## Penguins Invade South Texas Heat

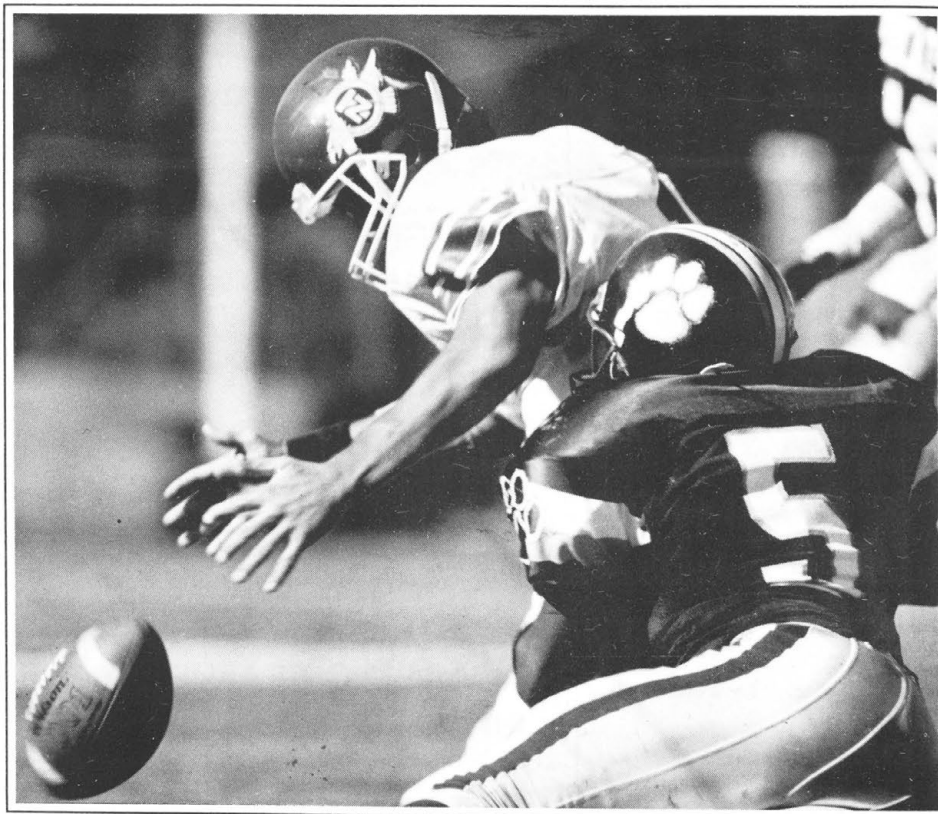
Tonight, Southwest Texas will embark on a tough two-week stretch against national powers, as they host the defending NCAA I-AA champions, Youngstown State in the home opener at the friendly confines of Bobcat Stadium.

From SWT's standpoint, this matchup will undoubtedly be the toughest test for the Bobcats thus far, as SWT will get a first-hand glimpse of how they stack up against the nation's top-ranked team.

Many football coaches around America say the most improvement in a football team can be noticed between the first and second games of the season. That was heavily noticed by fans, as the SWT offense amassed over 500 yards in total offense in the Bobcat's 39-34 victory over Texas Southern last Saturday at Alamo Stadium.

After gaining just 189 net yards rushing against Texas A&I the week before, the 'Cat ground attack returned to last year's form, compiling 360 yards against the Tigers. SWT junior fullback Scott Smith led the barrage with 109 yards rushing, while quarterback John Hygh added 100 yards and two touchdown runs.

The 360 yards of rushing offense marked the first time since the 1991 game against North Texas that SWT rushed for more than 300 yards. SWT finished fourth in the nation in 1991 at 287.8 yards per game rushing. The Bobcats were 3-1 last year in games in which they rushed for 300 yards or more. The only loss came at the hands of another nationally ranked team, Idaho. Since 1990 and the inception of SWT's current triple option of-



fense, the Bobcats are 8-2 when the team reaches that 300-yard plateau of net rushing.

Observers may have also noticed an oddity as the ever improving Bobcat air attack threw for 151 yards and two touchdowns, including a 28-yard strike from Hygh to Maurice Williams. Other than in the Prairie View game (59-6) last year, it was the first time since 1990 that the 'Cats have won a game in which they passed for more than 100 yards.

SWT kicker Ray Whitehead also proved to be vital in the win, booting three field goals during the game from 21, 28, and 29 yards.

The win over Texas Southern marked the first time a Bobcat gridiron squad had started the season at 2-0 since the 1988 season. However,

should the 'Cats want to have the idea of keeping their record unblemished, the SWT offense and defense must have a more consistent effort that in the past two games as the number one Penguins come waddling into San Marcos.

The Bobcat defense was the spark at Texas A&I, causing many turnovers and making the big plays when they had to, while their offense was sputtering. However last weekend, it was the offense that took center stage, while the defense surrendered 421 yards in total offense, of which TSU totaled 368 yards through the air on 16 Tiger completions.

On the other hand, who says Penguins can't fly? Though their passing stats are not going to rival most Big Sky numbers, Youngstown State has

managed just short of 800 yards of total offense in the team's first two games against Clarion and Delaware State.

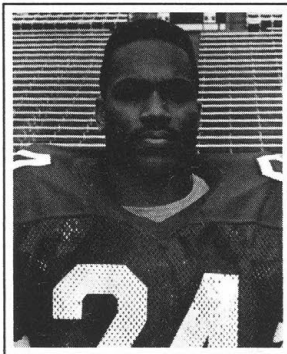
Youngstown State looks to be in the thick of the national championship race again, sporting a 2-0 record, outscoring their two opponents by the score of 90-27.

Last week, YSU avenged a loss at the hands of Delaware State in their championship season, beating the Hornets 42-20. YSU's All-American candidate, junior Tamron Smith, who rushed for 1,545 yards in 1991, bulldogged his way for 96 yards and four

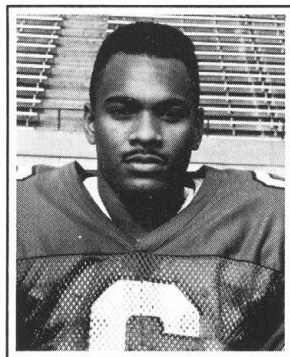
touchdowns to pace the Penguins.

Youngstown State also has two other All-American candidates in defensive end, Chris Vecchione, and defensive back, Dave Roberts.

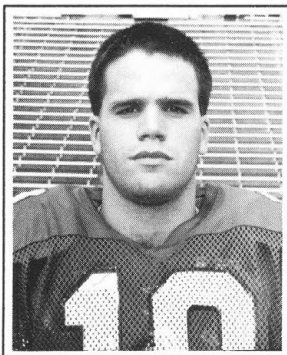
Last season, head coach Jim Tressel and his Penguin squad defeated the Thundering Herd of Marshall 25-17 in the NCAA I-AA championship game. Tressel and his father became the only father-son combination to win the national championships at their respective schools. The late Dr. Lee Tressel won the national title back in 1978 at Baldwin-Wallace.



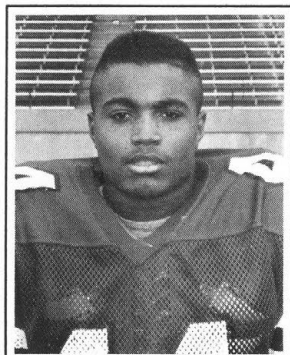

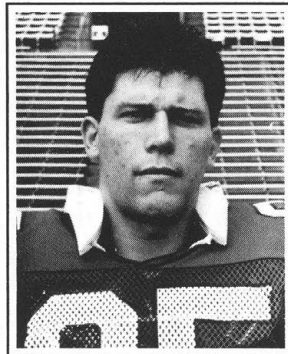

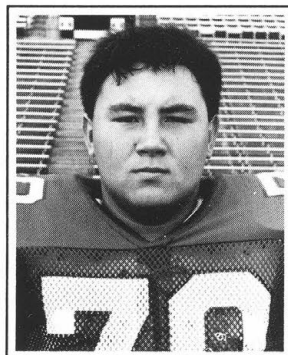

### The Fullback Option in Gear

With one of the nation's best I-AA football teams next up on the schedule, there could have been concern that the Bobcats of Southwest Texas might look past Texas Southern last Saturday.

An ever-improving Tiger squad made sure that wouldn't happen. TSU put together a never-say die game and though they never led, lost by just five points, 39-34.

One reason SWT was able to keep the lead on its side of the scoreboard was a rejuvenated rushing attack. The attack went for 360 yards on the ground with two 100-yard rushers.

Fullback Scott Smith led all rushers with 109 yards on 21 carries. For Smith, it was the first time he eclipsed the 100-yard mark since last year's season opener against Texas A&I.

"Being with the triple option, they can always take away one phase of it, but the other people are going to have a good game," the always modest Smith said after the game. "You have to be patient and hit it up in there and take advantage of what they give you."

Smith took over the team's rushing lead, now with 143 yards after two games. Quarterback John Hygh is second with 136 yards, while Maurice Williams has 100.

The Belton junior was the team's second-leading rusher a year ago with 549 yards and 6.4 yards per carry. Smith and Tom Stubblefield combined for 974 yards at the fullback position in 1991 and that duo is doing a pretty good job of double-teaming the opposing defense this year. Stubblefield finished with 67 yards on 15 carries against Texas Southern.

"Anytime you have depth, even with our "A" backs and quarterbacks, and you have an opportunity to rest and stay fresh," Smith added, "that wears down the defense."

Smith reflects on the team's first two games, both wins, as total team efforts.

"These last two weeks have proven that when the defense is off, the offense can take up the slack," Smith continued, "and when the offense is off, the defense can pick up

the slack."

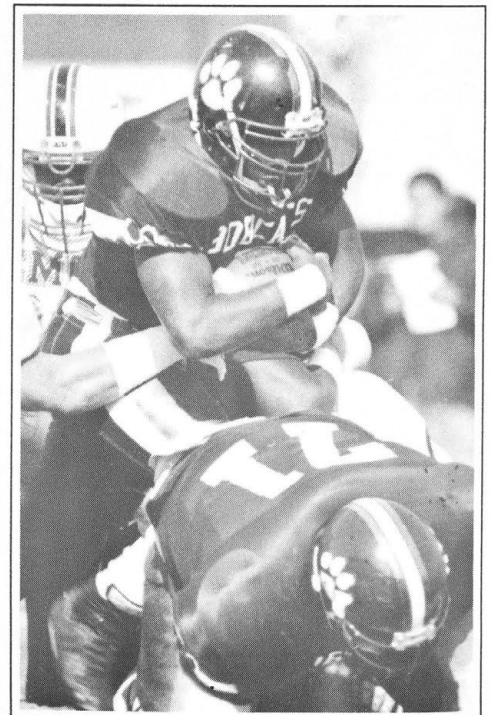
"When we hit it right on, then we will be hard to beat."

Another factor in SWT's early success, Smith credits, is the coaching staff.

"This team has displayed a lot of character this year and I think that is a reflection of the coaching staff," Smith said. "They are good men and we want to win for them as much as we want to win for ourselves."

"They have shown a lot more confidence in us as a team and therefore we have a lot more confidence in them."

Youngstown State is the next foe for the Bobcats. The Penguins are the defending NCAA I-AA national champs and are off to a 2-0 start this fall.

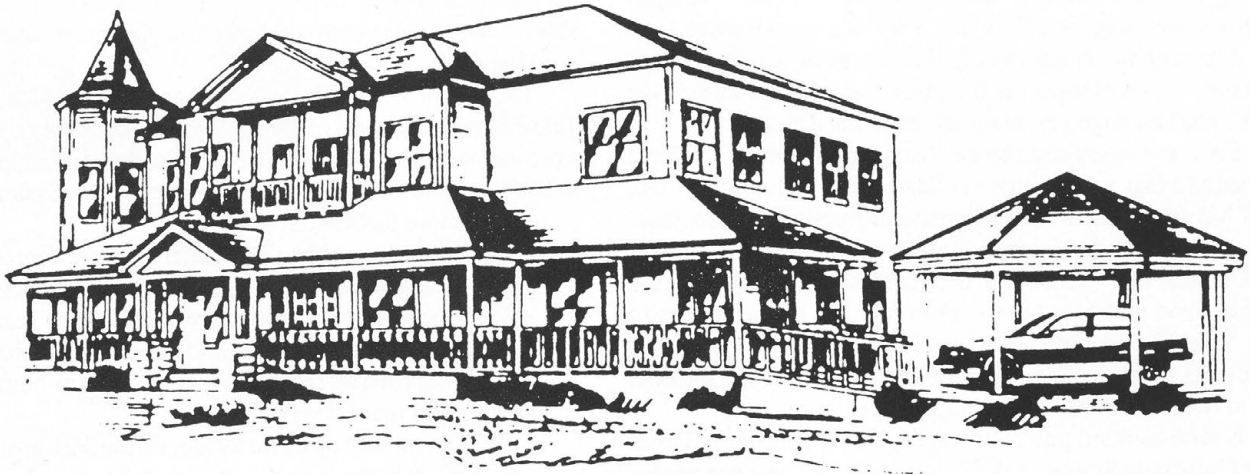

## SWT ■ PROFILE

Located on the edge of the Texas Hill Country, where blackland prairies turn into beautiful hills, Southwest Texas State University enjoys a setting that is unique among Texas universities. The beauty of the crystal-clear San Marcos River and the stately cypress and pecan trees on the campus adds to the charm of its picturesque setting.

A diversity of campus architecture – from historic red-steeped Old Main, SWT's original landmark building, to the Albert B. Alkek Library, which opened in 1990, – campus facilities encourage a feeling that SWT is a special place.

Although the major metropolitan areas of Austin and San Antonio – even Houston and Dallas – are not far away, San Marcos has managed to retain its small-town charm.

SWT was established by the Texas Legislature in 1899 and opened as a two-year teacher's college in 1903. Since that time, SWT has grown into a comprehensive university with programs through the master's degree level and an enrollment of more than 21,000 students. Although the increasing diversity of the graduate and undergraduate student mix is a major university goal, it is the resident student population that gives the SWT campus its special collegiate atmosphere. Some 5,000 students live in residence halls on the university campus.

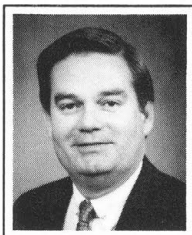
A state-assisted public university that is part of the Texas State University System, SWT offers undergraduate and graduate courses primarily for the people of Texas. Over the years, the university has preserved its commitment to excellence in teaching at all levels while developing a wide variety of programs in other fields and making significant contributions in many areas of research.

Sound academic programming that combines the best of liberal arts education with the professional career-oriented curricula provides SWT students with a broad range of educational options. SWT offers undergraduate courses and degrees in a wide variety of subjects through seven academic schools: Applied Arts and Technology, Business, Education, Fine Arts and Communication, Health Professions Liberal Arts, and Science. Master's degrees are offered in a variety of areas through the Graduate School. Graduate-level programs are made available at times and locations that are particularly convenient to the working adult.

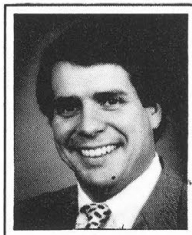
Dr. Jerome H. Supple has served as president of Southwest Texas State since April of 1989. A professor of chemistry with a proven background in university administration, Supple came to SWT from the State University of New York System.

A few more facts about SWT:

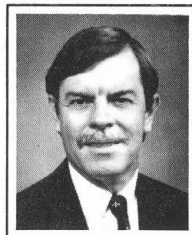
- SWT offers more than 130 undergraduate degree programs and more than 40 master's degree programs.

# Dr. Jerome Supple

Dr. Jerome Supple is in his fourth year as President of Southwest Texas State University after taking office on April 3, 1989.

Supple holds a Doctorate in organic chemistry from the University of New Hampshire as well as Bachelor's and Master's degrees in chemistry from Boston College.

When he was selected as SWT's president in December 1988, Supple was in the middle of a one-year appointment as acting provost and vice president of academic affairs at the State University of New York-Potsdam. He was on a one-year leave of absence from his position as vice president of academic affairs and professor of chemistry at SUNY-Plattsburgh in order to fill the Potsdam

vacancy.

He also served as acting president of SUNY-Plattsburgh, dean of general and special studies at SUNY-Fredonia and acting vice president for academic affairs at SUNY-Fredonia.

While serving as a vice president of academic affairs, Supple initiated programs designed to enhance the intellectual climate on campus, such as development of faculty research and scholarship opportunities, growth of external support systems through grants, the creation of an honors program and a distinguished visiting professor program.

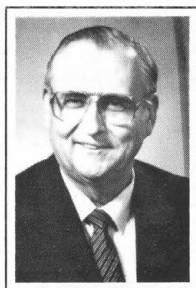
An emphasis on curriculum development during Supple's tenure as vice president for academic affairs at SUNY-Plattsburgh resulted in 13 new major programs at the undergraduate level as well as the initiation of 47 academic minor programs.

Since taking office at SWT, Supple

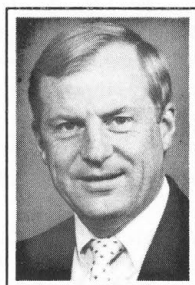
has encouraged a greater emphasis on research and scholarship among SWT faculty and has worked to enhance grant and other extended external support of the university.

During most of his tenure as a university administrator, Supple continued to teach and do research. At SWT, he holds the rank of tenured professor in the Department of Chemistry. He has taught at all academic levels and has supervised several research groups. He has co-authored two chemistry textbooks and has published numerous other scholarly articles and papers.

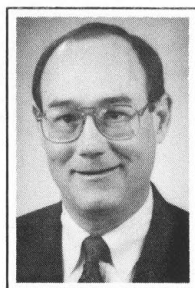

## Alma Mater

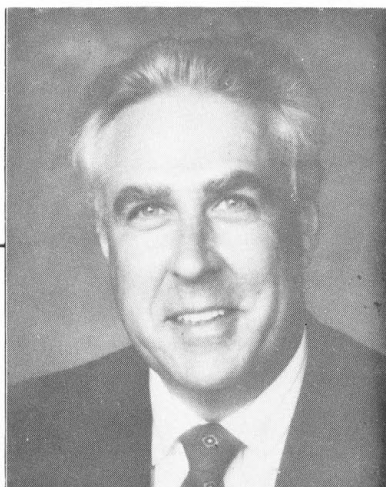
O, Alma Mater, set up on the green hills,

## Richard Hannan

Richard Hannan was named the fourth Director of Athletics in Southwest Texas history on January 4, 1992, and began as SWT's A.D. in February.

Hannan came to Southwest Texas after a successful two and one-half years as the athletic director at Weber State University in Ogden, Utah. He replaced Bill Miller, who retired after

31 years on the Bobcat staff, including the last 20 as athletic director.

While at Weber State, Hannan's programs claimed the Big Sky Conference's "All-Sports" trophy for the first time in school history. The Wildcat program also witnessed balancing the athletic department budget, creating a student advisory board, and implementing an academic support system. Hannan was also very active in both the Big Sky Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Hannan spent 14 years at Lewis Clark State College in Lewiston,

Idaho, as athletic director, head basketball coach, and assistant professor. He also spent seven years at Columbian Basin College in Pasco, Washington, as the head basketball coach and assistant professor.

In May of 1991, Hannan was inducted into the National Athletic Intercollegiate Association (NAIA) Hall of Fame.

Hannan graduated from Eastern Washington State College in 1963, and received his Master's degree from Eastern Washington, as well, in 1967. He and his wife, Nancy, have three children.

The 1992 Southwest Texas football team is in new hands. But not to worry, they are good hands.

Jim Bob Helduser enters his seventh season at Southwest Texas, but his first as the head coach of the Bobcats. The 35-year old Helduser becomes the 11th head football coach in Southwest Texas football history and, in doing so, takes over a program on the rise.

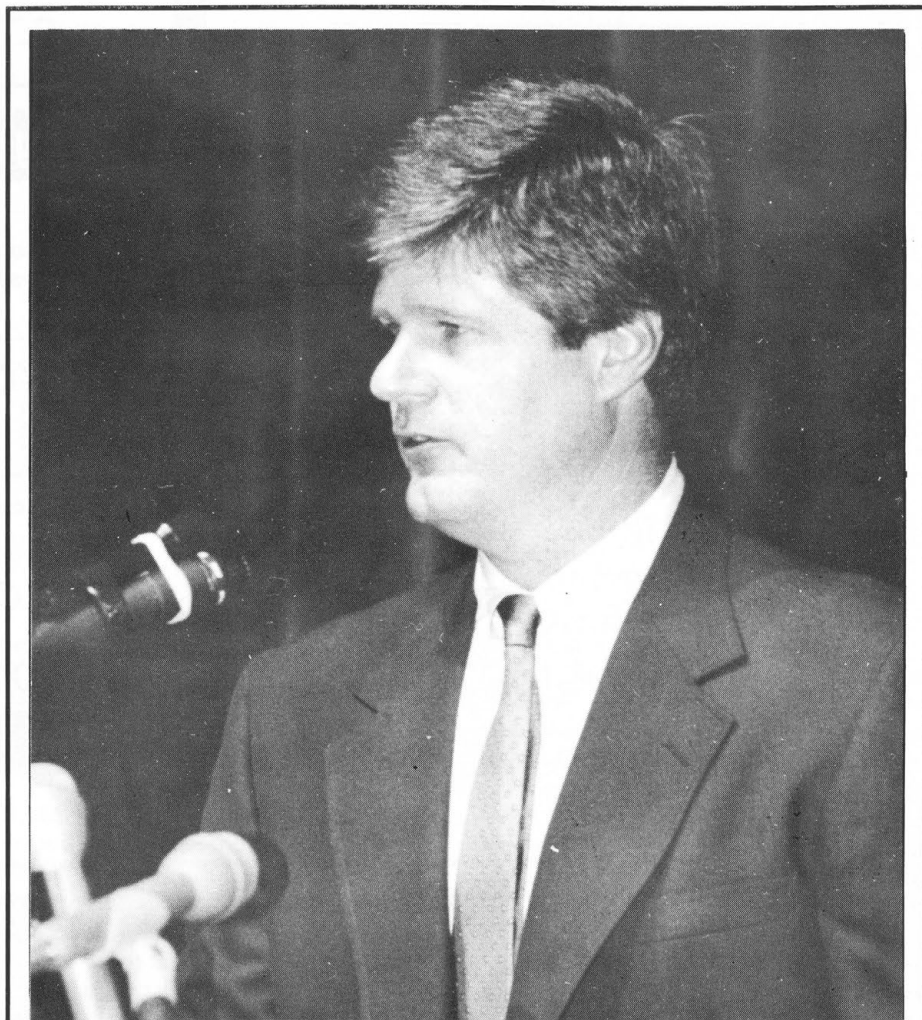
Helduser was the defensive coordinator for Southwest Texas the past two seasons, taking over the program from Dennis Franchione, who left the job vacant when he accepted the head coaching position with the University of New Mexico.

Helduser inherits a team with 44 returning letter winners and 16 returning starters, eight on offense and eight on defense. In the past two seasons, SWT has posted its first two winning records since 1984 with a 6-5 mark in 1990 and a 7-4 finish last fall. The Bobcats have also made a mark for themselves in the NCAA I-AA national polls, ranked as high as ninth last year, and in the national statistical categories. Last season, Helduser guided the Bobcats to a 12th place standing in total defense and a 13th place finish in rushing defense. On offense, Southwest Texas was ranked in the top five nationally in rushing yardage the past two seasons.

The soft-spoken first-year head coach is viewed as a "players" coach and is making his mark off the field, as well. He is upgrading current and establishing new player orientation policies for the arrival of new student-athletes in order to make their transition to college smoother. He is continuing to upgrade an outstanding strength and conditioning program and will further pursue academic excellence in his players through the Athletic Academic Counseling Program.

In past years, Helduser worked on the Southwest Texas coaching staff with the offensive line (1989), the defensive line (1986 and 1988), and with the offensive backs (1987).

Helduser was an assistant coach at Houston's Alief-Elsik High School two seasons before coming to SWT. In

addition, Helduser coached at Rice University for five years from 1980-84.

Helduser lettered four seasons at Texas Lutheran College and played on the 1975 NAIA National Championship team which posted a 13-1 record. He was coached at Texas Lutheran by former Southwest Texas and current University of Minnesota head coach Jim Wacker.

Helduser was a two-year letter

winner at Port Neches-Groves High School, and was a member of the 1974 squad which reached the state 4-A semi-finals twice. He was a two-time All-District selection.

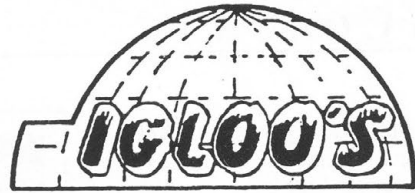

**Secondary**

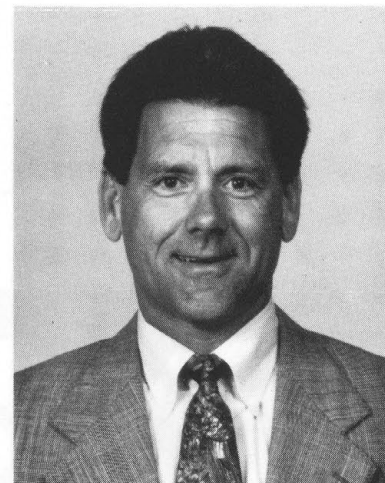
Ricky Matt is a first-year Bobcat assistant coach with responsibilities this fall in the secondary and on special teams.

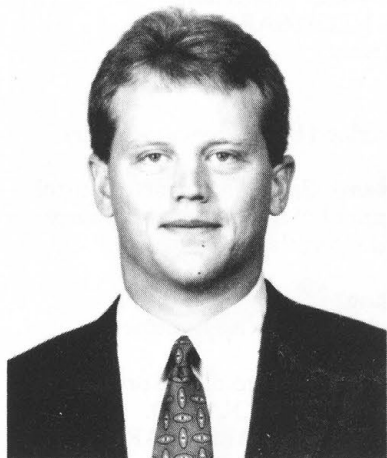

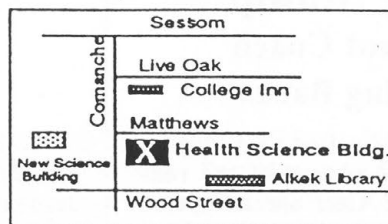

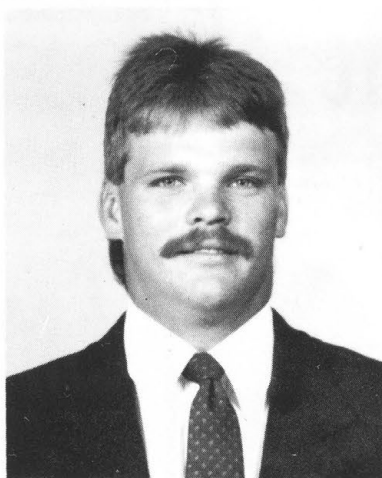
**Mike Ferguson**

Ferguson and his wife, Vicki, have three daughters, Shawna (9), Tara (6), and Emalie (4).



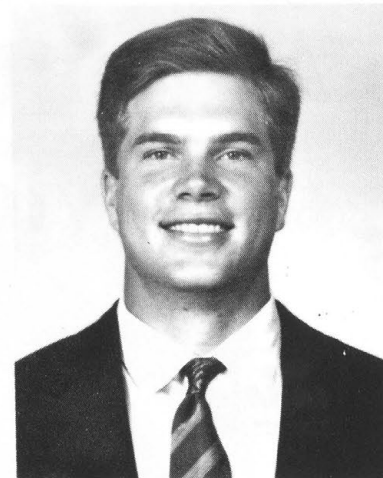
**Butch Maywald**

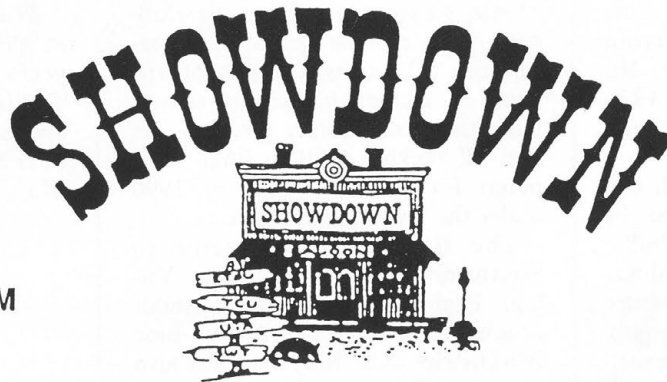

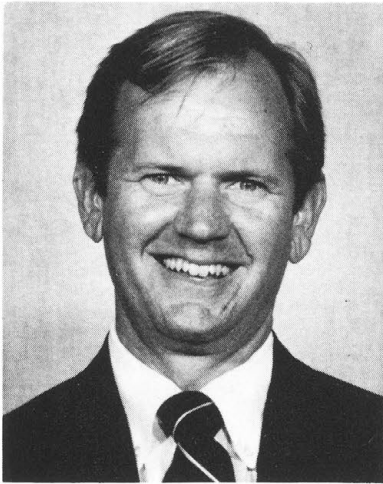

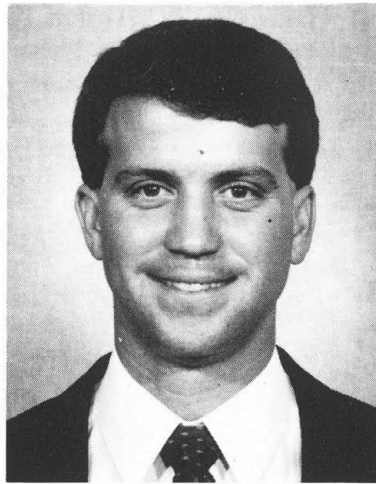
**Bobby Moore**

Assistant Trainer

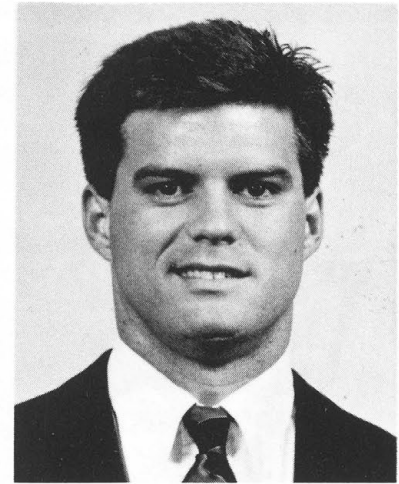

Bobcat Stadium, a \$4.4-million facility, has been home to the South-west Texas State football team since 1981.

Construction started in the fall of 1979 and was completed in August of 1981. The project also included the demolition of Evans Stadium and the addition of 2,200 parking spaces for the stadium and nearby Strahan Coliseum.

Turf on the playing surface is a hybrid Bermuda developed especially for football fields. The field has a built-in watering system and underground drainage.

Capacity of the semi-bern stadium is 14,104, and the west side features a 50-yard long, 23,000 square foot press box. The press box has seating for 50

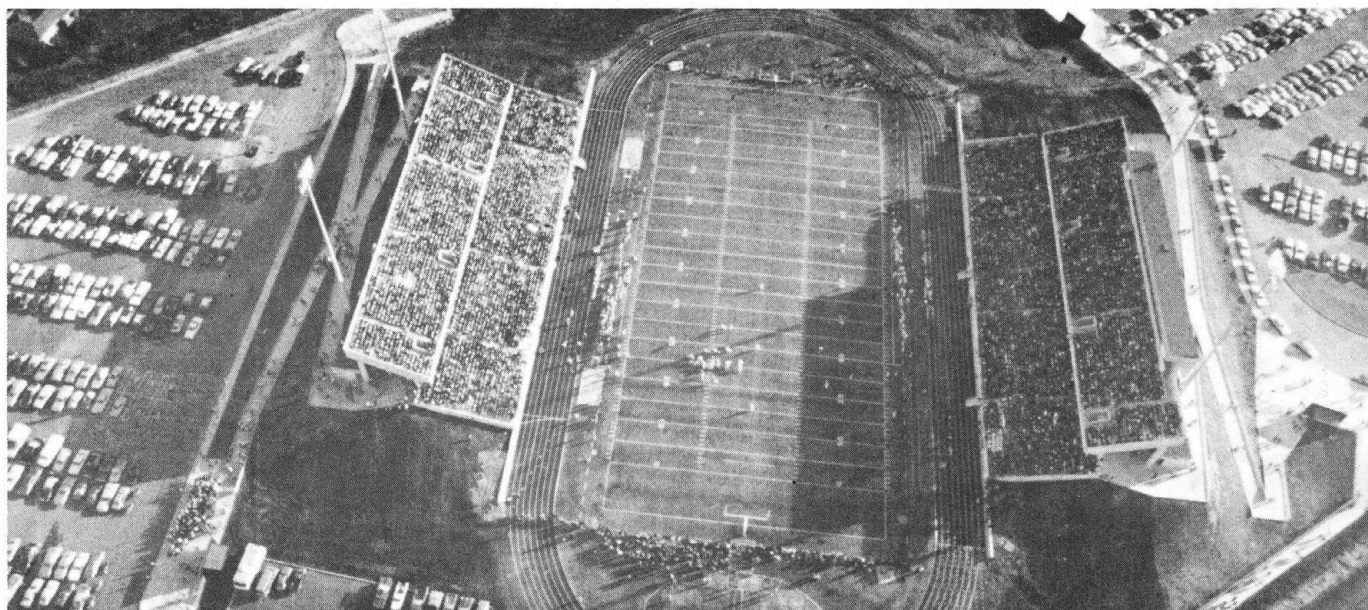
working media, two radio booths, a film deck, coaching booths for both teams, men's and women's rest-rooms, and an efficiency kitchen. More than 100 people can be accommodated in the facility.

A Maroon & Gold room for major donors to the university also sits atop the concession stand on the west side, and can be used for meetings, recep-tions, and social functions

Lighting, furnished by Wide-Lite of San Marcos, produces 120,000 watts from four 120-foot poles. The scoreboard, furnished by Dr. Pepper and State Bank and Trust, and manufactured by Spectrum of Houston, features a computerized message center and the stadium's public address system.

The track was completely resurfaced two years ago by Balsam, and it now features a full-pour polyurethane surface.

Bobcat Stadium has hosted events as diverse as the Texas Special Olympics, a Houston Oilers intrasquad game, and was the home of the San Antonio Riders in the spring. Many other special events and numerous high school regular season and playoff games have also been held in the stadium which was designed by Lock-wood, Andrews & Newman of Hous-ton and built by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

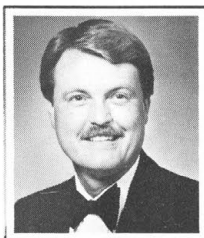
## Bobcat Marching Band

## Geography Puts SWT on the Map

It came as a surprise to Dr. Dick Boehm when a colleague offered him congratulations at this year's Association of American Geographers convention.

Boehm, chair of the Department of Geography and Planning, didn't know why he deserved his friend's accolades.

"He knew something I didn't," said Boehm. "He knew that our department had just been named the top undergraduate geography department in the nation. News like that was a very nice way to start the conference."

The official notification was waiting in Boehm's mailbox when he returned to San Marcos. The SWT department had come out on top in a survey conducted by the Department of Geography at the State University of New York College at Geneseo. The survey ranked 141 undergraduate geography programs on five characteristics relating to enrollment, teaching, advisement and pre-professional preparation. SWT finished in the top seven in four of the five categories, was first in advisement and pre-professional preparation and first overall.

"More than anything else, what this survey means is that we have been extremely successful in explaining to students the value of geographic education and training in modern society," said Boehm.

This is not the first time the SWT Geography and Planning Department has finished first in a national survey. A study conducted in 1981 by the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire also ranked SWT as the premier program in the nation. That lofty ranking could have caused a degree of complacency, but instead the SWT Geography and Planning Department used it as a springboard to growth and change with continued excellence a constant goal.

Since 1981, the department has added a graduate program and the number of faculty has nearly doubled, as has enrollment. Faculty members are also generating grant dollars at a record-setting pace and they are more active than ever in research and scholarly publishing.

Boehm gives the department's faculty the lion's share of the credit when he assesses the national ranking. He calls them "the finest group of dedicated professionals I've ever known" and likens them to salespeople marketing a superior product.

"Our department is enormously busy in serving students and that's a result of selling the importance of geography to those students. Our students are not babes in the woods and you can't sell them a bill of goods

for long. If you sold them on geography but they went out and couldn't find jobs, the word would trickle back. But the real story at SWT is our students are getting jobs -- significant jobs -- using their geography," said Boehm.

In fact, SWT geography and planning students are in demand in the job market and a degree from the department is highly respected in the profession. Boehm credits that to the fact that SWT students are getting "real world" experience while attending college.

That experience comes in many forms. A mapping project conducted by SWT students in cooperation with Hays County government paved the way for a countywide 911 emergency system implemented in late July. SWT students developed a San Marcos physician locator map to be used by out-of-town doctors to help refer patients for treatment in San Marcos, where the medical community has grown considerably in recent years. Students in the department have helped municipalities develop land use maps. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Soil Conservation Service are using SWT students to help plan surface water development projects. Students help the university in developing up-to-date route maps for the school's shuttle bus system.

The list of projects goes on and on. What they all have in common is that they utilize student workers to provide professional quality results.

"Because we are an applied geography

department, we look for projects that allow us to conduct research and provide our students with valuable training at the same time. We are able to take the content of geography and apply it to real world problems and we've been very successful in that regard. Our students are working on projects while in school that are precisely the kinds of things they will be asked to do when they graduate and accept full-time employment," said Boehm.

SWT is also headquarters of the Texas Alliance for Geographic Education, a cooperative institute between SWT and Texas A&M University that works closely with school teachers to improve the quality of geographic education in Texas schools. During the summer, a grant from the Department of Education allowed TAGE to host the Governor's Geography Academy. Teachers from across Texas attended and learned better techniques to instill in their students an excitement for geography.

Outreach efforts such as those provided by TAGE and a consistent record of excellence have provided the SWT department with a reputation -- and a ranking -- literally second to none. The result is a curriculum very much in demand by students.

"Right now we have 15 full-time faculty advising about 500 majors. Because of the sheer numbers, we're working harder and harder all the time. And I wouldn't have it any other way," said Boehm.



# The NCAA—Working Together Toward a Common Goal

**W**hat is the NCAA? The question could be answered simply by saying "National Collegiate Athletic Association," but in reality the NCAA is much more than four words.

It is also much more than a staff working in Overland Park, Kansas, on administrative details of America's intercollegiate athletics programs.

To say that the NCAA is a staff or a group of people is to misunderstand not only what the NCAA is, but what its goals and objectives are.

In reality, the NCAA is composed of some 1,000 colleges and universities across the United States. The NCAA, in its truest sense, is every member institution working together for the common good of all. It is democracy in action. All rules, all policies, all procedures, even the directions and goals of the NCAA are determined by the colleges and universities working and voting together in a common body.

As with any organization made up of individuals or member institutions, the requirements in any given area, are continually changing in response to the desires of the membership. But the goal is always the same—a sound mind, a sound body, a spirit that is unafraid and a clean sports program that develops those qualities individually, institutionally and nationally.

Perhaps no area of the NCAA comes under more inspection than the enforcement program. Yet, even there, the NCAA is responsive to the needs and concerns of the individual institutions working together for what they perceive to be the common good. The colleges and universities make the rules. The NCAA staff, working under the direction of the colleges and universities, simply administer the programs designed by the members. And it is the Committee on Infractions, which is comprised of college administrators from around the country, that determines sanctions levied against fellow members.

Just as integrity is the key to an academic program, it also is vital to healthy competition between NCAA member institutions. The colleges and universities seek to create an atmosphere in which all institutions have an equal chance to recruit America's outstanding student-athletes. It is then up to member schools to help the individual student-athletes be as good as

they can be, both in the classroom and in their athletic endeavors.

For all of the attention it receives, the enforcement program is but one small part of the NCAA's total concern. The NCAA administers 79 championships in three divisions in 21 sports. More than 18,000 men and women student-athletes compete annually in these events, designed to determine national champions.

Other programs under the auspices of the NCAA include the National Youth Sports Program. NYSP is a unique summer program that offers sports skills instruction, competition, improved physical fitness, and enrichment opportunities for economically disadvantaged youth between the ages of 10 and 16.

The NCAA conducts free Youth Education through Sports (YES) clinics in many sports, annually providing thousands of youngsters expert instruction from the best collegiate coaches, as well as important information about academics and substance-abuse prevention.

The NCAA and the NCAA Foundation also administer several scholarship programs that benefit not only deserving student-athletes but also students in general. The NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship Program has distributed more than \$5.1 million to some 2,300 student-athletes for full-time graduate study; two Walter

Byers Postgraduate Scholarship winners annually receive \$7,500 renewable stipends; the NCAA Ethnic Minority Enhancement Program and the NCAA Women's Enhancement Program each provide scholarship awards to qualified individuals for postgraduate study in sports administration; and the NCAA makes available grants to undergraduate student-athletes who have exhausted their institutional financial aid opportunity and who wish to complete their undergraduate degrees.

More information about these scholarship programs is available from the NCAA administration department.

The NCAA also sponsors one of America's foremost honors programs, which is designed to recognize yesterday's and today's top athletes, and the contributions of intercollegiate athletics as a whole to the country and society.

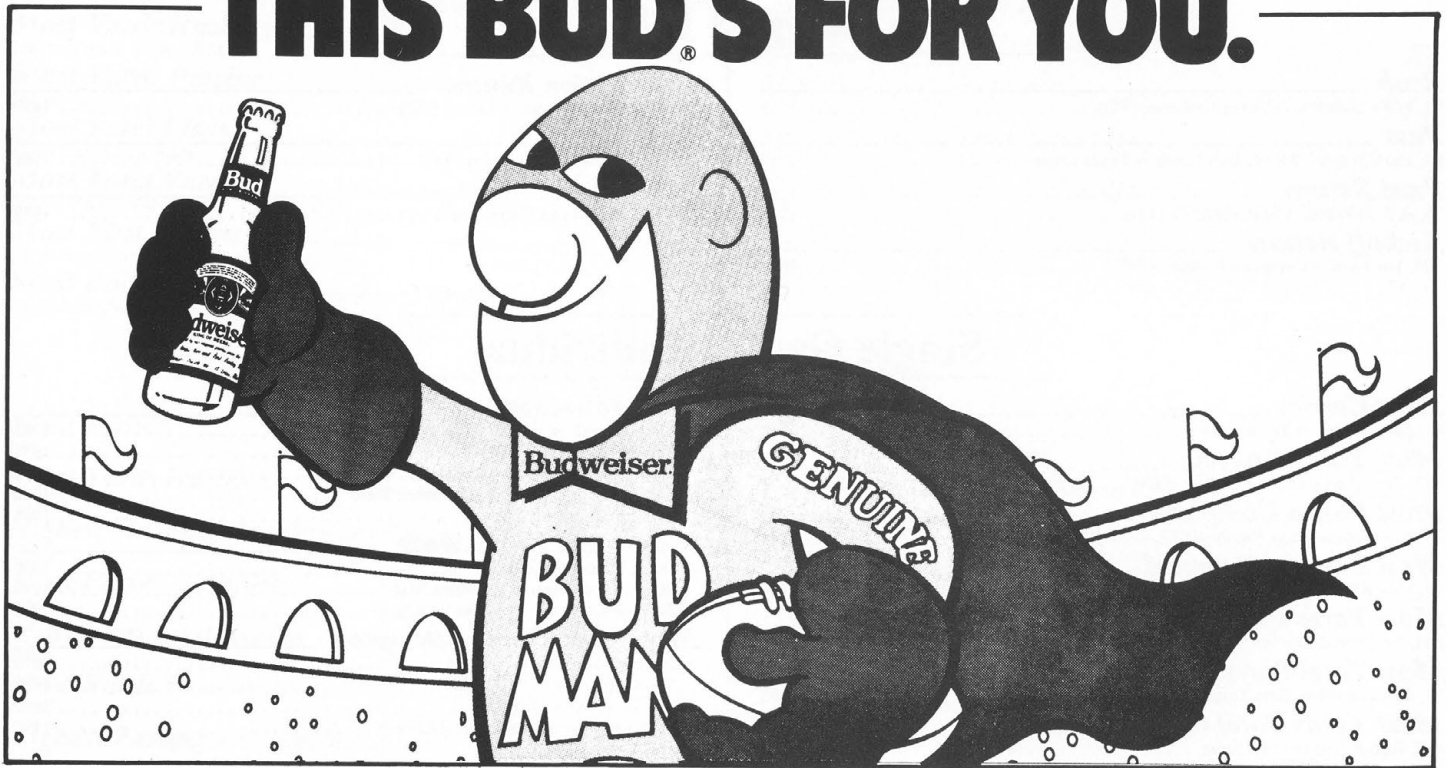
It has been said, and rightfully so, that sports is but a microcosm of society. Never before has it been more true, for sport and for the NCAA.

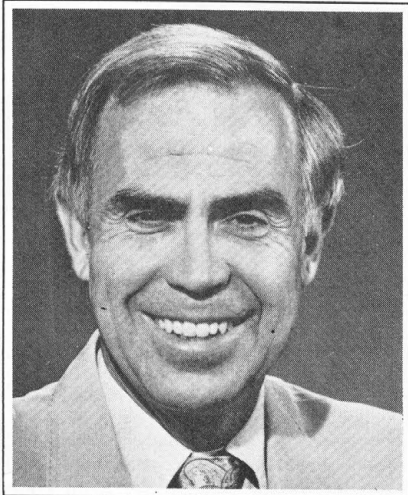

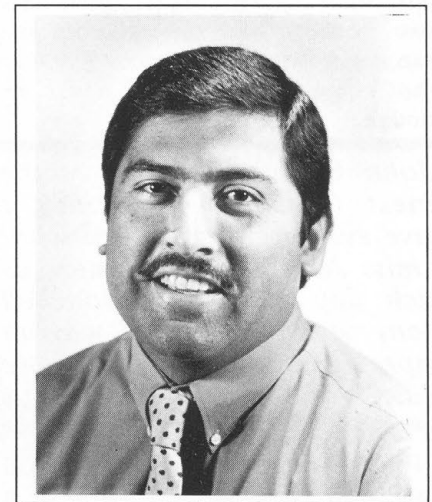

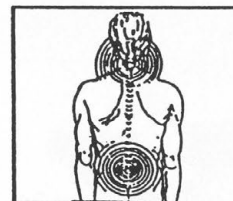

# SWT '92 TRIBUTE ■ TO ■ JOHN ■ O'HARA

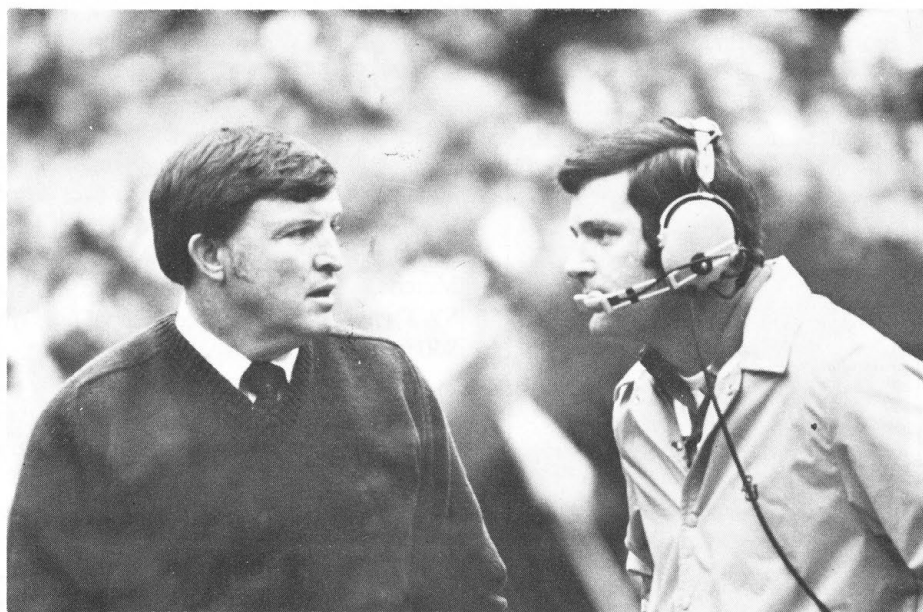
John O'Hara, the former head football coach at Southwest Texas, passed away in February while on a cruise with the University of Iowa coaching staff. Since that time, scores of articles have been written remembering the man it seems everyone loved. To those who knew John, it will never be enough.

Frank Verducci of the Iowa football staff best described O'Hara in a column written for the Iowa City Press Citizen. "John O'Hara was an outstanding football coach, which may have been the least of his contributions to all who knew him. He was a faithful, loving husband and father. Although his immediate family numbered five, his other family numbered into the hundreds. Indebted are the young men who came to John O'Hara as boys and left his guidance as men."

**John O'Hara's first big break came when he joined the Baylor staff under head coach Grant Teaff and helped build the Bears' offense into a powerhouse in the SWC.**

O'Hara grew up in Elk City, Okla., and climbed the coaching ladder until he landed next to Grant Teaff at Baylor University. For ten years, he helped build the Bears' offense, setting numerous Southwest Conference records along the way.

O'Hara came to Southwest Texas in 1983, following Jim Wacker, who had posted back-to-back NCAA Division II National Championships. O'Hara went 8-3 and advanced to the NCAA II playoffs in his first year, then witnessed Southwest Texas' climb into the ranks of Division I-AA. He finished seven years with the Bobcats with a 36-41 career mark. His final team went 5-6, losing twice on missed field goals in the closing minutes.

Following his departure from Southwest Texas, O'Hara went to Iowa as offensive line coach, helping the Hawkeyes to the Rose Bowl in his first year.

O'Hara is survived by his wife, Sandra, and three children: Chad, Koby, and Shelley.

# SWT '92 SOUTHLAND ■ CONFERENCE

The Southland Conference is comprised of six Texas and four Louisiana universities, all competing at the NCAA Division I level.

Weaving itself into the very fabric of Texas and Louisiana, the Southland Conference's 1991 expansion from eight to ten universities finds league institutions surrounding the major metropolitan cities of Dallas/Fort Worth, Shreveport, Austin, Houston, San Antonio, and New Orleans. While surrounding these major media and professional sports markets, however, nearly every Southland Conference university is nestled within its own smaller, more intimate community.

In 28 years, Southland Conference institutions have sent numerous student-athletes onto professional athletic careers, while presenting millions with undergraduate and graduate degrees to help guide their careers in a variety of distinguished professions.

Most notably in professional sports, McNeese State sent Joe Dumars to the National Basketball Association, North Texas shipped Mean Joe Greene to the National Football League and Northeast Louisiana placed Chuck Finley with Major League Baseball.

In the coaching ranks, Stephen F. Austin State graduate Bum Phillips coached the Houston Oilers and the New Orleans Saints before taking on Oiler color analysis duties. Another SFA grad, Nacogdoches native Don Gaston is president of the Boston Celtics.

Northwestern State's Mark Duper and Bobby Herbert, Nicholls State's Mark Carrier, Texas-Arlington's Tim McKyer, McNeese State's Leonard Smith, Southwest Texas' Ricky Sanders and Northeast Louisiana's Bubby Bristler have all made a major impact in the NFL.

In the NBA, Northeast Louisiana's Calvin Natt and Texas-San Antonio's Derrick Gervin both started their careers with the New Jersey Nets. Natt played for Portland and Denver before landing with the Indiana Pacers. Gervin completed an outstanding rookie year with the Nets before sitting out on injured reserve.

Southland Conference institutions have propelled numerous students on to distinguished media careers. The most noted include news anchorman Dan Rather, a graduate of Sam Houston State and ESPN sportscaster Tim Brando, who attended Northeast Louisiana. The Wall Street Journal's London bureau is home to Ken Wells, who earned his undergraduate degree at Nicholls State.

Politically, Lyndon B. Johnson was a Southwest Texas State graduate, while several SLC schools boast alumni in the U.S. Congress and Senate, as well as high ranking officials in the U.S. Armed Forces.

The conference promotes academic achievement through the recognition of an outstanding male and female athlete from each university, culminating in the naming of one male and one female Southland Conference Scholar Athlete of the Year. Also established to honor outstanding work in the classroom, the league sponsors two post-graduate scholarships.

While earning their valuable college degrees, Southland Conference student-athletes also earn accolades on the athletic fields and courts.

Most recently, three Southland athletes earned national championships in outdoor track. Southwest Texas took Charles Austin and Drew Fucci won the high jump and decathlon, respectively. Texas-Arlington's McClinton Neal captured the conference's third NCAA gold with a win in the 400 meter hurdles. Austin had recorded a jump of 7-feet 8 and one-half inches at the SLC Outdoor meet for the second best jump by an American and third best jump overall.

Southland Conference teams have advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA football championship contest in four of the past seven years, with Northeast Louisiana claiming the national title in 1987.

Seeds for the creation of the Southland Conference were planted by administrators representing five institutions when they gathered for the first time in 1963. The five original institutions were Abilene Christian College, Arkansas State College, Lamar State College of Technology, Trinity University and Arlington State College.

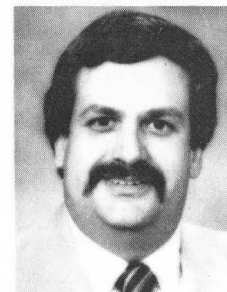
Since those early years, the league has changed dramatically with some 15 institutions having been part of what is now the Southland Conference.

The league crowns champions in 15 sports, conducting annual championship competition in the sports of women's volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's tennis and men's golf. Through round-robin competition, the conference names champions in football, softball and baseball.

The Southland Conference receives automatic invitations to the NCAA Division I-AA football playoffs, the Division I men's and women's basketball tournaments, the Division I women's volleyball tournament and the Division I baseball tournament.



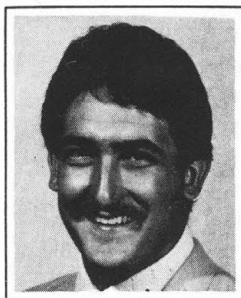

## Golfers Getting in the Swing of Things

It hasn't been accomplished in quite some time, as SWT golf head coach Jim Bob Jackson and his troops have the envious task of retaining the Southland Conference title, as well as climbing up the ladder for national recognition.

Despite losing seven players to graduation, including 1992 All-American Tom Kenney, Jackson doesn't seem phased a bit as two of the top five players in the conference return, including the 1992 SLC Tournament medalist, junior Thad Harbour.

Harbour, a native of Austin, Texas, transferred in from the University of Houston last season and won medalist honors at the SLC Tournament in sudden death over Kenney.

"Thad is a great player", said Jackson. "He brings a lot of experience to the team participating in the junior ranks. I feel he has the ability to be an All-American like Tom."

The other player mentioned above among the top five in the tournament, Dan Sjöström was a "diamond in the rough" for the 'Cats a year ago.

"Dan was a big surprise, as well as a pleasant one", said Jackson. "He was the first kid I have ever taken without ever seeing him play."

The reason why the native of Sweden was a pleasant find was the fact he finished tied for third at the conference tournament. He should only get better with age.

So, the real question for Jackson this season as he enters his sixth season as mentor is who will fill the three gaps created by the loss of seniors.

"I have in mind about seven guys who

could be in the top five," said Jackson. "I can replace the three spots with Jon Denney, an established junior college player, Midland Juco transfer Shaun Bishop, who finished seventh in the junior college ranks, and redshirt James Rolls."

Denney sat out last season as a redshirt. However, Jackson feels confident that the native of Florence, Texas, will be heard from in the years to come.

"Jon could have played for me last season," said Jackson. "However, I wanted him for all of the tournaments for the next two years. He is the guy to watch."

Bishop will be expected to produce this season, after an outstanding season last season at Midland. Redshirts James Rolls, Richard Edwards, as well as Robert Noble will vie for the final spot among the starters.

What was once merely just a fantasy, now is a reality. With the 'Cats receiving their first top 10 ranking in the region since turning to a division I program last season,

a Bobcat goal is maintaining that ranking throughout the year and qualifying for the NCAA Regional Tournament.

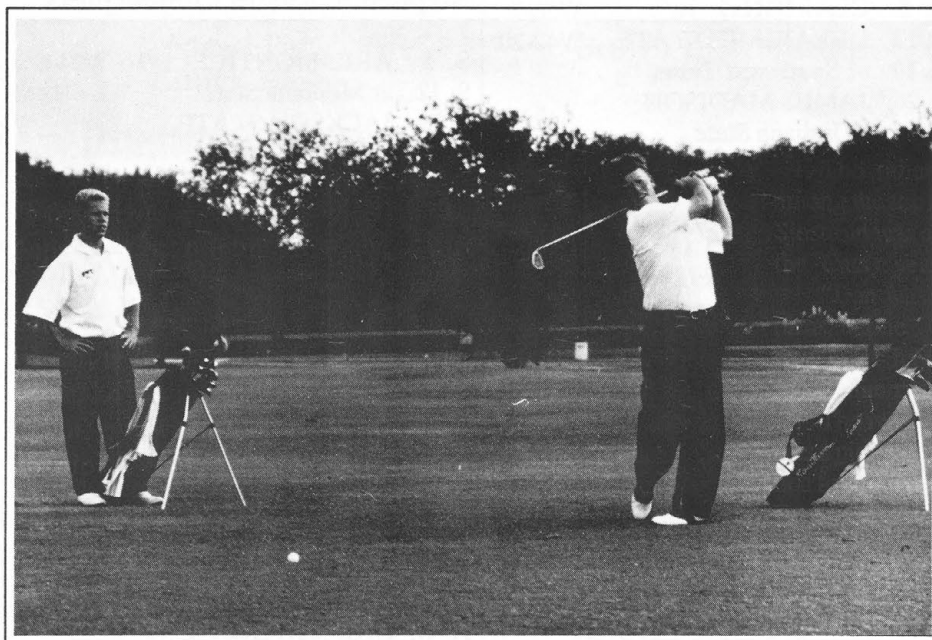
"It's a hard road, because we are in the toughest region in the country, besides the one out west," said Jackson. "However it is not an impossible task. If we go out and play the way we are capable, then we can beat anyone."

However, Jackson maintains his top priority for the season is retaining the SLC title.

"First of all, I would like us to repeat as the SLC Champions," said Jackson. "That hasn't been done in five or six years since Lamar accomplished it."

Again, SWT looks to be in the thick of things in the SLC race, as the fall season is nearly two-weeks away.

"North Texas by far will challenge," said Jackson. "They return everyone back with exception of one. Also Stephen F. Austin returns three or four."

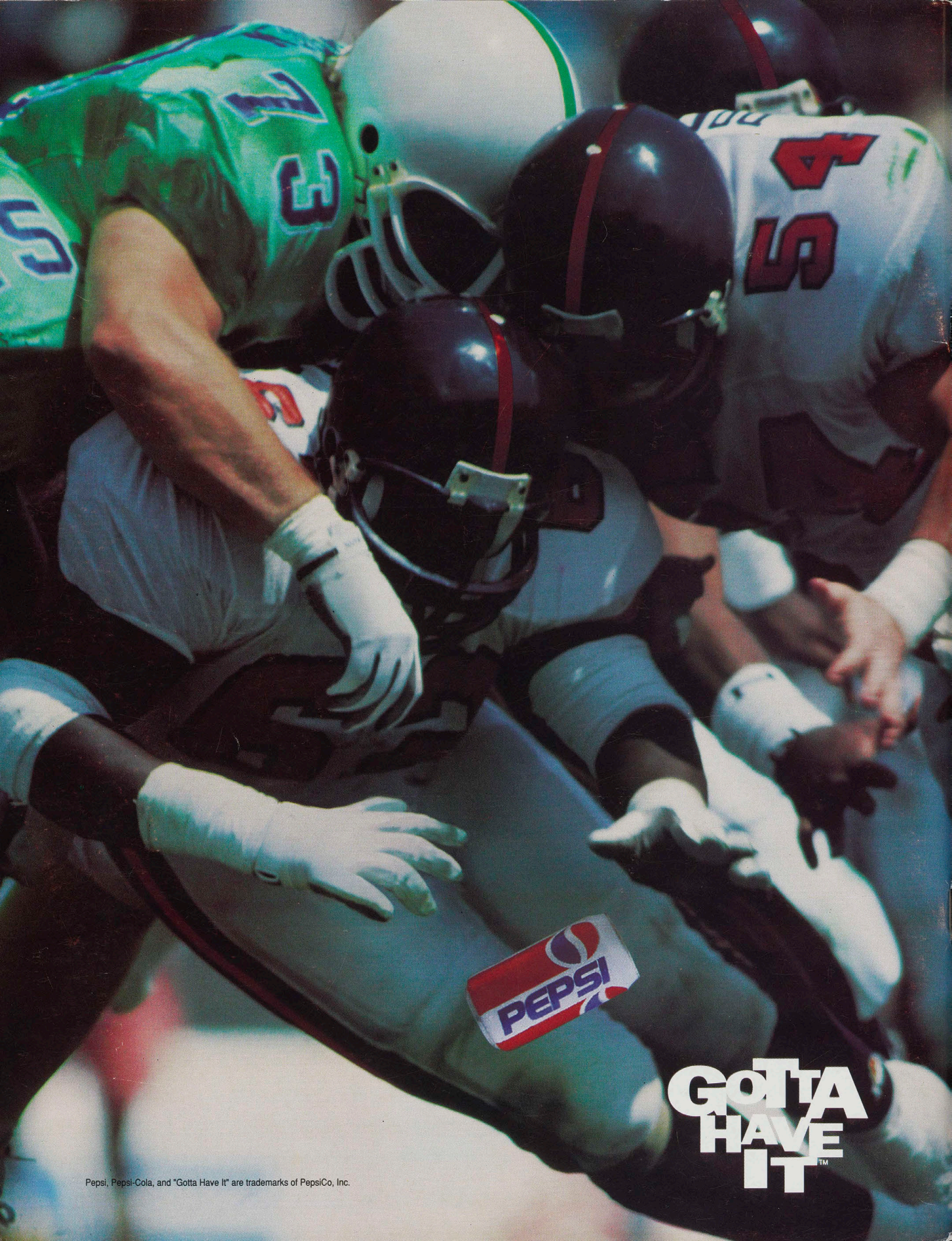
