THE GAME

The Texas State football team returns to Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium when the Bobcats play host to Nicholls tonight. Texas State enters the game seeking its third straight win after defeating Stephen F. Austin 35-26 in Nacogdoches last Saturday night and Tarleton State 38-28 in its first home game on Sept. 17. The Bobcats have a 2-2 overall record after opening the 2011 campaign with a 45-10 loss at Wyoming on Sept. 10 and a 50-10 setback at Texas Tech on Sept. 3.

Nicholls is 1-3 after opening its Southland Conference schedule with a 34-0 loss against Northwestern State in Thibodaux last Saturday night. The Colonels opened the season with a 42-0 victory over Evangel on Sept. 1 before falling 38-7 at Western Michigan on Sept. 10 and 38-21 at Louisiana-Lafayette on Sept. 17.

SERIES HISTORY

This marks the 30th time that Texas State and Nicholls will meet on the gridiron in a series that began on Oct. 4, 1980 in Thibodaux. The Bobcats enter this year's game with a 13-16 overall series record, but have won two of the three previous games. Texas State won 34-10 in 2008 and 34-28 in 2009 before suffering a 47-45 loss in quadruple overtime at Bobcat Stadium in 2010. With the loss, Texas State enters Saturday night's game with an 8-7 record against the Colonels at Bobcat Stadium.

BATTLE FOR THE PADDLE

There are many rivalries in college athletics today prompted by various events in history. The Texas State vs. Nicholls series is one such rivalry and is identified as "The Battle for the Paddle." A rowing oar serves as the traveling trophy with the winning school holding possession of the paddle until the next game in the series. The game is played in recognition of the 1998 floods in Central Texas which forced the postponement of the game from October until late November. The oar is painted maroon and gold on one side with Texas State's victories listed. The opposite side is painted red and gray with Nicholls' victories listed. Since 1998, the series is tied at 6-6.

FIVE BOBCATS EARN PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS IN 2011

Junior quarterback Shaun Rutherford and junior tight end Chase Harper were named FCS Independent Players of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards earlier this week after helping the Bobcats defeat Stephen F. Austin.

Will Johnson was named the CFP National Player of the Week after kicking a school-record, 53-yard field goal against Tarleton State. Ben Follis also was named the CFP National Punter of the Week.

Rutherford also was the FCS Independent Player of the Week by *College Sports Madness*. It is the second straight week a Bobcat has earned that award as Terrence Franks earned the award after running for three touchdowns versus Tarleton State.

PLAYER SPOTLIGHT- Bryan Iwuji

As a recent spectator during Texas State's last home game against Tarleton State, I overheard a conversation a few rows in front of me. Someone was pointing out Bryan Iwuji running out onto the field and stated, "Bryan Iwuji, number 6... that's an awesome guy right there."

As I watched the Texas State University senior run onto the field, I could tell by his demeanor that he has a great devotion for the game of football.

That devotion came early for Iwuji, who remembers going to his older brother's middle school games and being anxious to put pads on and make some hits himself.

When the opportunity finally came for him to play football – he welcomed it with open arms. Since then, Iwuji played football during the rest of his childhood and went on to play in high school and eventually in college at Texas State.

While he has several memories from playing football, the one memory that he will never forget came during his senior year at Hebron High School in Carrollton, Texas.

The Hebron Hawks owned a 15-0 record heading into the 2005 Class 4A Division II State Championship game against Corpus Christi's Calallen High School.

The Hawks were not sure they could beat Calallen, but they decided to give it their all so they could leave the field without any regrets. Hebron won the game and overwhelmed Calallen by a 28-0 score.

Since then, leaving a field without any regrets is just as important to Iwuji as it was when he played in that state championship game. In fact, it has become part of his mantra for playing each game throughout his collegiate career.

"I don't want to be finished (playing football) and have any regrets," said Iwuji. "After playing in college for four years, you are going think back on this as your whole life, and you don't want to think back and ask, 'Did I give my best effort? Did I try my hardest? Did I play my best? Was I the best I can be?'"

While using this as motivation, Bryan also looks for additional motivation from watching NFL players, in particular, Ray Lewis, linebacker for the Baltimore Ravens.

"He plays the game of football for his teammates, not himself," said Iwuji. "He also plays to win each game."

Just as Ray Lewis plays for his teammates and not himself, Iwuji follows the same path when it comes to football.

He would like his team to win every game the rest of this year.

While that is a team goal that Bryan would like to achieve, he also has a personal goal that he would like to attain. That goal is to win as many linebacker awards as he can.

To accomplish this, Iwuji gives everything he has on the field – not just at the game, but at practice. In addition, he watches extra film and does everything he can to learn the opposing team's offense so he knows what is coming before each play even starts.

Iwuji believes that the ideal football player needs to have mental toughness, great effort, devotion to football, along with doing extra things beyond what is expected. These extras include lifting weights hard throughout the week and putting outside issues aside so he can focus on the game of football.

Not letting personal issues affect his game is important to Iwuji. To prepare for each game, he likes to relax during the day until it is game time. To him, stress can take an unnecessary mental toll.

Bryan does his best to keep football stressors separate from his academic life even though he understands that he must spend much more time studying and preparing for his classes in college than when he was in high school.

He also realizes that football practices in college are much more intense and physical.

"You can't have bad practices and go out and have a good game in college," said Iwuji. "You have to have a good practice and work hard all week before you can bring it to the field on Saturday."

As with anything in life, football has often brought challenges to Iwuji.

During the time he has played football here at Texas State, one of the hardest challenges he has had to overcome was adapting to a new coaching staff during his senior year.

Suddenly, a new set of coaches entered his last year at Texas State. While he originally thought the transition would be a hard challenge to overcome, it has turned out to be positive because his new coaches are "respectful, cool and smart". They also have helped him continue the significant improvements he has shown each year of his collegiate career.

In 2008, Iwuji played in 10 games and made 17 tackles throughout the season.

In 2009, improvement was obvious when he played in 11 games, and had 67 tackles during that season.



Last year, he also played in 11 games and accumulated 52 tackles, which put him amongst the team's top five leaders.

Without a doubt, Bryan's main sports interest is obviously football. In addition to playing football, he also enjoys going to the Student Recreation Center and playing basketball, as well as going out to the batting cages and hitting baseballs.

When asked if he would like to play football after his collegiate career, he says "Hopefully, if that's what God has planned for me."

If not, however, Bryan has other career aspirations, as well. He is an accounting major, who is scheduled to earn his bachelor's degree next May and will go on to become a certified public accountant.

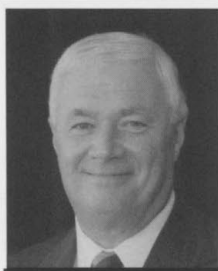

2011 BOBCAT FOOTBALL



Dennis head coach **FRANCHIONE**

A proven winner who has a history of turning around struggling programs, Dennis Franchione returns to Texas State as the head football coach in 2011.

Franchione begins his 26th season as a collegiate head coach with a 187-101-2 career record, including a 13-9 mark at Texas State in 1990-91. He has led his teams to nine conference championships and one divisional title. In addition, his teams have played in nine bowl games, four NAIA playoff games and one NCAA Division II playoff contest.

His collegiate head coaching career began at Southwestern College in 1981, when he compiled a 14-4-2 record in two seasons.

In 1982, the Builders won nine games, a Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference championship and beat Oklahoma Panhandle State 15-0 in the Sunflower Bowl. It was Southwestern's first bowl game and the nine victories were the school's highest total in a single season and the most wins at Southwestern since 1967.

Following the record-setting season, Franchione went to Tennessee Tech, where he served as the offensive coordinator in 1983 and 1984 before being named head coach at his alma mater, Pittsburg State.

During the next five seasons, he led the Gorillas to a 53-6 record and four Central States Intercollegiate Conference championships and one Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title with a combined record of 37-1. He was named the NAIA National Coach of the Year twice.

His teams tied the school record with 11 victories in a season three times before breaking it with a 12-win campaign in 1989 when Pittsburg State joined the NCAA Division II ranks.

In 1990, Franchione took the reins of Texas State's football program for the first time. He led the Bobcats to a 6-5 record in his first year, and that was Texas State's first winning record as a member of the Southland Conference and the first winning season since 1984.

The following year, Franchione led the Bobcats to their second straight winning season, a feat that was not duplicated until Texas State had back-to-back winning seasons in 2008 and 2009.

After compiling a 13-9 record at Texas State during those two years, Franchione joined the NCAA Division I FBS head coaching ranks for the first time when he took over New Mexico's program.

Before his arrival, New Mexico won just 26 of its previous 106 games, and Franchione compiled a

33-36 record during the next six seasons and had three winning seasons.

He led the Lobos to their first winning record in 11 years with a 6-5 record in 1993. Franchione also guided New Mexico to its first back-to-back winning campaigns since 1971 when the Lobos posted a 6-5 record in 1996 and a 9-4 mark in 1997.

New Mexico won the Western Athletic Conference's Mountain Division with a 7-1 league record to earn an invitation to play in the Insight.com Bowl in 1997. It was the school's first bowl game since 1961.

While he was at New Mexico, Franchione coached future NFL Pro Bowl linebacker Brian Urlacher during his freshman and sophomore seasons in 1996 and 1997. Urlacher recorded over 102 tackles to rank second on the team in 1997.

Franchione also produced Third-Team All-American receiver Pascal Volz and a pair of WAC Offensive Players of the Year in quarterbacks Stoney Case (1994) and Graham Leigh (1997) while he was at New Mexico.

Following the Insight Bowl, Franchione was named head coach at TCU in 1998 and quickly turned around the fortunes of the school's football program.

Before his arrival, the Horned Frogs had finished the previous season with a 1-10 record. In his first year at the helm, Franchione led them to a 7-5 mark and a 28-19 victory over USC in the Sun Bowl. The Horned Frogs scored a school-record six defensive touchdowns, intercepted 12 passes and held opponents to an average of 19.6 points per game – the lowest average in over 30 years. His offense featured running back Basil Mitchell, who gained 1,111 yards and scored six touchdowns. Mitchell rushed for 185 yards and two touchdowns in the 28-19 win over USC.

The next season, Franchione also led TCU to the inaugural Mobile Alabama Bowl when LaDainian Tomlinson burst onto the national scene by leading the nation in rushing with 1,850 yards and 18 touchdowns on 268 carries.

The Horned Frogs posted two shutouts and led the Western Athletic Conference in every major defensive category. TCU won the WAC championship and upset No. 20 East Carolina 28-14 in the bowl game as Tomlinson ran for 124 yards and two touchdowns.

In 2000, Tomlinson was a Doak Walker Award winner, and a finalist for the Heisman Trophy. Football News National Offensive Player of the Year and an unanimous All-American after running for 2,158

yards, the fourth-highest single season total in NCAA history. He also scored 22 touchdowns as TCU finished the season with a 10-1 record, a WAC championship and a second-straight berth to the Mobile Alabama Bowl. Defensively, the Horned Frogs allowed only 245.0 total yards and 9.6 points per game, ranking first in the nation in both categories.

Following the 2000 campaign, Franchione was named the head coach at Alabama after the Crimson Tide finished the previous season with a 3-8 record. In his first season, he led the Tide to a 7-5 record and a 14-13 victory over Iowa State in the Independence Bowl, giving Alabama its first bowl victory in five years.

In 2002, he led the Crimson Tide to a 10-3 mark and a SEC West Division championship with a 6-2 league record. However, previous NCAA sanctions made Alabama ineligible to play in a bowl game. Following Alabama's victory over Hawaii at the end of the regular season, Franchione returned to the State of Texas when he was named head coach at Texas A&M.

During the next five seasons, his Aggies posted three winning records and played in three bowl games. Texas A&M finished the 2004 season with a 7-5 mark and played in the Cotton Bowl, the Aggie's first bowl game in three seasons. His best season at the school came in 2006 when the Aggies won nine games and played in the Holiday Bowl.

The next year, Texas A&M posted a 7-5 record and qualified to play in the Alamo Bowl. However, Franchione resigned as head coach prior to the bowl game and ended his tenure at the school with a 32-28 record. His recruiting classes were ranked among the Top-13 nationally from 2003-05.

Born March 28, 1951 in Girard, Kan., Franchione resides in Horseshoe Bay, Texas and was an analyst for ESPN Radio broadcasts in 2008 and 2009. He is married to the former Kim Kraus, and they have two daughters Ashley and Libby. He also has a son, Brad. Brad and his wife, Rebecca, have three children.

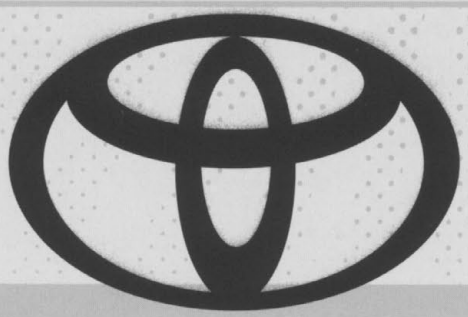

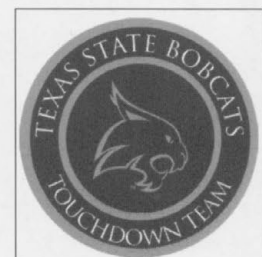

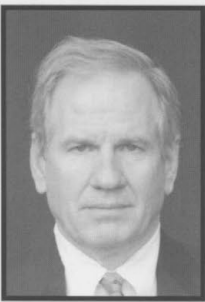

MIKE SCHULTZ

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH
CO-OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR
QUARTERBACKS COACH

Beginning his 32nd season as a football coach with extensive and successful experience, Mike Schultz returns to Texas State and rejoins Dennis Franchione's staff as an assistant head coach, co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2011. Schultz came back to Texas State after serving as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Middle Tennessee State in 2010 and as the offensive coordinator and tight ends coach at Illinois in 2009.

He went to Illinois after spending 11 seasons on the staff at TCU under Franchione and Gary Patterson. He served as both the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two years after coaching the running backs during his first nine seasons with the Horned Frogs.

While he was offensive coordinator, TCU set single-season school records for points scored (420) and touchdowns (54). The Frogs led the nation in time of possession (35:05) and were 13th nationally in team rushing (215.7 yards per game) in 2008.

The Frogs also ranked second in the Mountain West Conference in total offense (417.1 yards per game) and third in scoring offense (35.0 points per game). In 2007, Schultz helped mentor Frog signal caller Andy Dalton to Freshman All-America honors. Dalton set single-season TCU records for pass completions (222) and attempts (371) while placing second in yards (2,459) and fourth in completion percentage (59.8).

During Schultz's tenure, the TCU running game was consistently ranked among the best in the nation and Schultz made a habit of developing young players at the position.

Prior to Aaron Brown receiving 2005 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year honors as a true freshman, Lonta Hobbs and Robert Merrill became the first two freshmen in TCU history to rush for 1,000 yards in 2002 and 2003, respectively.

Schultz tutored a 1,000-yard rusher five times at TCU - with Basil Mitchell, LaDainian Tomlinson (twice), Hobbs and Merrill each earning that distinction. Prior to Schultz's arrival, TCU had boasted just four 1,000-yard rushers in more than 100 years of college football.

Under the direction of Schultz, Tomlinson was a two-time NCAA rushing champ, leading the country with 1,850 yards in 1999 and a school record 2,158 in 2000. He earned All-America honors, was a Heisman Trophy finalist and the winner of the Doak Walker National Running Back Award. Tomlinson parlayed his success into a top-five draft pick and a standout NFL career, which includes 2006 MVP honors.

Schultz served six seasons under Franchione at New Mexico, the first four as the assistant head coach and secondary coach and the final two as the assistant head coach and running backs coach.

He originally served under Franchione as a defensive secondary and recruiting coordinator at Texas State in 1990-91.

The Houston native began his coaching career at his alma mater, Sam Houston State, in 1979. Schultz then assisted at UTEP and Kansas State. His next stops were with Fred Akers' staff at Texas for one season (1985) and three years at Round Rock (Texas) Westwood High School as an assistant.

Schultz and his wife, Cindy, have three daughters, Taylor, Kendall and Jordan.



DARRELL DICKEY

CO-OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR
RUNNING BACKS COACH

Beginning his 26th year as a collegiate coach and well-known throughout the coaching ranks with his expertise with offenses, Darrell Dickey is in his first season as the co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach at Texas State.

Dickey came to Texas State after spending the last two seasons as the offensive coordinator and running backs coach at New Mexico. He also served as the offensive coordinator at Utah State in 2007 and 2008. During his tenure at New Mexico, Dickey helped install a new offense that featured freshman All-American tight end Lucas Reed. While at Utah State, Dickey's offense produced 1,653 rushing yards in 2008, and that was the school's highest total in nine seasons.

Dickey went to Utah State after serving nine years as the head coach at North Texas from 1998-2006. He guided the Mean Green to four consecutive Sun Belt Conference championships with a combined record of 25-1 between 2001-04 and was 34-22 overall in conference games.

He guided the Mean Green to nine wins for the first time in 23 years during the 2003 season after winning eight contests a year earlier. The Mean Green also had a 7-5 mark in 2004.

Dickey was named the head coach of the Sun Belt Conference's 30th Anniversary Team. Under his direction, North Texas landed 70 players on All-Sun Belt Conference teams, including 39 First-Team selections. Dickey guided the Mean Green to its first bowl win in 57 years as well.

North Texas produced back-to-back NCAA rushing leaders as Patrick Cobbs led the nation in 2003 with 152.7 yards per game. Jamario Thomas repeated the feat in 2004 with 180.1 yards per contest.

The offensive-minded Dickey went to North Texas after serving as the offensive coordinator at SMU in 1997, when the Mustangs posted their first winning season since being reinstated from the "Death Penalty" in 1989.

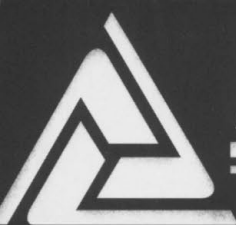
He went to SMU after serving as the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at UTEP from 1994-96. He also was a tight ends coach at LSU from 1991-93, where the Tigers upset No. 1-ranked Alabama in Tuscaloosa in 1993. He went to LSU after serving as the quarterbacks and running backs coach at Mississippi State in 1990.

Dickey also served as offensive coordinator at Memphis in 1987-89 after serving one season as running backs coach for the Tigers in 1986. While he was at Memphis, the Tigers upset SEC powers Alabama in 1987 and Florida in 1988.

He also served as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M in 1985, when the Aggies won the Southwest Conference and played in the Cotton Bowl

Dickey is the son of Jim Dickey, who was head football coach at Kansas State from 1978-85. He played quarterback for his father and led the Wildcats to the 1982 Independence Bowl, the school's first ever bowl game. He also played in the 1982 Blue-Gray All-Star game.

Dickey graduated from Kansas State in 1983 with a degree in business administration. He and his wife, Tory, have a daughter, Meredith.



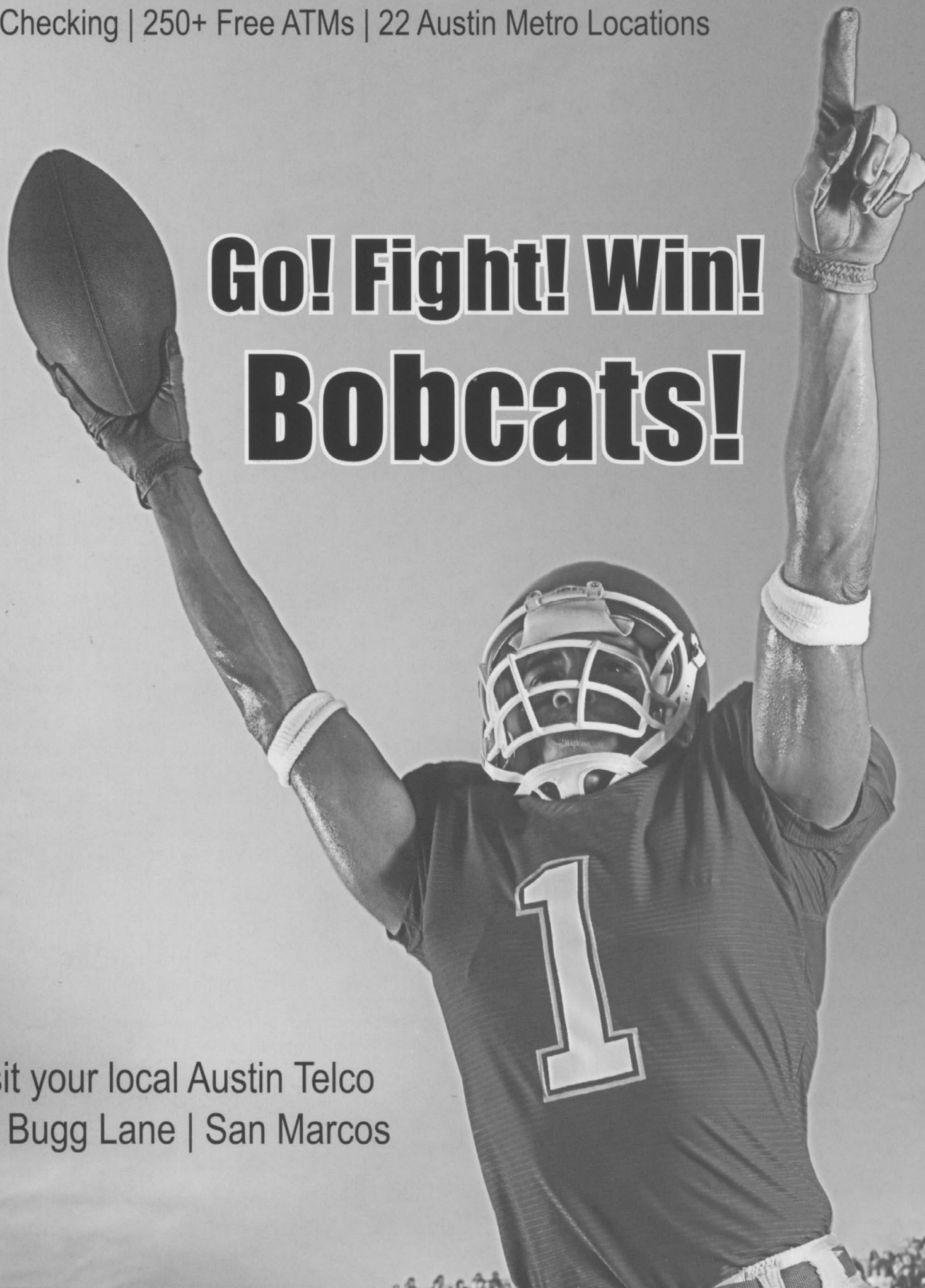

CRAIG NAIVAR
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR
SAFETIES COACH

After spending the last four seasons at Rice, Craig Naivar returns to Texas State as a defensive coordinator and safeties coach. Naivar previously served in the same capacity for the Bobcats from 2004-06 when he built some of the top defenses in the Southland Conference.

During his first three-years at Texas State, Bobcat defenses were noted for their high energy and an aggressive style of play. Texas State's 2005 squad ranked first or second in every defensive statistical category among SLC teams.

Texas State also had 13 defensive players named to the All-Southland Conference teams, including eight on the First-Team during those three seasons. Naivar returned to Texas State after serving in multiple capacities at Rice.

During his first three seasons with the Owls, Naivar was the co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach. He produced a Freshman All-America Second-Team selection, a Second-Team All-Conference USA selection and an Honorable Mention All-Conference safety. In the 2008 campaign, the Owls posted their best record since the 1950's with a 10-3 mark. Rice also won a share of the C-USA West Title and were the Texas Bowl Champions.

In 2010, Naivar was given the responsibility of reviving the Owls' special teams units when he served as the special teams coordinator and defensive line coach.

During that campaign, Naivar produced an AFCA All-America punter and a First Team All-Conference defensive end, who also was selected to play in the East-West Shrine game and was invited to the NFL Combine after the season.

In one season, the Owls' rush defense improved from being ranked 102nd to No. 54 nationally. The Owls punt team ranked sixth nationally in net punting. The punter set a school record with an average of 45.9 yards per punt. The Owls also boasted the nation's 26th-best punt return unit and had the nation's 10th-best kickoff returner.

Naivar originally came to Texas State in 2004 after serving two seasons as the defensive coordinator and two seasons as the special teams coordinator and defensive line coach at Sam Houston State. In 2001, Sam Houston State won the Southland Conference title and played in the NCAA Division I FCS playoffs. The Bearkats led the league in quarterback sacks, ranked second in turnover ratio and third in total defense.

He went to Sam Houston State after serving two seasons as the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator at Southern Illinois and as a defensive graduate assistant coach at TCU under Dennis Franchione in 1998.

He also worked under Franchione at New Mexico in 1996 and 1997, when he coached the defensive line, tight ends and wide receivers.

From 1994 to 1995, Naivar was the special teams coordinator and a defensive assistant at Hardin-Simmons under Texas High School Coaches Association Hall of Honor member Jimmie Keeling.

Naivar earned both a master's degree in sports management and a bachelor of science degree in physical education from Hardin-Simmons, where he was a four-year letterman and team captain as a safety. The Cowboys also won a conference championship and advanced to the national semifinals during his senior year.

Naivar and his wife Michelle, also a Taylor native, have a daughter, Jordan Ashleigh and a son, Gunner.



BRAD FRANCHIONE
SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR
LINEBACKERS COACH

Beginning his 16th season in the coaching ranks, Brad Franchione enters his first season as a linebackers coach and special teams coordinator.

Franchione comes to Texas State after serving the past six seasons as the head coach at Blinn College, where he guided his teams to two national championships and three Top-10 NJCAA finishes while compiling a 54-13 career record. He also led the Buccaneers to three Southwest Junior College Football Conference championships and four overall bowl appearances.

The Buccaneers won their first national title and a Southwest Junior College Conference championship during his second season as head coach and defensive coordinator in 2006 when they finished the season with a 12-0 record and boasted the nation's top defensive unit. Following the season, Franchione was named the SWJCFC Coach of the Year, the American Football Monthly Schutt Sports Coach of the Year and the inaugural Sportex® Football Coach of the Year.

In 2009, Franchione was named the American Community College Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year after leading Blinn to another national title with a 11-1 record. In 2010, Franchione led the team to an 8-3 record and a victory in the Heart of Texas Bowl.

Throughout his tenure at Blinn, Franchione coached four NFL Players in Carolina's Cam Newton, who was the top overall player selected in the 2011 NFL Draft, Cincinnati's James Johnson and Bernard Scott, along with Ryan Mouton of the Tennessee Titans, 19 NJCAA All-Americans and 85 total players who went on to play in NCAA Division I schools.

Franchione went to Blinn after serving one season as the defensive line coach at Texas A&M-Commerce. There, he also served as the program's academic coordinator, travel coordinator and video coordinator.

He also was an associate head coach and defensive coordinator at Bacone College in Muskogee, Okla., in 2003-04, where he helped lead the Warriors to a second place finish in the Central States. He went to Bacone after serving as an linebackers coach, kickoff team coach and recruiting coordinator at Tennessee-Martin in 2002.

Franchione's career as a linebackers coach began at West Alabama in 2001 and 2002 when he served as linebackers coach as well as the punt and kickoff teams coach.

He gained additional coaching experience at East Central University (in Ada, Okla.) and at Fort Scott Community College in Kansas. He served as the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator at East Central from 1999-2001. He also was the team's recruiting and academic coordinator. He helped lead the Tigers to their first winning season in 17 years during the 2000 campaign.

While at Fort Scott, Franchione coached the quarterbacks and punt team, while also serving as the video coordinator in 1998.

Franchione was born in Miller, Mo., graduated from Pittsburg (Kansas) High School, earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at the New Mexico in 1996 and a master of science degree in education at Arkansas State University in 1998. He began his coaching career as a student coach assisting with the secondary at New Mexico from 1992-96, and was a graduate assistant coach with the offense at Arkansas State from 1996-98.

He and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons Wyatt and Gunnar, and a daughter, Isabella.

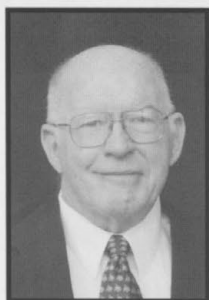

DENNIS DARNELL
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Entering his 43rd season as a coach, Dennis Darnell is in his first season as the offensive line coach at Texas State in 2011.

Darnell came to Texas State after serving as the offensive line coach at Blinn College in 2010 under Brad Franchione. Three of his linemen, including Texas State signee Mike Yoder, earned All-Southwest Junior College Football Conference honors. Yoder earned First-Team honors and was an Honorable Mention All-America selection.

Darnell went to Blinn after spending three seasons as the offensive coordinator at Northern Colorado. There, he coached five All-Big Sky Conference players and helped the Bears improve their scoring average by nine points per game and gain an average of 87 yards of total offense between the 2007 and 2008 seasons.

Darnell also was the offensive coordinator at Missouri State for two years, where he coached six All-Missouri Valley Conference players on offense. The Bears also set seven school records while averaging over 350 yards and 27 points per game each season.

Darnell went to Missouri State after serving five seasons as the head coach at East Central University in Ada, Okla. There, he was named the 2001 Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year after leading the Tigers to a 6-4 record, their first winning season in the NCAA Division II ranks. He had an overall record of 21-32 and East Central set 43 team and individual school records during his tenure as head coach.

He also was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at New Mexico from 1992-98 under Dennis Franchione and Rocky Long. Darnell was named the New Mexico FCA Coach of the Year after the Lobos won the 1997 WAC championship and played Arizona in the Insight.com Bowl game.

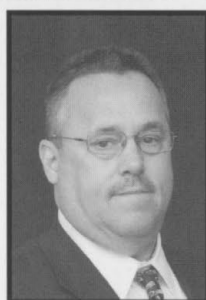
He went to New Mexico after serving a one-year stint as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Utah State. As the head coach at Missouri Western, he had a 19-23-1 record from 1986-90. His best season came in 1989 when he led the Griffons to a 7-4 mark, their first winning season in the NCAA Division II ranks.

Prior to that, Darnell was an assistant coach at Drake for the second time in his career, guiding the Bulldogs' offensive line from 1983-1985. He also was an assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Drake from 1975-79 when the Bulldogs won games over Big Eight teams Colorado and Iowa State. In between the two stops at Drake, Darnell was the offensive line coach at Wake Forest in 1980.

A native of El Dorado Springs, Mo., Darnell graduated from Missouri State in 1969 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He was a three-year letterman as an offensive center for the Bears from 1966-68. He then went on to earn his master's degree at Pittsburg (Kan.) State in 1970.

Darnell began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Missouri Southern while earning his master's degree at Pittsburg State. Darnell served as an assistant football coach and head wrestling coach at Pratt Junior College. He also coached at Sullivan and Republic High Schools in Missouri and has additional collegiate experience coaching at Wichita State and Southeast Missouri State in his career.

Darnell and his wife, Karen, have one son, Pete, who is the quarterbacks' coach at Gardner Webb.



MIKE HUDSON
DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Mike Hudson returns to Texas State as an assistant coach for the third time in his career in 2011 after serving on the staff at Montana for the last six seasons. Hudson, who will coach the defensive line for the Bobcats, begins his 23rd season as a coach.

Hudson coached several positions during his six-year stint at Montana. He spent the 2010 season coaching linebackers after serving as Montana's secondary coach for two seasons.

He also was the football director of operations in 2009, and was Montana's associate head coach while coaching running backs and secondary from 2005-08. During his tenure there, the Grizzlies were FCS Playoff finalists in 2008 and 2009. Montana also won or shared the Big Sky Conference from 2005-09.

Last season, he coached All-Big Sky Conference linebacker Caleb McSurdy after producing a pair of all-conference defensive backs Shann Schillinger and Trumaine Johnson in 2009.

Hudson went to Montana from Sam Houston State, where he was the defensive coordinator in 2003 and 2004 after serving one year as a defensive line coach.

While at Sam Houston State, the Bearkats advanced to the semifinals of the 2004 NCAA FCS Playoffs.

Hudson began his collegiate coaching career as a student coach at Texas State in 1987 and also served as a graduate assistant coach, working full time with the defensive line in 1990-91 under Dennis Franchione.

He also was the linebackers coach at Texas State from 1995-2002, and produced Second-Team All-Americans Ypres Thomas in 1995 and Myron Coleman in 2000 and Greg Pitts in 2002. Pitts also was a Third-Team All-American in 2001.

Hudson also served as defensive coordinator during the last two seasons. In addition to his coaching duties, Hudson handled numerous administrative responsibilities that included serving as the liaison for academics and student services, study hall and summer school coordinator and the director of football camps.

In between his first two stints at Texas State, Hudson was an assistant coach at Trinity University in San Antonio for two seasons before rejoining Franchione as the defensive line coach at New Mexico in 1994.

Hudson earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology at UTSA in 1994. Born in Bryan, Texas and raised in San Antonio, Hudson played collegiate football at Angelo State University in 1983 and 1984. The Rams won a Lone Star Conference championship in 1984.

He and his wife Dyan have two children, Lee and Loryn.

While at Kentucky State, Johnson produced one of the top five receivers in the Southern Intercollegiate Conference who was named a Second-Team All-Conference performer.

He went to Kentucky State after serving three seasons on the coaching staff at Sul Ross State. He was the quarterbacks coach in 2009 when he produced an Honorable Mention All-Conference performer after coaching the wide receivers in 2008 and serving as a graduate assistant coach in 2007.

Johnson began his coaching career at Bacone College in Oklahoma as a wide receivers coach in 2002 and a quarterbacks coach in 2003 before playing Arena Football from 2004-07.

He was a quarterback for the Odessa Roughnecks in 2004-05 before playing one season with the Lakeland Thunderbolts in 2006. In 2007, he played quarterback for the Laredo Lobos in the Arena 2 League.

He went to Western Kentucky after playing two seasons at Kemper Military Junior College in 1998 and 1999. Johnson was named a NJCAA Honorable Mention All-America in 1999.

Johnson graduated from Western Kentucky in 2002. He and his wife, Jessica, have two children, Saniya and Ellis.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES COACH

Reuben Vaughn returns to Texas State as the defensive tackles coach after serving the last three seasons as the defensive tackles and linebackers coach at Southwest High School in Fort Worth.

Vaughn helped lead Southwest to the Class 4A Area finals with an 8-4 overall record and a 7-2 mark in District 6-4A. Southwest also qualified for the Bi-District playoffs in 2008. In addition, he coached two All-District First Team and one Second-Team linebackers in 2010.

He went to Southwest after coaching the offensive line at Texas A&M-Commerce in 2006.

Vaughn also was an assistant offensive line coach and was involved with the scout team for defense and special teams at Texas A&M from 2003-05 under Dennis Franchione. In addition, he assisted with the organization and preparation of game plans, playbooks and scouting reports.

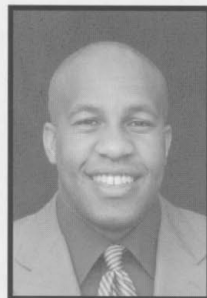

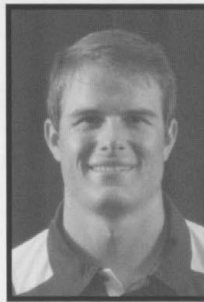
MIKE GROCE

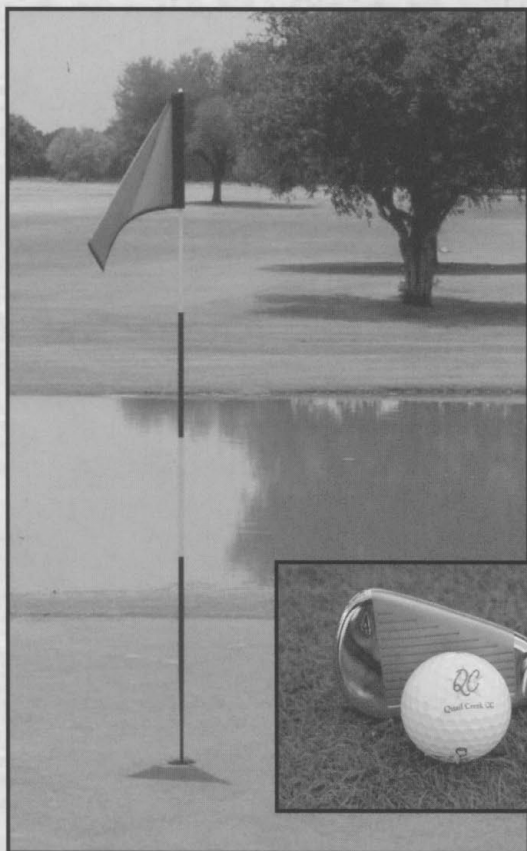

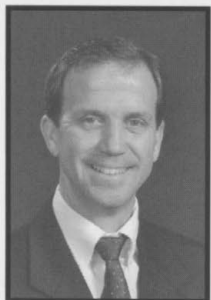

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

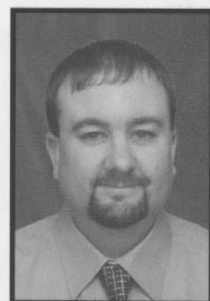
Dick Miller is in his fourth season as the Texas State football program's equipment manager.

THE TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

The Texas State University System has a long and illustrious history in Texas. In fact, it is the oldest and third largest higher education system in the Lone Star State.

Beginning as an administrative means to consolidate the support and management of state teacher colleges, the System has evolved into a network of higher education institutions stretching from the Texas-Louisiana border to the Big Bend region of far West Texas.

Today, eight System components offer a broad range of academic and career pathways. Throughout the System are professionals committed to preparing students for working and contributing to an increasingly global society.

The academic and professional programs offered help students learn to make sound decisions in life and to become contributors in their communities. Each university, college and institute within The Texas State University System is unique.

Three of the member institutions are members of the Southland Conference. They are Texas State University-San Marcos, Sam Houston State University and Lamar University.

The other five member institutions of the System are: Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College-Orange, Lamar State College-Port Arthur, Sul Ross State University and Sul Ross State University Rio Grande College.

The Texas State University System is governed by a nine member Board of Regents appointed by the Governor. In addition, a nonvoting student regent is appointed annually to the Board. The administration, which is headed by a board-appointed Chancellor, is based in Austin where it provides support to the System components and state government.

The Board of Regents are: Charles Amato (Chairman), Donna N. Williams (Vice-Chair), Dr. Jaime R. Garza, Kevin J. Lilly, Ron Mitchell, David Montagne, Trisha S. Pollard, Rossanna Salazar and Michael Truncale. Ryan Bridges, a student at Sam Houston State, serves as the Student Regent.



BRIAN MCCALL
CHANCELLOR

Brian McCall, Ph.D., is chancellor of The Texas State University System, the oldest and third-largest university system in Texas, comprising eight institutions with more than 76,000 students and 15,000 faculty and staff.

Dr. McCall previously served in the Texas House of Representatives, first elected in 1991 to represent the areas of North Dallas, Frisco, Allen, and Plano. As a representative, he served as chairman of the House Calendars Committee and as a member of the Higher Education Committee. Texas Monthly named McCall one of the "10 Best" legislators of the 2009 session.

McCall wrote and passed one of the largest tax-cut bills in the history of Texas and during his last session secured \$5 million in funding for The University of Texas at Dallas' Center for Values and Medicine. Other legislative accomplishments include authoring and passing key bills in the areas of health care, biotechnology, high technology, identity theft, and tax and budget policy.

McCall was President of Westminster Capital Corporation, an investment firm focused on acquisitions primarily in software and technology. He also serves on the board of View Point Bank and, along with his brother, David, operates Snow Hill Farm north of Dallas.

McCall holds a bachelor's degree from Baylor University, a master's degree from Southern Methodist University, spent a year as a visiting post-graduate student at Oxford University, and earned a doctor of philosophy degree from University of Texas at Dallas.

A long-time civic and community volunteer, McCall is founder and chairman of the board of The Empowerment Project, a non-profit organization which has sent more than \$10 million worth of math and science books to disadvantaged schools in the Republic of South Africa, and helped construct a library in Vietnam through the Libraries of Love organization. The Empowerment Project also raised more than \$350,000 to provide direct support for the medical needs of children in north Texas.

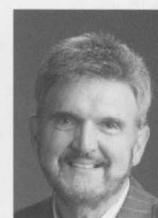

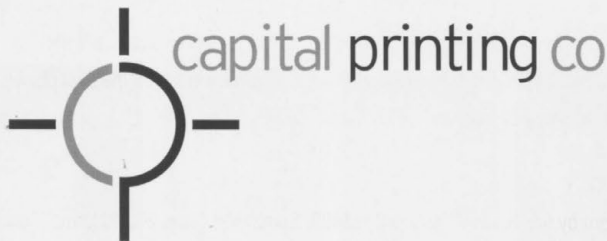

TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Texas State University-San Marcos is a doctoral-granting university located in the burgeoning Austin-San Antonio corridor. It is the largest campus in the Texas State University System and the fifth largest in the state.

Texas State's 34,000 students choose from 97 bachelor's, 89 master's and nine doctoral degree programs offered by the following colleges: Applied Arts, McCoy College of Business Administration, Education, Fine Arts and Communication, Health Professions, Liberal Arts, Science, University College and the Graduate College.

Texas State students come from around the globe, and our student body is diverse. Thirty-five percent of Texas State students are ethnic minorities. In fact, Texas State is ranked 20th in the nation for the number of degrees we grant to Hispanic undergraduates.

LOCATION

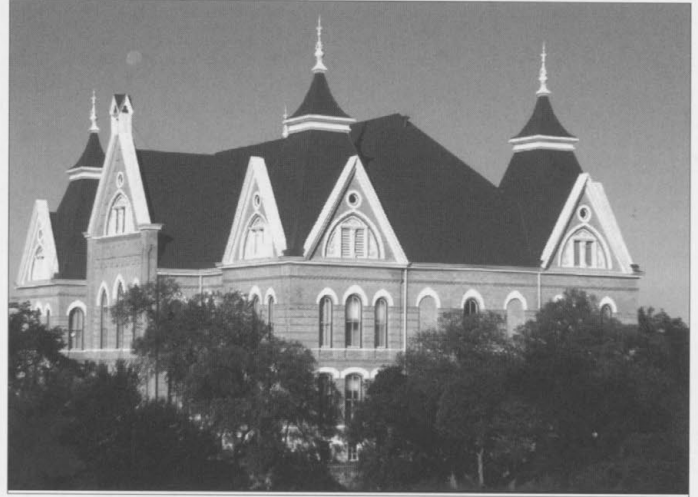
Texas State's main campus is in San Marcos, a growing community of 50,000 people about halfway between Austin and San Antonio. Located on the edge of the Texas Hill Country, where black land prairies roll into beautiful hills, Texas State enjoys a setting that is unique among Texas universities.

The beauty of the crystal-clear San Marcos River and the stately cypress and pecan trees on the campus adds to the charm of the university's picturesque setting. Our location on the banks of the San Marcos River provides recreational activities for students throughout the year.

The Round Rock Higher Education Center (RRHEC) is the official name of Texas State University-San Marcos' campus in Round Rock, Texas. Informally, this campus is often referred to as "Texas State-Round Rock" or as "Texas State's Round Rock Campus." On this campus, Texas State offers upper-level courses leading to bachelor's degrees and complete master's degree and certificate programs at convenient times close to where students live and work. Through partnerships with nearby Austin Community College (ACC) and Temple College at Taylor (TCAT), students can complete the lower-level courses comprising the rest of a bachelor's degree program. Students who complete their degree requirements on Texas State's Round Rock campus earn their degrees from Texas State University-San Marcos.

SAN MARCOS CAMPUS

Completed in 1903, the red-roofed, castle-like landmark called Old Main was Texas State's first building. As the university's student population has grown — from 303 in 1903 to 32,572 in 2010 — our San Marcos campus, too, has expanded. Today it consists of a 457-acre main campus and 5,038 additional acres in recreational, instructional, farm and ranch land.



The Texas State campus is as diverse as the students who live and learn here. Our hilly campus is home to 225 buildings. Some, like Old Main, are as old as the university itself. Others, such as McCoy Hall and the Mitte Complex, are cutting-edge facilities.

At the Aquarena Center on the Texas State campus, you can see the second-largest springs in Texas through the floor of a glass-bottom boat. These springs feed the San Marcos River and are home to eight endangered species, including the Texas Blind Salamander. In fact, as the site of the Aquarena Center, River Systems Institute and Edwards Aquifer Research and Data Center, our campus is one of the best places in the world to study aquatic ecosystems and species.

HISTORY

Authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1899, Southwest Texas State Normal School opened its doors in 1903. Over the years, the Legislature broadened the institution's scope and changed its name, in succession, to Normal College, Teachers College, College, Southwest Texas State University, and in 2003 to Texas State University-San Marcos. Each name reflects the university's growth from a small teacher preparation institution to a major, multipurpose university. Texas State's original mission was to prepare Texas public school teachers. It became renowned for carrying out this mission, but today it does far more.

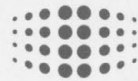

DR. DENISE M. TRAUTH PRESIDENT

Since Denise M. Trauth was named the ninth president at Texas State University-San Marcos in June 2002, the university has achieved many milestones, including:

- Record enrollment every fall (32,586 for Fall 2010), making Texas State one of the 50 largest public universities in the U.S.
- The largest private gift in university history, \$20 million from Emmett and Miriam McCoy of San Marcos to support the College of Business Administration that now bears the couple's names.
- A new university mission statement, new shared values, new university goals, a University Plan to guide academic development through 2012, and a Campus Master Plan for development of facilities through the year 2015.
- A gift of 101 acres of prime land from the Avery Family for the University's Round Rock Higher Education Center. The first building, the Avery Building, opened in 2005, and the second, the Nursing Building, opened in 2010.
- A new nursing program, launched by a \$6 million gift from the St. David's Foundation, began in 2010, with nearly 200 junior- and senior-level nursing students enrolled this fall.
- The Ingram School of Engineering made possible through a \$5 million gift from Bruce and Gloria Ingram of New Braunfels, with an additional \$2 million gift added later.
- Construction of the Performing Arts Center began with an \$8 million gift from Patti Harrison of Wimberley.
- Major gifts from Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields of Houston totaling \$10.7 million, including \$7 million to athletics, which honored them with their name on the West Side Complex of Bobcat Stadium.
- New campus facilities including Bobcat Stadium Expansion, Bobcat Baseball/Softball Stadium Improvements, Bobcat Track and Field Stadium, the Student Recreation Center expansion, Concho Green, improvements to the North LBJ bus loop, San Marcos and San Jacinto residence halls, Bobcat Village, the Student Health Center, the Mitte Complex, the End Zone Complex at Bobcat Stadium, expansion of Strahan Coliseum, McCoy Hall and its parking garage, the Speck Street and Matthews Street parking garages, the Nursing Building in Round Rock and the Family and Consumer Sciences Building Expansion. Construction is currently in progress on the new Undergraduate Academic Center, the North Campus Housing Complex, the North Side Complex at Bobcat Stadium and the Performing Arts Center.
- An increase in the number of full-time faculty from 694 to over 1,150.
- Increased diversity in the student body. One-third of Texas State students are now ethnic minorities, and the university became a Hispanic Serving Institution in fall 2010.
- Expanded curriculum with the addition of electrical engineering and nursing, and

new doctorates in aquatic resources, physical therapy, mathematics education, criminal justice, and developmental education.

- An increase in annual research expenditures from \$9 million to over \$30 million.
- Initiation of the Common Experience, an annual campus-wide focus for classroom discussion, performing arts, exhibitions, invited speakers, and community involvement. This year's theme is "Freedoms: The First Amendment."

In addition to her many on-campus responsibilities, President Trauth is a member and former president of the Austin Area Research Organization, a former member of the Austin Chamber of Commerce Executive Committee and Board, serves on the Board of Trustees of the Southwest Research Institute and is a member of the Philosophical Society of Texas. She also serves on the boards of the United Way Capital Area Community, The Austin Leadership Forum, KLRU and E3 Alliance.

She also is a former member of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges and past chairman of the Texas Council of Public University Presidents and Chancellors and of the Texas International Education Consortium. This past summer she received the Austin Business Journal's Special Achievement Award.

Dr. Trauth came to Texas State from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, where she served as provost. She has also held academic and administrative positions at Bowling Green State University and the University of Tulsa.

She is married to Dr. John Huffman, professor emeritus at Bowling Green and UNC Charlotte. They have two daughters and four grandchildren.

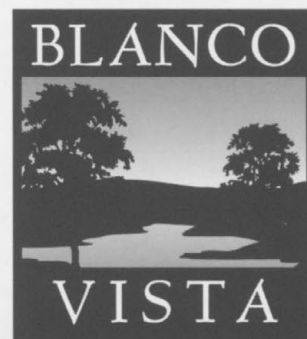

DR. LARRY TEIS DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

As Athletic Director since 2004, Dr. Larry Teis leads Texas State into its final year as a member of the Southland Conference. The Bobcats are scheduled to become a member of the Western Athletic Conference in July 2012.

Teis has led Texas State to unprecedented growth and success. Under his leadership, Texas State has won three Southland Conference Commissioner's Cups, five of the last seven SLC Women's All-Sports Trophies, along with 18 Southland Conference championships and nine SLC Tournament titles.

In addition, more than 172 student-athletes have graduated and 426 attained a grade point average of 3.0 or higher during the last three years. Texas State's fund-raising efforts have generated record-setting donations in the past four years and new facilities and renovation projects have totaled nearly \$90 million.

Facility improvements have included the complete renovation and grand opening of the new Bobcat baseball and softball stadiums, the addition of the Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields West Side Complex at Bobcat football stadium which added 15 new suites and 450 club seats above the press box for the 2009 season and the installation of a new FieldTurf Duraspine Pro system as a new playing surface on Jim Wacker Field in 2010.

Texas State also opened a new Athletic Academic Center last year and will open a new track and field stadium in 2011-12. Renovations for Bobcat Stadium continue with new scoreboards being installed and adding a \$33-million North End Zone Complex. The new complex will bring the stadium capacity to nearly 30,000 for the 2012 season opener against Texas Tech.

These improvements come after new locker rooms were built at the Bobcat Tennis Complex and soccer field. In addition, new video boards were installed in each of the volleyball, men's and women's basketball, and baseball/softball facilities in 2007-08.

In 2009-10, Texas State Athletics received its second million-dollar gift when Jerry and Linda Fields donated \$6 million to the program. This followed their gift of \$100,000 help fund Texas State's football season tickets drive for the 2008 season. The first \$1 million gift to the department came from Darren B. Casey in 2008. Those donations combined with record-setting corporate sponsorships and the student government approving an athletic fee has helped Texas State in becoming a NCAA Division I FBS Institution.

Citing his leadership skills, experience and values as elements that made him the right fit for the position, Texas State President Denise M. Trauth named Teis the Bobcats' eighth director of athletics in March 2004.

A member of Texas State's athletic administration since January, 1999, he resides on the President's Council and reports directly to President Trauth.

Teis was honored as the 2005-06 General Sports TURF Systems AD of the Year Division I-AA West Region Winner, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In 2007, he was honored by the All-American Football Foundation with the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award.

After capturing back-to-back Commissioner's Cups during his first two years as the Director of Athletics, Texas State won its third Commissioner's Cup under his direction in 2008-09 after winning five Southland Conference championships and becoming the first SLC school ever to win a football, women's soccer and volleyball championship in the same year. The Bobcats also became the first SLC institution since 1991 to win both the baseball and softball championships in the same season. Additionally, Texas State won a pair of SLC Tournament Championships and had four teams and two individuals participate in the 2008-09 NCAA Tournaments. Texas State's overall success off the field that year included a record number of 74 Bobcat student-athletes earning their bachelor's degrees for a school-record 78 percent graduation rate, 104 student-athletes being named to the SLC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll, with more than 100 student-athletes, Strutters, cheerleaders and student trainers maintaining a GPA average of 3.5 and above.

In 2009-10, Texas State won Southland Conference championships in soccer, baseball, softball and women's golf. The women's volleyball team won the SLC Tournament to earn a NCAA Tournament berth for the sixth time and the women's golf team played in the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. That year, 52 Bobcat student-athletes earned their bachelor's degree, 166 student-athletes were named to the SLC Commissioner's Fall and Spring Honor Rolls, with more than 100 student-athletes, Strut-

ters, cheerleaders, student trainers and managers maintaining a grade point average of 3.5 and above.

In 2010-11, the Bobcats won the Southland Conference baseball championship along with the SLC Tournament titles in baseball and softball to qualify for the NCAA Regional Tournaments. In track and field, Logan Cunningham earned All-American honors in the pole vault with a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Texas State also led Southland Conference schools with 102 Bobcats being named to the SLC Commissioner's 2011 Spring Honor Roll after 60 Bobcats were named to the Fall Honor Roll. In addition, 47 student-athletes received their bachelor's degree, and baseball's Tyler Sibley was named a Capital One CoSIDA Second-Team Academic All-American. The future looks bright for Bobcat Athletics as the NCAA Division I Committee on Athletics Certification announced that Texas State Athletics was certified as operating its athletics program in "substantial conformity with operating principles adopted by the Division I membership" in 2009.

During his first six years, Teis restructured the department's administration with the hiring of key senior administrative staff and five head coaches.

In his previous role as associate athletic director for external affairs, he had oversight of several key areas, including game management, marketing, promotions, facilities and ticket sales. Teis was also responsible for the administration of men's and women's golf, baseball and volleyball teams as well as the Strutters. From 1998-2002, he oversaw the Bobcat Athletic Foundation.

A native of Fort Worth, Teis came to Texas State after spending four years as the director of athletic marketing at TCU, where he developed the marketing plan for all sports that, included facility signage, season ticket campaigns, game day operations and corporate sponsorships.

Prior to his tenure at TCU, Teis was the assistant director of New Mexico's Lobo Club for three years.

Teis has served on several key Southland Conference committees and is an active member of the local community, including serving on the board of directors of the San Marcos Convention and Visitors Bureau.

He holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from TCU, a master's in sports administration from St. Thomas University of Miami, Fla., and a doctorate in health, physical education and recreation with an emphasis in sports administration from the University of New Mexico.

Teis resides in San Marcos with his wife, Jana, and two daughters, Taylor (18), a freshman at Texas State, and Shelby (14).

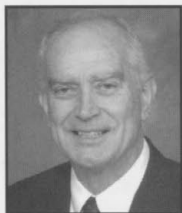

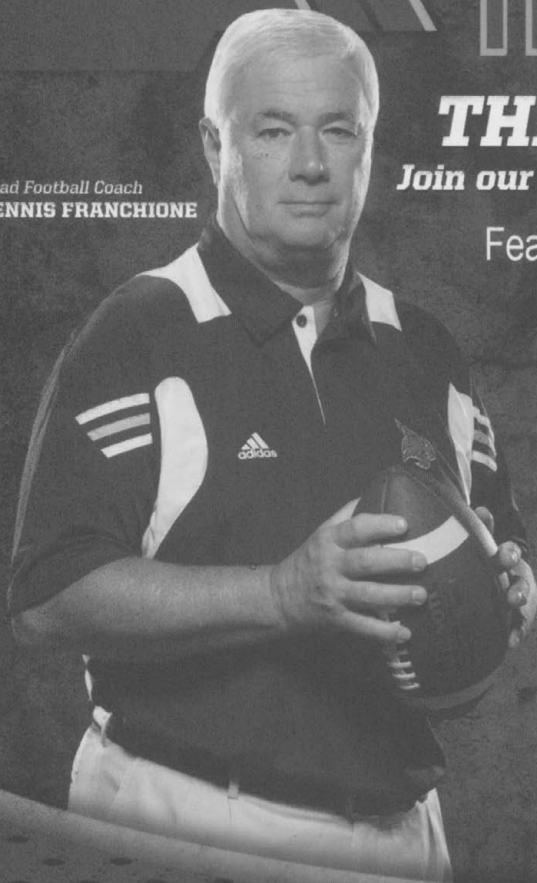

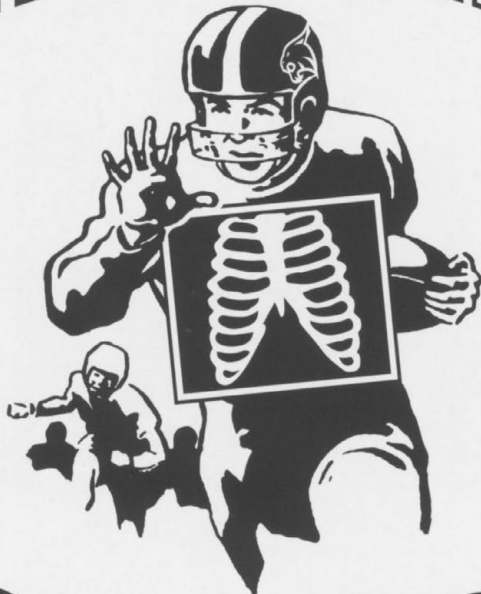

Bobcat Fans are in store for some real surprises when they visit Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium during the 2011 season. The stadium is undergoing some construction that will expand its seating capacity to nearly 30,000 with the addition of a North End Zone Complex. The complex will contain a visitor's and officials locker rooms, a satellite bookstore and new ticket office.

With construction taking place in the north end of the stadium, new videoboards in the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium with a new scoreboard attached to the South End Zone Complex. The addition of a new end zone complex marks the fourth time in the last five years that Bobcat Stadium has been renovated. Last year, a new Duraspine Pro FieldTurf was installed on the playing field.

Two years ago, the Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields West Side Complex added 15 luxury suites and over 450 club seats to the stadium. Additional improvements included installation of the original video and scoreboard that encompassed approximately 1,800 square feet in 2007.

Originally called Bobcat Stadium, the facility's name was changed to Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium in 2002 to honor Texas State's former football coach and director of athletics.

Texas State's South End Zone Complex was completed and dedicated in 2002. Located in the south end zone of Bobcat Stadium, the facility houses the athletic program's football and track and field operations. The complex includes a state-of-the-art weight room, training center, locker rooms, meeting rooms and coaching staff offices.

The End Zone Facility also includes the Sac-N-Pac Room on the second floor and is one of two major banquet rooms for Texas State Athletics. In addition to playing host to athletic donors for pregame festivities, the Sac-N-Pac Room along with the Maroon and Gold Room at Strahan Coliseum play host to special events throughout the year.

The stadium's capacity for the stadium is 16,000 with the west side featuring a 50-yard long, 5,000 square foot press box below the Suite and Club Seat Levels. The press box has seating for 50 working media, and contains coaching booths for both teams, two radio booths, a television booth and a game-operations control booth.

In 2010, Texas State became one of the first NCAA or NFL teams to use the Duraspine Pro FieldTurf as its playing surface. Texas State joined the New England Patriots, Sacramento State and the University of Arizona as organizations that have opted for the latest in innovation from the world leader in artificial turf. The Duraspine PRO product has a durable artificial grass blade and combined with FieldTurf's patented infill system, the Bobcats play on one of the highest performing artificial turf surfaces.

Lighting, furnished by Wide-Lite of San Marcos, was also improved with the west-side renovations as banks of lights were added above the Legacy Suite level to enhance the 120,000 watts of illumination that was previously mounted on four, 120-foot poles.

Original construction of Texas State University's Bobcat Stadium began in 1979 and was completed in August, 1981. The project also included the demolition of Evans Stadium and the addition of more than 2,000 parking spaces. The stadium was designed by Lockwood, Andrews & Newman of Houston and built by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

During its history, Bobcat Stadium has served as a multi-use facility. It has served as home for the Bobcat football games, Texas State outdoor track and field meets and the Texas Special Olympics. The stadium was also the site of scenes from the movie, The Ringer, which starred Johnny Knoxville. The film was released in late 2005. A computer-generated version of the stadium complete with a third deck and the city of Austin in the background was featured in the critically-acclaimed NBC series Friday Night Lights in 2007.
