 And we hope to reach our victory by fighting on the way.

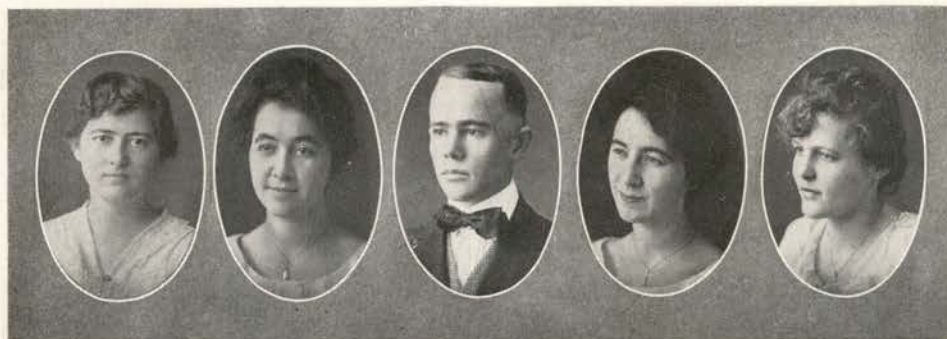

## Freshmen as Athletes

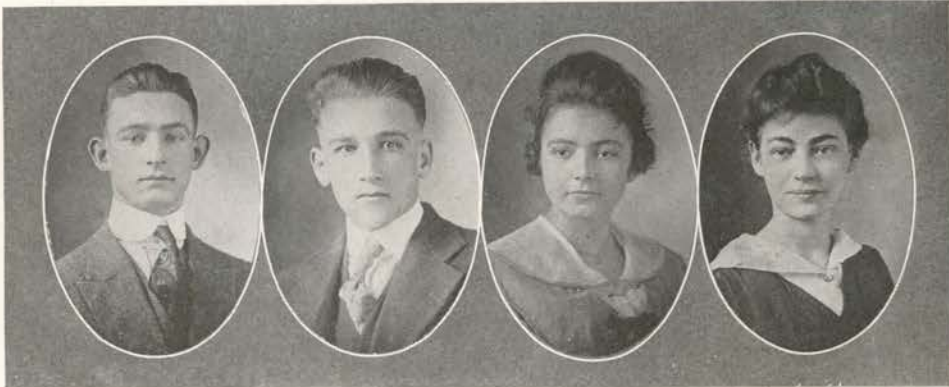

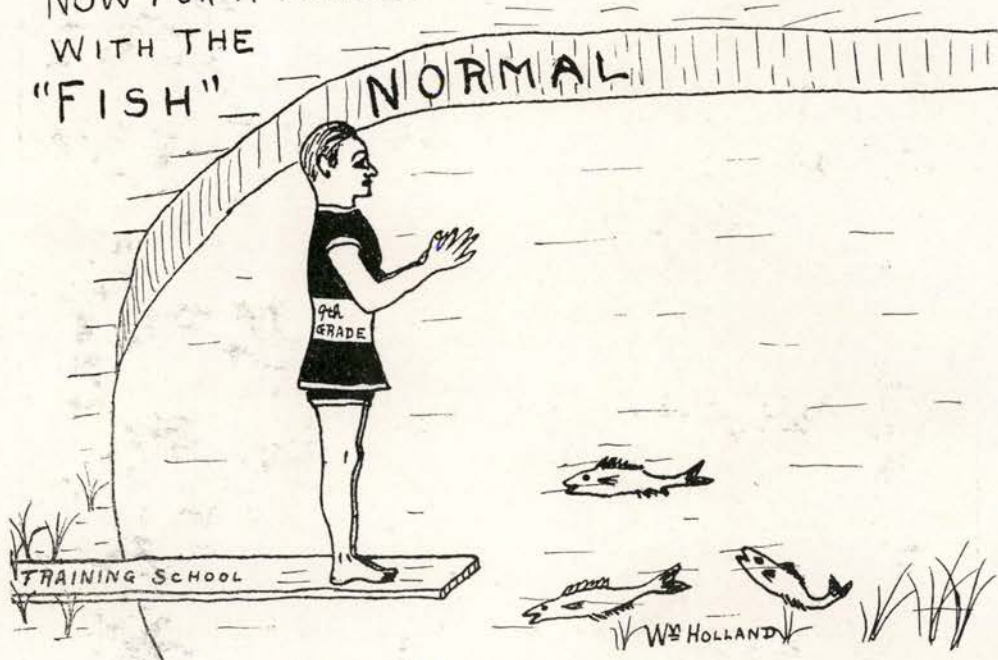

## What the Training School House Said

I was once only a dwelling just like the buildings around me, but one day Normal decided she wanted a place where she could train her students for teachers; so some men were sent down the hill to choose one of us for this school. These men talked and considered everything about us, and finally they decided to have me for this building. They hired carpenters, painters, and other men to improve me; there were blackboards put on my walls and desks put in all of the rooms. After they had everything in and about me prepared for a school house, they named me Training School, which name I still bear.

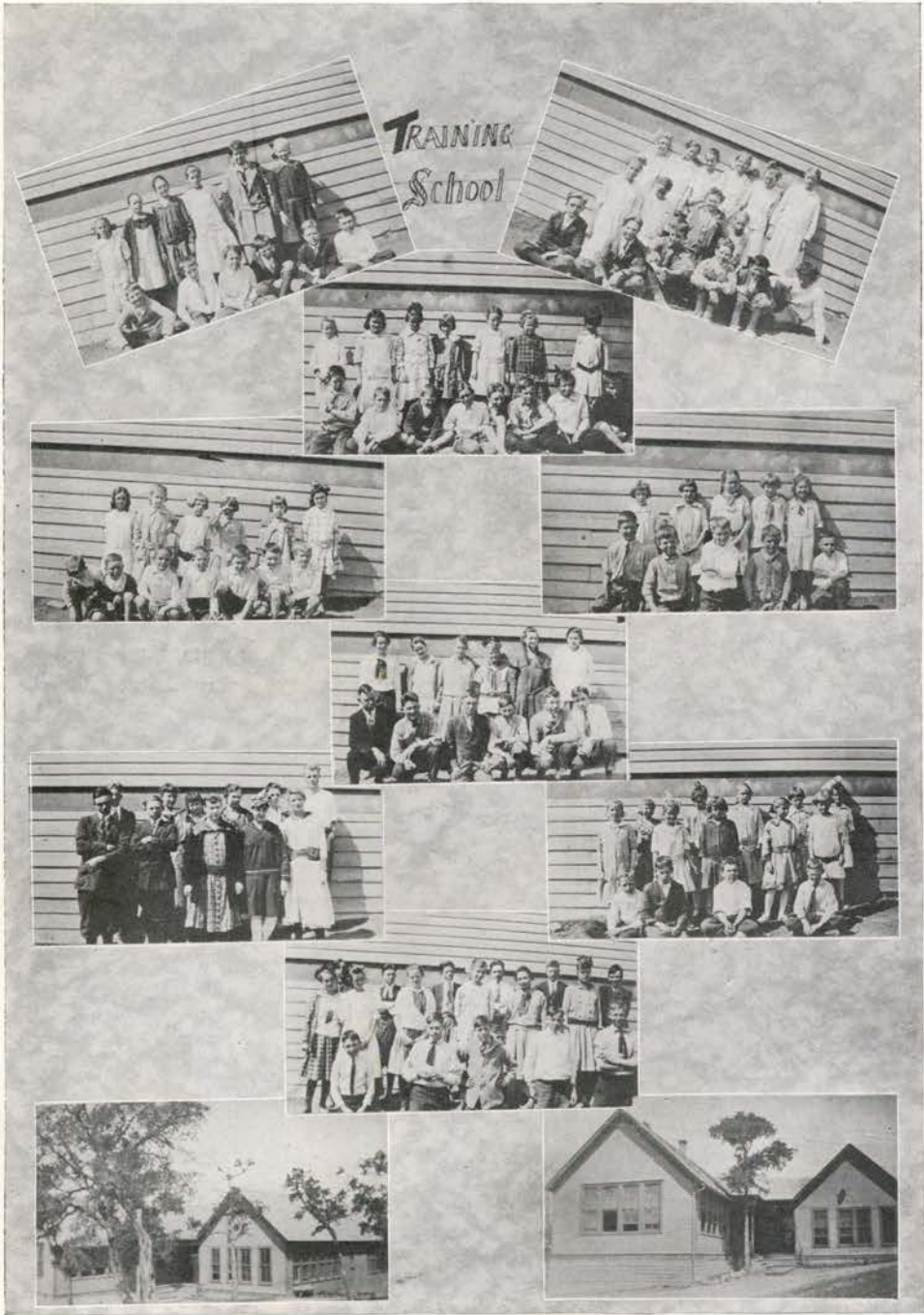
Now they could not have school without teachers, so the next thing the people did for me was to get five teachers—Mr. Garrett, Miss Blair, Mrs. Mayfield, Miss Smith, and Miss Cadwaller. But still I was not faultless, for there were no pupils to sit in the vacant desks, to write on the blackboards, or for those five teachers to teach. This was not a hard problem, either, for all they did was to tell the people who had children about me; and a child was sent for every desk—and some were sent away. Now everything was all right, and on January 3, 1914, I began my career as a school.

During these four years I have had many improvements made on me; my rooms have been made larger; new windows, doors and cloak rooms have been put in me, and my grounds have been improved by cleaning and planting flowers on them. There has been added to the course of study for the High School Department a course of Home Economics.

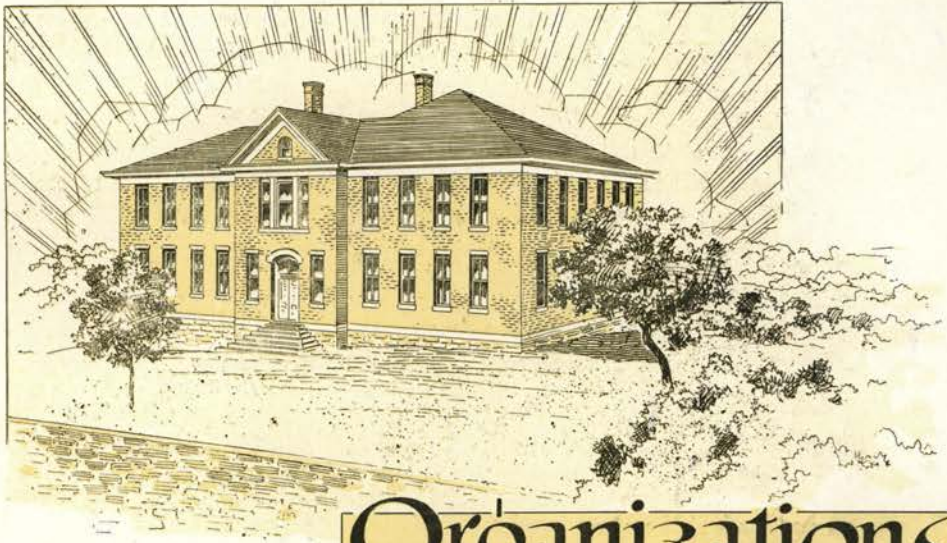
I even get acquainted with the Seniors of the Normal. They take Ed. 12, and teach my children.

The only fault I have is that I am so small! But I can see myself in the future as a big, fine building, surrounded by grounds with flowers and grass planted on them, and a great big spot well equipped for the children to play on. In those days I shall be perfect.

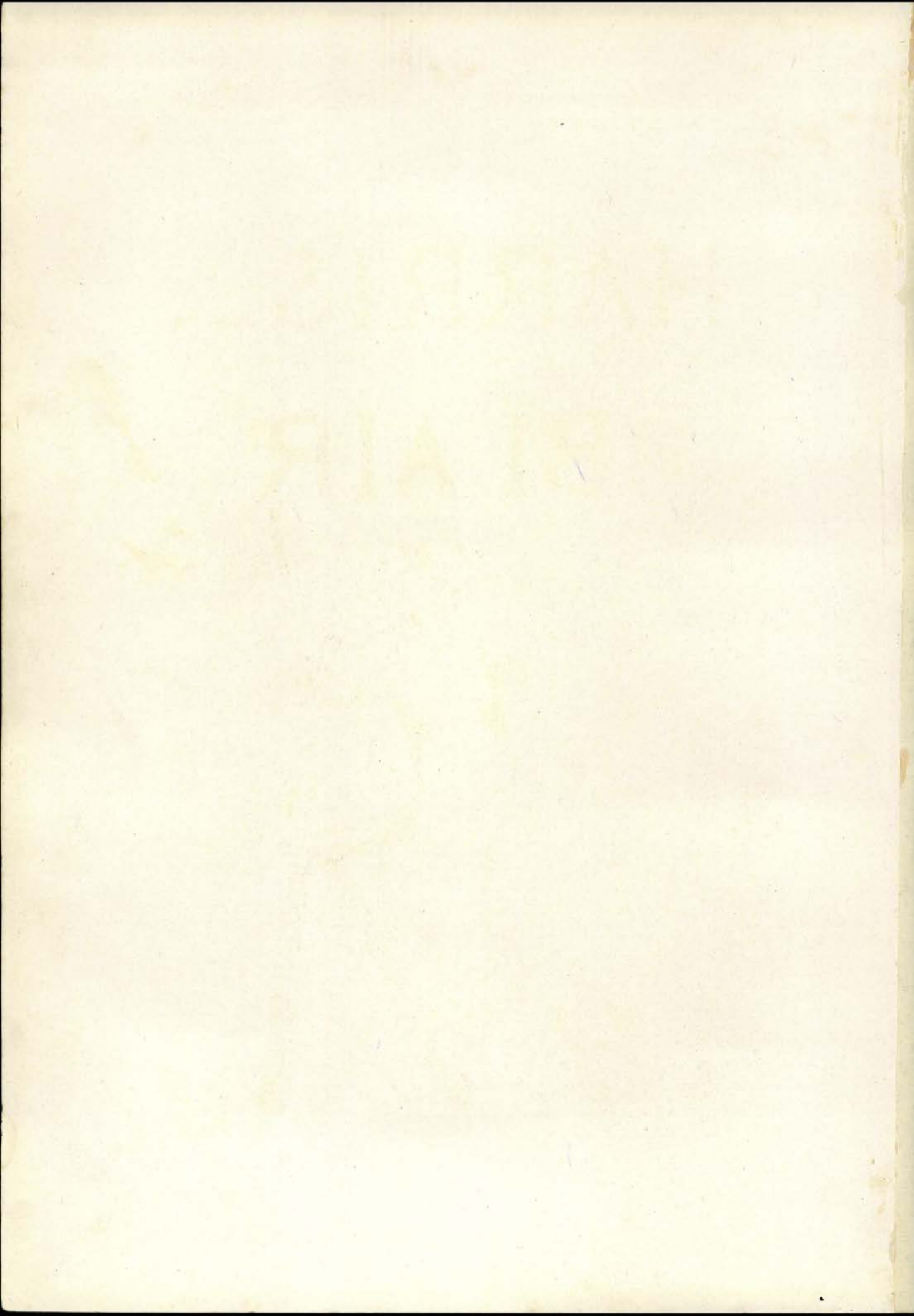

And to Texas, a stronger, nobler citizenship give.

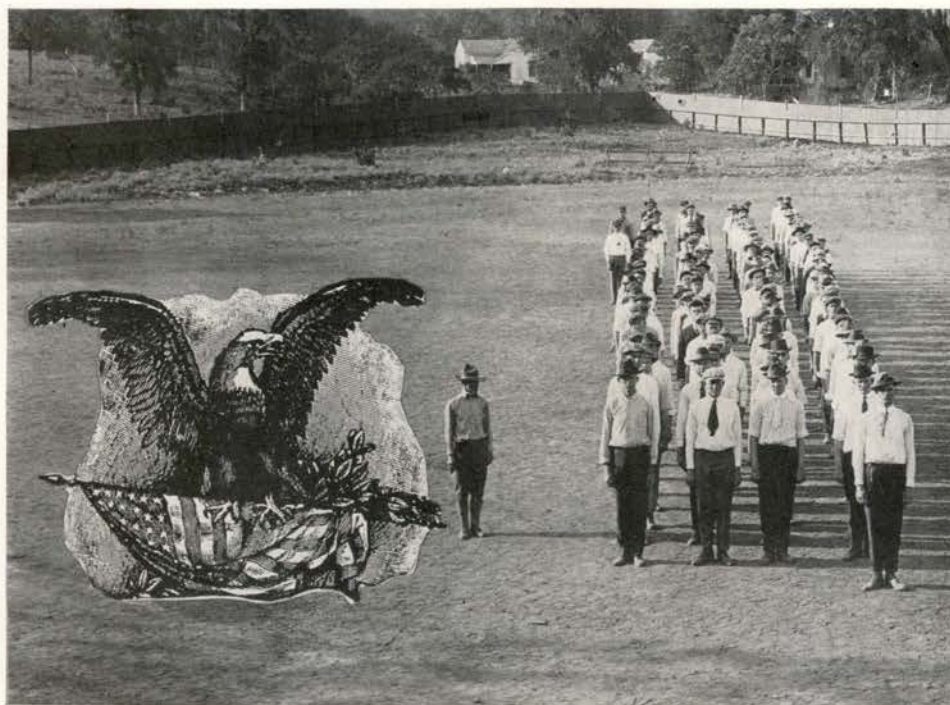

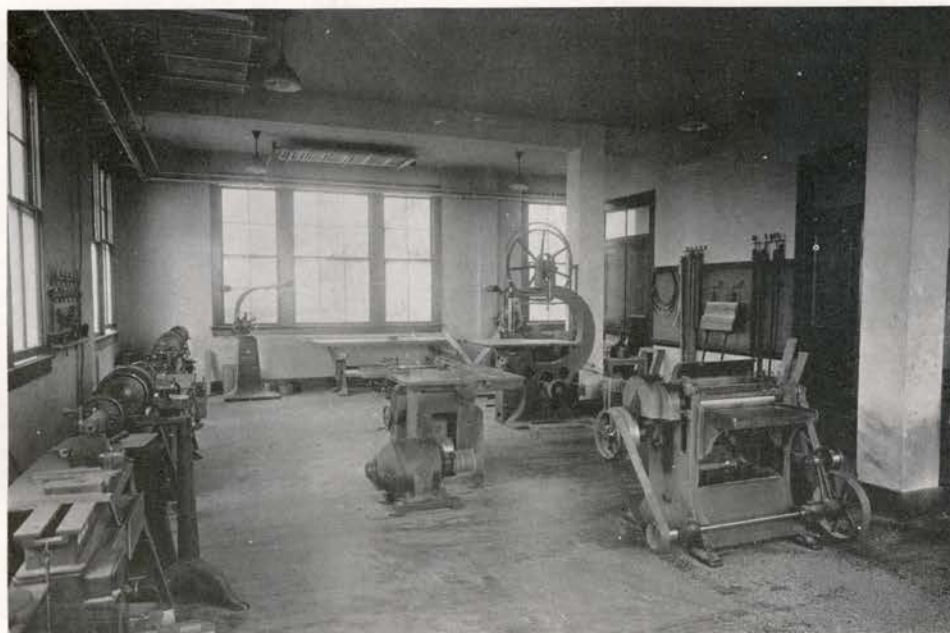

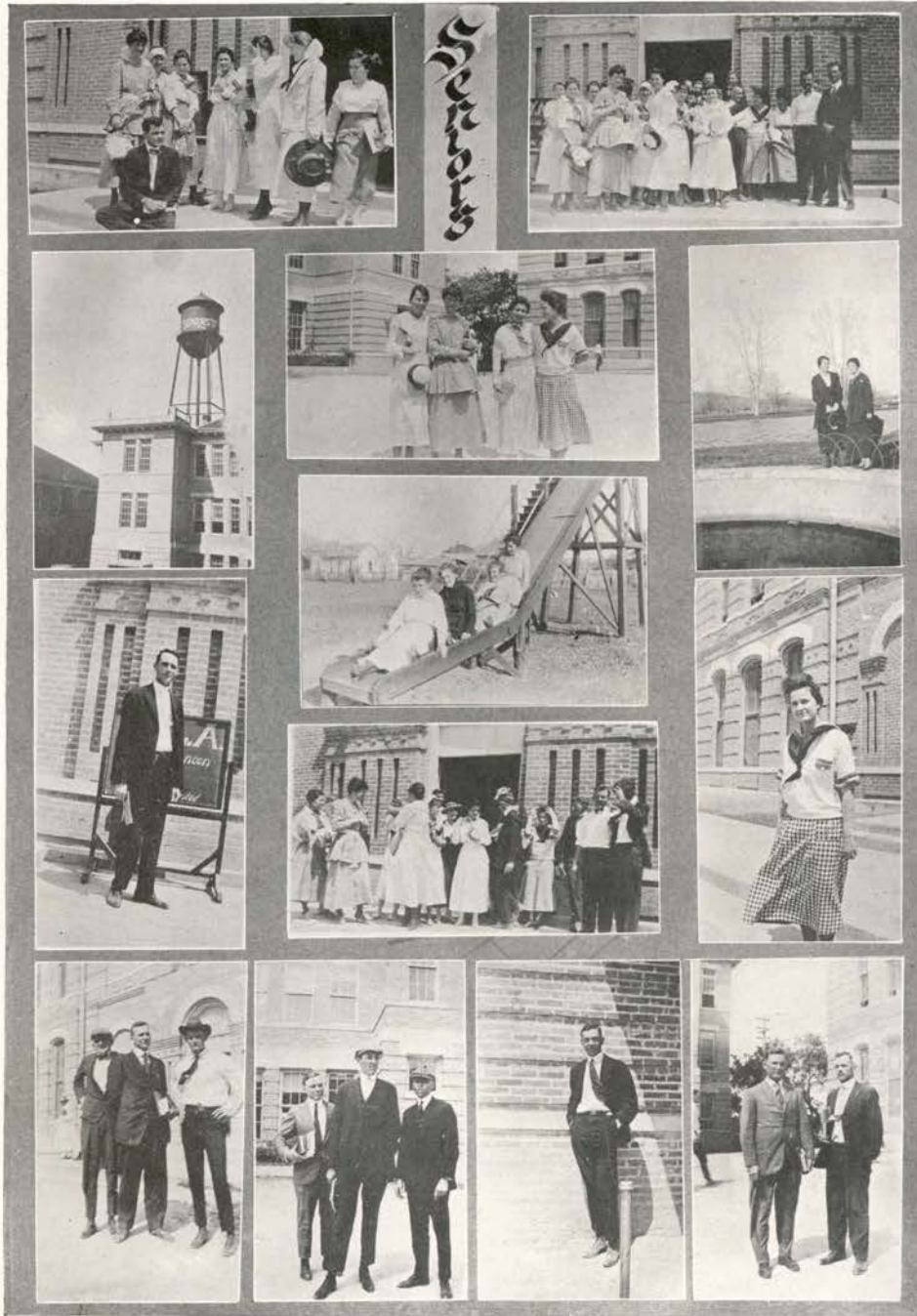


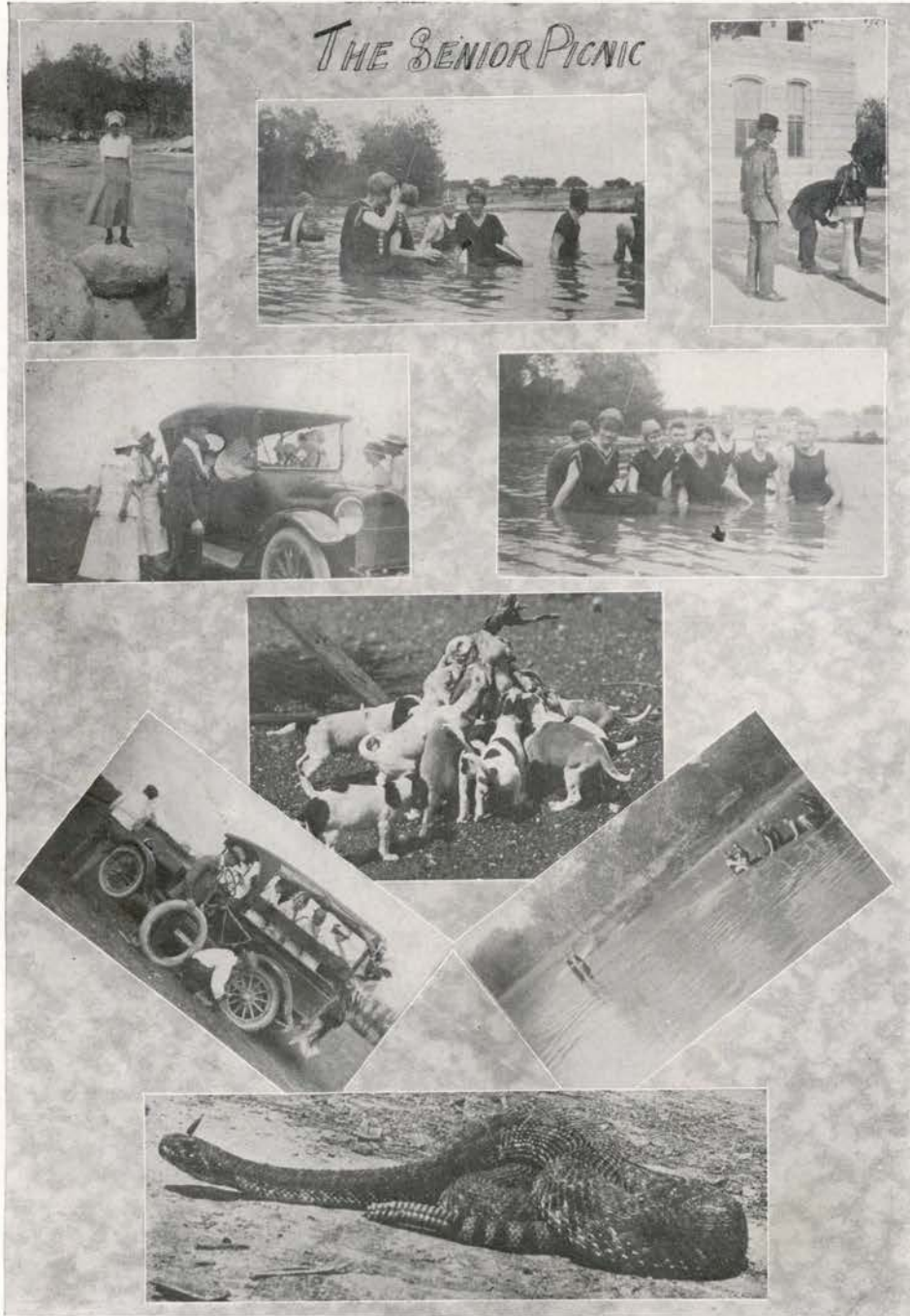
April 6, 1916. The Senior class met, probably for the last time, today. A motion was made and passed that the class disband in order to answer ~~off~~ country's call.

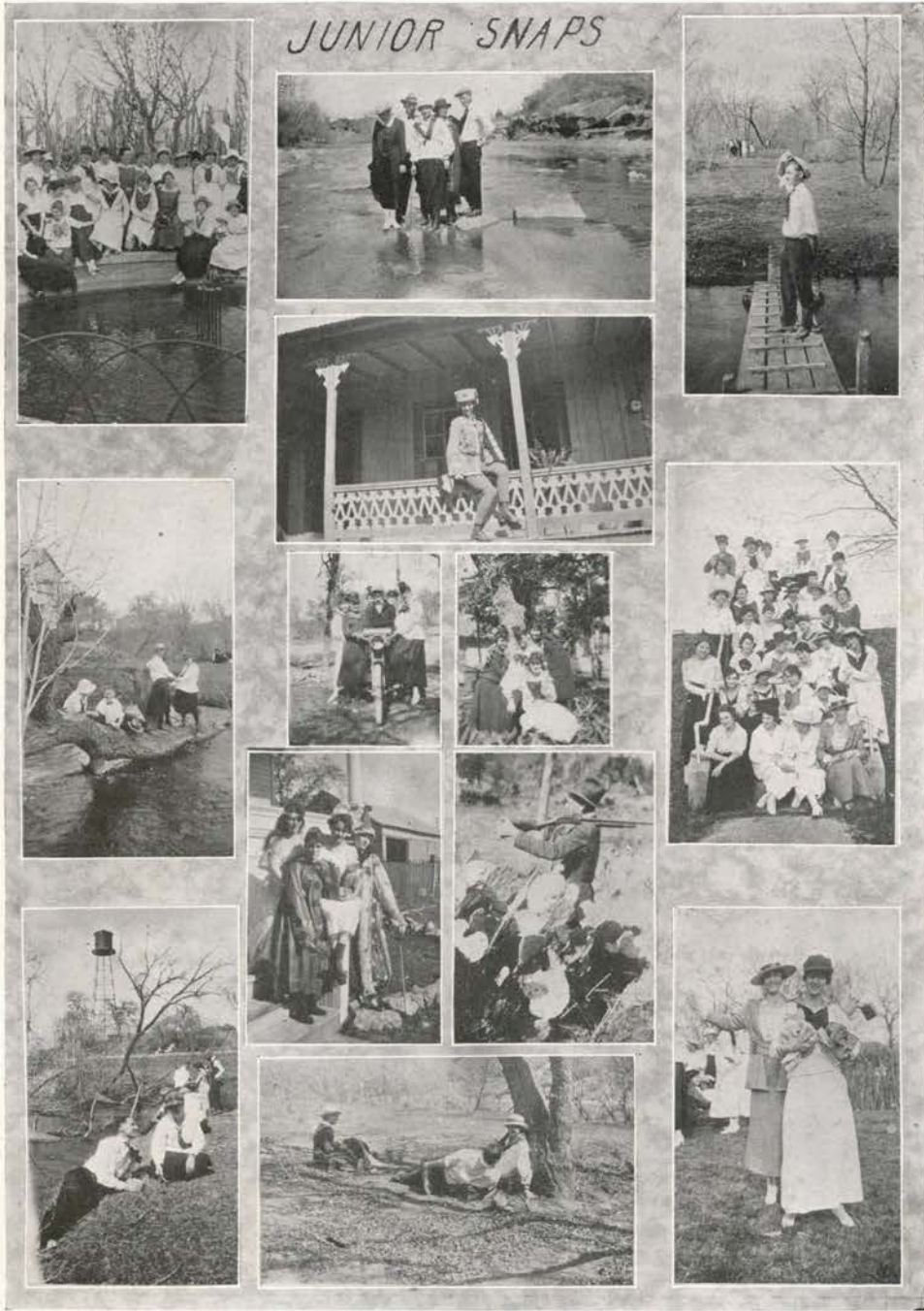
