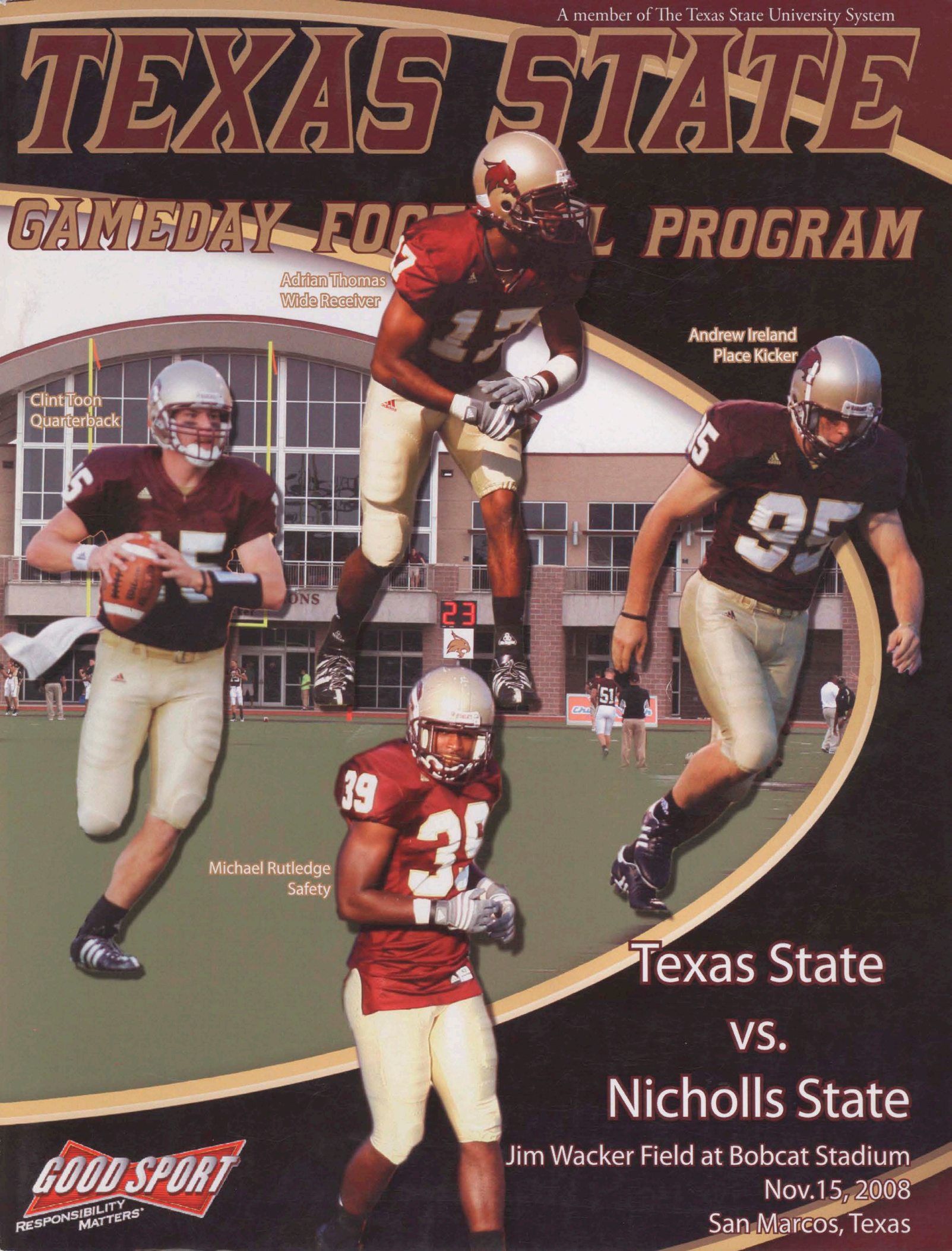

These 18 seniors include Jeff Bowen, Blake Burton, Morris Crosby, Wellington Deshield, John Gilley, Corey Hickerson, Andrew Ireland, Donovan King, Cameron Luke, Freddy Paige, Brian Quackenbush, Michael Rutledge, Courtney Smith, Adrian Thomas, Clint Toon, Jamal Williams and Stan Zwinggi.

Each of these players have had a significant role in Texas State's success this season. Bowen has anchored the Bobcat offensive line that ranks among the nation's Top 10 teams for fewest sacks allowed, while Gilley has been a versatile tight end who is adept at helping to pave the way for running backs and making key receptions.

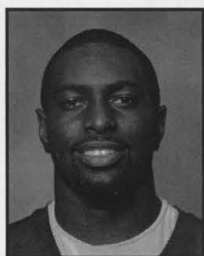
Burton and Zwinggi have been key players in the nation's Top 20 rushing attack this season.

King, Deshield, Quackenbush and Paige are key contributors on Texas State's defensive line that has averaged two sacks per game.

Smith leads the team in tackles, while Crosby and Williams made the successful transition from offense to defense this season. They have joined Rutledge in an improving secondary.

Thomas and Hickerson have been reliable receivers throughout their careers, and Luke has developed into one of Texas State's all-time greats while setting school and Southland Conference records each of the last two years. Ireland has proven to be one of most reliable kickers in the country.

What are your plans after graduation? My major is criminal justice and I want to get a job in law enforcement.

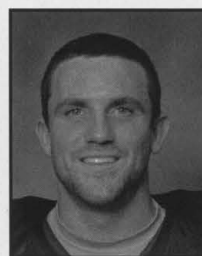

What is your favorite restaurant in San Marcos? Zookas Burritos.



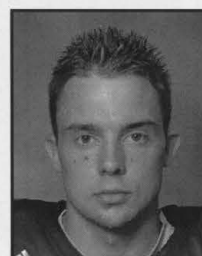

What is your favorite restaurant in San Marcos? Italian Garden.

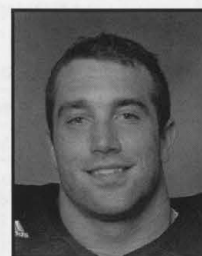

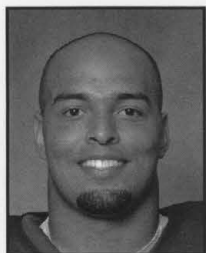
What's your most memorable game at Texas State? When we played McNeese State last year because it was my first game at Texas State. I played linebacker and I had a lot of fun.

I'm working on MBA and I hope to find a good job and make a lot of money.

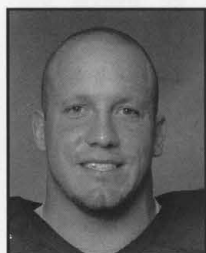

“T” ASSOCIATION INDUCTS FOUR MEMBERS INTO HALL OF HONOR

Texas State’s “T” Association has inducted four new members into its Hall of Honor in 2008. This year’s class consists of a former Bobcat men’s tennis player and athletics trainer, football player, men’s basketball player, along with a football and track star.

Each Hall of Honor inductee was nominated by Bobcat letter-winners and chosen by the “T” Association Board of Directors at their annual summer meeting. Induction into the Hall of Honor is the highest honor given to former Texas State letter-winners. Below is a biographical description for each of this year’s inductees:



JOE AMMERMAN
1952-54

Joe Ammerman was a three-year letterman for the Bobcat tennis team from 1952-54. He also served as an athletic trainer during that span as well. Ammerman is the first nominee ever to be inducted into the Hall of Honor based on both his athletic accomplishments and accomplishments in athletic training.

After his career at Texas State, Ammerman was a jet and multi-engine pilot as a lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force from 1955-1959. Then, he began a long career in athletics training and education. He served as head athletics trainer for the San Marcos Independent School District, Permian High School and North Texas University before being named an assistant trainer for the Dallas Cowboys.

In addition, Ammerman held numerous educational positions, serving as the assistant principal at Uvalde High School, the director of federal programs for Uvalde CISD, principal at Uvalde Junior High, assistant superintendent for Uvalde CISD and assistant superintendent at Rockdale ISD where he ended his career.

He has been active in several civic organizations including being named the director of the Uvalde Chamber of Commerce, president of the Uvalde Lions Club, and coordinator for Campus Crusade for Christ.

Ammerman was a member of executive committee at the Texas State Teachers Association in Austin from 1967-1968. He is a lifetime member of the Texas Association of School Administrators, National Athletic Trainer’s Association and Texas State University Alumni Association.



SCOTT FORESTER
1981-84

Scott Forester was a four-year letterman and standout center for the Bobcat football team from 1981-1984. A member of the 1981 and 1982 National Championship team, Forester earned First-Team NCAA I-AA All-America and All-Lone Star Conference First Team honors in 1984. That same year, he was named the team’s offensive Player of the Year and was awarded the J.C. Kellam Outstanding Player of the Year award. Off the field, Forester was a Who’s Who

Among Students of American Universities and president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes from 1982-1984.

After graduation, Forester entered a career in coaching and real estate. He currently works for the Comal Independent School District as a Prevention Educational Specialist and is also a licensed real estate agent with Prudential Classic Realty in New Braunfels. Prior to taking the position in the CISD, Forester was the assistant head coach football coach and offensive coordinator at Brewer High School from 2006-07, where he also taught biology.

His previous coaching experience included stops in the Abilene Independent School District, the New Braunfels School District, Hardin-Simmons University, John Tyler High School, Ellison High School and TCU. Forester was also the head football coach and athletic director for the Marion Independent School District from 2003-2004.

Forester is a member of several Baptist churches including Normandale Baptist, Beltway Baptist, Oakwood Baptist and Southside Baptist where he is an ordained deacon. He has been active in coaches’ outreach Bible study, the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, as well as New Braunfels Little League baseball and youth basketball.

His induction is preceded by that of his father, Don, who was inducted into the Hall of Honor in 2004.



RICHARD LYNN McDONALD
1973-77

Richard Lynn McDonald was a four year letterman and two-year starter for the Texas State basketball team from 1973-1977. He was an Academic All-Conference selection in 1977 and named an All-Conference Honorable Mention player that season. He also was a member of the Dean’s List in 1975, 1976 and 1977.

McDonald is one of two Bobcat inductees this year who have been preceded in induction by their fathers. Richard is the son of Vernon McDonald, who was inducted into the Hall of Honor in 1977.

After graduation, McDonald followed in his father’s footsteps and has become one of the top high school basketball coaches in the state of Texas. McDonald is currently in his 13th season as the head basketball coach at Clear Lake High School and has received numerous accolades throughout his coaching career. McDonald was named Coach of the Year in District 24-5A during the 1997-1998, 1999-2000, 2001-2002, 2003-2004 and the 2006-2007 seasons. In 1997 he was the Clear Lake High School nominee for the Texas Excellence Award for Outstanding Teachers, and in 2007, he received the most prestigious coaching award in state and was named the State of Texas Class 5A High School Coach of the Year.

McDonald is an active contributor to the Clear Creek Education Foundation, the Bob Neil Scholarship Fund, the University of Central Arkansas Student Mobilization Foundation.

The Dream for Africa Foundation and is a member of the board of directors for the Vernon McDonald endowed scholarship fund. McDonald also serves as the chair for the Clear Lake High School Health and Physical Education Department.



LEW SIMMONDS
1962-65

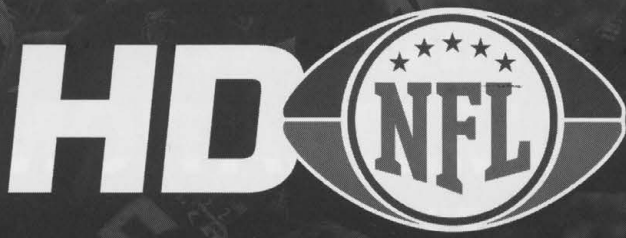
Lew Simmonds was a stand-out in both football and track and field for the Bobcats from 1962-1965. He was a running back on the 1963 football team that went undefeated with a perfect 10-0 record, and was a Lone Star All-Conference selection in 1964 before serving as team captain in 1965. In addition, he ran for Texas State’s 440-yard relay team that was the 1964 Lone Star Conference champion and served as president of his junior and senior class and vice-president of Kappa Sigma Fraternity. Simmonds was named Gallardian in 1963.

Simmonds has been a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association for the past 36 years serving as the senior director, by laws-committee chairman and track advisory committee representative for Region VIII. He has served in numerous coaching roles, including assistant football coach and track coach at Rockdale High School from 1973-1979. While at Rockdale he helped coach two bi-district teams, two quarterfinals teams, and one state champion football team. In addition, the Tigers won seven straight district championships, one regional championship, and one state championship in track during his tenure.

After his stint in Rockdale, Simmonds served as both an assistant and head football coach, and head track coach at New Braunfels High School. While he was an assistant coach from 1980-89, the Unicorns had the highest winning percentage among 4A football teams in Texas. As head coach from 1990-1995, he led the Unicorns to a bi-district championship in 1991 and district championship in 1992. As head track coach, he led the Unicorns to several district track championships and the 1987 Region IV championship. Simmonds was named Comal County Coach of the Year 1992.

He is a former member of the New Braunfels Rotary Club, former president of the Comal County Emergency Children’s Shelter, former business department chairman at New Braunfels High School, and is a member of the Oakwood Baptist Church and sponsor of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. In 2007, Simmonds was awarded the Silver Unicorn Award, which is the highest award given by the New Braunfels Independent School District for distinguished service to the boys and girls of New Braunfels.

Simmonds is currently retired, but works part-time as an on-site coordinator for Staff Development for Educators, a company that provides seminars, conferences and training for teachers and administrators across the nation.

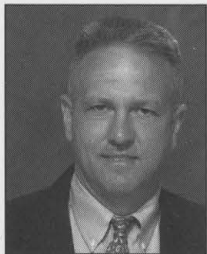

HEAD COACH BRAD WRIGHT



BRAD WRIGHT
HEAD COACH
TEXAS STATE, 1981

Brad Wright enters his second season as the head coach at Texas State University, the school from which he graduated in 1981, and from where he launched his coaching career.

In his first season as head coach, Wright's offensive attack produced a 2,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver in the same season. The Bobcats also posted one of the school's top eight attendance averages for the fourth straight year.

Senior punter Chris MacDonald earned First-Team All-American honors, while record-setting wide receiver Cameron Luke earned All-Southland Conference First-Team honors. Running back Karrington Bush was named the SLC Freshman of the Year and a All-SLC Second-Team selection. In addition, Crawford May was a All-SLC Second-Team choice.

Nick Clark was named Texas State's first-ever Draddy Award Finalist, National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete, and a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American Second Team selection.

Since the 2007 season ended, Wright instilled an improved work ethic into his team that carried over into spring workouts and he is hopeful these efforts will result in an improved record.

Wright was named head coach in the spring of 2007 after serving the three previous



seasons as an assistant head coach, running back coach and special teams coordinator. During that span, the Pearsall native played a significant roll in the resurgence of Texas State's football program.

Prior to Wright returning to his alma mater, the Bobcats suffered 15 losing records in the 19 years of playing football as a member of the NCAA Division I Football Championship Sub-division. But in his three years as an assistant head coach, Texas State posted a 21-15 record, won its first-ever Southland Conference championship in 2005 and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division I football playoffs.

Wright's association with winning at Texas State dates back to the late 1970s when he walked on to the Bobcat football program and went on to have a career in which he played on both sides of the ball for legendary coaches Bill Miller and Jim Wacker.

His coaching career began as a student assistant coach for Wacker's 1981 NCAA Division II national championship team.

After a stint as a graduate assistant at Louisiana-Lafayette and moves up the ladder in the Texas high school coaching ranks, Wright returned to his alma mater and has been a part of a program which has taken off on the field, at the turnstiles and in the community.

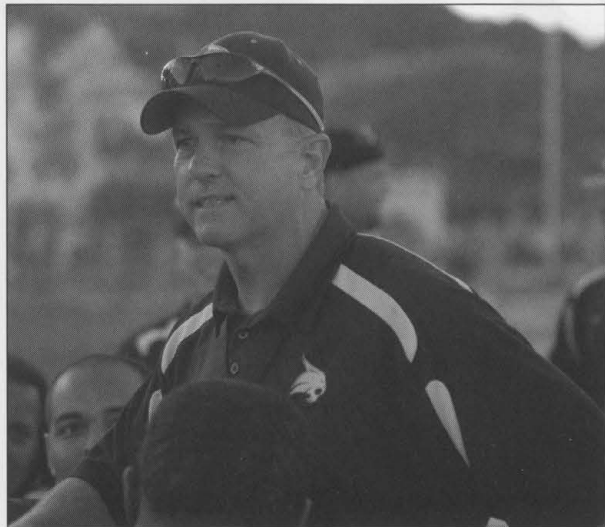
In addition to the 2005 playoff run, Texas State finished strong in 2006, winning four of its last six games including a 28-21 road victory at Sam Houston State. The win at Sam Houston State knocked the conference rival out of contention for a league title.

Texas State set attendance records for the second straight year in 2006, averaging 12,886 fans per game. The Bobcats have been active in the community too, taking part in campus projects such as Bobcat Build and serving mentorships at area elementary schools.

No other Southland Conference team won more league games than Texas State from 2004-06. The Bobcats were 11-6 (.647) during those three seasons in the highly competitive league.

Wright served as a running backs position coach for a unit which led the Southland Conference in total offense the past two seasons. His running backs in 2006 included Stan Zwinggi, who rushed for 735 yards, third-most in the Southland Conference.

In 2005, Wright's corps of running backs played a major role in the Bobcats being ranked 11th nationally in total offense (439.07 ypg), 15th in rushing yards (228.43 ypg) and eighth in scoring (37.00 ppg) among NCAA championship teams. Wright also served as Texas State's special teams coordinator and coached the All-



Southland Conference First-Team punter three straight years (Cory Eloff in 2004 and 2005 as well as Chris MacDonald in 2006) and 2005 All-SLC First-Team place kicker Stan Jones.

In fact, Texas State also had 17 players named First-Team All-Southland Conference while 13 players were named to the All-SLC Second-Team during those three seasons.

In 2006, Texas State led the NCAA's Football Championship Subdivision by having five players named to CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VI Team. Texas State also led the way with seven student-athletes being selected for the Capital One All-Southland Conference Academic Team.

Prior to joining the Texas State staff, Wright spent the previous four seasons as the director of athletics and head football coach at New Braunfels' Canyon High School. He helped turn around a struggling Cougar football program. After two, one-win seasons his first two years at the school, Canyon went 7-2 in 2002 and advanced to the state quarterfinals in 2003, finishing with an 11-2 mark.

Wright also coached at East Bernard, where his squad was an area finalist in 1999 as well as at Karnes City which posted back-to-back third-place district finishes. He was also an assistant coach at El Campo for five years, helping the program to three district titles. Wright's prep coaching experience as an assistant coach also includes stops at Klein Oak and Pearland.

He originally walked-on at Texas State as a wide receiver, played a season at running back and then moved to the other side of the ball where he was a defensive leader at free safety and was a member of the Bobcats' 1980 Lone Star Conference championship team.

Wright earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Texas State in 1981. He is married to the former Kim Pesek, a 1996 Texas State alum. They are the parents of a daughter, Paige Elizabeth.

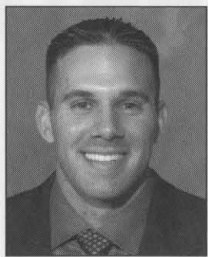

Travis Bush is in his fifth season overall and second season as the associate head coach, co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at his alma mater, Texas State.

Last season, Bush directed the Bobcats' offensive unit that produced a 2,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and 1,000-yard running back for the first time in school history.

The 2,000-yard passer under his direction was Bradley George, who finished the 2007 campaign completing 190 of his 334 passes for 2,099 yards and 16 touchdowns. Bush is in his fifth season overall at Texas State. He was promoted to his current position after serving three seasons as Texas State's wide receivers coach.

During the 2005 Southland Conference championship and national semifinal playoff run, Bush coached one of the league's top receivers, Markee White, who was named to the All-Southland Conference First-Team. White went on to sign a free agent contract with the St. Louis Rams. He also coached All-SLC honorable mention return specialist Dameron Williams. Texas State led the Southland Conference and ranked 11th nationally in total offense in 2005, averaging 439.7 yards per game. The Bobcats also led the league with a 135.48 pass efficiency rating.

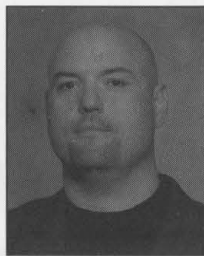
Bush began his coaching career at San Marcos High School where he tutored the Rattlers' quarterbacks, running backs and special teams. San Marcos completed the 2000 campaign with an 11-1 record and an appearance in the state's regional finals.

From 2001-2004, Bush was a graduate assistant coach at Texas Christian University, working with the Horned Frogs' offensive line. During his three-year tenure, the Frogs made three straight bowl appearances, captured both Conference USA and Liberty Bowl championships and had a combined 27-10 record.

Bush graduated from TCU in 2003 with a master's degree in education administration. The Portland native graduated from Gregory-Portland High School in 1995 where he was a Class 4A All-State quarterback. He moved on to Texas State University, lettering four seasons as a wide receiver and served as the Bobcats' special teams' captain in 1999. He was also awarded the J.C. Kellam Award in 1999, which honors Texas State's most outstanding senior football student-athlete.

Bush graduated from Texas State in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science and holds teaching certificates in math-

ematics and physical education. He and his wife Diana have two sons, Treyson and Tyler.

Ben Norton begins his second season as the assistant head coach and co-offensive coordinator at Texas State. He will also coach the Bobcats' offensive linemen. In his first season at Texas State, Norton tutored All-Southland Conference Second-Team selection Crawford May. The Bobcat offensive line featured three new starters and helped pave the way for the school's ninth 1,000-yard rusher, Karrington Bush, who was named the SLC Freshman of the Year and an All-SLC Second-Team selection.

Norton joined Texas State's staff in 2007 after serving two seasons at McNeese State, where he was an offensive coordinator/offensive line coach and running backs coach.

In 2006, he was the offensive coordinator/offensive line coach and helped guide the Cowboys to a Southland Conference championship and an appearance in the NCAA Division I playoffs. That season, Norton also coached arguably one of the league's top linemen (Brent Poussan) who was the leading vote getter among offensive linemen for the All-Southland Conference team. Norton coached McNeese State's running backs during his first season on the staff.

Prior to joining the McNeese State staff, Norton spent six seasons (1999-2004) at Sam Houston State where he served as offensive line coach and was also the team's assistant head coach his last two seasons. During his tenure at Sam Houston, the Bearkats captured two Southland Conference championships and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division I playoffs in 2004.

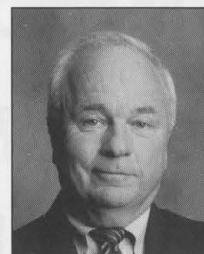
While Norton was at Sam Houston, the Bearkats led the Southland Conference in passing offense four times, total offense three times and scoring twice. Sam Houston State posted a 41-30 record during Norton's tenure.

Norton's first full-time position was a two-year stint as the offensive line coach at Eastern Illinois. Prior to that, the veteran coach served as a graduate assistant coach at Angelo State (1994), Vanderbilt (1994-95) and LSU (1996).

Since 1997, Norton has been the position coach for six NCAA Division I All-Americans as well as 13 players who have received first-team all-conference honors during his coaching tenure.

The Vidor native was a four-year letterman as a lineman at Stephen F. Austin where

he was an Academic All-Southland Conference selection. He earned his bachelor's degree from SFA in 1993 and also earned a master's degree from Vanderbilt in 1997.

A successful veteran defensive coach, Fred Bleil is in his first season as Texas State's new defensive coordinator and safeties coach. Bleil joins the Bobcat coaching staff after coaching linebackers at Tulane in 2007, when the Green Wave led Conference USA in rushing defense after allowing just 132.6 yards per game, and finished fourth in total yards allowed and fifth in points allowed among the 12 C-USA schools.

Bleil went to Tulane after returning for one season as the defensive coordinator at North Texas. That season, the Mean Green had the Sun Belt Conference's fourth-best pass defense and fifth-best rushing defense, allowing 189.1 yards passing and 149.3 yards rushing per game.

He also led the Mean Green's defense in 1997 and 1998 when North Texas finished among the Big West's top three teams in scoring defense both years after leading the league's second-best pass defense in 1996. Two-time NFL Pro Bowler Brian Waters was an All-Big West selection for Bleil's defense, as were three other North Texas players in that two-year span.

Between his two stints at North Texas, Bleil was the secondary coach at San Diego State for eight years and the special teams for three. Under his direction, the Aztec secondary became a force in the Mountain West and across the nation. San Diego State improved from 86th in the country in pass defense in 2002 to fourth in 2003. Aztec cornerbacks ranked first and second among 2003 Mountain West Conference leaders in passes defended and third in interceptions during the 2003 campaign.

Bleil was also the defensive coordinator at New Mexico from 1992 to 1995. In four seasons with the Lobos, Bleil helped improve the defense from one of the worst in the nation to one of the best in the WAC.

Bleil served as defensive coordinator and assistant head coach at Utah State from 1986-91, and was the head coach at New Mexico Highlands from 1979 to 1982. He earned Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Coach of the Year honors when he led Highlands to the 1981 conference crown. He also was named the AFCA College Division Coach of the Year.

Born Jan. 7, 1949, Bleil played football at Northern Iowa in 1967 and went on to letter two

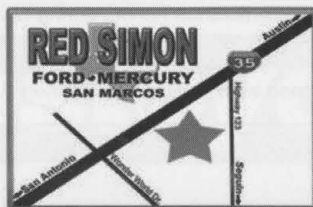

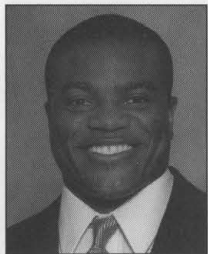

Terrol Dillon is in his second season as the special teams coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas State after coaching All-American punter Chris MacDonald and place kicker Andrew Ireland in 2007. He also coached linebacker Marcus Clark, who led the Bobcats in tackles and interceptions.

Dillon returned to the State of Texas after spending the 2006 season as a member of the coaching staff at Cal Poly, where he coached the linebackers as well. The Mustangs posted a 7-4 record in registering the program's fourth straight winning season.

Dillon was the position coach for Buck Buchanan Award winner Kyle Shotwell. The Buchanan Award is given annually to the top defensive player in Division I's Football Championship Subdivision. Shotwell registered 122 tackles, including 21 stops for lost yards and seven quarterback sacks in 2006.

In 2006, Cal Poly ranked fifth among Division I FCS schools in total defense (248.27 ypg) and was eighth in scoring defense (14.73 ppg). The Mustangs also ranked fourth in quarterback sacks (3.36 pg) and fifth in tackles for lost yards (7.64 pg). In addition to his defensive coaching responsibilities, Dillon coached Cal Poly's punt block squad. The Mustangs had four blocks during the 2006 season.

Before joining the Cal Poly staff, Dillon was a member of coaching staff at the University of Texas in 2005, serving as the special teams quality control coach. The Longhorns captured a national title, defeating Southern Cal 41-38 in the Rose Bowl, after winning the Big 12 Championship and the conference's regular-season title.

Dillon coached cornerbacks and also served as the boys' track and field coach at Earl Warren High School in San Antonio from 2002-05. In addition, he taught mathematics at the Northside Independent School District high school. He also served as the varsity secondary coach at Central Catholic High School in 2001, helping the team to a TAPPS state title.

Dillon, a San Antonio native, walked on to the Texas program after transferring from the Naval Academy. He earned a scholarship and two letters at Texas, playing in the 1999 and 2000 Cotton Bowl games. He blocked a school-record four punts during the 1999 season. He was named to the 2000 Spring Semester Big 12

Commissioner's Honor Roll after earning a 4.0 grade point average.

Dillon earned his bachelor of science degree in corporate communications from Texas in 2000. He also earned a master's degree in education from Texas A&M-Kingsville in 2005.

Mike Barela begins his second season on the Texas State coaching staff in a dual role, serving as the program's Director of Football Operations as well as coaching the Bobcats' tight ends.

Last season, Barela's tight ends combined to catch 19 passes for 176 yards and one touchdown, along with helping to open holes for Texas State's rushing attack that finished with 2,172 yards and scored 19 TD's.

Barela came to Texas State with extensive experience in both collegiate football team management and coaching. Prior to joining the Texas State staff, Barela served as the Director of Football Operations for the past five years at North Texas.

Prior to joining the UNT staff in 2002, he coached tight ends two seasons at Southland Conference member Sam Houston State. While a member of the Mean Green staff, Barela was responsible for organizing team travel and team housing as well as coordinating official recruiting visits. He had extensive involvement in the day-to-day schedules of the coaching staff and student-athletes including practices, study halls and team meetings. He also worked with the Mean Green Summer Football Camps and was the community liaison for the program.

During his tenure, Barela played an integral role in North Texas' preparation and travel to the 2002-2004 New Orleans Bowls. The Mean Green defeated Cincinnati 24-19 in the 2002 New Orleans Bowl. UNT went on to win three straight Sun Belt Conference Championships during Barela's five seasons.

Barela coached First-Team All-America tight end Keith Heinrich during the 2000 and 2001 football seasons at Sam Houston State. Heinrich would go on to be the sixth-round pick of the Carolina Panthers in the 2002 NFL Draft.

During his two seasons with Sam Houston State, the Bearkats had a combined 17-7 record. Sam Houston State was 10-3 in 2001 and captured a share of the Southland Conference championship.

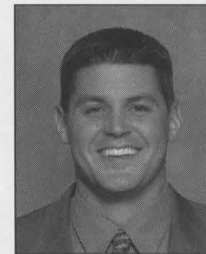
Barela's coaching experience also includes time at Morningside College (1999) where he was the offensive line coach as well as strength and conditioning coach. He also was the run-

Kevin Brown begins his second season coaching Texas State's wide receiver corps that combined to catch 137 passes for 1,825 yards and 17 touchdowns in 2007. The top receiver was record-setting All-Southland Conference receiver Cameron Luke, who finished the year with 60 catches for 1,035 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Brown joined the Texas State staff from TCU where he was an offensive graduate assistant for the Horned Frogs. Among his responsibilities at TCU were working with the Horned Frogs' offensive linemen, film breakdown of opponents' defenses and charting the opposition's defense from the press box on game days.

During his playing career as a wide receiver at TCU (1998-2002), Brown caught 39 passes for 567 yards, an average of 14.5 yards per catch. He caught a career-high 16 passes for 208 yards as a senior in 2002 and also had four touchdown receptions during his career.

During his career, TCU received five bowl invitations. The Horned Frogs defeated USC 28-19 at the 1998 Sun Bowl and beat East Carolina 28-14 in the 1999 Mobile Alabama Bowl. Brown capped his career as a member of TCU's 2002 Conference USA championship team which defeated Colorado State 17-3 in the AXA Liberty Bowl.

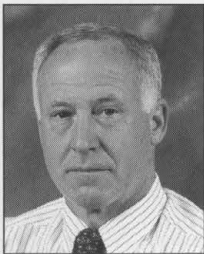

MIKE BUGAR
ASSISTANT COACH

Mike Bugar enters his first season as the defensive line coach at Texas State University. Bugar joins the Bobcat coaching staff after serving seven years as the interior defensive line coach at North Texas from 2000-07.

During his last six years at North Texas, Bugar produced seven All-Sun Belt Conference selections. The most celebrated of those eight players was Brandon Kennedy, of whom many regard as the best defensive lineman ever to play at North Texas. Kennedy was the named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year twice. Alex Pahulu (2001) and Chris McIver (2002) were all-conference selections as well as Michael Pruitt and Evan Cardwell who both were honored in 2004.

Bugar's interior line was a strength of a defense that led the Sun Belt Conference in every major statistical category during three of his last six years. In 2002, the defense ranked No. 3 nationally in scoring defense and No. 9 in total defense. From 2001-2003, only five opposing players rushed for over 100 yards in a game against Bugar's front line. Bugar's line helped hold opponents to just 104.7 yards per game rushing in 2003, which is the best average since 1967.

Bugar joined North Texas in 2000 as the program's strength and conditioning coordinator and became the team's interior defensive line coach in 2001. He has over 31-years experience in coaching the defensive line and strength and conditioning.

A three-year letter winner and 1969 graduate of Florida State University, Bugar began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1970. Since that time he has served on the staffs at Wofford College (1971-76); Gardner Webb College (1977); Clemson University (1977-79); University of Florida (1980-82); West Georgia College (1985-87); University of Southern Mississippi (1988-89); LSU (1990-93); Baylor (1994-96); Mary Hardin-Baylor (1998); and Jacksonville State (1999).

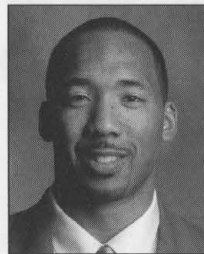
He also spent one year in the professional coaching ranks as defensive line coach for the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL in 1983.

Among his coaching assignments, Bugar served as defensive coordinator at LSU and Southern Mississippi under head coach Curley Hallman and served as defensive line coach and ran the football strength programs at Clemson and Florida under Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

His coaching resume is highlighted by 13 trips to bowl games including the 2001, 2002,

2003 and 2004 New Orleans Bowls (North Texas), 1994 Alamo (Baylor); 1990 All-American (Southern Mississippi); 1988 Independence (Southern Mississippi); 1982 Astro Bluebonnet (Florida); 1981 Peach (Florida); 1980 Tangerine (Florida); 1979 Peach (Clemson); 1978 Gator (Clemson); and 1977 Gator (Clemson). During Bugar's playing days at Florida State, the Seminoles participated in four bowl games - 1964 Gator; 1966 Sun; 1967 Gator, and 1968 Peach.

Bugar and his wife Jeanne have been married for 21 years.



STEVE IRVIN
ASSISTANT COACH
CORNERBACKS
UNLV, 1999

Steve Irvin enters his first season as the defensive backs coach at Texas State University after serving as an assistant coach at College of the Desert in Palm Springs in 2007. While there, the Roadrunners posted a 9-1 regular season record, won a conference co-championship and advanced to the state playoffs for the first time in school history when they played Bakersfield in the Golden Empire Bowl. The College of the Desert also ranked second in total defense in conference play as well.

Last season was the second time Irvin served as an assistant coach at the College of the Desert. He also was an assistant coach from 1999-2001, serving as defensive coordinator in 2001. In addition to his coaching duties, he was an instructional support assistant in the Physical Education Department in 2001-02.

In between those two stints, Irvin was an assistant coach at Montana State for one year, where he coached the safeties. He also was the assistant director of football operations at San Diego State in 2004-06 after serving as a graduate assistant coach at San Diego State in 2002-03, working with the defensive ends.

Irvin earned a master's degree from San Diego State in 2004 and a bachelor's degree at UNLV in 1999 after lettering for the Rebels as an outside linebacker in 1998.

A native of Las Vegas, Irvin began his collegiate career at the College of the Desert, where he earned All-Conference honors in 1995.

Charlie Reeve is in his second season as the running backs coach at Texas State after coaching the school's ninth 1,000-yard rusher in 2007. Karrington Bush finished the season with 1,039 yards and three touchdowns on 137 carries. In addition, Stan Zwinggi rushed for 497 yards and a team-high nine TD's on 74 carries. Texas State's third back Alvin Canady was the team's second-leading receiver with 37 catches for 264 yards and had 88 carries for 377 yards and two scores.

Reeve returned to his alma mater in 2007 after serving one season as an offensive graduate assistant at Rice. While he was at Rice, Reeve was a member of a coaching staff which revived an Owl football program which had not experienced a winning season since 2001 and was part of the school's first bowl appearance since the 1961 Bluebonnet Bowl.

Rice posted a 7-6 record in 2006 and advanced to play in the New Orleans Bowl. The Owls scored 350 points during the 2006 season, setting a school record for most points scored in a season.

Rice's turnaround in 2006 was the No. 2-ranked turnaround among NCAA FBS schools. Reeve was a graduate assistant working with quarterbacks and wide receivers. One of the Owls' receivers led the nation in touchdown catches and was named First-Team All-America by one news service.

Reeve was a student assistant coach for two seasons at Texas State while earning a bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science and a minor in history. He originally was recruited to play at Texas State but an injury ended his career. Then coach Bob Debesse asked Reeve to continue to be a part of the program as a student-assistant coach. Prior to coming to Texas State, Reeve was an NJCAA All-America selection at quarterback, leading junior colleges in passing and total offense.

After graduating in 2003, he coached two seasons at high schools in the southern Texas. He was the quarterbacks coach at Bay City in 2004 and posted a 9-2 record. In 2005, he served as the defensive ends and receivers coach at Cuero. There, he was part of a staff that led the school to the state semifinals and a 13-1 record.

Reeve is married to the former Courtney Boeer who received both her bachelor's and master's degrees from Texas State.

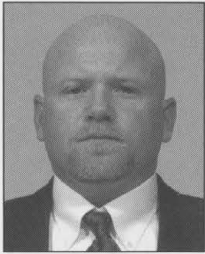

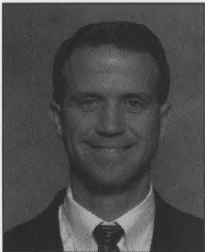
Thad Livingston is in his fifth season overseeing the strength and conditioning program for the Texas State football team.

David Gish is in his 18th year overall at Texas State, and was named head athletics trainer in 1998 after serving as an assistant athletics trainer for eight years.

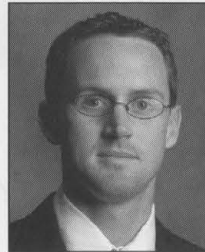

A native of San Marcos, Gutierrez graduated from San Marcos High School and attended Texas State.

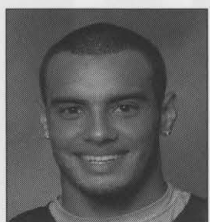

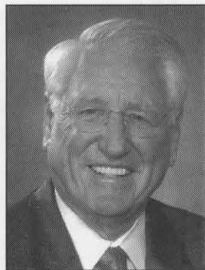
Each university, college and institute within The Texas State University System is unique in its own way.

Three of the member institutions are also members of the Southland Conference. They are Texas State University-San Marcos, Sam Houston State University and Lamar University.

The other five member institutions of the System are: Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College-Orange, Lamar State College-Port Arthur, Sul Ross State University and Sul Ross State University Rio Grande College.

The Texas State University System is governed by a nine member Board of Regents appointed by the Governor. In addition, a non-voting student regent is appointed annually to the Board. The administration, which is headed by a board-appointed Chancellor, is based in Austin where it provides support to the System components and state government.

DR. CHARLES R. MATTHEWS
Chancellor

A native Texan, Charles R. Matthews has distinguished himself in government, business and civic leadership.

Dr. Matthews became the Chancellor of The Texas State University System on February 1, 2005, after a nationwide search by the Board of Regents. During his time at the Sys-

tem, Chancellor Matthews has become an outspoken voice for Higher Education.

From his first day as Chancellor Matthews has stated that one of his main goals is to minimize the upward pressure on tuition in order to keep higher education affordable to all potential students. To that end, he has explored ways to increase efficiencies, decrease expenditures and raise revenue.

Matthews has been instrumental in refinancing bonds from the System as well as the System's Foundation in order to realize greater savings. He has streamlined the planning and construction process and implemented a comprehensive review of the procedures, contracts and financial aspects of the System's construction projects. This has resulted in a more transparent, predictable and cost-effective model for managing campus construction projects.

In addition, Matthews has formed an Information Technology Committee composed of institutional representatives to carry out key strategic planning. These collaborative efforts will provide greater efficiencies by eliminating the duplication of resources and capitalizing on the economies of scale offered by all the institutions collectively.

Matthews has also been instrumental in assisting the four Lamar component institutions (Lamar University, Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College-Port Arthur and Lamar

State College-Orange) damaged by Hurricane Rita in September 2005. Dealing with this tumultuous event required Matthews to work diligently with state, local and campus officials in order to resume classes as soon as possible. It took almost a month for all four of the institutions to reopen, but each was able to complete the semester.

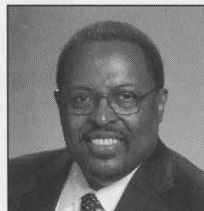
Prior to his current position as Chancellor, Matthews served as the 40th Commissioner of the Railroad Commission of Texas for ten years. First elected in 1994, he won re-election in 2000 to a second term, receiving the highest number of votes ever cast for a Railroad Commissioner.

Before taking office at the Railroad Commission in January 1995, he served as the Mayor of Garland, the ninth largest city in Texas. In addition, he served as President of the Texas Municipal Power Agency and was Governor William P. Clements' appointee to the Texas Turnpike Authority.

Chancellor Matthews earned a B.A. at the University of Texas at Dallas, a Masters in Public Administration from Texas State University, and an Ed.D. at the University of Texas at Austin in Higher Education Administration.

Chancellor and his wife Julia have four grown children, six grandchildren, and reside in Austin, Texas.

TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY



Texas State University-San Marcos is a doctoral-granting university located in the burgeoning Austin-San Antonio corridor, the largest campus in the Texas State University System and the sixth largest in the state. Texas State's 28,121 students choose from 111 undergraduate, 84 masters and six Ph.D. graduate degree programs offered by seven colleges (Applied Arts, Business Administration, Education, Fine Arts and Communication, Health Professions, Liberal Arts and Science), the University College and the Graduate College. With a diverse campus community including over 25 percent of the student body from ethnic minorities, Texas State is one of the top 20 producers of Hispanic baccalaureate graduates in the nation.

LOCATION

Located on the edge of the Texas Hill Country, where black-land prairies turn into beautiful hills, Texas State enjoys a setting that is unique among Texas universities. The beauty of the crystal-clear San Marcos River and the stately cypress and pecan trees on the campus adds to the charm of its picturesque settings.

HISTORY

Authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1899, Southwest Texas State Normal School opened its doors in 1903. Over the years the Legislature broadened the institution's scope and changed its name, in succession, to Normal College, Teachers College, College, University, and in 2003 to Texas State University-San Marcos.

Each name reflects the university's growth from a small teacher preparation institution to a major, multipurpose university. Texas State's original mission was to prepare Texas public school teachers, especially those of south central Texas. It became renowned for carrying out this mission, but today it does far more.

COLLEGES

The University offers programs in colleges of Applied Arts, Business, Education, Fine Arts and Communication, Health Professions, Liberal Arts, and Science.

In 1935, the Board of Regents authorized the formation of The Graduate College. In 1986, the University College was created to assure a broad general education for all students, regardless of major.

CAMPUS

Overlooking the campus and serving as a landmark since 1903 is Old Main, a red-gabled Victorian building restored to its original grandeur.

In 1979, after adding a number of classroom buildings and residence halls, the university purchased the former San Marcos Baptist Academy adjacent to the original campus.

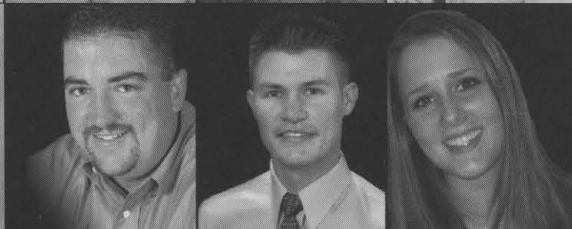
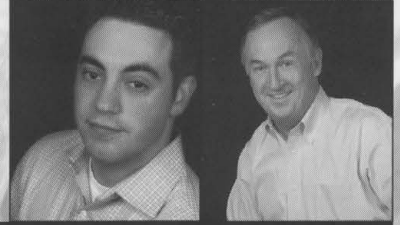
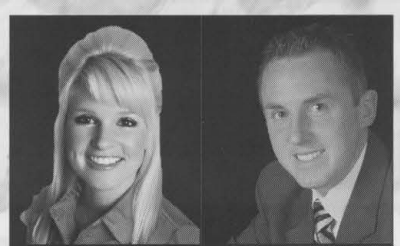
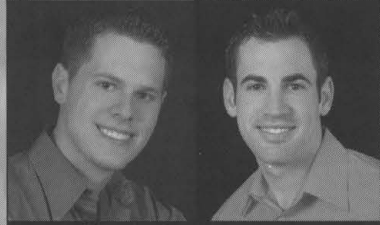
In 1981, South Texas entrepreneur Harry M. Freeman donated a 3,500-acre ranch to Texas State to be held in perpetual trust as the Harold M. Freeman Educational Foundation. The working ranch is used as a laboratory for students in agriculture, animal science, biology and a variety of other academic disciplines.

In 1990, the university opened the Albert B. Alkek Library. The building, conveniently located in the center of campus, is named for the noted Texas rancher, oil man and educational philanthropist who died in 1995.

Today, Texas State consists of 457-acre main campus and 4,777 additional acres in recreational, instructional, farm and ranch land as it continues to expand.

UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION



DR. DENISE M. TRAUTH
PRESIDENT

Denise M. Trauth was named Texas State University-San Marcos' ninth president in June 2002. During her tenure, the university has achieved many milestones, including:

- In September 2003, the university celebrated the 100th anniversary of opening its doors to the first class.
- The university received the largest private gift in its history, a \$20 million endowment from Emmett and Miriam McCoy of San Marcos to support the College of Business Administration that now bears the couple's names. In 2006, the college moved into its new facility, Emmett and Miriam McCoy Hall.
- Under Dr. Trauth's leadership, Texas State has developed a new university mission statement, new shared values, new university goals, a strategic plan to guide its academic develop-

ment through 2012, and a Campus Master Plan for development of its facilities through the year 2015.

- Dr. Trauth secured the gift of 101 acres of prime land from the Avery Family of Round Rock for the university's Round Rock Higher Education Center. The first building there opened in 2005 and ground was broken for the second building in August 2008.
- Round Rock's second building will house the university's new nursing program, which was launched by a \$6 million gift from the St. David's Community Health Foundation in 2006.
- The university dedicated the Ingram School of Engineering in April 2008, launching a major new academic initiative. The school is named for Bruce and Gloria Ingram, who donated \$5 million for the engineering program.
- Patti Harrison of Wimberley donated \$8 million to begin fund-raising for the Performing Arts Center. The center is one of five pillars of the coming Pride in Action campaign, along with academic excellence, athletics, an alumni center, and library support.
- The campus added new facilities including San Marcos and San Jacinto residence halls, Bobcat Village, the Student Health Center, the Mitte Complex, the End Zone Complex at Bobcat Stadium, expansion of Strahan Coliseum, McCoy Hall and its parking garage, and the Speck Street parking garage. Major construction projects currently under way include expansions of the Student Recreation Center and Family and Consumer Sciences Building, improvements to the North LBJ bus loop, and several conversions of asphalt and concrete into green spaces.
- The number of full-time faculty has increased from 801 to 950, improving the student-faculty ratio and individual faculty teaching loads. Dr. Trauth has also overseen a successful plan to make faculty and staff salaries more competitive.
- From 2002 to 2007, African-American student enrollment increased by 7.5 percent and Hispanic enrollment by 25 per-

cent, to the point that African-Americans and Hispanics now make up 26 percent of the student body. The university expects to become a Hispanic Serving Institution (25 percent of enrollment Hispanic) by 2012.

- The academic program now includes three additional doctorates (aquatic resources, physical therapy, and mathematics education), with others in criminal justice, materials science and engineering, and developmental education under development.
- In 2004, the university initiated the Common Experience, an annual campus-wide focus for classroom discussion, performing arts, exhibitions, invited speakers, and community involvement. The 2008-09 theme is "Civic Responsibility and the Legacy of LBJ" to coincide with the year-long celebration of the LBJ Centennial, in which Texas State is a partner.

In addition to her on-campus responsibilities, President Trauth is a commissioner of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the recognized regional accrediting body in the 11 southern states. She is also the past chair of the Texas Council of Public University Presidents and Chancellors, an organization representing 35 institutions and six university systems in Texas. In addition, she is a member of the Commission on Presidential Leadership and Global Competitiveness of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and a member of the executive committee of the Texas International Education Consortium.

She is a past president of the Austin Area Research Organization, better known as AARO, a non-profit organization composed of 75 business and community leaders in the five-county Austin region.

Dr. Trauth came to Texas State from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, where she served as provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. She has also held academic and administrative positions at Bowling Green State University and the University of Tulsa. She holds a bachelor's degree in English literature from the College of Mount St. Joseph in Ohio, a master's degree in journalism from The Ohio State University and a Ph.D. in mass communication from the University of Iowa. She is married to Dr. John Huffman, professor emeritus at Bowling Green State University and UNC Charlotte. They have two grown daughters and four grandchildren.

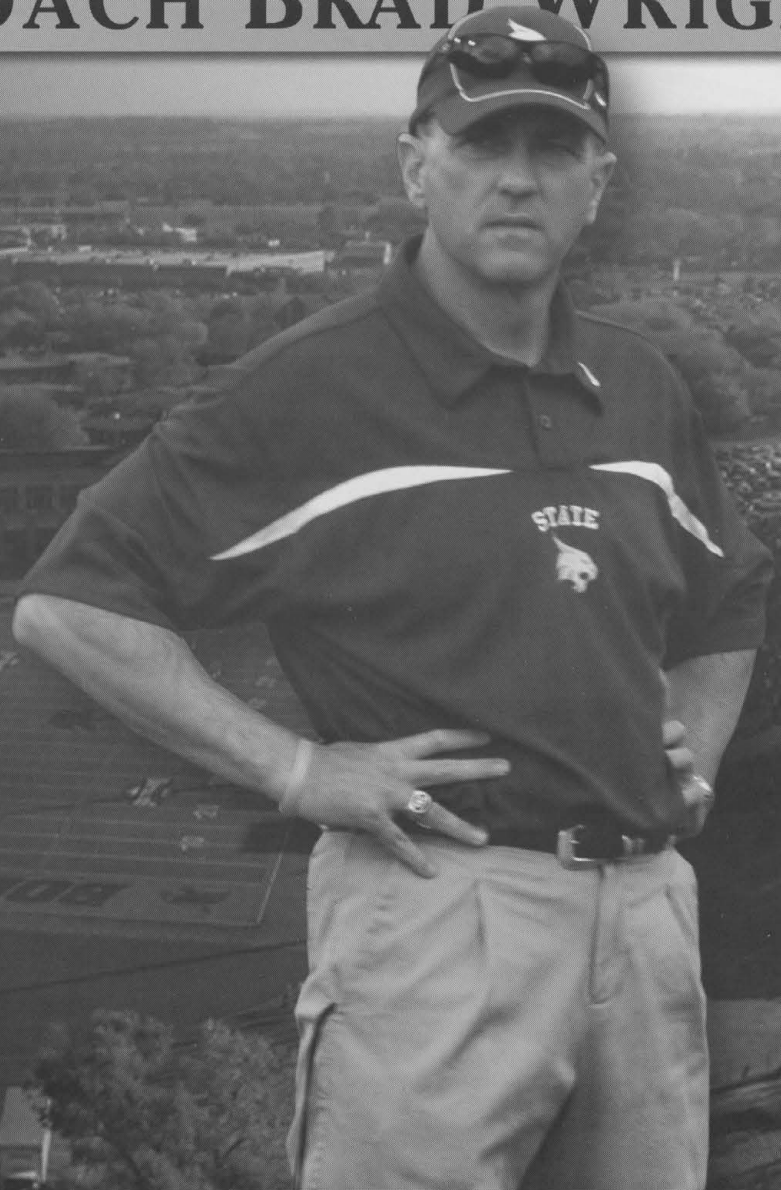

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



As Director of Athletics since 2004, Dr. Larry Teis has led Texas State's Athletics Department to a pair of Southland Conference Commissioner's Cups, extended its current streak to eight straight SLC Women's All-Sports Trophies, and

recorded several Southland Conference tournament and regular season Championships.

Teis was honored as the 2005-06 General Sports TURF Systems AD of the Year Division I-AA West Region Winner presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In 2007, Teis was also honored by the All-American Football Foundation with the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award.

Citing his leadership skills, experience and values as elements that made him the right fit for the position, Texas State president Dr. Denise M. Trauth named Teis the Bobcats' eighth director of athletics in March 2004.

A member of Texas State's athletic administration since January, 1999, Teis resides on the President's Council and reports directly to President Trauth.

After capturing back-to-back Commissioner's Cups in his first two seasons, Texas State had another strong athletic year during the 2006-07 academic year and finished third in the final Cup standings. The trophy is annually awarded to the league institution with the highest combined total of men's and women's all-sports points.

Stressing academics, each year the Bobcats' overall team GPAs have improved and Graduation rates rank among the best in the State of Texas. Texas State consistently ranks near the top of the Southland Conference schools with the most recipients of the Hibernia Bank/SLC Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll. This past year, Texas State had 60 student-athletes meet the honor roll requirements, including nine athletes named to their respective sports' all-academic teams.

The 2007-08 campaign was an outstanding year for the Bobcats both on and off the field. Darren Casey gave the first ever \$1 million gift to the department, while Jerry and Linda Field donated \$100,000 towards Texas State's football season ticket drive and the new-look Bobcat Club recorded record donations for its scholarship mission.

The Bobcat Club's mission is to raise scholarship dollars for fifth-year student-athletes, medical hardships and those attending summer school. Endowment giving also increased generously with the addition of new athletics endowments and increased support from donors to the existing endowments. Restricted sport fund-raising experienced record growth, raising more dollars for coaches than in years past.

In addition, corporate sponsorships reached an all-time high and the student government passed an athletic fee dramatically increasing departmental support for the next five years. The volleyball team won the Southland Conference Tournament Championship, the women's basketball team won their first-ever regular season championship and also their first ever post-season win with a first round victory in the Women's National Invitational Tournament.

Individually, Nick Clark was the first-ever Bobcat football player to be named a finalist for the Draddy Award for his outstanding football/academic performance, and Joyce Ekworomadu represented the women's basketball team in the national three-point shooting contest at the NCAA Final Four in San Antonio.

Facility improvements have included new video boards being installed in each of the football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, and baseball/softball facilities. The future also looks bright for Bobcat athletics with ground breaking scheduled in August, 2008 for a \$7.5 million dollar renovation for the baseball/softball complex, new press box and suites in Bobcat Stadium for the 2009 season, and football stadium expansion scheduled for the near future. In addition, the Bobcats recently were reinstated by the NCAA after completing the three year probationary period

Other key accomplishments during Teis' first four years include: the first ever Southland Conference Football Championship, an appearance in the NCAA playoffs and a Top Five national ranking. He also restructured the department's administration with the hiring of key senior administrative staff and five head coaches.

New facilities and renovation projects have totaled over \$23-million in athletic facility improvements during the past six years. Bobcat Athletic Foundation gifts also have nearly

tripled in a four-year span. Texas State also has restructured its Athletics Academic Center and created a new website for Athletics. Teis also completed and implemented a five-year strategic plan for the department.

In his previous role as Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs, Teis had oversight of several key areas, including game management, marketing, promotions, facilities and ticket sales. He was also responsible for the administration of men's and women's golf, baseball and volleyball as well as the Strutters. From 1998-2002, Teis also oversaw the Bobcat Athletic Foundation.

A native of Fort Worth, Teis came to Texas State after spending four years as the Director of Athletic Marketing at TCU. In that position, he developed the marketing plan for all sports at TCU, including facility signage, season ticket campaigns, game day operations, and corporate sponsorships.

Prior to his tenure at TCU, Teis was the Assistant Director of the University of New Mexico's Lobo Club for three years, working in all aspects of the athletic department's annual fund drive.

Teis has served on several key Southland Conference committees, and is an active member of the local community, including serving as Chairman on the board of directors of the San Marcos Convention and Visitors Bureau for three years.

Teis holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from TCU, a master's in sports administration from St. Thomas University of Miami, Fla., and a doctorate in health, physical education and recreation with an emphasis in sports administration from the University of New Mexico.

Teis resides in San Marcos with his wife, Jana, and two daughters, Taylor (15) and Shelby (11).

JIM WACKER FIELD AT BOBCAT STADIUM

The aura that fell on Texas State University's Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium in 2005 was akin to a heavy morning fog that can sometime settle on the valleys of the Texas Hill Country. Both lay heavy on their respective landscapes. Unlike an early morning fog which shrouds the countryside in a peaceful silence, the dense atmosphere that loomed over Bobcat Stadium carried an electrical charge that would power a Texas State team to an unprecedented NCAA Division I-FCS season.

And despite a 3-3 record at home, that electricity returned to Bobcat Stadium in 2006 as the stadium again broke attendance records.

Additional improvements to the stadium in 2007 included a new video scoreboard that encompasses approximately 1,800 square feet.

The new scoreboard was built by Daktronics of Brookings, S.D., and includes Daktronics ProStar Video Displays. The display is capable of showing live video, instant replays, animation, graphics and other information using full-color LED technology.

In 2008, the Bobcats play a six-game home schedule again which includes a season-opener against Angelo State, a first-time visit by Southland Conference rival Central Arkansas for its homecoming game, non-conference tilts against Southern Utah and Texas Southern and two other Southland Conference games versus Northwestern State and Nicholls State.

Originally called Bobcat Stadium, the facility's name was changed to Jim Wacker Field at Bobcat Stadium in 2002 to honor Texas State's former football coach and director of athletics.

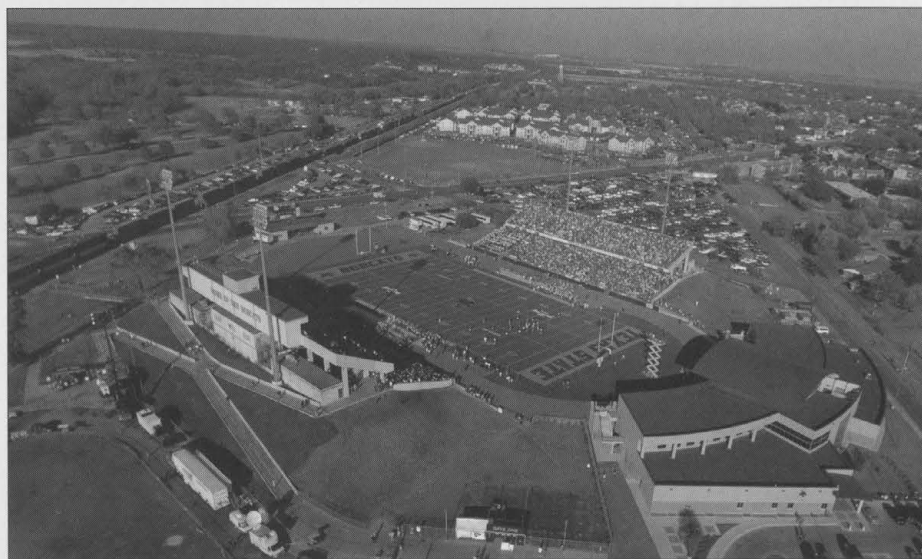
Texas State's End Zone Complex also was completed and dedicated in 2002. Located in the south end zone of Bobcat Stadium, the facility houses the athletic program's football along with the school's track and field operations. The complex includes a state-of-the-art weight room and training center, locker rooms, meeting rooms and coaching staff offices for both football and track and field.

The End Zone Facility also included the Sac-N-Pac Room, which located on the second floor and is one of two major banquet rooms which are a part of Texas State athletic facilities. In addition to playing host to athletic donors on game days, the Sac-N-Pac Room along with the Maroon and Gold Room at Strahan Coliseum play host to special events throughout the year.

The capacity for the stadium is 15,218 with the west side featuring a 50-yard long, 5,000 square foot press box. The press box has seating for more than 50 working media.

It contains a President's Box, coaching booths for both teams, two radio booths and a game control booth. Additionally, a film deck and enclosed television box are located on the second level.

An elevator to make the press level more conveniently accessible was added before the 2006 season, and the first Bobcat Apparel Store,



which is operated by the Texas State University Bookstore, was opened on the west side of the stadium.

The Bobcat Stadium playing surface is AstroPlay® artificial turf which is a new concept in filled turf systems. The turf is a grass-like, non-abrasive, polyethylene fiber matrix filled with special rubber granules.

AstroPlay® has been engineered to offer the best aspects of natural grass without the inherent drawbacks such as high maintenance, low use levels, game cancellations and uneven footing. AstroPlay® is made by Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc. Lighting, furnished by Wide-Lite of San Marcos, produces 120,000 watts from four, 120-foot poles.

The track at Bobcat Stadium was resurfaced in 2002 by Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc., and features EUROATAN® WS, a paved-in-place, structurally sprayed polyurethane surface.

Original construction of Texas State University's Bobcat Stadium began in 1979 and was completed in August, 1981.

The project also included the demolition of Evans Stadium and the addition of more than 2,000 parking spaces. The stadium was designed by Lockwood, Andrews & Newman of Houston and built by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

During its 25-year history, Bobcat Stadium has served as a multi-use facility. It has served as home of for the Bobcat football games, Texas State outdoor track and field meets and the Texas Special Olympics.

The stadium was also the site of scenes from the movie, *The Ringer*, which starred Johnny Knoxville. The film was released in late 2005. A computer-generated version of the stadium complete with a third deck and the city of Austin in the background was featured in the critically-acclaimed NBC series *Friday Night Lights* in 2007.

They are also the first American marching band to have performed for a soccer game in Mexico. In March 2007, the Bobcat Marching Band was selected to be featured on video at the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA) National Convention in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Most recently, the band was featured on the award-winning PBS show *The Biscuit Brothers*.

Above all, the Bobcat Marching Band prides itself on being an integral part of the excitement of the college game day experience! Under the direction of Associate Director of Bands Caroline Beatty, the band will bring on the spirit during all of the 2008 home football games and will travel to Dallas when the Bobcats take on the SMU Mustangs. Additionally, the band will take their exciting halftime shows on the road to be featured in exhibition performances at the Texas UIL 5A Area D Marching Contest. For the 2008 season, the Bobcat Marching Band will present two HOT halftime shows! The first, "Caliente!", features music with a Latin flair. The second

show is pure "007!" featuring exciting arrangements of the James Bond Theme, Goldfinger, and Live and Let Die.

Whether before, during or after the game, no band strives to support its team, entertain its fans or play as hard as "The Pride of the Hill Country", the Texas State Bobcat Marching Band!

The band was featured in a marching band performance video session at the national conference of the College Band Directors National Association in Ann Arbor, Michigan on March 30. The CBDNA made a call for tapes of halftime performances from last fall, acquiring recordings from college marching bands across the country. A panel of select college marching band directors judged the tapes submitted for this session, and selected only five bands to participate. After the judges tallied their votes, Dr. Schueller received notification from Dr. Kraig Williams of the University of Memphis, Project Manager for the Athletic Band Task Force for the national conference.

The College Band Directors National Association, known as CBDNA, is the foremost professional organization on college band issues, dealing mostly with concert ensembles. Over the past ten years, the association has

begun to include sessions dealing with athletic band performance related items. Additionally, the CBDNA sponsors a summer symposium that deals exclusively with athletic bands.

Dr. Rod Schueller, Director of the 215-member Bobcat Band, submitted a DVD recording of the band's performance at the Harlandale Marching Festival in San Antonio. The band performed in exhibition for the high school bands that competed during the festival, held on October 14.

Schueller remarked, "When I saw the CBDNA e-mail calling for tapes, I immediately thought about submitting the tape of that performance. I was judging the competition at Harlandale, so I did not travel with the band. I stayed in regular contact with the staff because I thought there was a good chance a major storm was going to hit before the competition was over."

He continued, "The storm approached as the Bobcat Band took the field. I have never seen a band march like that, nor have I heard a band sound like our group did that day. It was absolutely phenomenal, especially considering it poured on them for the last three minutes of the show. They were pros, continuing to give it their all like nothing was happening."

Concerning the honor of being selected, Schueller said, "This is a tremendous honor for our students, the School of Music, Department of Bands and of course, Texas State University. There were many great bands who submitted recordings, and we were judged to be on par with the elite in college marching band."

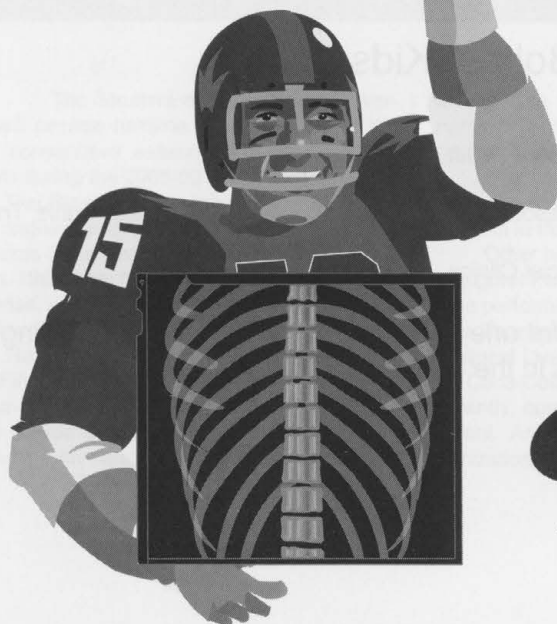

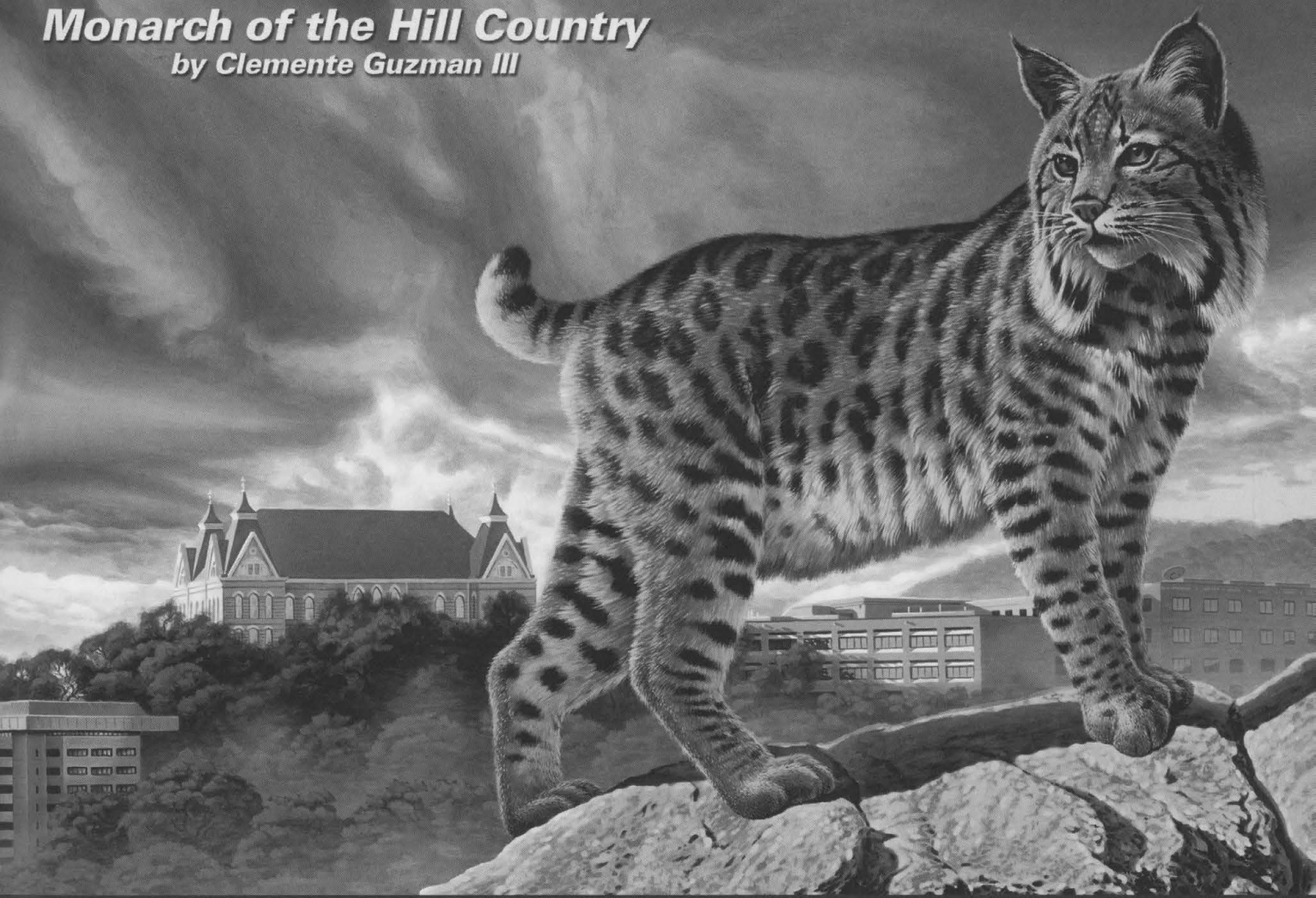

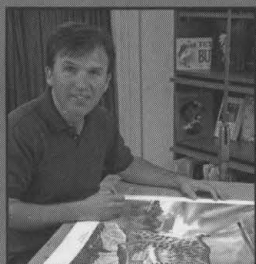
