southwest Texas State University and the Southwest Texas State University Support Foundation was been in effect since September 1, 1979. It was developed after the promulgation of Attorney General's Opinion H-1309, which indicated the need for a contract when the University provides services to a foundation. The Support Foundation is a small operation of volunteers, with no paid staff. In conducting its business, the Foundation receives a small amount of clerical assistance from the University. The contract in Enclosure X provides for a payment of \$300.00 annually to the University for typing and clerical services.

This contract was executed before the adoption of the Regents' Rules requiring that contracts with foundations be submitted to the Board. It is, nevertheless, submitted to the Board for approval in view of the Board's expression of interest in the relationship between the University and its Development Foundation and Support Foundation.

We recommend that the Board approve and ratify this contract.

Section 96.42. STUDENT FEES FOR BUS SERVICE

(a) The board of regents may charge each student enrolled at the institution SOUTHWEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY a fee not exceeding \$10 per semester or \$5 per six-week summer term to be used to finance bus service for students attending the institution. However, no fee may be levied unless the fee is approved by a majority vote of those students participating in a general election called for that purpose.

(b) The board may increase the fee authorized in Subsection-(a) of this section by an amount not to exceed \$1 per student during any one academic year. The board may not increase this fee to exceed \$10 per semester or \$5 per six-week summer term. THE INITIAL FEE FOR EACH STUDENT SHALL BE \$10.00 PER SEMESTER OR \$5.00 PER SIX-WEEK SUMMER TERM. TO COVER INCREASED OPERATING COSTS, THE BOARD MAY INCREASE THE FEE BY AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2.00 PER STUDENT FOR ANY ONE REGULAR SEMESTER OR \$1.00 PER STUDENT FOR ANY SIX-WEEK SUMMER TERM.

(c) ANY FUNDS RECEIVED BY THE UNIVERSITY FROM THIS FEE IN EXCESS OF THOSE NECESSARY TO MEET THE OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE BUS SERVICE SHALL BE HELD BY THE UNIVERSITY IN RESERVE, AND APPLIED ONLY TO FUTURE OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE BUS SERVICE.

(d) The fee for student bus service shall not be counted in determining the maximum student service fees which may be charged pursuant to the provisions of Section 54.503 of this code.

SUPPORT OF SHUTTLEBUS BILL

WHEREAS: An amendment to a bill concerning student fees for bus service reads as follows:

- (a) The Board of Regents may charge each student enrolled at Southwest Texas State University a fee to be used to finance bus service for students attending the institution.
- (b) The initial fee for each student shall be \$10.00 per semester or \$5.00 per six-week summer term. To cover increased operating costs, the Board may increase the fee by an amount not to exceed \$2.00 per student for any one regular semester or \$1.00 per student for any six-week summer term.
- (c) Any funds received by the University from this fee in excess of those necessary to meet the operating expenses of the bus service shall be held by the University in reserve, and applied only to future operating expenses of the bus service.
- (d) The fee for student bus service shall not be counted in determining the maximum student service fees which may be charged pursuant to the provisions of Section 54.503 of this Code.

Section 2. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended, and that this act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted, and

WHEREAS: these amendments are urgently needed in order to meet the rising costs of fuel, and

WHEREAS: fee increases are immanent if the Shuttlebus System at Southwest Texas State University is to continue as a successful student service; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Associated Student Government strongly support this amended bill to be submitted to the 67th Legislature.

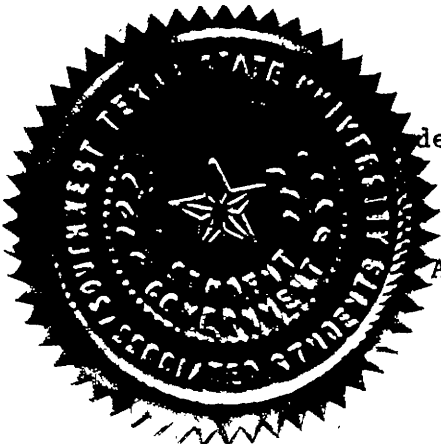

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED PROGRAMS

1. What is the title and nature of the proposed degree program?

This request seeks authorization for the following degree program: Master of Education with a major in Agricultural Education. The degree is designed for students who are practicing professionals in vocational agriculture, agriculture extension education, governmental agriculture categories and other professional vocational education programs.

THE PRIMARY PURPOSES OF THE DEGREE ARE:

- a. To expand the current Master of Education degree to include a major in Agricultural Education with an integrated minor in Agriculture and closely related fields. A degree program of this nature and title will serve a much larger clientele than programs currently available.
- b. To provide an opportunity for a significant number of graduates in the field of Agricultural Education to continue their education at the graduate level. In addition, to provide an opportunity for those individuals to develop their professional and technical competencies in an area of fundamental and increasing importance to educational programs in the public schools of Texas.
- c. To utilize more fully the already available knowledge, skills and experience of faculty members in the Department of Agriculture by employing that talent in working with students interested in continuing their formal education beyond the baccalaureate degree level. In addition to utilizing the already available faculty expertise, the addition of a graduate program should provide additional opportunities for these faculty members to participate in research activities, thus increasing their value as teachers of both undergraduate and graduate students.

3. Outline a semester-by-semester curriculum for the proposed program, if applicable.

Not applicable.

4. What special requirements are included in the degree plan? If a graduate degree is contemplated, is a thesis or dissertation required? If not, what will be substituted? Describe any innovative changes in degree requirements.

No thesis will be required, but a scholarly research paper will be required in several courses. This will permit the student to develop additional skills and competency in each subject matter area.

5. Is the proposed program entirely new to the institution? Is it an extension of a minor field? If so, give the number of students minoring in the program during the last three years.

This program is not entirely new. A Master's Degree with a major in Agricultural Education was offered at this institution from 1950-1959. A total of forty-nine (49) students were awarded the Master of Education Degree with a major in Agricultural Education as a result of that program. Interest in the program was strong and increasing when it was voluntarily terminated at the close of the 1958-1959 school year. Currently, students earning a Master of Education Degree with a major in Secondary Education may minor in Agriculture and may apply a limited number of Agriculture Education courses toward their major. This arrangement does not meet the needs of ninety percent of the Baccalaureate Degree practicing professionals at the secondary school, junior college, agriculture extension and other agriculture worker levels. Over the past two years, about twelve (12) students have enrolled in the current plan. With a large number of requests for the revised program, there would be thirty (30) to thirty-five (35) active students within a three year period.

6. How many similar programs are offered elsewhere in Texas, and where? What is the nearest institution offering a similar program?

Graduate Agriculture Education programs presently are offered at the following institutions: Texas A&M University, Texas A&I University, Prairie View A&M University, Sam Houston State University, East Texas State University, and Texas Tech University. Texas A&M is the nearest institution offering a similar program.

7. Describe current manpower needs for graduates of the program. Also, describe how the proposed program strengthens the total academic program of the institution.

Current manpower needs for highly competent agriculture teachers, County Agricultural Extension personnel and other agricultural professionals (Soil Conservation, F.H.A., A.S.C.S. and Agriculture Business) in the Central and Southern geographical areas of our state are strong.

- a. Public school agriculture programs and the Texas Agriculture Extension Service have education leave time available for their employees to return

for advanced training at the university level. Each program is demanding the additional training be acquired by their employees.

- b. The Department Chairman has received a number of inquiries over the last two years. Generally, teachers and agriculture extension agents returning to college for graduate work want to develop in depth knowledge and skills to better perform their professional responsibilities.
 - c. With the population increase, food shortage, and economic pressure, the need for well trained teachers of agriculture and other agriculture professionals has never been greater. It will be difficult to meet the future demands for competent agriculture teachers and leaders.
 - d. The proposed program will serve a large concentration of Teachers of Vocational Agriculture and other professional agriculture workers within a seventy-five (75) mile radius of Southwest Texas State University. Furthermore, the only other university offering any agriculture or agriculture education at the graduate level from San Marcos to the Rio Grande Valley is Texas A&I University. This school is presently offering a limited program.
 - e. The proposed program should strengthen the total academic program at Southwest Texas State University, especially by providing a logical and necessary extension of professional competencies at the graduate level.
 - f. The enrollment of undergraduates in the agriculture program at Southwest Texas State University is on the increase. This past year enrollment increased about twelve percent. Graduates from the undergraduate program are demanding advanced training opportunities.

At least twenty-five (25) teachers of vocational agriculture in this region have expressed a definite desire to continue their graduate training should this program be made available to them.

10. Describe the likely source of students who will enroll in the program. (Will they come from existing programs or will they be attracted to the institution to enroll in the proposed program?)

The initial source of students will be those employed in the public schools and agriculture extension service in the area. There will be some who are attempting to continue their education in traditional programs but will enroll in this program since it is designed to fit their needs and professional goals. A sizeable number of the graduating seniors would most likely enroll in graduate school if a master's program were available. There are one hundred, ninety-three (193) junior and senior agriculture majors at the present time.

11. Give the number of persons presently on the faculty who will be most directly involved in the proposed program. List name, rank, highest degree, present course load, and estimated course load in the proposed program for each. Do present faculty meet minimal criteria for the requested program?

The present faculty will meet basic criteria for the program. Those who will be most directly involved with the proposed program are:

12. Calculate the present student ratio in the subject matter field(s) or department(s) in which the proposed program will be offered. (Divide fulltime equivalent students by full-time equivalent faculty.) Also, give the average teacher-student ratio in the courses given by the department (planned number of students per class).

The subject matter fields or departments in which the proposed program will be offered are not new at Southwest Texas State University. In the Agriculture Department the student-faculty ratio at the present time is 29.25. The average teacher-student ratio in the graduate courses given by the department will be approximately 15 to 20.

13. Project the need for new faculty required for the proposed program for the next five years. If the teaching responsibilities for the proposed program will be absorbed in part or in whole by the present faculty, describe how this will be done.

The departments involved are large enough to absorb the new courses during the first two years. By September 1980 the projected undergraduate and graduate enrollments will necessitate an additional staff member in the major area and one in the technical area in 1981.

14. Will acquisition of new faculty for the program require an additional outlay of funds? Explain in detail.

As indicated in Item 13, the addition of faculty members will not be needed to initiate the program. Current projections suggest that the salary for one faculty member will need to be added the second year (1980-81) and another the following year (1981-82).

15. Describe the involvement of the faculty, present and projected, in research, extension, correspondence, and other activities related to the proposed program. Will this program decrease or increase the course load of present faculty?

Currently, individual faculty members are conducting research in areas of vegetable production, agriculture mechanics, animal nutrition and agriculture student profile and training needs studies. Off-campus undergraduate and graduate classes are presently being conducted. Teaching loads will not be increased or decreased for any possible research activity or correspondence and extension courses.

16. Are present library holdings in relevant fields adequate to begin the proposed program? How will the library have to be improved to meet program needs in the next four years? (Please explain need for books, periodicals, reference books, primary source materials, etc.) What are your institutional surpluses or deficiencies in holdings as measured by the Clapp-Jordan Formula? How will approval of this program alter this situation?

Adequate library holdings now exist or are already funded in academic fields. New professional books and journals are continuously added to the extensive collection. Specialized library materials have been added over several years as a part of regular allocations.

17. Do faculty and students now use libraries of other institutions? Could they do so in the proposed program? Explain in detail.

At the present there are strong reading facilities at Southwest Texas State University. Little outside library reading will be needed. A complete collection of reading research documents from ERIC-CRIER, AIM/ARM (Educational Resources Information Center - Clearinghouse on Retrieval of Information and Evaluation on Reading, Abstracts of Instructional and Research Materials) is also available. S.W.T.S.U. has maintained a steady accumulation of research documents.

18. Estimate the total expenditure for the last two complete fiscal years for library acquisitions in the departments or subject matter fields in which the proposed program will be offered, or in fields which are closely related to the proposed program.

20. Describe existing facilities that are available for the proposed program. Describe the present utilization of these facilities. What new facilities will be needed in the near future? Will the approval of this program result in planning for the addition of new facilities?

The Business-Agriculture-Mathematics Building was completed and occupied in March 1972. Agriculture Department facilities consist of individual faculty offices, four modern classrooms, a soils laboratory, an animal science laboratory, and a processing laboratory (meats, fruits, vegetables) and an Agriculture Education media laboratory. A new Agricultural Mechanics Center is located nearby. This center is one of the best equipped and organized in Texas. No additional space and equipment will be needed specifically for the program. Also, the Agriculture Department has just completed new horticulture facilities (greenhouse and headhouse). The laboratory farm for the undergraduate students is being improved and will improve the

program for students and research activities. The recently approved University Master Plan includes expansion in agriculture classroom and laboratory facilities.

21. Will the proposed program affect the administrative structure of the institution? If yes, describe how. In what department, division, school or college will the proposed program be administered? If the program is to have inter-departmental or inter-unit administration, explain in detail.

The proposed program will not affect the administrative structure of the institution. The program will be under the School of Applied Arts.

22. Describe the requirements for accreditation, if the program is eligible to be accredited. What is the name of the accrediting agency? What will be the initial costs of accreditation and the subsequent annual costs to maintain it? Identify basic criteria for accreditation and describe how well these are presently being met.

Southwest Texas State University's teacher training program is fully accredited by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The proposed program will be expected to meet or exceed the accreditation requirements of these groups. Also, a professional certificate program will be submitted to the Texas Education Agency's Board of Examiners for Teacher Certification. No initial costs of accreditation are anticipated.

23. Evaluate the subject matter fields at your institution which may be considered as necessary, or valuable in support of the proposed program. Will these fields need improvement or expansion? If so, how, to what extent, and to what cost? Be specific.

The subject matter fields at this institution which may be considered as necessary or valuable, in support of the proposed program are as follows:

- a. Agriculture
- b. Biology
- c. Education
- d. Business

The supportive areas for the proposed program will require no improvement or expansion. The agriculture curriculum offerings will need to be increased as indicated in the previous sections of the proposal.

24. Estimate the initial (first year) costs of the proposed program. If this is an extension of an ongoing program, what will be the cost differential?

The first years cost of the proposed program can be absorbed in the current operating cost. Any additional cost would be in a more complete utilization of present faculty during the summer sessions. The lack of utilization is a big factor in securing and holding competent faculty members. Therefore, faculty cost for summer sessions will increase about \$3,000 for the first year and \$5,000 each summer afterwards. No other cost should be involved.

(B) How will the proposed program affect the allocation or distribution of these funds?

The proposed program should have little or no effect on the supporting department's budget since only about one-third of the students desire course work outside the department in their program. These students will be enrolled in several class sections. The supporting departments should not be overburdened and budgetary increases should be minimal.

27. What additional funds for research will be needed to support the proposed program? Explain.

Additional funds for research will not be required to support the proposed program. The research involved would be educational survey research and the cost borne by the student. Clinical research is not desired.

28. How many graduate assistantships are considered desirable to begin the program? Estimate the amount of funds required for these assistantships over the next four years. What sources are available to support these assistantships? Will student aid funds be needed for undergraduates other than those provided for all undergraduates? Explain in detail.

One graduate assistantship is envisioned for the first year, two the second year and four during the third year of operation.

29. Describe briefly the sources of financial support for this program and evaluate the adequacy of funds for the inauguration and support of the program. Does the program give indications of becoming self-supporting within three years in terms of formula generated income?

The basic source of support will be funds appropriated by the State through existing appropriation formulas. Semester credit hours generated by the graduate level course offerings will be sufficient by the third year of implementation to finance the program through the formula basis. An estimate of semester credit hours generated each year is shown with the Coordinating Board formula appropriations for teacher salaries and departmental operation. A full-time student is assumed to carry 12 semester credit hours (SCH) in each of two long terms.

In evaluating the proposed program the following factors should be considered:

1) the need for the program; 2) practicality of implementation; 3) strength that it provides to the undergraduate program; 4) benefit to the students, the institution and the taxpayer.

The program, although fulfilling a specific need, is also practical in that facilities, faculty, and courses presently available in the major and supportive fields will be utilized to a large extent. Presently, for the lack of a proper degree title and plan, faculty and facilities are not utilized properly and to the fullest extent. This proposed program will bring about full utilization of faculty, facilities, and will provide necessary services to the public schools and the agriculture community in this area of the State.

SPEECH COMMUNICATION AND THEATRE ARTS

Request For Establishing A Non-Thesis Option For M.A. Degrees

Spring, 1980

I. CURRENT STATUS

The Department of Speech Communication and Theatre Arts currently offers graduate students the opportunity to earn a Master of Arts degree in either Speech Communication or Theatre Arts. The minimum number of hours required is thirty (30) semester hours. A thesis is required of both Speech Communication and Theatre Arts majors. Thesis options open to students include: (1) data-based studies, (2) research thesis in the areas of theory, history, and criticism in either speech or drama, (3) creative thesis in directing, playwriting, design, costume, children's theatre, creative dramatics, or oral interpretation. In the Division of Speech Communication approximately eighty percent of our students have elected either option #1 or #2, while in the Division of Theatre Arts, approximately fifty-five percent of our majors have elected option #3, the creative thesis.

II. PROPOSED PROGRAM CHANGE

The department wishes to retain the current thesis options as one of two programs available to our graduate majors. The thesis route would be strongly recommended to all Speech Communication graduate students who enter our program with the intention of pursuing a doctorate. The thesis route would be required for students in Theatre Arts whose emphasis is playwriting, dramatic literature, dramatic theory, or dramatic criticism. Non-thesis options would be available for Speech Communication majors not planning to pursue further graduate work beyond the Master's degree and for Theatre Arts majors whose emphasis is directing, design, costume, children's theatre, or creative dramatics. Specifically, the non-thesis option would consist of the following:

- A. A program consisting of a minimum of thirty - six (36) semester hours and a maximum of forty-two (42) semester hours. A minimum of twenty-four semester hours must be completed in the student's major -- either Speech Communication or Theatre Arts. The remaining twelve to eighteen hours may consist of courses within the student's major, or, with the approval of the departmental graduate committee, may consist of courses from cognate areas.
- B. No formal thesis would be required. However, each departmental Division has established requirements that will insure that the major possesses requisite creative and/or writing skills. In the Division of Speech Communication, non-thesis majors would be required to submit two (2) scholarly papers drawn from the student's coursework to the graduate faculty for approval/rejection as evidence of the student's writing and organizational skills.

In the Division of Theatre Arts, non-thesis majors will be required to complete a major creative project by either directing, designing, or costuming a major production for the University Theatre. This project will require the student to demonstrate the ability to put theory into practice at a high level of competence -- to research, analyze, design, and execute a theatrical production as director, set designer, or costumer. Instead of submitting a bound, typed thesis as in the past, the student will submit the following materials upon completion of the creative project:

1. Directing: A production book containing a complete analysis of the background of the play, the conflict, structure, action, characters, language, style, and genre of the play; a production concept to include the visual aspects of the production; rehearsal schedules, audition information, and the prompt script.
2. Costume: An analysis of the script, style, period; detailed character analyses, drawings, and construction plan.
3. Design: An analysis of the script, style, period, and concept; a rendering or model, detailed working drawings, and light plot.

Additionally, students who elect the creative project option will be expected to demonstrate a high degree of ability in research and writing skills by submitting to the graduate faculty a major research paper from one of the Theatre Arts classes taken. This paper should demonstrate the student's ability to design a research proposal, conduct research, and communicate the results of that research in an acceptable written form.

- C. Written and/or oral comprehensive examinations would be required of all non-thesis students in both Speech Communication and Theatre Arts. The examinations would consist of questions covering major areas of study as well as cognate areas, where applicable. A supervising committee, consisting of at least three graduate faculty members, will conduct the examination(s) and notify the departmental chairman when a candidate has satisfactorily completed the examination(s). In the Division of Theatre Arts, a separate oral examination in defense of the creative project will be required in addition to the course work comprehensive examination(s).

III. REASONS FOR PROGRAM CHANGE

Currently, graduate students are offered non-thesis options for Master of Arts degrees in Speech Communication and/or Theatre Arts in a number of Texas universities. Such universities have recognized the fact that an additional twelve to eighteen hours of course work can be more valuable than the thesis experience for certain students who plan no further academic work beyond the Master of Arts degree. Since most doctoral programs will readily accept the submission of scholarly papers in lieu of a formal thesis as evidence of writing skills, our requirement of two scholarly papers for non-thesis students will protect those students who later decide to apply for

doctoral work. We fully expect approximately one-half of our students to continue to elect the thesis option. For those students who are motivated to work on a major thesis project, the thesis experience will continue to be a valuable part of their academic training. For students who desire a master's degree with maximum exposure to a variety of classroom experiences, the non-thesis option will be a natural avenue.

THIS AGREEMENT, made the _____ day of _____, 19____, by and between _____ of _____, Texas, a banking corporation duly incorporated and authorized by law to do bank business in the State of Texas, hereinafter called the DEPOSITORY, and the Board of Regents, Texas State University System for Southwest Texas State University of San Marcos, Texas, hereinafter called the BOARD OF REGENTS, agree that:

I

In consideration of this agreement, the DEPOSITORY agrees to and with the BOARD OF REGENTS that it will act as depository for funds that may be deposited with it by Southwest Texas State University of San Marcos, Texas, at any time from September 1, 1980, through August 31, 1981, or until its successor is qualified.

II

All funds on deposit with DEPOSITORY to the credit of Southwest Texas State University shall be secured as follows:

1. Bonds or other evidences of direct indebtedness of the United States.
2. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness which are guaranteed as to both principal and interest by the United States.

3. Bonds of the Board of Regents of any four-year educational institution of the State of Texas.
4. Permanent University Fund Bonds of the Texas A&M University System and the University of Texas System.
5. Bonds of the following categories which are rated "A" or better by Moody's and Standard and Poor's or by either if not rated by both:
 - A. Tax bonds of the State of Texas.
 - B. State of Texas Veteran's Land Bonds.
 - C. Colleges of the State of Texas Constitutional Tax Bonds.
 - D. Tax-supported bonds of Texas cities, Texas counties, Texas independent school districts, and junior college districts.
 - E. Revenue bonds of utility systems issued by Texas cities.
 - F. Bonds of the following agencies of the State of Texas: Brazos River Authority, Lower Colorado River Authority, Trinity River Authority, and Water Development Board.

DEPOSITORY shall certify to the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University the market value of securities on the date said securities are pledged. The pledged securities shall have an aggregate market or par value, whichever is less, exclusive of accrued interest, at all times at least equal to the sum of the balances on deposit with DEPOSITORY in all accounts of Southwest Texas State University, and such pledged securities shall be deposited with the _____ of _____, Texas, hereinafter called the TRUSTEE. Such securities so deposited with TRUSTEE shall be held under joint Trust Receipt issued by said TRUSTEE in favor of DEPOSITORY and BOARD OF REGENTS, the original of such receipt shall be filed with the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University.

Within 10 days after the end of each calendar month, DEPOSITORY shall furnish to the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University in writing a signed statement showing a completely itemized list of the securities held as pledged collateral for Southwest Texas State University.

III

In the event the DEPOSITORY named shall be unable to pay or shall fail to pay and satisfy upon presentment for payment any check or draft lawfully drawn upon any existing fund of Southwest Texas State University, then the BOARD OF REGENTS shall have the right and power any time thereafter to procure the entire amount of money then on deposit in said DEPOSITORY belonging to Southwest Texas State University, by forced sale of the collateral pledged, and said TRUSTEE is hereby directed on demand of the BOARD OF REGENTS to surrender such pledged securities to the BOARD OF REGENTS, and the BOARD OF REGENTS is hereby fully authorized and empowered to proceed with the sale of such securities to the extent necessary to permit the BOARD OF REGENTS to receive in full its cash balances theretofore in such DEPOSITORY, and the money derived from such sale shall be the property of Southwest Texas State University in an amount equal to the funds of Southwest Texas State University in the DEPOSITORY, and any amount in excess thereof shall be the property of the DEPOSITORY. Such sales may be public or private and may be made in Austin, Texas, or elsewhere at the discretion of the BOARD OF REGENTS, and shall convey such securities absolutely to the purchase thereof and no notice of such sale shall be necessary.

IV

It is agreed that said DEPOSITORY shall have the privilege of substituting or changing the securities herein pledged as occasion may require, subject, however, to the approval of the President of the institution or his representative.

V

It is further agreed herein that the TRUSTEE shall credit to the DEPOSITORY the proceeds of interest coupons on such bonds or securities as they become due until otherwise notified by the BOARD OF REGENTS.

VI

It is understood that the TRUSTEE shall have no duty to ascertain the amount of funds on deposit by the BOARD OF REGENTS with the DEPOSITORY nor the validity or genuineness of securities deposited and that (1) under Article III, TRUSTEE has no duty to verify the circumstances but solely to comply with the "demand" of BOARD OF REGENTS. (2) DEPOSITORY shall be entitled to income on securities held by TRUSTEE and TRUSTEE may dispose of such income as directed by DEPOSITORY without approval of the BOARD OF REGENTS.

VII

It is further agreed that the DEPOSITORY will service the accounts in an efficient and prompt manner at no expense to the University and shall pay interest each month as it accrues on all funds deposited with it as time deposits at a rate to be determined as of the date of deposit in accordance with the table presented below:

II

All funds on deposit with DEPOSITORY to the credit of Southwest Texas State University shall be secured as follows:

1. Bonds or other evidences of direct indebtedness of the United States.
2. Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness which are guaranteed as to both principal and interest by the United States.

3. Bonds of the Board of Regents of any four-year educational institution of the State of Texas.
4. Permanent University Fund Bonds of the Texas A&M University System and the University of Texas System.
5. Bonds of the following categories which are rated "A" or better by Moody's and Standard and Poor's or by either if not rated by both:
 - A. Tax bonds of the State of Texas.
 - B. State of Texas Veteran's Land Bonds.
 - C. Colleges of the State of Texas Constitutional Tax Bonds.
 - D. Tax-supported bonds of Texas cities, Texas counties, Texas independent school districts, and junior college districts.
 - E. Revenue bonds of utility systems issued by Texas cities.
 - F. Bonds of the following agencies of the State of Texas: Brazos River Authority, Lower Colorado River Authority, Trinity River Authority, and Water Development Board.

DEPOSITORY shall certify to the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University the market value of securities on the date said securities are pledged. The pledged securities shall have an aggregate market or par value, whichever is less, exclusive of accrued interest, at all times at least equal to the sum of the balances on deposit with DEPOSITORY in all accounts of Southwest Texas State University, and such pledged securities shall be deposited with the _____ of _____, Texas, hereinafter called the TRUSTEE. Such securities so deposited with TRUSTEE shall be held under joint Trust Receipt issued by said TRUSTEE in favor of DEPOSITORY and BOARD OF REGENTS, the original of such receipt shall be filed with the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University.

Within 10 days after the end of each calendar month, DEPOSITORY shall furnish to the chief fiscal officer of Southwest Texas State University in writing a signed statement showing a completely itemized list of the securities held as pledged collateral for Southwest Texas State University.

III

In the event the DEPOSITORY named shall be unable to pay or shall fail to pay and satisfy upon presentment for payment any check or draft lawfully drawn upon any existing fund of Southwest Texas State University, then the BOARD OF REGENTS shall have the right and power any time thereafter to procure the entire amount of money then on deposit in said DEPOSITORY belonging to Southwest Texas State University, by forced sale of the collateral pledged, and said TRUSTEE is hereby directed on demand of the BOARD OF REGENTS to surrender such pledged securities to the BOARD OF REGENTS, and the BOARD OF REGENTS is hereby fully authorized and empowered to proceed with the sale of such securities to the extent necessary to permit the BOARD OF REGENTS to receive in full its cash balances theretofore in such DEPOSITORY, and the money derived from such sale shall be the property of Southwest Texas State University in an amount equal to the funds of Southwest Texas State University in the DEPOSITORY, and any amount in excess thereof shall be the property of the DEPOSITORY. Such sales may be public or private and may be made in Austin, Texas, or elsewhere at the discretion of the BOARD OF REGENTS, and shall convey such securities absolutely to the purchase thereof and no notice of such sale shall be necessary.

IV

It is agreed that said DEPOSITORY shall have the privilege of substituting or changing the securities herein pledged as occasion may require, subject, however, to the approval of the President of the institution or his representative.

V

It is further agreed herein that the TRUSTEE shall credit to the DEPOSITORY the proceeds of interest coupons on such bonds or securities as they become due until otherwise notified by the BOARD OF REGENTS.

VI

It is understood that the TRUSTEE shall have no duty to ascertain the amount of funds on deposit by the BOARD OF REGENTS with the DEPOSITORY nor the validity or genuineness of securities deposited and that (1) under Article III, TRUSTEE has no duty to verify the circumstances but solely to comply with the "demand" of BOARD OF REGENTS. (2) DEPOSITORY shall be entitled to income on securities held by TRUSTEE and TRUSTEE may dispose of such income as directed by DEPOSITORY without approval of the BOARD OF REGENTS.

VII

It is further agreed that the DEPOSITORY will service the accounts in an efficient and prompt manner at no expense to the University and shall pay interest each month as it accrues on all funds deposited with it, as time deposits at a rate to be determined as of the date of deposit in accordance with the table presented below:

AGREEMENT FOR CLASSROOM OBSERVATIONS

This agreement is made this _____ day of _____, 1980, between THE BOARD OF REGENTS, TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM, acting on behalf of Southwest Texas State University, a state-supported institution of higher education with its principal campus in San Marcos, Hays County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as "SWT", and THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, SAN MARCOS CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, whose administration offices are located at 501 South Lyndon B. Johnson Drive in San Marcos, Hays County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as "SMCISD".

In consideration of the mutual promises and consideration herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. TERM OF AGREEMENT

1.01 Term: This agreement shall commence on the _____ day of _____, 1980, and shall terminate on August 31, 1981.

2. DUTIES OF SMCISD

2.01 Student Observation: SMCISD will permit a reasonable number of students enrolled at SWT to observe classroom activities in its elementary and secondary schools. This observation will be made in connection with SWT's program of professional training for teacher education. The Director of Field Experiences at SWT and an administrative officer to be designated by SMCISD will coordinate the number of SWT students to be permitted to observe in SMCISD's classrooms, and all other matters relating to the time, place and manner of such observations as may be necessary to facilitate this

program. SMCISD will also permit such students of SWT permission to use its facilities, equipment, library, supplies, and, if available, lounges, locker space and eating facilities, all within the guidelines and restrictions established by SMCISD or the individual school to which the student is assigned, in order that such students may obtain practical classroom and public school experience and training as a part of their educational studies at SWT.

2.02 Equipment Provided by SMCISD: The facility will provide and maintain (or cause to be provided and maintained, if appropriate) such facilities, equipment, and supplies as it deems necessary for the students' observations and other activities under this agreement.

2.03 No Employer-Employee Relationship: The SWT students made the subject of this agreement will perform their observations and other duties and activities as a part of their instruction at SWT. Consequently, no compensation or payment of any kind is due such students by SMCISD and there is no employer-employee relationship between SMCISD and the student. Conversely, SMCISD will not charge such students any fee or other amount for the use of its facilities, equipment, library or supplies under this agreement. SMCISD may make reasonable charges for students using its eating facilities.

2.04 Accreditation: During the term of this agreement, SMCISD agrees to maintain its accreditation with the appropriate state accrediting agency.

2.05 Supervision: During the time SWT students are observing and performing other activities under this agreement, they will be under the supervision and control of the SMCISD classroom teacher

to whom they are assigned, as well as the administrators of the SMCISD and the particular school to which they are assigned.

3. DUTIES OF SWT

3.01 Supervision: SWT will provide qualified faculty members to assist in the supervision of the duties and activities of its students where appropriate. SWT will be responsible for the evaluation, counseling and guidance of its students assigned to this program. The parties understand that each student is required by SWT to complete at least eight observations, consisting of 55 minutes each, of the classroom activities in either secondary or elementary public school classrooms.

3.02 Salaries of Instructors: The salaries and expenses of regular SWT faculty members and supervisors will be paid by SWT and there will be no employer-employee relationship between the SMCISD and SWT's faculty members, supervisors or other employees.

3.03 Compensation: As consideration for the services to be rendered by SMCISD under this agreement, SMCISD shall be entitled to compensation in the amount of \$10,000.00, to be made in three installments as follows:

- (a) the sum of \$3,333.00 shall be paid on or before December 15, 1980;
- (b) the additional sum of \$3,333.00 shall be paid on or before March 15, 1981; and
- (c) the sum of \$3,334.00 shall be paid on or before June 15, 1981.

4. MISCELLANEOUS

4.01 Texas Law to Apply: This agreement shall be interpreted, construed and governed according to the laws of the State of Texas.

4.02 Only Agreement: This agreement constitutes the sole and only agreement of the parties hereto and supersedes any prior understandings or written or oral agreements between the parties respecting the within subject matter.

LICENSE AGREEMENT

This agreement made this _____ day of _____, 1980, by and between THE BOARD OF REGENTS, TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM, acting on behalf of Southwest Texas State University, a state-supported institution of higher education with its principal campus in San Marcos, Hays County, Texas hereinafter called the "Licensor", and PEDERNALES ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC., of Johnson City, Blanco County, Texas, hereinafter called the "Licensee".

WHEREAS, the Licensor is the owner of the following described real property:

All that certain tract or parcel of land, being 17.29 acres, more or less, out of the William Pettus Survey in Caldwell County, Texas, being the same land conveyed to Southwest Texas State University by the United States of America by deed dated November 7, 1975, and recorded in Volume 415, Page 283, Caldwell County Deed Records, which instrument and the record thereof is adopted herein for all descriptive purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Licensee desires to exercise certain rights and privileges upon and beneath the above described property,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

Licensor hereby grants and demises unto the Licensee the right to construct, install and maintain an underground electric distribution system, consisting of a variable number of underground cables and all necessary or desirable appurtenances (including conduits, primary cables, secondary conductors and ground rods underground and concrete pads, ground rods, ground clamps, transformers, cable terminators, cable riser shields, cutouts, and lightning arrestors overground) at or near the location and along the general

course now located and staked out by the Licensee on the above described property.

This license shall consists of a 10-foot wide area with the center line described as follows:

BEGINNING at a existing three phase angle pole located approximately 300 feet northeast of the Horticulture Building. THENCE, south 11° six (6) minutes east 17.5 feet to a wood stake. THENCE, south 40° forty-six (46) minutes east 289.6 feet to a point in the southeast property line intersecting with the southeast property line 875 feet northeast of the southern most property corner.

The center line described above is shown on the plat attached hereto, marked EXHIBIT "A", and incorporated herein by reference.

Licensors further grants Licensee with prior notification the right of ingress and egress over Licensors adjacent lands to or from said center line for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing, inspecting, patrolling, operating, maintaining and removing said cables and appurtenances; the right to place new or additional cable or cables on said system and to change the sizes thereof; the right to relocate along the same general direction of said system; the right to remove from said lands all trees and parts thereof, or other obstructions, which endanger or may interfere with the efficiency or said system or their appurtenances; and the right to place temporary structures for use in constructing or repairing said system.

Licensee agrees that in using this license, if it damages trees or other property of the Licensors it will replace the trees or other property or will reimburse Licensors for the fair market value of any trees or other property damaged. The Licensee will not interfere with the normal use of the land.

Licensee assumes the risk of, and shall protect, indemnify and hold harmless Licensor from and against all liability for or on account of injury to or death of any and all persons or damage to property resulting from or incident to the installation, maintenance or use of the electrical distribution line, whether such injury, death or damage shall be caused or contributed to by the negligence of Licensor, its agents, employees or otherwise, and Licensee will protect, indemnify and hold harmless Licensor and any others legally using its premises from all claims, demands, suits or actions growing out of any such loss, injury or demands, including investigation costs, court costs, and attorneys fees arising from the risks herein assumed by Licensee. Licensee further agrees to immediately investigate any such claims, demands, or suits and shall defend, settle or otherwise dispose of the same at its sole cost and expense. In the event Licensee settles any such claims, demands or suits, it shall obtain a release which includes Licensor.

In consideration for this agreement, the Licensee shall pay to Licensor the sum of Ten and No/100 Dollars (\$10.00) cash, upon the execution of this agreement.

This license shall remain in effect as long as it is necessary for Licensee to provide electrical service to a High Frequency Omni-Directional Range (VORTAC) to be installed by the Federal Aviation Administration at the San Marcos Airport situated adjacent to the 17.29 acre tract in question. This license shall terminate at such time such electric service is no longer provided, and

Licensee shall thereafter be allowed a reasonable time in which to remove its property from Licensor's land.

This license is personal to the Licensee. It is nonassignable and any attempt to assign this license will terminate the license privileges granted to Licensee hereunder.

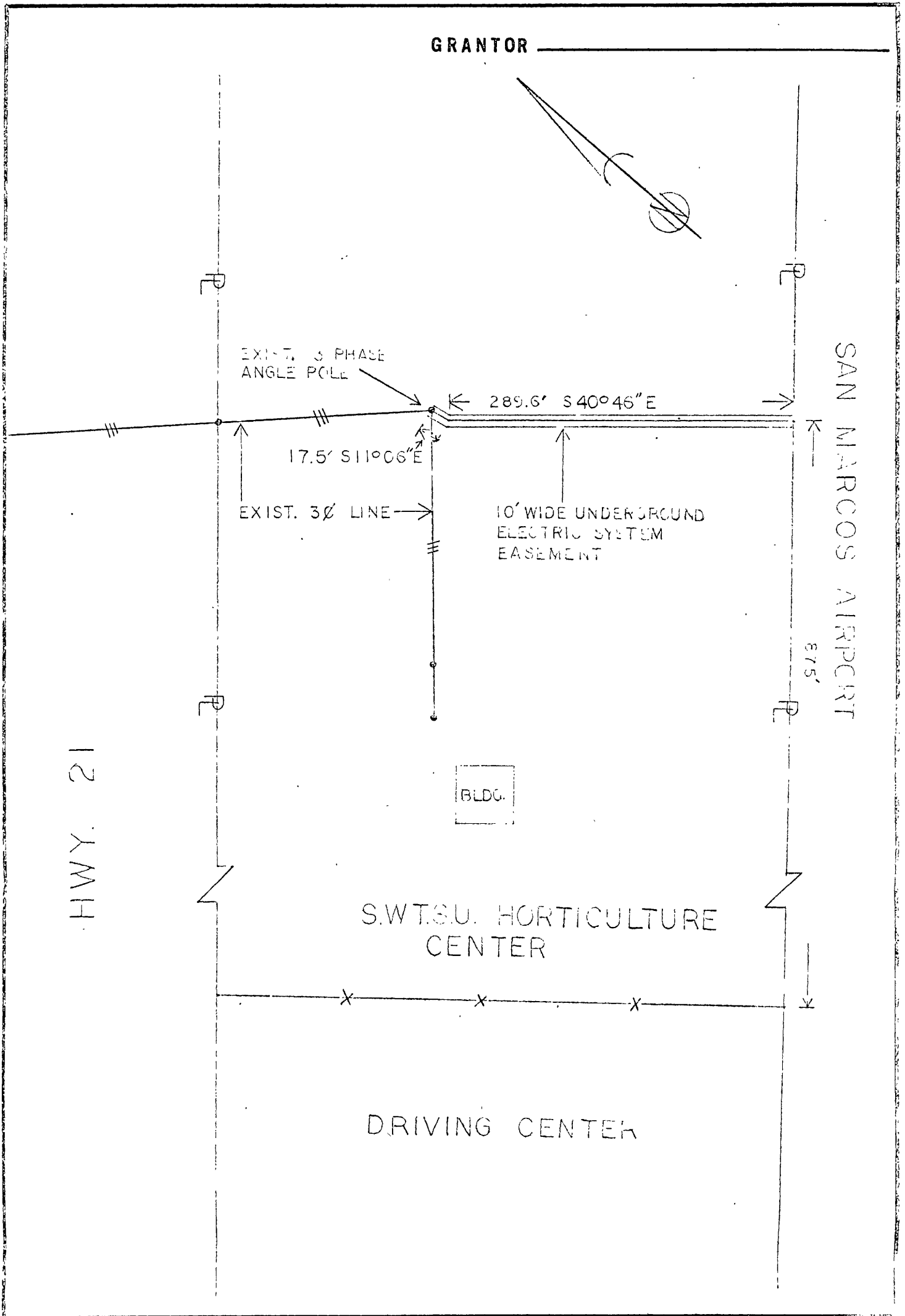

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES AGREEMENT

STATE OF TEXAS)

COUNTY OF HAYS)

This agreement is made this 8th day of February, 1980, between SOUTHWEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY, a State supported institution of higher education located in San Marcos, Hays County, Texas, hereinafter called the "University", and THE SOUTHWEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION, a Texas non-profit corporation with its principal office and place of business in San Marcos, Hays County, Texas, hereinafter called the "Foundation".

Recitals

It is the desire of the Foundation to engage the services of the University to perform for the Foundation assistance in its solicitation, fund-raising, record-keeping and related services as an independent contractor and not as an employee, and to compensate the University for such services.

It is the desire of the University to perform such services for the Foundation and to undertake, for the Foundation, assistance in its solicitation and fund-raising services and to assist the Foundation in keeping its books and records, in return for compensation for these services.

AGREEMENT

Term

1. The duties and obligations of the parties shall commence on the 8th day of February, 1980, and shall continue until terminated by either party giving thirty days' written notice to the other.

The University's Responsibilities

2. The University agrees to use its administrators, faculty members and staff employees to provide reasonable and necessary administrative and support services to the Foundation, including, but not limited to:

- a. Assisting the Foundation in its fund-raising efforts;
- b. Keeping the Foundation's books, records and performing related ministerial services for the Foundation; and
- c. Providing space, facilities and equipment for the Foundation's activities and records, all to the extent that it does not materially interfere with the educational functions of the University.

The Development Foundation's Obligations

3. The Foundation agrees to use its trustees and their individual and collective efforts to solicit and secure donations, gifts, and grants of money and property to assist the University pursuant to its Article of Incorporation. Further, the Foundation and the University agree to mutually set an annual budget for each fiscal year which will set forth, among other things, its fund-raising goals and expenditures of unrestricted funds for the year.

Entire Agreement

4. This agreement supersedes all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no other agreement, statement or promise relating to the subject matter of this agreement which is not contained herein shall be valid or binding.

Assignment

5. Neither this agreement nor any duties or obligations hereunder shall be assignable by either party without the prior written consent of the other.

Successors and Assigns

6. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this agreement shall be binding on the legal representatives, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

Governing Law

7. The validity of this agreement and of any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the parties are performable in Hays County, Texas.

Amendment

8. This agreement may be amended by the mutual agreement of the parties hereto in a writing to be attached to and incorporated into this agreement.

The University's Responsibilities

2. The University agrees to provide reasonable and necessary administrative and support services to the Foundation, including, but not limited to secretarial, clerical and related services, and the office supplies, space and equipment associated therewith.

The Foundation's Obligations

3. The Foundation agrees to use its Trustees in their individual and collective efforts to secure funds and property to assist the University as provided in its Articles of Incorporation. The Foundation will transfer funds and property to the University in the form of gifts in the amounts and manner determined from time to time during the term of this agreement by its Trustees.

4. The parties agree that specific cases requiring the cooperation of the parties may be covered in separate contracts or letters of agreement.

5. The Foundation agrees to pay \$300.00 annually for typing and clerical services.

Entire Agreement

6. This agreement supersedes all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no other agreement, statement or promise relating to the subject matter of this agreement which is not contained herein shall be valid or binding.

Assignment

7. Neither this agreement nor any duties or obligations hereunder shall be assignable by either party without the prior written consent of the other.

Successors and Assigns

8. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this agreement shall be binding on the legal representatives, successors and assigns of the respective parties.

Governing Law

9. The validity of this agreement and of any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the parties are performable in Hays County, Texas.

Amendment

10. This agreement may be amended by the mutual agreement of the parties hereto in writing to be attached to and incorporated into this agreement.
