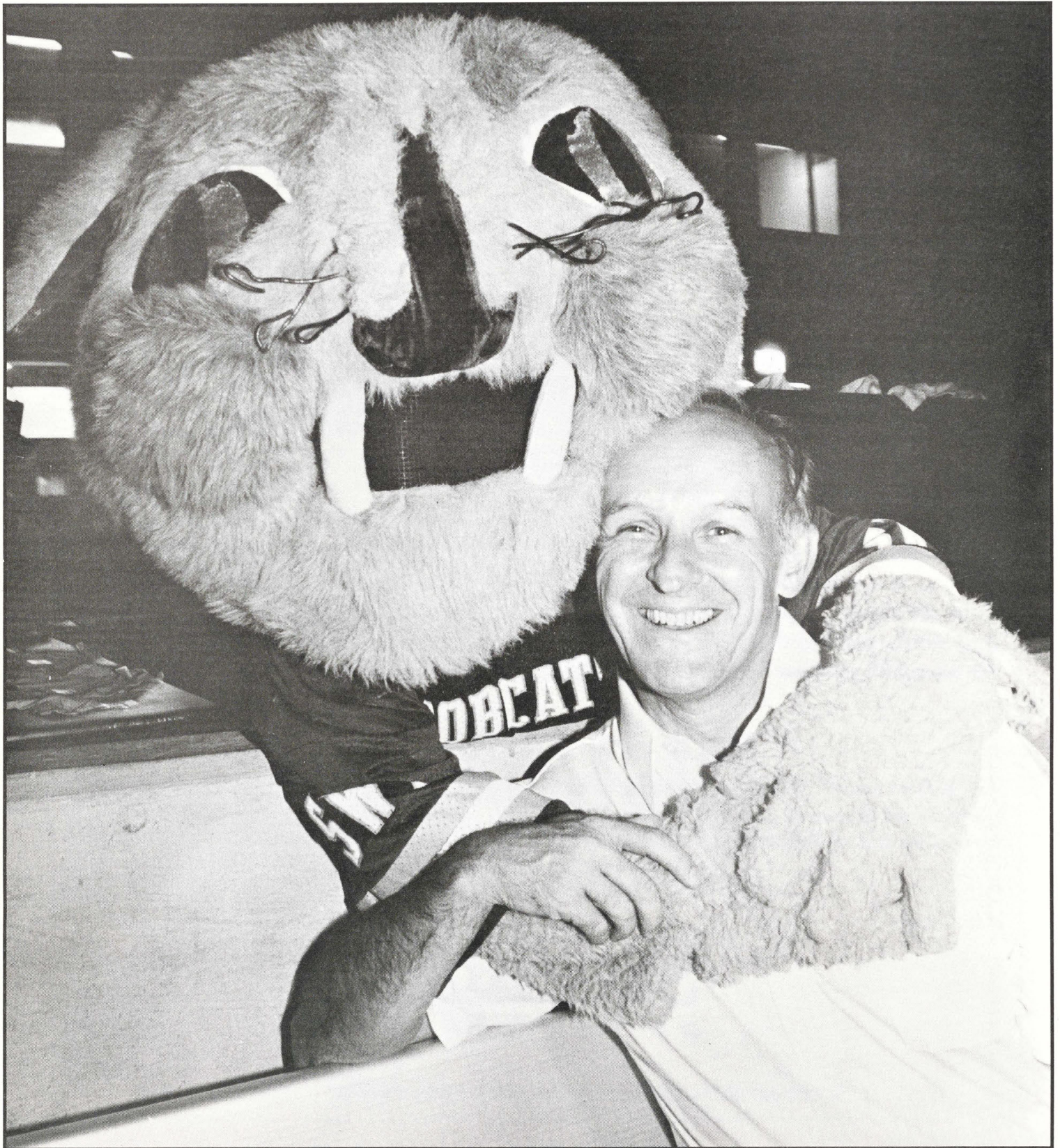

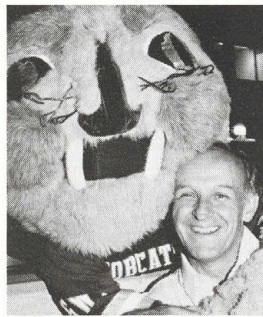

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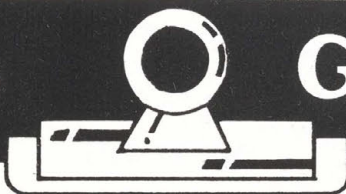

TODAY'S GAME



SOUTHWEST TEXAS VS. LAMAR

Well. We're back.

I know to some of you, it probably seems as though we've been gone forever. However, in reality, it's just been a month, a long month.

The Bobcats return home for their first afternoon game of the season and it's also Homecoming.

So, before I forget, for all of the alumni back in town for today's game, or for those of you who still live in San Marcos, welcome to our game this afternoon and we hope you enjoy the 1989 Bobcat football team and their game against Lamar.

The Bobcats enter today's game with a 3-5 record and a 1-3 mark in the Southland Conference. Times weren't so good for head coach John O'Hara and the Bobcats in October with four road games on the agenda. SWT finished the four-game swing with just one win in four tries.

That brings us to this afternoon's contest . . . a game which will feature a highly explosive offense in that of the Lamar Cardinals.

Lamar comes to town with a 3-4 record, but they're averaging over 400 yards a game in total offense and three-fourths of that coming via the passing game. Quarterback John Evans is throwing for over 300 yards a contest and has 14 touchdown passes in seven games.

Southwest Texas State has been successful in the 1980's on Homecoming. SWT is 7-2 in the previous nine Homecoming

dates this decade. The Bobcats suffered one of those two losses last year as McNeese State beat the 'Cats 24-21. Two years ago, Lamar was also the Homecoming guest as SWT got by the Cardinals 27-19 at Bobcat Stadium.

Lamar has enjoyed the past two week-ends off in a rare scheduling situation. Lamar's last game was October 14 when they were beaten by Alcorn State 32-16.

The cast you'll see today on the field will be headed by freshman quarterback Kevin Smith. This true freshman from San Antonio East Central has had his ups and downs through his first five collegiate starts, but is a good one and will likely be in the SWT picture for some time to come. His back-up is Eric Turner, who has come off the bench to spark the Bobcat offense in each of the past two games.

The running game is led by junior Reggie Rivers who is averaging just about six yards each time he carries the ball. He's got 517 yards on the year and is also second in receptions and is the team leader in kickoff returns with a 23.1 per return average.

Mike Murphy is the receiving leader with 25 in eight games. Murphy is also averaging just under 20 yards per catch.

The Bobcats also have a talented kicking game that is paced by junior punter Paul Alsbury. Alsbury is averaging 41.5 yards a kick and that ranks his 8th in the nation in Division 1-AA.

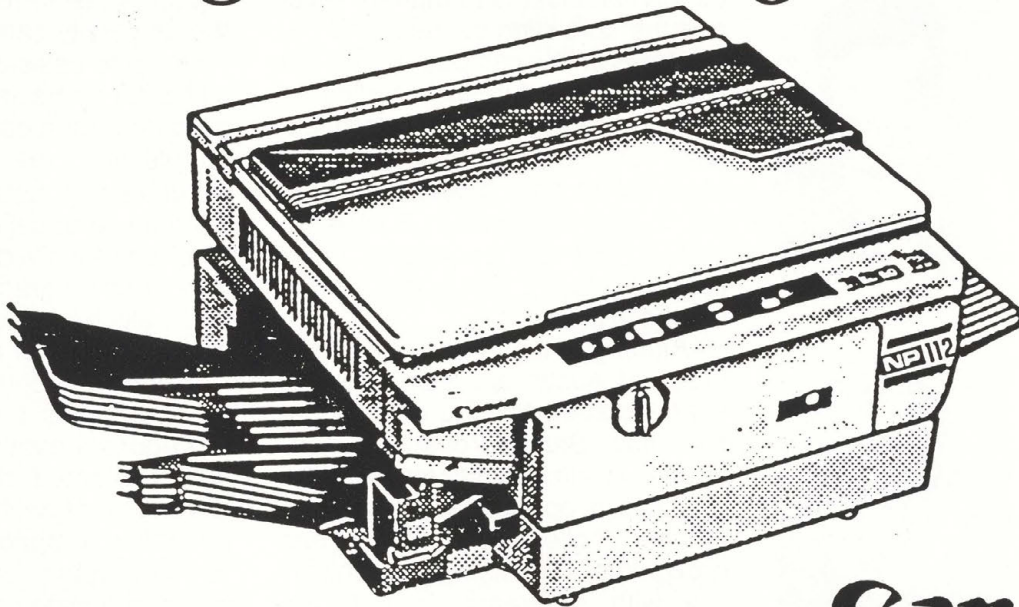

BOBCAT TRACKS

According to this week's NCAA Division 1-AA stats, several of the Bobcats remain among the national leaders. SWT is now 9th as a team in Net Punting with a 37.4 net average. Individually, punter Paul Alsbury is now 8th in the nation in punting with a 41.5 per kick average. Alsbury ranks second in the Southland Conference with that average and still holds the longest punt of the year at 67 yards. Punt returner Mike Collins is 19th this week with his

11.1 per return mark, and is now 6th in the Southland Conference. Senior Butch Maywald is also still among the national leaders at 3rd in interceptions with his 0.7 per game average and is second in the conference. He has five INT's in seven games played. Reggie Rivers is now 18th in the country in kickoff returns with his 23.1 per return average.

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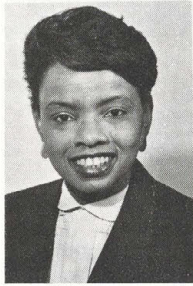

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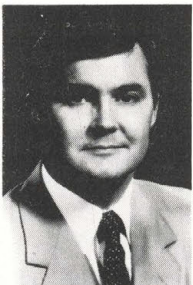

Located on the edge of the rolling Texas Hill Country, where blackland prairies turn into beautiful hills, Southwest Texas State University enjoys a setting that is unique among Texas universities. The beauty of the crystal-clear San Marcos River and the sprawling cypress and pecan trees on the campus adds to the charm of its picturesque setting.

A diversity of campus architecture- from historic red-steeped Old Main, SWT's original landmark building, to the modernistic LBJ Memorial Student Center-campus facilities encourage a feeling that SWT is a special place.

Although the major metropolitan areas of Austin and San Antonio-even Houston and Dallas- are not far away, San Marcos has managed to retain its small-town charm.

Since it opened as a two-year teacher's college in 1903, SWT has grown into a multi-purpose university with programs through the master's degree level and an enrollment of more than 20,000 students. Although the increasing diversity of

the graduate and undergraduate student mix is in keeping with a major university goal, it is the resident student population that gives the SWT campus its special collegiate atmosphere. Some 5,000 students live in residence halls on the university campus.

A state-assisted public university, SWT offers undergraduate and graduate courses primarily for the people of Texas. Over the years, the university has preserved its commitment to excellence in teaching at all levels while developing a wide variety of programs in other fields and making significant contributions in many areas of research.

Sound academic programming that combines the best of liberal arts education with the professional career-oriented curricula provides SWT students with a broad range of educational options. SWT offers undergraduate courses and degrees in a wide variety of subjects through seven academic schools: Applied Arts and Technology, Business, Education, Fine Arts and

□ SWT's student population is primarily from Texas although many other states and nations are represented.

□ SWT's 23 campus residence halls provide in-house counseling and tutorial services.

□ SWT counts among its many alumni the 36th president of the United States, Lyndon Baines Johnson, who graduated with a bachelor's degree and a permanent teaching certificate in 1930.

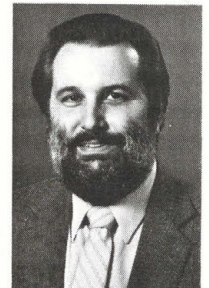

Stadium Information

SEATING: The west side (press box) of Bobcat Stadium is generally reserved for Bobcat Club members, season ticket holders and reserved seats. The east side will be used for student seating, bands and drill teams. Knot-hole seats for children 12 and under will be available at all SWT games for \$1.00 and these seats will be in the general admission section. Reserved seats are \$6.00 and general admission \$4.00.

REST ROOMS: Men's and women's rest rooms are located on the concourse level on both sides of the stadium.

CONCESSIONS: Concession stands are located on the concourse level on both sides of the stadium.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Two pay telephones are located on the concourse level on both sides of the stadium.

FIRST AID: The first aid station is located at the E.M.S. vehicle at the north end of Bobcat Stadium.

LOST AND FOUND: If any article is lost or found, please report same to Gate 1.

PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEM: The public address system is intended primarily for spectators' information concerning the game. 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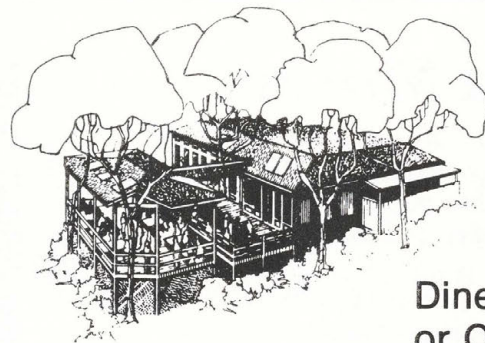
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JOHN O'HARA



John Barton O'Hara does not believe in mediocrity, but in the last three seasons, Southwest Texas State University has been average at best. SWT finished 4-7 in 1986, 4-7 in 1987, and 4-7 in 1988.

And while O'Hara has heard the critics cry grow louder each of those 4-7 seasons, the strongheaded former Baylor offensive coordinator has made some coaching staff moves that he believes will allow SWT to turn the corner in the toughest NCAA I-AA football conference (Southland) in the nation.

O'Hara will assume the dual title of head coach/offensive coordinator for the 1989 season. In his seventh season at the helm of the Bobcat program, O'Hara came to the San Marcos school with the reputation as an offensive mind.

At Baylor, O'Hara served as an assistant under Baylor head coach Grant Teaff from 1973 until 1982. He coached the offensive line before being named offensive coordinator in 1979. The following season under O'Hara, the Baylor offense set three school records and the entire Bear backfield was named to the all-Southwest Conference team.

At SWT, the Bobcats won the Lone Star Conference title in 1983 and claimed a NCAA

II playoff berth. SWT led the LSC that year (1983) in rush offense (213.9) and rush defense (107.4) and also produced the school's single season rushing leader, Roy Jackson with 1,187 yards.

Injuries and some bad luck - O'Hara may feel that the expression "if it wasn't for bad luck, he wouldn't have any luck at all" was coined with him in mind - have played havoc with his program the last two seasons.

A couple of years ago, O'Hara and staff stopped looking for excuses. A small change in philosophy was in order. "We (coaching staff) will no longer look at players that should get the job done, we will look at players that will get the job done," O'Hara said.

And the last three seasons, there have been signs to support that statement. Eleven points in 1986, 16 points in 1987 and just eight points last season were the difference between those 4-7 records and a possible 7-4 mark. Only one point (a 32-31 loss to Sam Houston State) kept the Bobcats from a share of the Gulf Star Conference championship in 1986.

O'Hara and other university administrators also realize that the success of a football program does not lie solely in wins and losses.

O'Hara, speaking at a clinic on sports psychology several years ago said, "I've also learned that you must do the best you can with what you've got and that counting wins doesn't always give you a true picture of the success or failure of your program. The things that are most important are developing better students and better citizens and I'm especially proud of the progress we are making in the academic areas."

The last two years in the Gulf Star Conference, SWT placed the most players on the league's all-academic team. Twice in the 1980's, a football player has received the Lyndon B. Johnson Outstanding Senior Award, the highest honor a student at SWT can receive.

O'Hara began his coaching career as a head coach at Mangum High School in Mangum, Okla. in 1967. He was offensive line coach at Amarillo Palo Duro High School from 1968-71 and was named offensive coordinator at Midland Lee High School in 1972 before going to Waco.

He played collegiate football at Panhandle State University in Goodwell, Okla., where he was a three-time all-conference selection at center. O'Hara was a captain on the 1967 team and was also voted Outstanding Senior Athlete of his graduating class.

O'Hara was born Jan. 13, 1944 in Elk City, Oklahoma. He and his wife Sandra, have three children: Chad, Koby and Shelley

A CLOSER LOOK AT .O'HARA COLLEGE EXPERIENCE PRIOR TO SWT:

Joined Baylor staff in 1973 as offensive line coach. Named offensive coordinator prior to the 1979 season and produced big numbers. Set several school records in 1980, the year the Baylor team won the SWC title. Set marks in most yards rushing per game (196.9), points in a season (315), and most total yards in a year (4,848). In addition, Walter Abercrombie rushed for 1,187 yards, most ever by a Baylor runner. The entire Baylor offensive backfield was named to the all-SWC team.

AT SOUTHWEST TEXAS STATE: Has a six-year record of 31-35. Produced a 9-2 team in his first season and claimed a Lone Star Conference title and a NCAA II playoff berth. Led the LSC in rush offense (231.3) and scoring offense (34.2) and second in total offense in 1983. In 1986, SWT led the Gulf Star Conference in rush offense (213.9) and rush defense (107.4) and also produced school's single-season rushing leader Roy Jackson with 1,187 yards.

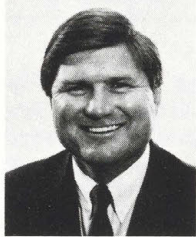

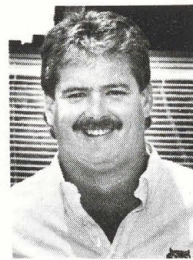

Beginning third season with Southwest Texas State University. Joined the SWT staff in 1986 from Houston Alief-Elsik High School.

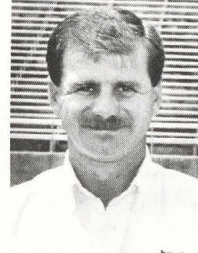
Responsibilities: Will begin first season with the offensive line.

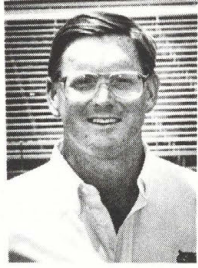
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EDDIE DAVIS
Defensive Secondary

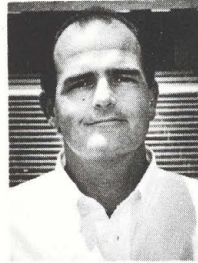
Joined the SWT staff in July after spending three years at Temple University as running backs coach.

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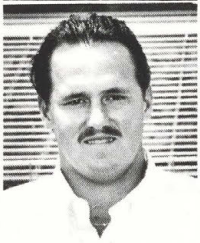
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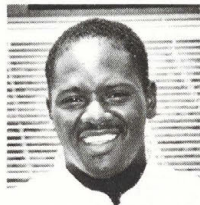
MIKE HUDSON

Joined the Southwest Texas State University staff in August of 1987 and will begin his third year after coming from Southern Connecticut State University.

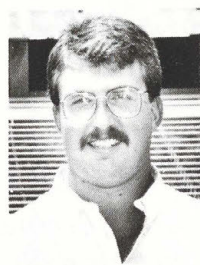
Responsibilities: Defensive assistant.

Porter was an all-Lone Star Conference selection at tackle and also was named as a NCAA II all-American in track and field in the discus. Earned six letters in football and track and field at Humble High School. In high school, was named to the Texas High School coaches Association All-Star game, twice all-district and selected to the Greater Houston team.

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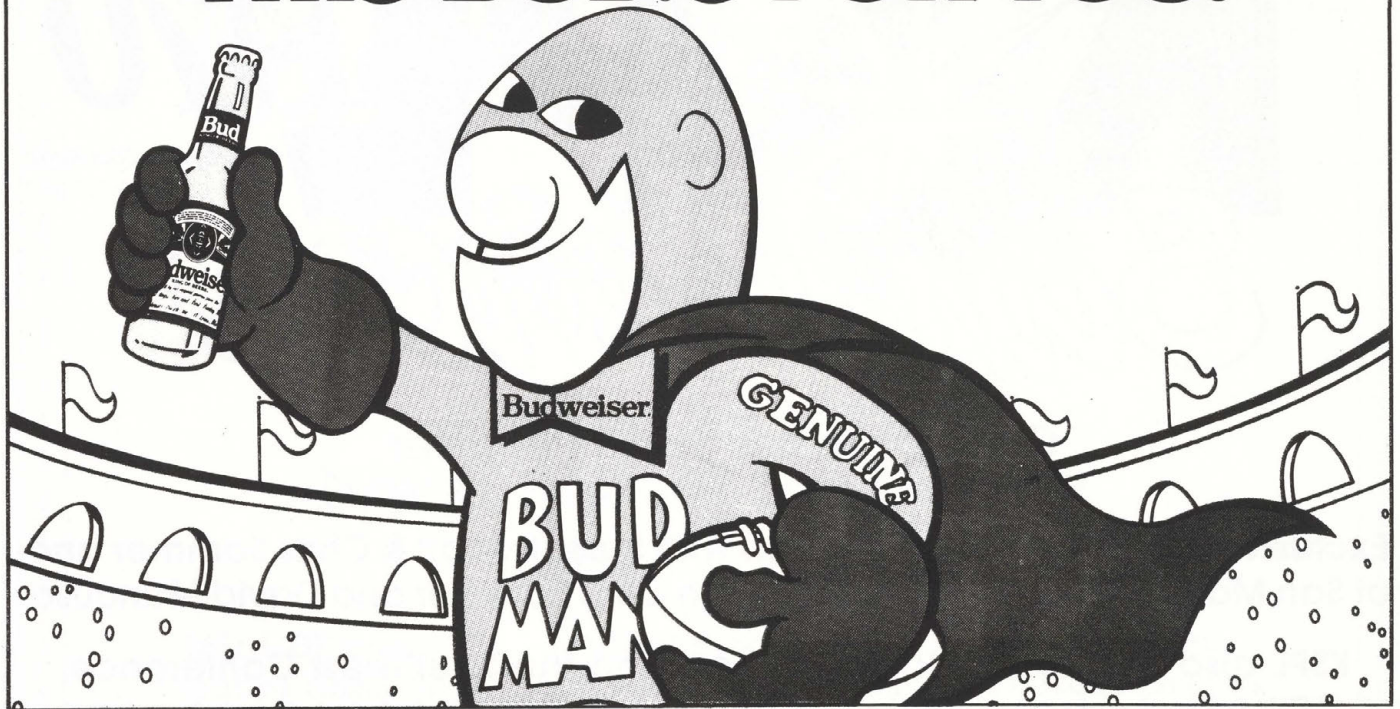
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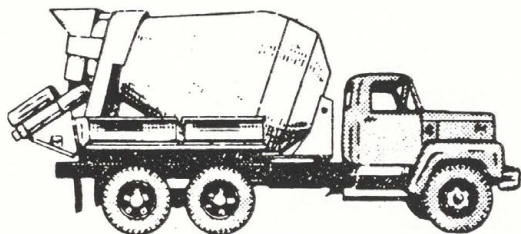
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Coaches' Retirement Plan Has Widespread Support

It took an act of the U.S. Congress and the signature of President Ronald Reagan, but the American Football Coaches Association has succeeded in helping thousands of college football coaches by creating a portable retirement trust fund that will enable them to make career moves without losing retirement benefits.

Two years after Reagan signed the 1,000 page, \$603 billion appropriations bill containing the 10-paragraph amendment that allowed the AFCA to create the American Football Coaches' Retirement Trust (AFCRT), much of the logistical work to establish the plan has been completed.

The AFCRT has a Plan Committee in place, a corporate money manager to invest its funds, and several third party contributors to supplement the personal contributions made by those coaches enrolled in the plan.

AFCA Executive Director Charles McClendon has been responsible for much of the detail work necessary to make the program a reality, after persuading the Association's 14-member Board of Trustees to pursue a retirement plan designed expressly for the football coaching profession.

"One of the 'givens' in our profession is that coaches have to move a lot to reach their career goals," says McClen-

don, who spent nine years as an assistant coach at Kentucky, Vanderbilt, and LSU before beginning a highly-successful 18-year career as head coach of the Bayou Bengals.

"Generally, we've found that coaches change jobs about every 4.5 years. It's almost impossible to be vested in a school's retirement program when you have to move that often, so you lose retirement benefits and have to start over each time. Coaches don't have that problem with our plan, and that's one of the unique things about it.

"We have the stamp of approval from the U.S. Congress and a U.S. President," says McClendon. "That certainly gives us added credibility when the head coach goes to his president and his financial officer to talk about installing the program on his campus. We've had a lot of help, and we're grateful to a lot of people."

McClendon, along with current AFCA president Don James of the University of Washington and immediate past president Joe Restic of Harvard University, recently visited Reagan in California to thank him for his role in the establishment of the retirement plan.

Among the congressmen primarily responsible for pushing the amendment through Congress were Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah; Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho;

Rep. James Sasser, D-Tenn., and Rep. John Duncan, R-Tenn., (since deceased). AFCA Assistant Coaches Committee Chairman Gary Moeller of the University of Michigan provided strong leadership as he and his committee led networking efforts within the membership of 3,500 college coaches in support of the retirement plan.

Brigham Young head football coach LaVell Edwards, AFCA president at the time the legislation was passed in December 1987, called it "one of the most significant events in the 65-year history of the Association."

Support for the AFCA and its retirement plan has been widespread, which reflects the determination of McClendon and the Association's trustees to make AFCRT a viable program.

Financial assistance from third party contributors has made the program more attractive to AFCA Active members. Corporations such as Domino's Pizza and Wilson Sporting Goods have made substantial contributions.

A legislative proposal passed at the 1989 NCAA convention created the Disneyland Pigskin Classic, a pre-season contest that will feature two top Division I-A football teams. The Classic will be played in Anaheim, Calif., beginning in August 1990. The proposal was created and supported by the AFCA primarily to generate funds that would benefit AFCRT.

While the additional financial resources are welcome, the heart and soul of the plan is similar to others—personal contributions from those who are enrolled.

"We're not asking our institutions for a penny," McClendon points out. "We are asking that schools allow our member coaches—through a payroll deduction plan—to put their own money in our 401(k) program."

Many of those who have assisted in the establishment of AFCRT believe it will benefit the football coaching profession in more ways than just added financial security for its retiring members.

"We need to keep promising young assistants in the profession," says James, who began his coaching career in 1957. "I believe the retirement program will be one incentive that will help us do that.

"As in any profession," James continues, "If we can attract and keep motivated, talented people in coaching, it will make it a better profession. In turn, it will reflect in the performance of the student-athlete on the football field, in the classroom, and in other areas of his life."

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ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



BILL MILLER

Athletic Director, Bill Miller continues to be the driving force behind the advance to national prominence for the Southwest Texas State University athletic program.

Miller, one of the most respected and dedicated figures in Texas college athletics is in his 28th year on the SWT staff and his 15th as Director of Athletics. His dedication and many long hours resulted in SWT's move to the Southland Conference and the NCAA Division I and the creation of the Gulf Star Conference.

In a 1984 press conference, Miller explained SWT's reclassification. "There

was no disenchantment on our part with the Lone Star Conference . . . it is a great Division II conference, but to be considered a so-called major institution, you must be competing at the division I level in intercollegiate athletics and we feel SWT is becoming a major university in every respect," Miller said.

Under his guidance, SWT was a powerhouse in the Lone Star Conference, winning five consecutive all-sports championships. SWT also won the 1986-87 Gulf Star Conference all-sports trophy and last year won both the men's and women's All-sports trophy's from the Southland Conference. Since 1979, SWT has won 27 team titles. On the national scene, SWT won two consecutive NCAA Division II football titles, a golf championship and was twice a runner-up in tennis. In 1986, the SWT volleyball team became the first program to qualify for post-season play in the NCAA Division I.

Miller became the school's fulltime Athletic Director in December of 1978 when he stepped down as football coach. He had been head football coach since 1965 and posted the winningest record in school history with an 86-51-3 (.614) ledger. Miller had been serving as both AD and football coach since the death of Milton Jowers in

1972. He first joined the SWT staff in 1961 as a football assistant to Jowers.

The personable Miller is only the third AD in SWT history. He is a product of two of the most successful coaches in Texas athletic history—Jowers and Paul Tyson. He was backfield coach for Jowers from 1961 until 1965 when he was named head coach, and he played for Tyson at now-defunct Daniel Baker in Brownwood in 1949-50.

Miller became director of SWT's entire intercollegiate program in 1975 when his duties were expanded to include the women's program. SWT's intercollegiate program currently includes 15 varsity sports, eight men's and seven women's.

Miller was born April 17, 1931, in Goldthwaite (in Central Texas). He played both football and basketball at Daniel Baker before serving in the Navy during the Korean conflict. Miller came to SWT in 1954 and lettered twice at fullback and graduated in 1957. He also holds a master's degree from SWT and has done post-graduate work at the University of Texas in Austin.

Miller's wife, Dr. LaRue Miller, is a superintendent of the Somerville School District.

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ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION



DANA CRAFT **Associate Athletic Director**

Dana Craft begins her seventh year as associate athletic director. Craft doubled as coordinator and women's basketball coach at Southwest Texas State for five years.

Craft came to San Marcos in 1977 as head women's basketball coach and took the added responsibilities of women's coordinator in 1978 upon resignation of Karen Fredenburg. Her teams compiled a 77-90 record in Craft's six seasons as women's basketball coach.

The Orange, Texas native served as women's basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse before coming to SWT. While earning her master's, she directed the Wisconsin team to 20-1 record and a regional berth.

Craft was born Feb. 21, 1950. She played basketball at Stark High School in Orange. Craft attended Sam Houston State University where she lettered four years under Jody Conradt, currently one of the nation's top collegiate coaches at the University of Texas at Austin.

After graduating from Sam Houston State in 1972, Craft coached at North Carolina-Greensboro and Cypress-Fairbanks High School in Houston.



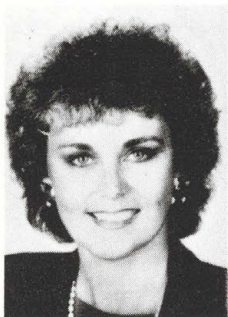
HARRY LARRABEE **Associate Athletic Director**

Sharp guided the Trojans to back-to-back NCAA titles in 1983 and 1984, and has compiled a 271-99 career record. Her USC teams were nationally-ranked 10 times in her 12-year career, and advanced to the Final Four four times.

The Cal State-Fullerton graduate served as head coach for the United States team at the 1987 World University Games in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, and has earned numerous coach of the year awards.

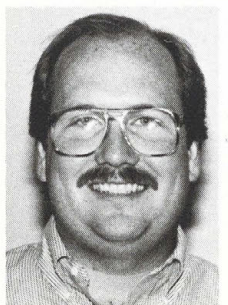

TONY BRUBAKER **Sports Information Director**

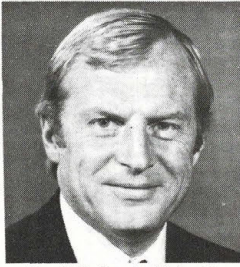
Tony Brubaker enters his first year as sports information director for Southwest Texas State University's 15 athletic programs.

Southwest Texas State's Strutters will provide halftime entertainment for the 28th consecutive season as one of the nation's top dance groups.

The Strutters celebrated their 25th year in 1986 with a two-week tour that included performances in the Peoples' Republic of China and stops in Japan and Hong Kong.

Popular for colorful routines, precision high kicks, poise, personality and winning smiles, the Strutters are under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Tidwell.

Mrs. Tidwell was originator of the Strutters and is still the coordinator and choreographer of the group. She is a graduate of Southern Mississippi University and a former Kilgore Rangerette.

During their existence, the Strutters have made more than two dozen nationally televised performances, including two presidential inaugural parades and a host of professional football games. They have been featured in three motion pictures and a nationally-circulated soft drink commercial.

Strutters, who receive instruction in charm, poise, personality projection, and grooming, as well as dancing, earn course credit for their activities through the Health and Physical Education Department.

Organized in 1960, the Strutter alumni number more than 1,500. Many SWT graduates who were part of the team now have high school precision dance units of their own.

Tidwell, who holds a master's degree from SWT, is married and she and her husband, Howard, have one son.



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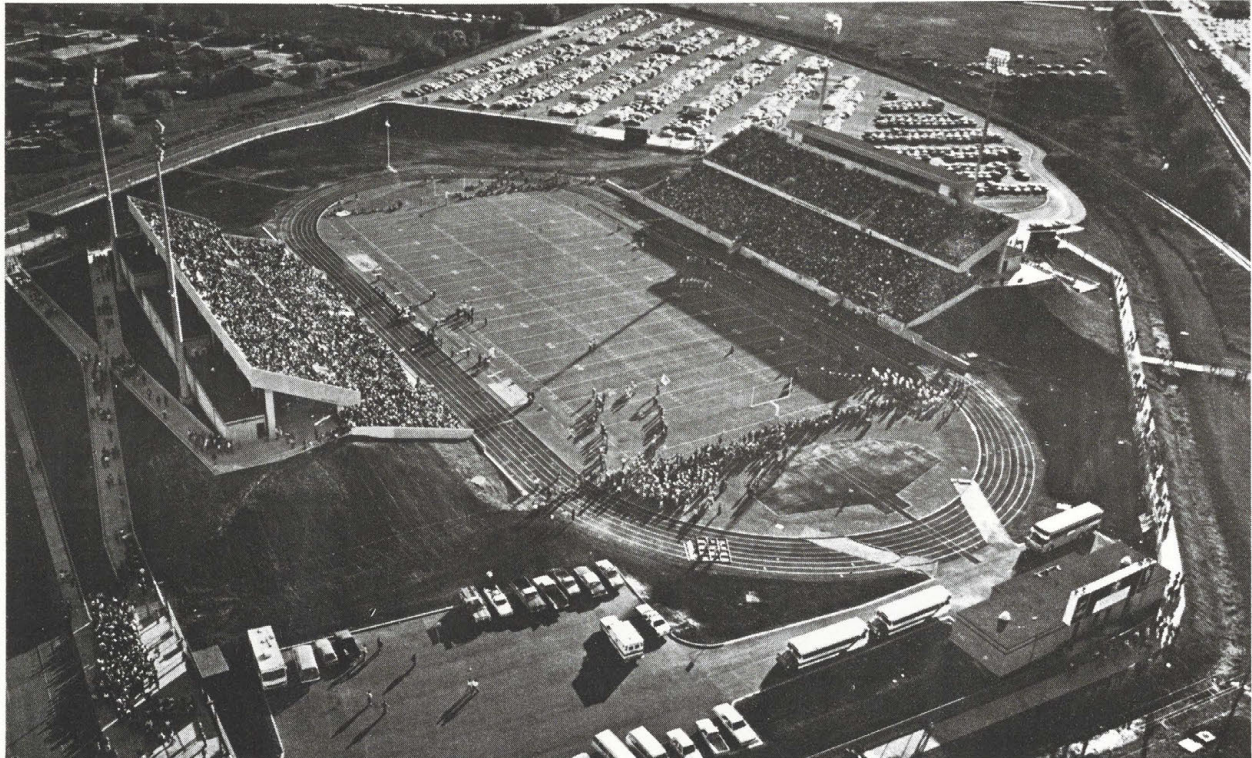

BOBCAT STADIUM



Bobcat Stadium, a \$4.4 million facility, became the home of Southwest Texas State's football and track teams in 1981.

Construction started in the fall of 1979 and was completed in August of 1981. The project also included the demolition of Evans Stadium and the construction of \$1 million in parking for the stadium, nearby Strahan Coliseum and commuters. Parking is available for 2,200 cars.

Capacity of the semi-berm stadium is 14,104. Approximately 78,000 cubic yards of dirt were brought in to build the berms which support the lower stands on both sides.

The west side features a 50-yard long, 23,000-square foot press box. The bi-level facility has a working press area which will seat 50, two radio booths, a film deck, booths for home and visiting coaches, men's and women's restrooms and an efficiency

kitchen. More than 100 people can be accommodated in the facility.

A Maroon & Gold Room for major donors to the university also sits atop the concession stand on the west side.

The 400-meter track is Resilite. Lighting, furnished by Wide-Lite of San Marcos, consists of 120,000 watts on four 120-foot poles. The scoreboard by Spectrum of Houston, features a computerized message center and the stadium's public address system. The scoreboard was furnished by Dr. Pepper and State Bank and Trust of San Marcos.

Turf on the playing surface is a hybrid Bermuda developed at Texas A&M University especially for football fields. The field has a built-in watering system and underground drainage.

Bobcat Stadium was designed by Lockwood, Andrews & Newman of Houston and built by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

- Within five years of initial entry to SWT if they entered with four years of eligibility.
- Within four years of initial entry to SWT if they entered with three years of eligibility.
- Within three years of initial entry to SWT if they entered with two years of eligibility.
- Within two years of initial entry to SWT if they entered with one year of eligibility.

This ring is dedicated to the student-athletes who have contributed their efforts on the field of play and balanced those efforts with a commitment to excellence in the classroom.

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HOMECOMING '89

Homecoming is a special time in the life of a university that goes beyond the "rah rah" of winning athletic contests and showing school spirit. It is a time to look back while still looking forward. It is one occasion during the school year that brings former and current students together. Like the theme implies, homecoming is a time for memories and dreams.

As SWT celebrates its annual homecoming today, three groups of alumni are in the spotlight: the Golden Anniversary Class of '39, the Silver Anniversary Class of '64 and the current alumni leadership.

The Class of '39 was honored at a dinner dance last night. It was an evening dedicated to memories. From the class, a Coming Home King and Queen were selected. They will be introduced at halftime today.

"Faith in College opportunity grows, year to year. Evidences of this faith are the enlarged campus, the building program, the diversity of academic offering, and the steadily increasing enrollment," Dr. C.E. Evans wrote in a letter from the president of SWT published in the 1939 *Pedagog*, which was edited by Crystall Rounsaville.

Prexy Evans' brief letter continued, "The concentration of all these forces for the common welfare of the student means greater student influence and greater student leadership on campus and in after life. That the greater College with its greater alumni means a greater Texas, there is no room for doubt."

The 1938 football squad had more than 50 members, according to the *Pedagog*, which credited "this large number" to a new Lone Star Conference ruling that made freshmen eligible for varsity competition. It was not, however, the team's winningest season. The Bobcat Band, directed by R.A. Tampke, was also the school's largest to date that fall.

This morning, the Class of '64 was recognized at the homecoming brunch. At SWT, the 1963-64 school year saw the Bobcat football team's first Lone Star Conference championship since 1948 and its first perfect season (10-0) since 1921. It also saw the introduction of "soap box speaking," the local debut of the free speech movement. The 1964

Pedagog, edited by Charles Hughes, recounted these happenings, along with the introduction of a new college president, Dr. James H. McCrocklin, and the glories of Spring Fling.

Today's alumni leadership bridges the gap between alumni and current students. O.C. Haley ('64, '69) of San Antonio is president of the Alumni Association. First vice president is Bryan Clarke ('77) of Houston. Second vice president is Mark Mayad ('79) of Dallas. Bob Covey ('69) of Houston is immediate past president. Director of alumni affairs is Bart Harst ('72). Assisting the association's executive committee is a 47-member board of directors.

Among the members of the board are current Associated Student Government President Clint Swindell and Student Foundation Coordinator Kathi Livingston, leaders among SWT's more than 20,000 current students.

Other student leaders will be introduced at today's game during pre-game and halftime ceremonies. Gaillardians — all-campus favorites — will be announced at pre-game and the homecoming queen and her court will be introduced at the half.

Besides the Bobcat football team which will be looking for a homecoming day win against Lamar, both the Bobcat Marching Band, joined at pre-game by the Alumni Band, and the Strutters are celebrating special anniversaries this year. This is the 70th anniversary year for the Bobcat Band and the 30th anniversary for the Strutters.

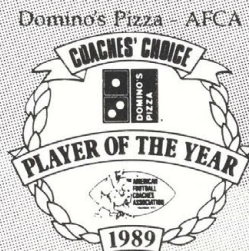

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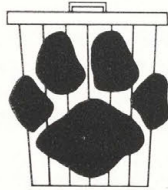
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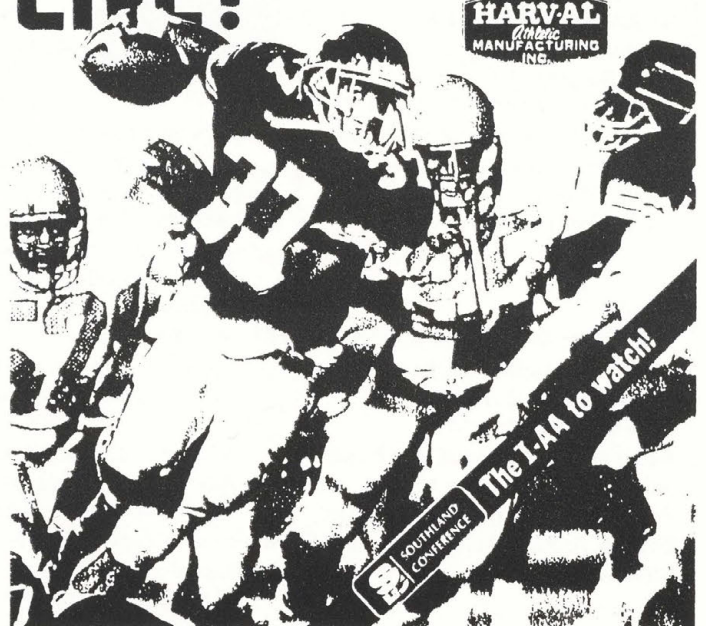
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The learning environment at Lamar is dynamic, whether in the classroom with a dedicated professor; through involvement in student activities; or in seeking personal satisfaction in the many dimensions of the university.

Lamar's dedication to excellence extends beyond its reputation and quality in curricula, faculty and student positions world-wide in professions ranging from the Middle East oil empires to board rooms in major corporations to the NASA control room and launching pad.

The three cities where Lamar maintains campuses—Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange—form the golden Triangle or Triplex of Southeast Texas. The hub of the region, Beaumont is a city of 120,000 situated 85 miles east of Houston, 45 miles north of the Gulf of Mexico, 75 miles south of the Rayburn and Toledo Bend recreational complex and just south of the Big Thicket National Preserve.

The school was founded in 1923 as South Park Junior College, and it was housed in the South Park High School building. In 1932, it was renamed Lamar College (in honor of Mirabeau B. Lamar; second president of the Republic of Texas) and relocated to its present Beaumont site.

In 1951, the school became Lamar State College of Technology (Lamar Tech) when it was granted senior college status by the Texas

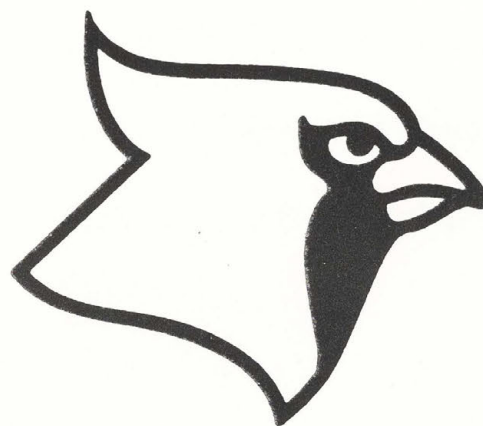
Legislature. The last name change, to Lamar University, came in 1971.

The Lamar location provides many advantages to students. Built-in "labs" or area industries are used by those in engineering and programs in oceanographic technology, environmental science and energy resources management.

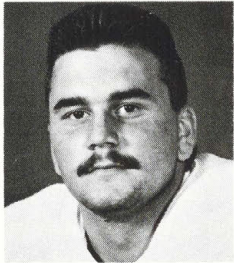
One of the cornerstones of Lamar's always-improving campus is the \$13 million, 10,080-seat Montagne Center, the multipurpose facility that houses the school's famous basketball team. Other ornaments include the Mary and John Gray Library, the Setzer Students center, the Brown Center (a picturesque mansion, situated on the Orange campus) and the Gray Institute.

Established in 1981, the Gray Institute is a privately-funded, non-profit center for the development of new information and planning initiatives, and for the presentation of highly-specialized educational services directed toward the mutual advancement of business, labor and industry.

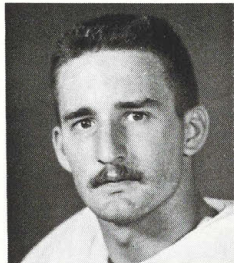
The Gladys city recreation area, located on the main campus, is a popular tourist and educational attraction which preserves the history of the oil industry near the original Lucas gusher site.



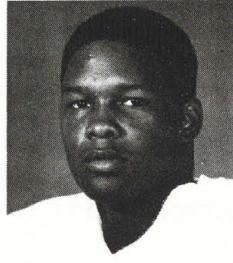

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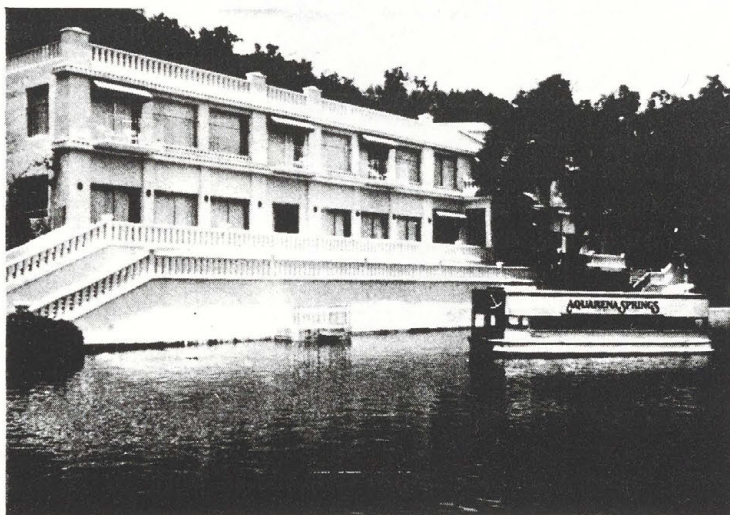
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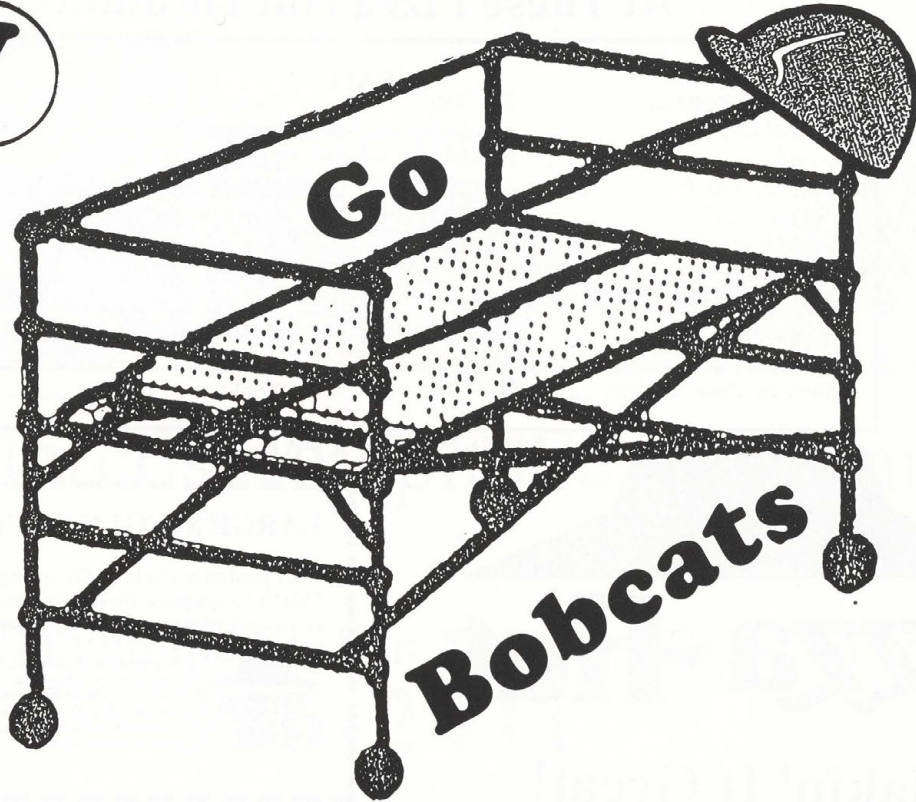
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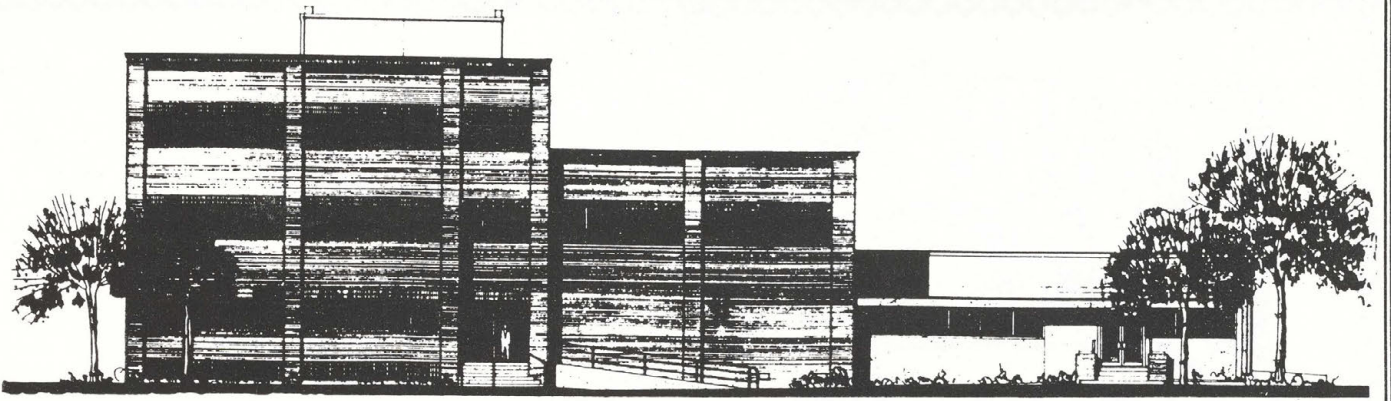



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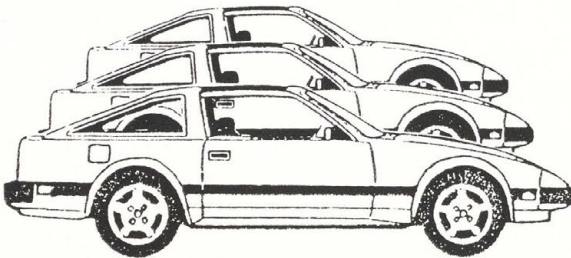
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BOBCATS IN THE PROS

The Washington Redskins selected A.J. Johnson in the sixth round, while Green Bay took Ben Jessie in the 10th round. Bill Jones was a 12th round pick for the Kansas City Chiefs. Darren Jones and Mark Millett signed as free agents with Phoenix and Atlanta, respectively.

The five players in NFL camps brings the number to seven of former SWT players currently in the NFL. Ricky Sanders, a standout wide receiver for Washington two seasons ago in the Super Bowl, is regarded as one of the National League's premier receivers while defensive back Bobby Watkins is beginning his eighth year with the Detroit Lions.

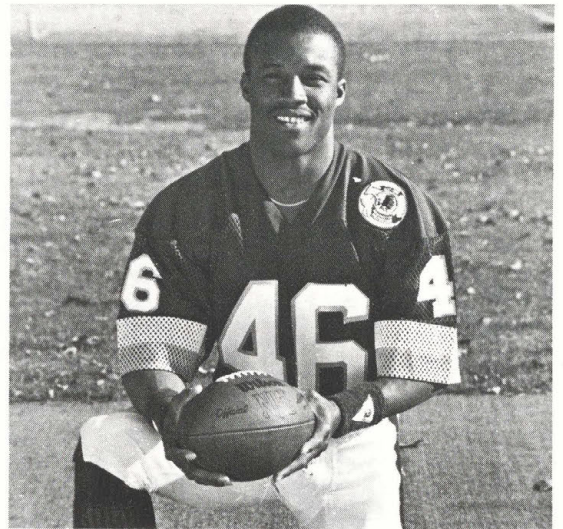
Sanders, who played on two NCAA II National championship teams with SWT, got Super Bowl MVP honors as a receiver in Washington's 42-10 win over Denver two years ago.

The Belton High School product set then two Super Bowl records and tied another. Sanders finished the game with 193 yards in receiving and also 235 yards in total offense, both new Super Bowl marks. His two touchdowns scored tied yet another Super Bowl record shared by many.

Watkins has been a member of the Detroit Lions since 1982 and has been a starter in the defensive secondary for several seasons until a knee injury forced him to the sidelines for much of the last two years.

The three players drafted last spring by NFL clubs are the most SWT has sent to the NFL in one year. Johnson, a wide receiver and safety for the Bobcats, will be used in the defensive secondary by Washington. Jessie with Green Bay will also be in the defensive secondary and could also return punts and kickoffs for the Packers while Jones, as a running back, led the Southland Conference in rushing last season.

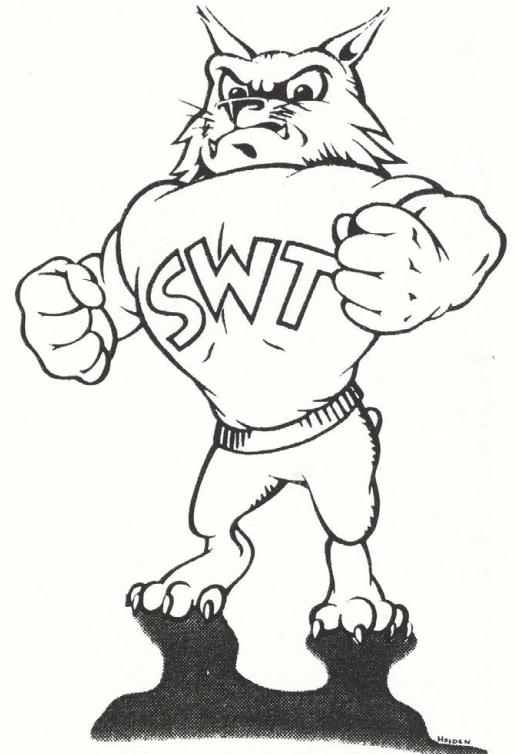
Jones was signed by St. Louis as a defensive back while Milett signed with the Falcons as a tight end. A total of 19 players have gone from SWT to the National Football League in the last 20 years.

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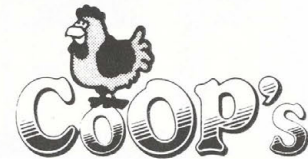

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Drugs and the Athlete... a losing combination.



Athletes command a unique position in American society and in societies throughout the world. Many view the athlete as a hero who strives for perfection. The public expects excellence, and to achieve these high standards and thereby maintain public favor, the athlete must maintain peak alertness, responsiveness, efficiency and coordination.

A small segment of the athlete population has resorted to the use of drugs (e.g., anabolic steroids, amphetamines and various "street drugs") purported to improve physical performance. The decision to use drugs to improve physical performance, for the most part, has not been based on sound information and could have dire physical consequences for involved individuals. Further, such usage violates NCAA ethical principles.

The ethics of sport need to be emphasized, particularly in that taking drugs to improve performance constitutes cheating. There is need to reemphasize the fact that the important thing in sport is to compete honorably; to win at all costs is a contradiction to the meaning of sport.

The athlete should not carry all the blame for the situation. Coaches, trainers and the medical profession need to share some of this burden, as does the public, for expecting and frequently demanding a winning effort every time.

Society has placed a number of demands upon the athlete. If one believes that athletes and the general public will make sound judgments most of the time when provided with the necessary information, educating athletes and others about drug effects, appropriate drug use and the skills needed to cope with such problems could have substantial benefits to the individual and to society.

FIRST WALTER CAMP ALL-AMERICAN TEAM MARKS 100TH ANNIVERSARY

NEW HAVEN, CONN. - This year marks the 100th Anniversary of the first college football All-American team selected by the renowned Walter Camp, universally recognized as "The Father of American Football."

Camp's first All-American team in 1889 was composed entirely of Ivy League players, including the immortal Amos Alonzo Stagg and the grandnephew and namesake of Edgar Allan Poe. It was Camp to whom a young Notre Dame student wrote around the urn of the century asking for guidance in starting a football team.

To commemorate the centennial of Camp's first All-American team, and to focus national attention on the many innovative contributions he made to the game of football, the Walter Camp Football Foundation of New Haven is planning a special program to honor the 1989 Walter Camp All-American team. The Walter Camp Foundation carries on the tradition initiated by Camp and annually honors an All-American team chosen by college football coaches and sports information directors.

"The celebration of this milestone is of national significance for all college football fans," says Ernie Williams, who is president of the Foundation. "No other college football All-American team has the mystique and legendary scope of the Walter Camp team. We are very excited about this anniversary and urge all colleges to join us in this celebration."

The celebration will be held in New Haven, home of Yale University, Camp's alma mater where he was an outstanding athlete, a brilliant coach (67-2-0 from 1888 to 1892), and an extraordinary innovator whose genius changed forever the old English game of rugby into today's distinctly American game of football. Camp played in the first Yale-Harvard game of rugby in 1876. From then on, his fertile, inventive mind and guiding leadership that brought about the American style of football.

Among the many innovations credited to Camp are: replacing the rugby scrummage (scrum) with the line of scrimmage, adopting the system of a fixed number of downs and yards to gain, creating the position of quarterback, legalizing the forward pass, reducing the number of players from 15 to 11, and developing the close-order formation that led to the T-formation. By dividing the field of play into yardage segments, he gave birth to the expression "gridiron."

Camp is regarded as not only the creator but also the savior of the game; when public reaction in 1906 to the brutality of football ("the flying wedge," crippling injuries and all-out brawling) threatened its future, Camp's rule changes

persuaded Teddy Roosevelt to give the new sport a second chance. He became a charter member of the rules committee of the just-formed organization in 1906 that is known today as the NCAA.

"Jane Fonda probably never heard of Walter Camp," says Williams, "but he is considered to be the first aerobics instructor with his famous 'Daily Dozen' calisthenics for Yale students back in the 1880's".

The All-American team was personally picked by Camp from 1889 until his death in 1925, when famed sportswriter Grantland Rice took over the responsibility and continued the selection until 1948. *Collier's* magazine annually featured the Camp All-American teams throughout this period. From 1949 until 1966 Camp All-American became synonymous with consensus All-American teams being chosen by wire services and other organizations which emerged to rival the Camp selection.

The Walter Camp Football Foundation was established in 1967 by New Haven area residents who were determined to perpetuate Camp's name and his legacy to college football. The Foundation resumed the Camp All-American selection process that year and built the annual Walter Camp Weekend into one of the most prestigious and successful football events in the nation.

Besides recognizing each year's top offensive and defensive players, the Foundation honors a Player of the Year, Coach of the Year, Distinguished American, and Man of the Year. The newest award goes to an Alumnus of the Year, presented to a Camp All-American who has made significant contributions to society after his playing days.

"Just as important," says Williams, "the Water Camp Weekend brings the All-Americans in touch with area youngsters, many of whom are in hospitals and whose eyes light up when they see these football stars." Support of local charities has long been a driving force of the Foundation; since its inception, the group has contributed over \$350,000 to needy organizations.

"The first Walter Camp All-American team had players from just three universities - Yale, Harvard and Princeton," says Williams. "Football was a new game in 1889 and those selections reflected that situation. Year by year, as the game caught on with other schools, the All-Americans represented a wider and wider geographical spread. You can trace the history of college football through the Walter Camp teams. Our 1989 team will be the latest in that long line of great players."

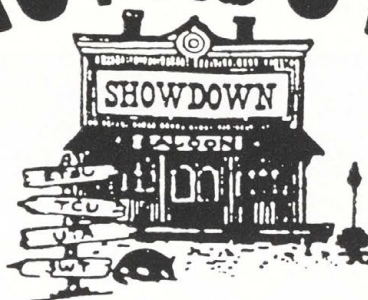

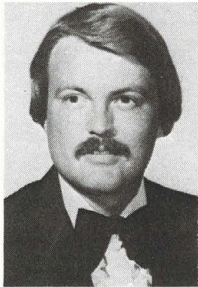

The Bobcat Band has established

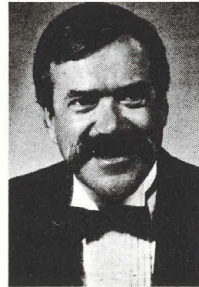

Consisting of approximately 170 members from various academic ar-

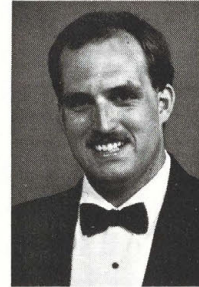

BOBCAT BASKETBALL MEN'S

Nothing has come easy for Southwest Texas State University head coach Harry Larrabee in his three seasons at the helm of the Bobcat basketball program. With that knowledge in hand, Larrabee may be embarking on his toughest coaching challenge in his eight years on the collegiate level.

What Larrabee and staff (and team of course) must replace is simply its top two scorers and rebounders from a squad that posted a 13-17 record.

"We are going to be the young and restless," said Larrabee this summer. "We are going to have towels on the sidelines but instead of wiping away the sweat, they will be wiping away the tears (i.e. youth spells a trying season)."

Torgeir Bryn, a 6-9 Norwegian product, led SWT the last two seasons in both scoring and rebounding. Last year, Bryn was named to the all-Southland Conference team for the second consecutive season after averaging 16.7 points and 9.0 rebounds a game. He also finished with a league high 42 blocked shots.

The other hole to fill comes from the loss of 6-5 forward Kevin Stiner. The Houston Clear Lake product developed into a better than average shooter and finished with a 12.7 scoring norm and a 4.1 rebound average.

What is back are two starters and a total of seven lettermen. SWT will be rich in the backcourt area, especially after the recruiting season, but power forward and center remain as the Bobcats two biggest question marks.

The youth Larrabee is referring to is the fact that only one three-year and one two-year lettermen appear on the roster for the upcoming season, and that three-year lettermen, senior Jon Hass, only played 56 minutes last season.

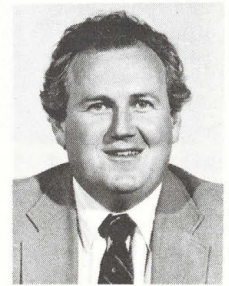
In the backcourt, returning senior guard Stacy Bennett is SWT's top scorer back after a 10.2 average last year and should handle the playmaker position in 89-90. The other experienced guard back is senior John Morgan, who along with Bennett transferred to SWT last season. Morgan averaged just under five points and four rebounds a game last year.

At the small forward spot, junior starter Gregg Frizzell (4.6 points and 3.4 rebounds) and sophomore Nick Bess (4.7 points and 2.4 rebounds) are back.

Hass, 5-7 sophomore guard Lance Harper, and 6-10 sophomore center Mats Ostberg along with redshirt freshman Morris Farr a 6-7 power forward, also return for SWT.

Out of those returnees, three starters may emerge for SWT, Bennett, Frizzell and maybe Ostberg at center. The rest of the starting line-up may have to come from juco players signed last spring.

Heading that list are 6-2 guard Maxwell Curry and 6-5 forwards, Ken Hockless and Rod Hill.

If anyone knows what it takes to be a winner, Linda Sharp does. In a 12 year span at the University of Southern California, Sharp Posted a win-loss record of 271-99, and produced back-to-back national championship teams in 1983 and 1984.

Sharp also garnered conference coach of the year honors three times, and was the head coach for the United States team at the World University Games in Yugoslavia in 1987.

Since taking the SWT job in late May, the 38-year-old Oklahoma native has been working hard to put together her program for the upcoming season. "SWT has the potential to be a powerhouse in the state of Texas," Sharp said. "We intend to put the Bobcat program on the map in women's basketball."

Without the benefit of a full recruiting season, Sharp will have to shape the talents of players already in the program to fit her running style of play. The transition should be eased somewhat by the presence of senior all-America candidate Shelly Borton, who led SWT in five different stat categories last season.

SWT can also count on Landthis Ortiz to add an offensive spark and provide strength under the boards from her guard spot. The 5-9 Ecuadorian senior averaged nine points and almost seven rebounds a game last year despite enduring a horrendous shooting slump in the middle of the season.

Sophomore Chris Ferrell is the Bobcats' outside threat,

hitting on 41 of 106 three-point tries last year, and classmate Tami Krout has the athletic ability to make things happen on the court either at guard or small forward.

Junior Ami Davis can also score from the outside, and is hard to stop when her shot is on.

With the loss of forwards Kim Schultz and Fiona Robinson, the 'Cats will have to rely on 6-3 shot-blocker Melinda Hieber and 5-11 Ronda Ratcliff to score and rebound inside, but help may come in the form of JUCO transfer Marla Roepke. The 6-0 Blinn JC grad is an excellent defensive player, and has the strength to crash the boards when needed.

The Bobcats are loaded at the guard position, and speed is of the essence with newcomers Teresa Cobble and Angie Goodwin. Those two will team up with Trinity Valley JC product Rowena Hickman to give SWT a trio of good young shooters in the backcourt.

SWT head coach Karen Chisum has found the fountain of youth in her 1989 Bobcat volleyball squad, and her only concern is that the waters may be a little bit shallow.

The 'Cats return only one senior on a squad loaded with young talent. Of the seven returning lettermen, only two have more than one year of collegiate play under their belts. Making Chisum's task all that much more difficult is the gaping hole at the setter spot left by the departure of Southland Conference first-teamer Kathy McClure.

Chisum's troops won't be entirely without leadership, though, as senior middle blocker Molly Morrow returns after posting her best numbers ever in 1988. The 5-10 Eules Trinity product put down 325 kills with a .280 hitting percentage, and also led the team in blocks with 17 solos and 78 assists.

SWT's youngsters can also follow the lead of junior Stephanie Lawrence, who co-captains the team with Morrow. Lawrence ranked 11th nationally last year in service ace average, recording 89 for a 0.69 per game norm. The 5-7 jumping-jack also had 359 digs in 1988, second highest on the team, while only seeing action in half of the rotation.

Sophomores Alisande Cavanagh and Liz Faour will battle for the right to fill McClure's shoes at setter, and they are equal in that they are able but inexperienced. Cavanagh started on match in 1988 at setter, and performed well enough to aid a five-set win over SLC rival Sam Houston State, while Faour saw most of her action at outside hitter.

Cavanagh has a deceptive serve which earned her 41 aces last year, and is a gutsy backcourt player, notching 204 digs in '88. She needs to im-

prove her strength to become an effective hitter, and must expand her setting repertoire to give the Bobcats options on the attack.

The 5-8 Faour is a fiery competitor on the court, and has the ability to rally the team in difficult matches. She is a stronger hitter than Cavanagh, and can play good defense in the back row, but must improve her serving and shot selection to win a starting role.

The starting spot will go to the one who comes back in the best condition. "We want to run a 5-1 offense, and don't want to be stuck shuttling setters in and out."

Whoever takes the position will undoubtedly set a lot of balls in the direction of soph Stephanie Winn, a dynamic leaper who hits the ball as hard as anyone in the country. Winn joined the team as a walk-on in 1988 and quickly made her mark in unwitting opponents.

Standing only 5-8, Winn sometimes hits like she is a foot taller, and that ability earned her 291 kills in 1988, third best on the squad. Her athleticism also helped her top the 200 mark digs.

Two other returning lettermen may hold the key to SWT's defense in the middle. DeAndrea Limbrick makes up for her lack of height with athletic ability, while Kim Uptegraph uses her great blocking technique and court awareness to overcome a lack of speed.

At 5-10, Limbrick is short for a division I middle blocker, but she compensates with good jumping ability and intelligent hitting. She reads defenses well and has a very quick attacking motion.

Uptegraph stands 6-1 and has an uncanny knack of being at the right place at the right time despite her lack of speed. She was second on the squad in blocks in '88, recording 13 solos and 29 assists while playing in only 58 games. Uptegraph also had 64 kills and a .238 hitting percentage, with many of the kills coming from the right side.

Among the newcomers, San Antonio Clark graduate Kim Busby will probably see the most playing time as a freshman. Chisum said, "Kim will be one of the first players off the bench for us because she is so versatile. She has a lot of club experience, and is an excellent passer. Kim also digs the ball well and can crush it on the attack."

Jalie Holdman brings a winning tradition with her, as her Amarillo team won the Texas state 5A title in 1988, and she could see a lot of time at outside hitter after playing in the middle during

her high school career.

"We think Jalie will be able to help us on the front line when she improves her strength," Chisum said. "She played middle blocker in high school, but can hit well enough to play the outside for us."

SWT will face what is probably the strongest line-up of opponents Chisum has ever scheduled, including defending national champs Texas on opening day. The Bobcats are slated to play more than ten potential top-20 teams, prompting the tenth-year mentor to say, "I have never shied away from difficult matches, but I may have gotten a little carried away this time considering how young we are. We've got three top-20 class teams in our pool at the Cal-Fullerton tournament, and things don't get much easier after that."

In spite of apparently having the cards stacked against her, Chisum is optimistic about her team's chances in 1989, particularly in the always-tough Southland Conference.

THE SOUTHLAND CONFERENCE

Completing its Silver Anniversary last fall, the Southland Conference conducts championships in 15 sports-eight for men and seven for women-at the NCAA Division I level (I-AA football).

The Southland Conference was founded in 1963 by the presidents of Abilene Christian College, Arkansas State College, Lamar State College of Technology, Trinity University, and Arlington State College. Change has been steady through the years with each step making the league a stronger organization.

The first changes came in 1971 when Dick Oliver was named the first full-time commissioner in conference history and Louisiana Tech and Southwestern Louisiana were added as members of the league. The following year Trinity withdrew and McNeese State came out on board.

In 1982, Southwestern Louisiana left the league to pursue I-A football status while Northeast Louisiana and North Texas State joined the league. Then in 1986, Texas-Arlington was forced to withdraw when the school decided to drop football but was later readmitted for the 1987-88 campaign along with four other new members.

Following the 1986-87 season charter members Arkansas State and Lamar University joined Louisiana Tech in withdrawing, making way for new members Northwestern State, Sam Houston State, Stephen F. Austin and Southwest Texas. In addition, Don Landry was named only the second full-time commissioner in the league's history, replacing Oliver who announced his retirement.

The current membership of the Plano, Texas, based organization is McNeese State University, the University of North Texas, Northeast Louisiana University, Northwestern State University, Sam Houston State University, Southwest Texas State University, Stephen F. Austin State University, and the University of Texas at Arlington.

Team titles are determined in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's outdoor track and field, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis and men's golf.

The Southland Conference and its eight member institutions receive automatic invitations to the NCAA Division I-AA football playoffs, Division I men's basketball tournament, Division I volleyball tournament and Division I baseball tournament this year.

In the past, Southland Conference teams have represented this league well on the national scene. And that hasn't changed with the most recent membership revision.

Conference teams were among the nation's best

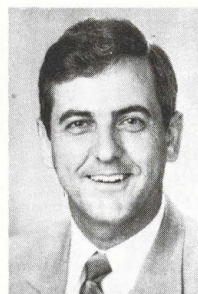
in all sports they competed in last season. North Texas and Stephen F. Austin both shared the lime-light as the nation's top-ranked I-AA football team last fall and those two, plus Northwestern State, represented the SLC in the 16-team NCAA I-AA national championship play-offs. The Southland trio's appearance marked the first time in play-off history that a conference placed three teams in the field.

In the sport of volleyball, Texas-Arlington was among the nation's best, holding down the No. 7 spot in the American Volleyball Coaches Association national poll and advancing to the regionals for the third straight year. The Lady Mavericks posted a regular-season victory over eventual national champion, Texas, and fell to the hosting Lady Longhorns in the regional final.

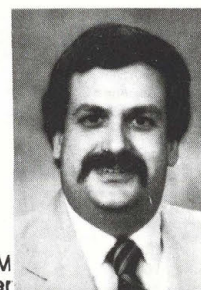
Last winter, Stephen F. Austin was ranked as high as 11th among Division I women's basketball teams by the Associated Press. The Ladyjacks advanced to the NCAA West Regional before being eliminated by top seeded Maryland. Northwestern State also received an at-large bid to the NCAA Women's Basketball tournament and McNeese State represented the SLC in the NCAA Men's Tournament, falling to the Midwest region's top-seed, Illinois State, in the opening round.

Southland Conference universities cover a diverse range, from the small, regional institution to the large metropolitan universities. Enrollments of member institutions range from 6,000 to 24,000 and offer a wide range of academic fields of education.
