In a matchup of two teams with identical records, Texas State hosts Georgia State this afternoon at Bobcat Stadium as both teams look to get back on the winning track. The Bobcats and Panthers both enter the game with 2-6 overall records and are 1-3 in Sun Belt Conference games this season.

TEXAS STATE - GEORGIA STATE SERIES

Texas State and Georgia State meet for the third time overall and second time in Bobcat Stadium today as the Bobcats enter the contest with a 2-0 series record against the Panthers. Texas State began the series with a 24-17 victory over Georgia State in 2013 and came back to win 54-31 in Atlanta's Georgia Dome last season.

THE COACHES

Texas State head coach Dennis Franchione is in the fifth season of his second stint and seventh season overall at the school. He enters today's game with a career record of 212-132-2 and ranks third among NCAA Division I active FBS head coaches.

Trent Miles is in his third season at the helm of the Georgia State football program after serving as the head coach at Indiana State for five years. He also served as an assistant coach at Stanford, Notre Dame and Washington.

TEXAS STATE IN BOBCAT STADIUM

Texas State enters the Georgia State game looking to improve its home record to 3-2 in Bobcat Stadium this season. The Bobcats have an all-time record of 119-85 in Bobcat Stadium.

TEXAS STATE STATE NOTABLES

- Texas State ranks among the nation's top 38 rushing teams and is fifth in the Sun Belt Conference with an overall average of 194.9 yards per game.
- Robert Lowe ranks sixth among the Sun Belt Conference overall rushing leaders after averaging 89.9 yards in Texas State's first eight games. Lowe also is sixth among the Sun Belt Conference overall scoring leaders with an average of 6.2 points per game after catching a touchdown pass against New Mexico State.
- Tyler Jones ranks 38th nationally and third among Sun Belt Conference leaders in total offense with an average of 262.5 yards per game after rushing for 467 yards and throwing for 1,633 yards.
- Tyler Jones enters the Georgia State game having thrown for 5,433 yards in his career. This season, he has completed 145 of 246 passes for 1,633 yards, nine touchdowns and six interceptions.
- Damani Alexcee is second among Sun Belt Conference leaders with 47 solo tackles after equaling his career best with a game-high 12 solo tackles against New Mexico State. He also ranks sixth among Sun Belt leaders and leads Texas State with 65 overall tackles this season.
- Lumi Kaba ranks 14th nationally and is second among league leaders after averaging 44.5 yards on 42 punts this season.

GEORGIA STATE NOTABLES

- Nick Arbuckle leads the Sun Belt and ranks seventh in FBS in passing yards (333.0 pg). Arbuckle ranks fourth among all FBS quarterbacks in career passing yards per game (297.4).
- Robert Davis has caught at least one pass in 32 straight games and enters today's game with 2,043 career receiving yards.
- Donovan Harden has 1,946 career yards, including 1,282 yards at GSU and 664 yards in two seasons at Illinois State.
- Penny Hart leads the Sun Belt in receiving yards per game (92.3) and ranks second in receptions (5.8 pg).
- Chandon Sullivan has 32 tackles, three tackles for loss, three pass breakups and one interception, which he returned 25 yards for a touchdown.

FOUR BOBCATS ARE INDUCTED INTO "T" ASSOCIATION HALL OF HONOR

Billy Hall, Jeff Novak, Charlie Sharp and Ervin Thomas are the newest members

The Texas State "T" Association held its 2015 Athletic Alumni Hall of Honor Induction Ceremony on Friday night in the J. Garland Warren Room at Bobcat Stadium to honor this year's class consisting of football stars Billy Hall, Jeff Novak and Ervin Thomas, along with basketball standout Charlie Sharp. Induction into the Hall of Honor is the highest athletic honor given to Texas State athletic alumni. Below is a brief description of this year's class.

BILLY HALL

Billy Hall was a defensive back for the Bobcat football team from 1979-82 and was selected First-Team All-Lone Star Conference and Third-Team All-American his senior year. Hall started 36 straight games for the Bobcats, with his team compiling an unbelievable 33-3 record while winning back-to-back NCAA Division II National Championships. Hall was also member of three Lone Star Conference Championship teams.

Hall graduated with a degree in Physical Education and began an extensive career as a teacher and high school football coach. He coached in numerous high school playoff games, and helped Killen High School win the class 5A Division I State Championship in 1991. In 2002, Hall won his second class 5A Division I State Championship as a coach at Judson High School.

During his career Hall was privileged to coach 18 First-Team All-District safeties, four All-State players, two High School All-Americans, three NFL defensive backs and one Super Bowl Champion. Hall retired from coaching in 2014.



CHARLIE SHARP

Charlie Sharp was a center for the Bobcat basketball team from 1957-60 and was a member of the NAIA 1960 Men's Basketball National Championship Team. Sharp is the all-time leading scorer in the history of Bobcat Basketball with 1,884 points. During Sharp's three seasons, he and his teammates compiled a 74-14 record and only lost one home game. In 1960 Sharp was named MVP of the National Championship Tournament and was twice named All-American. He was voted one of the top 25 players in the history of the NAIA Tournament and was named to the NAIA 75th Anniversary All-Star Team.

Sharp was drafted by the Philadelphia Warriors with the 31st pick in the 1960 NBA draft. Sharp is being recognized posthumously today. Accepting on behalf of Charlie is his cousin Sammy Allen and his niece Marci Fisher.

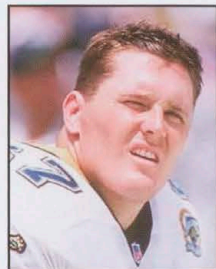
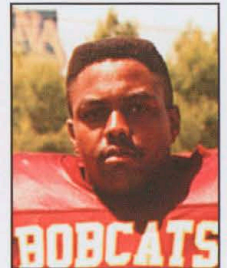


ERVIN THOMAS

Ervin Thomas was a center for the Bobcat football team from 1987-91, dominating on the offensive line while earning Southland Conference First-Team accolades in 1991. That same season Thomas was named a First-Team All-American.

During his career he was named Honorable Mention All-Southland Conference, All-Southland Conference Second Team, was named team captain twice, and during his senior season Thomas earned First-Team All-Conference and All-American accolades. In 2013, Thomas was named to the Southland Conference All-Decade Team.

Thomas graduated with degree in Urban and Regional Planning and Policy Development. He immediately began a successful career in external relations, public affairs and issues management for many private and public businesses. In 2007, Thomas was named the Legislative and Regulatory Issues Advisor at Chevron North America where he is still currently employed. He was appointed by Governor Rick Perry to serve on a Blue Ribbon Section Committee to honor Texas citizens, communities and companies for their advancements and innovations in meeting the needs of Texas and is the former Chairman of the Mickey Leland Environmental Internship Program which assists minority college students with interests in engineering, science and law.



JEFF NOVAK

Jeff Novak was an offensive tackle for the Bobcat football team from 1987-89. In both 1988 and 1989 he was named First Team All-Southland Conference and his senior season Novak was named First-Team All-American. In 2013, Novak was named to the Southland Conference All-Decade Team.

In 1990 Novak was drafted in the seventh round of the NFL Draft and played professionally for nine years while playing for the San Diego Chargers, New York Giants, Miami Dolphins and Jacksonville Jaguars. In 1995, Novak was picked second overall in the NFL expansion draft by the Jaguars. That season Novak started in 15 of the 16 games and was selected as team captain. During his career he won four playoff games, and in 1996 played in the AFC Championship game.

After his NFL career ended, Novak began a successful career in real estate and for the past eight years has owned his own real estate develop company, Novak Brothers. In 2015, Novak returned to Texas State and graduated with a degree in Applied Arts.

SENIOR SPOTLIGHT

MERSHAD DILLON: ALL BUSINESS FOR 60 MINUTES

Texas State is in the midst of its fourth year of competing at the Division I Football Bowl Subdivision level, and the program continues to grow and progress.

For an athlete like Mershad Dillon, going to a school where he could be a part of that growth process made Texas State an easy choice for the defensive tackle from California. He says the Bobcats coaching staff, and the city of San Marcos were the icing on the cake when he made his decision.

"I really enjoyed the coaching staff," said Dillon. "The city was really cool as well. San Marcos is beautiful and the fact that the river runs right through campus is really special. On the football side, I wanted to be a part of a program that was building and

continuously getting better so that I could grow as an athlete."

Dillon has had no problem growing as a football player. After transferring from Allan Hancock College in his hometown of Santa Maria, Calif., to Texas State before last season, Dillon made his presence known immediately. He started 10 of 12 games for the Bobcats last year and has been on the field in every game for Texas State this season.

"I love playing here because I know that it has made me a better man and has prepared me for life after football," said Dillon. "You have tough days and you have good days, but that's what makes us better players and better men."

As far as life after football is concerned, Dillon says only time will tell. He, like most football players of his caliber, has dreams of playing in the NFL, but he says he could also see himself going into strength and conditioning or becoming a coach.

"Right now, I'm focusing on school because I have to graduate before any of my goals can be achieved," said Dillon.

Dillon believes keeping his focus and maintaining a strong work ethic has contributed to most of his success, but he also acknowledges that the strong support he receives from his family has kept him motivated to be the best he can be as well.

"My family has been a huge inspiration for me, said Dillon. "Being around them and seeing how they handle adversity has made me want to come here and prove to people that I can do the same thing. Having them behind me has made a world of difference because not everyone has that kind of support system."

Dillon says that adversity is just part of the game and the grind of playing comes with being a college athlete. He says this team is going through its fair share of adversity, but he feels they are equipped to persevere and rise up to the challenges this season has presented. Dillon says that being able to adjust is the key to being successful or falling behind.

"Being in college athletics has definitely been challenging," said Dillon. "If it weren't, everyone would do it. Balancing schoolwork with workouts and games is probably the biggest adjustment that I have had to make since coming here."

Playing college football is not for everyone. There are days when your body and mind will be pushed to the limit, but Dillon says he tries to do everything extra needed to help put the team and himself in a position to succeed.

"Football takes a lot of extra time and preparation," said Dillon. "It takes a lot of extra time working out in the weight room, watching game and practice film, and getting treatments so that we make sure that we're taking care of our bodies."

He went on to add that he actually enjoys putting in the extra work, and he thinks it has made a difference in helping him get to where he is today.

"In the weight room, you do every rep that you can and push yourself as hard as you can, said Dillon. "After we're done, I'll go and do some extra curls, push ups, or I will come out to the field to do some extra gassers just so that I can stay ahead of the game."

Dillon has thought about what he wants his football legacy a to be.

"I want people to remember me as being a dominant player," said Dillon. "I want to leave my mark as a guy who was always impacting the ball and inspiring others to play hard."

Dillon uses music to get himself in the right frame of mind before games, and when it's game time he is all business for 60 minutes. The Bobcats need Dillon to be a leader on the defensive side of the ball, and he has not disappointed.

Now it is up to the 300-pound defensive tackle to help carry this team toward the finish line of this season.

He is pursuing a degree in exercise and sports science and hopes to become a coach one day when he is finished with his playing career.

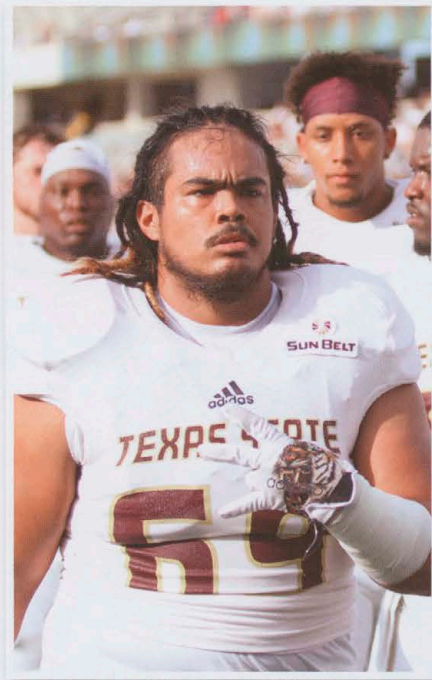

Standing at six-foot-four, senior defensive tackle Dondre Elvoid has brought more talent and depth to Texas State's football squad. The Pittsburgh native made his mark at the junior college level and is currently doing so at the Division I FBS level as well.

2005 FOOTBALL TEAM CELEBRATES 10-YEAR ANNIVERSARY



Another group of athletics alumni being honored today is the 2005 Texas State football team, which won the school's first Southland Conference Championship, and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division I FCS Playoffs for the first time in school history. The team's success also propelled Texas State Athletics to the NCAA Division I FBS level.

Head coach David Bailiff was named the AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year and finished third in the voting for the Eddie Robinson Award, which is presented annually to the top NCAA Division I FCS head coach.

Texas State set a school record for total attendance that season as well as per game attendance average.

The 2005 football team featured the nine All-Southland Conference First-Team players, including the SLC Player and Defensive Player of the Year, two All-SLC Second-Team players and seven All-SLC Honorable Mention selections.

Fred Evans was named an All-American defensive lineman, SLC Defensive Player of the Year and All-SLC First-Team selection before going on to play with the Minnesota Vikings.

Quarterback Barrick Nealy was named a Second-Team All-American and All-Southwest Region player. He also was tabbed the Southland Conference Player of the Year and an All-Southland Conference selection before finishing fifth in voting for the Walter Payton Award, which is given to the NCAA Division I FCS Player of the Year, and played in the CFL.

Evans and Nealy were both selected to play in the 2006 Hula Bowl All-Star game.

Thomas Kerezstury also was named a Second-Team All-American, All-Southwest Region and All-Southland Conference First Team selections.

Stan Jones also was an All-Southwest Region and All-Southland Conference First-Team selection.

The other All-Southland First-Team selections were Cory Eloff, Luke Horder, Walter Musgrove, David Simmons, Travis Upshaw and Markee White.

The All-SLC Second-Team players included Daniel Jolly and Gary Shepard, while Blake Burton, Jeremy Castillo, Matt Jenkins, Jamarqus O'Neal, Tyrone Scott, Daniel Varvel, and Dameon Williams were Honorable Mention choices.

Southland Conference All-Academic Team members included Nick Clark, Dominic Giametta, Buck Koalenz and Nate Langford.

Randy Moshier was named Texas State's Outstanding Senior Student-Athlete and was named to the FCS Athletic Directors Association Academic All-Star Team and the SLC All-Academic Team. He also was a semifinalist for the Draddy Award.

Texas State finished the regular season with a 9-2 record and was the 2005 Southland Conference co-champion. The Bobcats went on to defeat Georgia Southern 50-35 after coming back from a 35-16 deficit. Texas State beat Cal Poly in the quarterfinals before falling 40-37 in overtime against Northern Iowa in the semifinals.

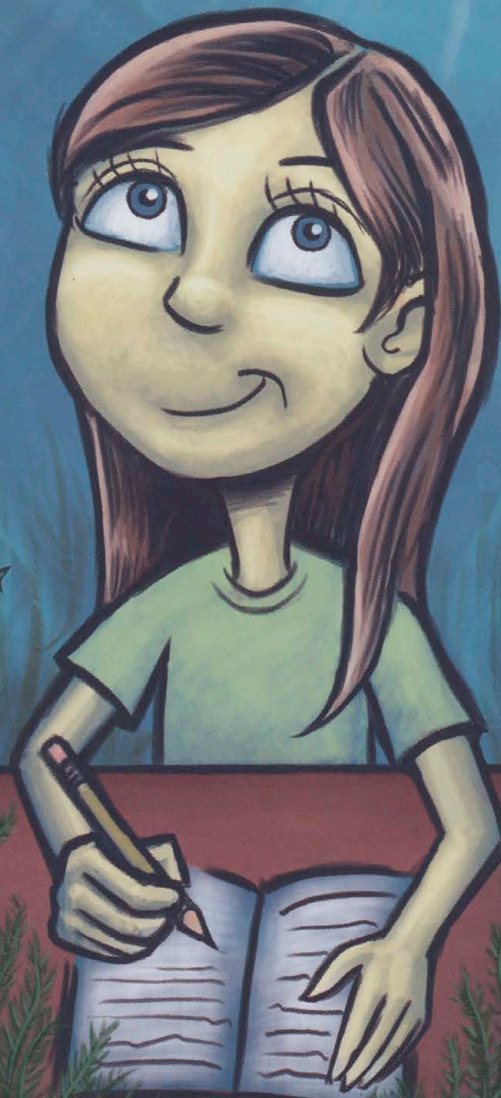

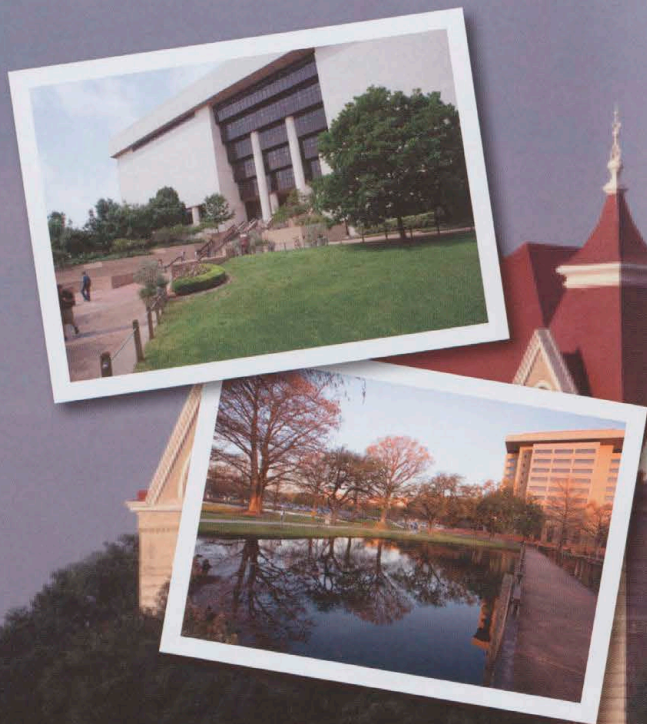
Texas State's San Marcos campus is located in the Texas Hill Country, where blackland prairies roll into beautiful hills, providing a unique setting among Texas universities. The beauty of the crystal-clear San Marcos River and the stately cypress and oak trees on campus add to the university's picturesque setting. The river also provides recreational activities for students throughout the year.

Authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1899, Texas State, originally called Southwest Texas State Normal School, opened its doors in 1903. The red-roofed, castle-like landmark known as Old Main was the first building. The University has a second 101-acre campus in Round Rock.

As the university's student population has grown - from 303 in 1903 to 36,790 in 2014 - Texas State's campus has expanded and today consists of a 457-acre San Marcos campus and 5,038 additional acres in recreational, instructional, farm and ranch land.

The campus is home to over 260 buildings. Some, like Old Main, are as old as the university itself. Others, such as the Performing Arts Center, opened in 2014. An Undergraduate Academic Center opened in 2012, and additional new buildings are being completed.

Over the years, the Legislature broadened the institution's scope and changed its name, in succession, to Normal College, Southwest Texas State Teachers College, Southwest Texas State College, Southwest Texas State University, and in 2003 to Texas State University. Each name reflects the university's growth from a small teacher preparation institution to a major, multipurpose university.

Texas State offers 97 bachelor's, 88 master's, and 12 doctoral degrees.

The total enrollment of Texas State is 36,790. This includes 32,215 undergrads, 3,516 master's, 463 doctoral, and 601 post-baccalaureate.

Texas State has set enrollment records for each of the past 17 years. The number of new students has increased by 3.4 percent in 2014-15.

Students of Texas State come from 227 of Texas' 254 counties, all 50 states, and 62 nations.

Texas State became the state's eighth Emerging Research University in 2012, making it eligible for funding to boost research initiatives.

Texas State students first saw the Victory Star on campus in December 1936 when it was placed as a Christmas decoration on top of a 50,000-gallon water tower near where the Chemistry Building sits today. After the holidays, the star was taken down and put away. But in 1942, night watchman Elmer Titsworth found it and placed it on the water tower. He turned it on after the Bobcats won football games and created a new tradition.

When the water tower was replaced, the Victory Star tradition was moved to the top of the 138-foot-high Jackson Hall. The star was replaced by a new star that had a radius of six feet from the center to the tip of each arm. It contained two sets of lights -- an outside white outline and an inner colored set of lights. The white set was to be controlled by a photoelectric cell which could turn the lights on at sundown and off at sun-up. The colored lights were to operate on a manual switch. The student senate was expected to write a set of rules governing the circumstances under which the star would be illuminated.

The new star was built by San Marcos sign-man Ivar Gunnarson, who expected to have it ready in time for the first game against Texas Lutheran on September 16, 1967. In its new location atop Jackson Hall, the Victory Star actually sits about 50 feet higher than its predecessor sat on the former water tower.

The five-pointed star atop Jackson Hall on Texas State's highest hill can be seen from miles away and is lighted after all athletic victories, both home and away. This star is, of course, Texas State's symbol, taken from our university seal. It is from the star that the school's newspaper, The University Star (formerly named the Normal Star and the College Star), gets its name.

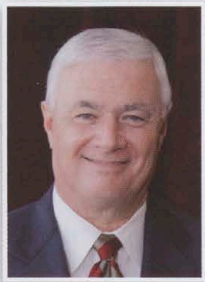

DENNIS FRANCHIONE

Head Coach
Seventh Season at Texas State
30th Season as a Head Coach
Pittsburg State, 1973

Beginning his 40th season as a football coach and 30th season as a collegiate head coach, Dennis Franchione enters the 2015 season as one of only four active NCAA Division I FBS head coaches with 200 career victories.

Franchione owns a 210-126-2 career record, has led his teams to nine conference championships and had the best divisional record during another season. In addition, his teams played in nine bowl games, four NAIA playoff games and one NCAA Division II playoff contest.

Franchione enters the fifth season of his second tenure and his seventh season overall as Texas State's head coach and has a 36-34 record at the school.

Last season, he led Texas State to a 7-5 mark to make the Bobcats bowl eligible for a second straight year despite playing an NCAA Division I FBS schedule for just the third time in school history. He also converted Texas State's offense to an up-tempo attack that resulted in the Bobcats ranking among the top four most improved offenses in the nation, Robert Lowe becoming the school's first 1,000-yard rusher in five seasons and Tyler Jones developing into the most accurate passer in school history. Texas State's defense also produced a Fourth-Team All-American linebacker, the Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Year and a pair of NFL Draft picks.

A former head coach at Texas State in 1990-91, Franchione returned to the school in 2011 to lead Texas State's transition to the FBS ranks. During the transition, he has led the Bobcats to three non-losing seasons in the last four seasons. Texas State finished with 6-6 records in 2011 and played its first FBS season in the WAC before the Bobcats joined the Sun Belt Conference in 2013. Texas State posted six wins again in 2013 and seven victories last season.

It marks just the 10th time in the last 30 seasons that Texas State has posted three non-losing records in a four-year period, and five of those 10 seasons came under Franchione's direction.

Texas State became bowl eligible for the first time in its second season of playing in the FBS during the 2013 campaign to equal the shortest span for a school to become bowl eligible since Marshall accomplished the feat in 1999. The Bobcats also were in their first year as a member of the Sun Belt Conference, which finished the season with 21 non-conference wins in 2013.

His collegiate head-coaching career began at Southwestern College in 1981, when he compiled a 14-4-2 record in two seasons. In 1982, the Builders won nine games, a Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference championship and beat Oklahoma Panhandle State 15-0 in the Sunflower Bowl.

It was Southwestern College's first bowl game and the nine victories tied the school's single-season record that was previously set in 1967.

Following the record-setting season, Franchione went to Tennessee Tech, where he served as the offensive coordinator in 1983 and 1984 before becoming head coach at his alma mater, Pittsburg State.

During the next five seasons, he led the Gorillas to a 53-6 record and four Central States Intercollegiate Conference championships and one Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title with a combined record of 37-1. He earned NAIA National Coach of the Year honors twice. His teams tied the school record with 11 victories in a season three times before breaking it with a 12-win campaign in 1989 when Pittsburg State joined the NCAA Division II ranks.

In 1990, Franchione took the reins of Texas State's football program for the first time. He led the Bobcats to a 6-5 record in his first year. It was Texas State's first winning record as a member of the Southland Conference, the first winning season as a Division I FCS member and first winning season since 1984.

The following year, Franchione led the Bobcats to their second straight winning season, a feat that was not duplicated until Texas State had back-to-back winning seasons in 2008 and 2009.

After compiling a 13-9 record at Texas State during those two years, Franchione joined the FBS head coaching ranks for the first time when he took over New Mexico's program.

Before his arrival, New Mexico had won just 26 of its previous 106 games. During his six seasons with the Lobos, Franchione compiled an overall 33-36 record and had three winning seasons. He led the Lobos to their first winning record in 11 years with a 6-5 record in 1993.

Franchione also guided New Mexico to its first back-to-back winning campaigns since 1971 when the Lobos posted a 6-5 record in 1996 and a 9-4 mark in 1997.

The 1997 New Mexico team won the Western Athletic Conference's Mountain Division with a 7-1 league record and played in the Insight.com Bowl in 1997. It was the school's first bowl game since 1961.

While he was at New Mexico, Franchione recruited and coached future NFL Pro Bowl linebacker Brian Urlacher during his freshman and sophomore seasons in 1996 and 1997. Urlacher recorded over 102 tackles to rank second on the team in 1997.

Franchione also produced Third-Team All-American receiver Pascal Volz and a pair of WAC Offensive Players of the Year in quarterbacks Stoney Case (1994) and Graham Leigh (1997) while he was at New Mexico.

Following the Insight Bowl, Franchione moved to TCU in 1998 and quickly turned the fortunes of the school's football program.

Before his arrival, the Horned Frogs had finished the previous season with a 1-10 record. In his first year at the helm, Franchione led them to a 7-5 mark and a 28-19 victory over USC in the Sun Bowl.

The Horned Frogs scored a school-record six defensive touchdowns, intercepted 12 passes and held opponents to an average of 19.6 points per game — the lowest average in over 30 years.

His offense featured running back Basil Mitchell, who gained 1,111 yards and scored six touchdowns. Mitchell rushed for 185 yards and two touchdowns in the 28-19 win over USC.

The next season, Franchione also led TCU to the inaugural Mobile Alabama Bowl when LaDainian Tomlinson burst onto the national scene by leading the nation in rushing with 1,850 yards and 18 touchdowns on 268 carries.

The Horned Frogs posted two shutouts and led the Western Athletic Conference in every major defensive category. TCU won the WAC championship and upset No. 20 East Carolina 28-14 in the bowl game as Tomlinson ran for 124 yards and two touchdowns.

In 2000, Tomlinson was a Doak Walker Award winner and a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, Football News National Offensive Player of the Year and an unanimous All-American after running for 2,158 yards, the fourth-highest single season total in NCAA history.

He also scored 22 touchdowns as TCU finished the season with a 10-1 record, a WAC championship and a second-straight berth to the Mobile Alabama Bowl. Defensively, the Horned Frogs allowed only 245.0 total yards and 9.6 points per game, ranking first in the nation in both categories.

Following the 2000 campaign, Franchione was named the head coach at Alabama after the Crimson Tide finished the previous season with a 3-8 record. In his first season, he led the Tide to a 7-5 record and a 14-13 victory over Iowa State in the Independence Bowl, giving Alabama its first bowl victory in five years.

In 2002, he led the Crimson Tide to a 10-3 mark and placed first in the SEC West Division with a 6-2 league record. However, previous NCAA sanctions made Alabama ineligible to play in a bowl game and the SEC Championship Game. Following Alabama's victory over Hawaii at the end of the regular season, Franchione returned to the State of Texas when he was named head coach at Texas A&M.

During the next five seasons, his Aggies posted three winning records and played in three bowl games. Texas A&M finished the 2004 season with a 7-5 mark and played in the Cotton Bowl, the Aggies' first bowl game in three seasons.

His best season at the school came in 2006 when the Aggies won nine games and played in the Holiday Bowl. The next year, Texas A&M posted a 7-5 record and qualified to play in the Alamo Bowl. However, Franchione resigned as head coach prior to the bowl game and ended his tenure at the school with a 32-28 record. His recruiting classes were ranked among the Top 13 nationally from 2003-05.

Franchione also worked in broadcasting for three years prior to his return to coaching at Texas State, including two seasons as an analyst for ESPN Radio in 2008 and 2009.

Born March 28, 1951 in Girard, Kan., he is a graduate of Pittsburg State, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education and received an Alumni Meritorious Achievement Award. He and his wife, Kim, have two daughters, Ashley and Libby. He also has a son, Brad, who serves as linebackers coach and special teams coordinator for the Bobcats. Brad and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons, Wyatt and Gunnar, and a daughter, Isabella.

Franchione and Kim also formed the Coach Fran Charities, a nonprofit organization that assists children with special needs and other charitable causes.

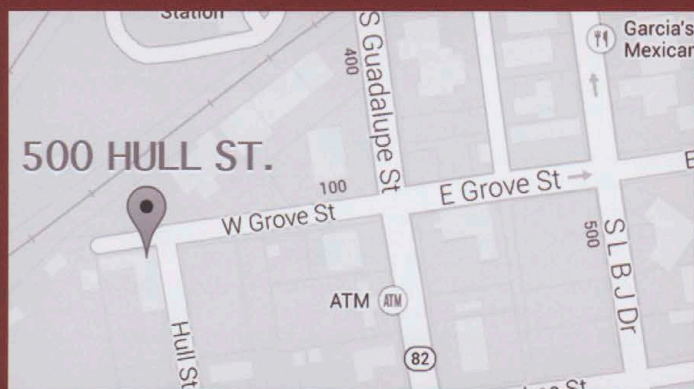

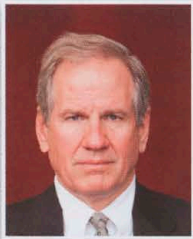

**Assistant Head Coach, Co-Offensive Coordinator,
Quarterbacks Coach
Seventh Season at Texas State
Sam Houston State, 1979**

Mike Schultz is in his fifth year as an assistant head coach, co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach and seventh season overall at Texas State after rejoining Dennis Franchione's staff in January 2011. He also served on Franchione's staff from 1990-91 at Texas State and 1992-2000 at New Mexico and TCU.

Last season, Schultz installed an up-tempo offense that produced a record-setting quarterback and one of the most improved offenses in the nation. The Bobcats ranked among the top four most improved offenses in 2015 and had one of the nation's top 24 overall offenses and top 18 rushing attacks after averaging 464.3 yards of total offense and 238.4 yards rushing per game.

Tyler Jones ranked among the nation's top 16 most accurate passers and second in Sun Belt Conference while setting a Texas State single season record after completing 65.4 percent (246-378-7) of his passes for 2,670 yards and 22 touchdowns as a sophomore.

In addition, Texas State produced its first 1,000-yard rusher since 2009 when Robert Lowe ranked fifth in the SBC with 1,091 yards and 12 touchdowns on 185 carries. The Bobcats also had another top 10 rusher in the SBC with Terrence Franks running for 712 yards and eight touchdowns on 107 carries.

Jones broke the previous school record that was set in 2012 by Shaun Rutherford when he had a completion percentage of 64.5 percent.

Schultz's first stint under Franchione came at Texas State in 1990-91 when he served as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator for the Bobcats.

He followed Franchione to New Mexico, where he was the assistant head coach and secondary coach from 1992-95. He moved over to offense as the assistant head coach and running backs coach for the Lobos in 1996 before following Franchione to TCU in 1998, where he was the co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach for the next three seasons.

From 2001-06, he served as TCU's offensive coordinator and running backs coach under Gary Patterson before serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach with the Horned Frogs in 2007-08.

The Horned Frogs set single-season school records for points scored (420) and touchdowns (54) in 2008. They also led the nation in time of possession (35:05) and ranked 13th nationally in team rushing (215.7 yards per game). The Frogs were second in the Mountain West Conference in total offense (417.1 yards per game) and third in scoring offense (35.0 points per game). TCU totaled at least 410 yards of offense in eight of 12 games.

In 2007, Schultz helped mentor Frog signal caller Andy Dalton to Freshman All-America honors. Dalton set single-season TCU records for pass completions (222) and attempts (371) while placing second in yards (2,459) and fourth in completion percentage (59.8).

Four of the seven highest-scoring teams in TCU history came under Schultz's direction. TCU's running attack ranked ninth nationally in 2006 with 194.6 yards per game and the Horned Frogs were 17th in total offense (408.5 ypg).

In 2004, the Horned Frogs were among the nation's Top 20 teams in scoring, total and passing offense. TCU ranked fourth nationally in rushing offense with 275.6 yards per game in 2000, and was one of just six schools to average over 200 yards rushing and 200 yards passing in 2003.

As running backs coach, Schultz coached Aaron Brown, the 2005 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year and five 1,000-yard rushers at TCU after the Horned Frogs had just four 1,000-yard rushers in more than 100 years prior to his arrival. The five included Lonta Hobbs, Robert Merrill, LaDainian Tomlinson (twice) and Basil Mitchell.

Tomlinson was a two-time NCAA rushing champ, leading the country with 1,850 yards in 1999 and a school record 2,158 in 2000. He earned All-American honors, was a Heisman Trophy finalist and the winner of the Doak Walker National Running Back Award before being selected fifth overall in the 2000 NFL Draft and earning NFL MVP honors in 2006.

Schultz began his coaching career at his alma mater, Sam Houston State, in 1979. He served as recruiting coordinator and coached linebackers one season and was the quarterbacks and receivers coach the next year.

He also was a recruiting coordinator and coached receivers and tight ends at UTEP and coached tight ends Kansas State before joining Fred Akers' staff at Texas for the 1985 season.

Following the 1985 season, Schultz was an assistant coach and handled defensive coordinator responsibilities at Westwood High School in Round Rock for four years before joining Dennis Franchione's staff at Texas State in 1990.

Schultz also was the the offensive coordinator and tight ends coach at Illinois in 2009 and offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Middle Tennessee State in 2010 before returning to Texas State.

Schultz and his wife, Cindy, have three daughters, Taylor, Kendall and Jordan.



JEFF CONWAY

**Co-Offensive Coordinator,
Running Backs Coach
Fourth Season at Texas State
Northwest Missouri State, 1981**

Jeff Conway enters his fourth season as the co-offensive coordinator, running backs and tight ends coach at Texas State after coaching two of the top 10 rushing leaders in the Sun Belt Conference during each of the last two seasons and producing a pair of All-Conference players in his first three years.

Last season, *Phil Steele* and *College Sports Madness* named Robert Lowe an All-SBC Third-Team selection after he became the first Bobcat since 2009 to rush over 1,000 yards when he ranked fifth among league leaders with 1,091 yards and 12 touchdowns on 185 carries. Terrence Franks also ranked 10th among SBC rushing leaders with 712 yards and eight TDs on 107 carries.

In 2013, Lowe earned All-SBC Second-Team honors after ranking second among league leaders with 945 yards and nine touchdowns on 164 carries. Chris Nutall also gained 477 yards and scored six TDs on 83 carries to rank 10th among league leaders.

In his first season, Conway tutored Second-Team All-WAC tight end Chase Harper, who finished the season second among Bobcat reception leaders with 28 catches for 315 catches and three touchdowns.

In addition, running back Marcus Curry was an Honorable Mention All-WAC selection after leading the Bobcats in rushing with 685 yards and 10 touchdowns on 113 carries in 2012.

He also coaches kickoff returns on special teams and has produced two of the top kick returners in the nation each of the last two seasons. In 2013, record-setting Brandon Smith ranked fifth nationally after averaging 29.9 yards per return and tied a NCAA record when he returned two kickoffs for touchdowns in the same game at UL Lafayette. In 2012, Jafus Gaines led the WAC in kickoff returns and ranked 10th nationally with 28.9 yards per return.

Conway came to Texas State after serving as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach at Sam Houston State during the two previous seasons when the Bearkats posted a combined record of 20-6.

In 2011, Sam Houston State was a Division I FCS Finalist and ended the season ranked No. 2 nationally with a 14-1 overall record. The Bearkats also won the Southland Conference with a 7-0 league record.

One of his receivers at Sam Houston State was 2011 SLC Offensive Player of the Year Richard Sincere, who caught 25 passes for 449 yards and rushed 120 times for 965 yards and nine touchdowns when lining up behind center in the "Wild Bearkat" formation.

Conway went to Sam Houston State after serving as the associate head coach and wide receivers coach at Central Missouri for six seasons.

During that span, the Mules compiled a 41-24 record, including an 8-3 mark in 2009. Central Missouri also had four seven-win campaigns in 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008.

He also worked six seasons as a special teams and recruiting coordinator at New Mexico, where he began his tenure coaching tight ends in 1998-99, running backs in 2000-01 and wide receivers from 2002-03.

During the 2001 season, New Mexico enjoyed its best season in four years as the Lobos averaged 191 yards rushing per game and produced a NFL Draft selection, Jarrod Baxter.

Conway went to New Mexico from Blinn College, where he was a first-year head coach in 1997 and led the Buccaneers to an 8-3 record and a No. 14 national ranking.

He was named head coach after serving as the offensive coordinator for four seasons when Blinn posted a 47-8-1 record, won 26 consecutive games and won back-to-back national championships in 1995 and 1996.

Conway also served as the offensive coordinator at Missouri Western State in 1991 and 1992 after serving in the same capacity at Houston's North Shore High School in 1990.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater, Northwest Missouri State, in the spring of 1984 before moving to Sam Houston State as a wide receivers coach in 1984-85. The Bearkats finished 8-3 both seasons and won a Gulf Star Conference championship. He also served as a quarterbacks and receivers coach at Lamar from 1986-89.

Conway is a 1981 graduate of Northwest Missouri State where he earned his bachelor's degree in finance and played football as a free safety from 1978 to 1981. He was named an All-Conference selection as a senior. A native of Knoxville, Iowa, Conway and his wife, Jolene, have three daughters - Callie, Patsy and Bobbi.

BRAD FRANCHIONE

Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers Coach
Fifth Season at Texas State
New Mexico, 1996

Brad Franchione takes over as defensive coordinator during the 2015 season after serving as linebackers coach and special teams coordinator since 2011. Last season, he coached Texas State's first FBS All-American, top two leading tacklers on the team and an All-Sun Belt Conference punter in 2014. In addition, he produced an NFL Draft selection and NFL free agent signee last year.

David Mayo was named a Fourth-Team All-American linebacker by *Phil Steele* and the unanimous SBC Defensive Player of the Year after ranking second nationally in tackles and leading the SBC with 12.8 tackles per game. His overall total of 154 tackles tied a SBC record and ranked third in school history for most tackles in a single season. He also was the only FBS player last season and the first SBC player in league history to record 20 or more tackles in two games during the same season. His 22 tackles at UL Monroe were the highest single-game total in the nation in 2014.

In addition, Trey McGowan joined Mayo as a starting linebacker in seven games and ranked second on the team with 80 tackles while playing in 11 contests as a junior.

Will Johnson was named an All-SBC Second Team punter by both *College Sports Madness* and *Phil Steele* after ranking second among league leaders and 21st nationally with an average of 43.8 yards on 65 punts. He placed 21 punts inside the 20, had 16 punts over 50 yards with four resulting in a touchback. Johnson also converted 11 of his 15 field goal attempts and averaged 63.4 yards on 71 kickoffs with 46 resulting in touchbacks throughout the season.

Last spring, Mayo was selected by Carolina in the fifth round of the 2015 NFL Draft and Johnson signed with the Houston Texans after the Draft.

Franchione also produced a pair of All-SBC linebackers in 2013 as *Phil Steele* chose both Mayo and Michael Orakpo as All-SBC Second-Team selections. In addition, Mayo was tabbed an All-SBC Second-Team selection by *College Sports Madness*.

In 2012, Texas State's special teams were ranked fourth nationally overall by *Phil Steele*. com and Johnson set a school record for the longest field goal made for the second straight year.

As a team, Texas State ranked eighth nationally and second in the WAC in net punting with an average of 40.5 yards per punt. The Bobcats also ranked third nationally and led the WAC in punt returns.

Franchione also coached Second-Team All-WAC linebacker Joplo Bartu, who is in his third season with the Atlanta Falcons after leading the Bobcats in tackles. He ranked sixth in the WAC in tackles, second in tackles for loss and fifth in sacks.

Franchione came to Texas State after serving six seasons as the head coach at Blinn College, where he guided his teams to two national championships and three Top-10 NJCAA finishes while compiling a 54-13 career record. He also led the Buccaneers to three Southwest Junior College Football Conference championships and four overall bowl appearances.

Blinn won its first national title and a Southwest Junior College Conference championship under his direction during his second season as a head coach and defensive coordinator in 2006 when the Buccaneers finished the season with a 12-0 record and boasted the nation's top defensive unit.

Following the season, Franchione was named the SWJFCF Coach of the Year, the American Football Monthly Schutt Sports Coach of the Year and the inaugural Sportex® Football Coach of the Year.

In 2009, Franchione was named the American Community College Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year after leading Blinn to another national title with an 11-1 record. In 2010, Franchione led the team to an 8-3 record and a victory in the Heart of Texas Bowl.

Throughout his tenure at Blinn, Franchione coached four NFL Players. They included Carolina's Cam Newton, who was the top overall player selected in the 2011 NFL Draft, James Johnson and Bernard Scott, and Ryan Mouton. He also coached 19 NJCAA All-Americans and 85 total players who went on to play in NCAA Division I schools.

Three of his players included Terrance Cain, the 2008 NJCAA Offensive Player of the Year; Scott, the 2008 Harlan Hill Trophy winner and Newton, who was named the 2010 *Associated Press* College Football Player of the Year and winner of the 2010 Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Trophy, Davey O'Brien Award and Manning Award.

Franchione went to Blinn after serving one season as the defensive line coach at Texas A&M-Commerce. There, he also served as the program's academic, travel and video coordinator.

He also was an associate head coach and defensive coordinator at Bacone College in Muskogee, Okla., in 2003-04. He went to Bacone after serving as a linebackers coach, kickoff team coach and recruiting coordinator at Tennessee-Martin in 2002.

Franchione also coached linebackers at West Alabama in 2001-02 when he coached the linebackers, punt team and kickoff team. He gained additional coaching experience at East Central University (in Ada, Okla.) and at Fort Scott Community College in Kansas.

Franchione began his coaching career as a student coach assisting with the secondary at New Mexico from 1992-96 and was a graduate assistant coach at Arkansas State from 1996-98.

He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at New Mexico in 1996 and master of science degree in education at Arkansas State in 1998.

He and his wife, Rebecca, have two sons Wyatt and Gunnar, and a daughter, Isabella.



ASHLEY AMBROSE

Cornerbacks Coach
First Season at Texas State
Colorado, 2009

Former NFL standout player and veteran coach Ashley Ambrose is in his first season as the cornerbacks coach at Texas State after serving in the same capacity at Idaho during the 2014 season and previously as a secondary coach at California and Colorado.

Ambrose played 13 seasons in the NFL with Indianapolis (1992-95), Cincinnati (1996-98), Atlanta (2000-02) and New Orleans (1999, 2003-04).

He began his collegiate coaching career at Colorado in 2008 as a defensive technical intern before serving as a receivers coach in 2009 and defensive backs coach in 2010. Ambrose also served as a secondary coach at California during the 2011 and 2012 campaigns.

During his lone season working with Colorado's defensive backs in 2010, Ambrose coached senior Jimmy Smith to All-Big 12 First-Team honors.

Smith was a first-round selection (No. 27 pick overall) by Baltimore in the 2011 NFL Draft.

Another cornerback, Jalil Brown, earned All-Big 12 Honorable Mention honors and tied Smith with five pass breakups before being selected by Kansas City in the fourth round of the 2011 NFL Draft.

While at Cal, Ambrose coached a pair of first-time All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention selections in Josh Hill and Steve Williams.

In addition, both safeties that Ambrose coached in 2011, D. J. Campbell and Sean Cattouse, earned All-Pac-12 honors before moving on to the NFL with Carolina and San Diego, respectively.

Cal's defensive backs recorded 10 of the team's 12 interceptions in 2011 and 12 of the team's 14 interceptions in 2012.

As an NFL player, Ambrose was the 1996 AFC's Defensive Back of the Year and an All-Pro selection after recording a career-best eight interceptions with the Bengals. His eight interceptions tied for second among NFL leaders, and were one back of the league leaders.

He ended his career with 42 interceptions, 35 pass breakups and returned three interceptions for touchdowns. He also had 178 passes defended and 514 tackles (464 solo).

Overall, Ambrose played in 192 games and made 141 NFL starts before retiring after the 2004 season. Following his playing career, Ambrose began his coaching career as an intern with the Falcons in 2006 and was a minority intern with New Orleans in 2013.

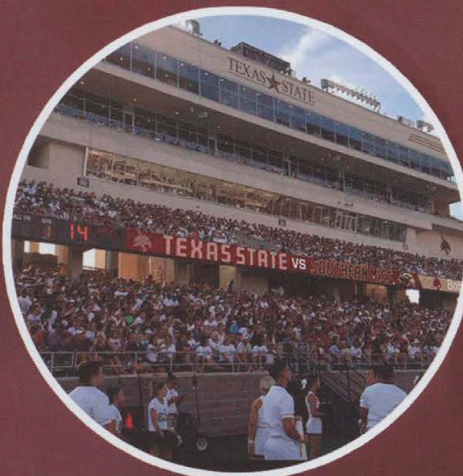

Offensive Line Coach
Second Season at Texas State
Colorado, 2009

Brad Bedell begins his second season as the offensive line coach at Texas State after producing a trio of All-Sun Belt Conference players in 2014.

Adrian Bellard, who is on the 2015 preseason watch lists for the Outland and Rotary Lombardi Awards, earned All-SBC Second-Team honors.

Charlie Will Tuttle was named to the All-SBC Third Team by *Phil Steele* and Ryan Melton was chosen as an Honorable Mention All-SBC team by league coaches and media representatives.

Bedell joined Texas State's staff in 2014 after serving in the same capacity at Arkansas State, where he produced a pair of All-Sun Belt Conference Second-Team offensive linemen in sophomore Bryce Giddens and senior Steven Haunga in 2013. Giddens was also on the Rimington Trophy watch list.

The Red Wolves won their third straight SBC title and won the GoDaddy.com Bowl for the second straight year. His offensive line also paved the way for an offense that averaged 407.8 yards in total offense, including 205.7 yards rushing per game. The Red Wolves also ran for 31 touchdowns and had five different players rush for over 100 yards in a game.

Bedell went to Arkansas State after serving as an assistant coach at New Mexico State in 2012, where he tutored All-Western Athletic Conference lineman Davonte Wallace.

In addition, his line helped the New Mexico State's offense compile 4,024 yards total offense that included 1,171 yards on the ground.

Prior to joining New Mexico State's staff, he was the offensive line coach and run game coordinator at UC Davis in 2011.

There, he coached two First-Team All-Great West Conference offensive linemen Sean Davies and Ray Wilburn.

He went to UC-Davis after spending the 2010 campaign as the offensive line coach at Northern Colorado. In his lone season with the Bears, Northern Colorado averaged 357.8 yards of total offense and ranked 31st nationally with 227.0 passing yards.

He also produced a pair of All-Big Sky linemen in tackle Lee Barbiasz and center Tim McGraw. Bedell began his coaching career at his alma mater, Colorado, where he served as an offensive intern from 2007-09. He joined the Buffaloes' staff after playing six years in the NFL with the Houston Texas in 2006, Green Bay Packers in 2004 and 2005, Miami in 2003 and Cleveland in 2000 and 2001. He played in 40 NFL games and made four starts during his pro career.

Bedell began his professional career after being named a First-Team All-American by the Football Writers Association of America as a senior at Colorado, where he was a two-year letterman as an offensive guard in 1998 and 1999. The Associated Press also selected him as a Second-Team All-America selection by the Associated Press and he earned First-Team All-Big 12 as a senior. He used a medical redshirt in 1997 after a neck injury sidelined him following the second game of the season.

He went to Colorado after playing two seasons at Mt. San Antonio College in 1995 and 1996. As a sophomore, he did not allow a sack all year and drew only one penalty while leading the Mounties to an 8-2 record and a victory over Chaffey College in the Southern California Bowl. He also earned First-Team All-America honors and was rated as the 1996 top junior college offensive lineman and the nation's No. 4 overall junior college recruit.

Born Feb. 12, 1977, he and his wife, Jessica, have a son, Walker.



MIKE HUDSON

Defensive Line Coach
17th Season at Texas State
22nd Season Overall
UTSA, 1994

Mike Hudson enters his fifth season as the defensive line coach at Texas State and 18th season overall as an assistant coach with the Bobcats after coaching a group of defensive ends that accumulated 142 tackles, 21 tackle for losses, 14 sacks and 12 quarterback hurries in 2014.

Last season, Hudson coached Michael Odiari, who was named an All-Sun Belt Conference First-Team defensive end after ranking second in the league with 9.0 sacks and fifth in tackle for losses with 13.0. He also was third among team leaders with 73 tackles and led the Bobcats with seven quarterback hurries.

In 2013, Hudson tutored a group of defensive ends that totaled 77 tackles, including 48 solo stops and 10 tackle for losses, seven quarterback sacks and six quarterback hurries. Odiari was named an All-SBC Third-Team selection by *College Sports Madness* after recording three sacks, three quarterback hurries and breaking up two passes.

In 2012, Hudson tutored Joplo Bartu, who earned Second-Team All-WAC honors as a defensive end and linebacker before playing in the NFL with the Atlanta Falcons in 2013 and 2014.

In 2011, he coached a pair of All-Independent Team players in Michael Ebbitt and Jordan Norfleet.

Ebbitt was selected as the Independent Team's Defensive Player of the Year after recording 11.5 sacks and 15.5 tackles for losses. He also recovered two fumbles and returned one 63 yards for a touchdown. Norfleet added 2.5 sacks and led the team with six quarterback hurries.

Hudson returned to Texas State as an assistant coach for the third time in his career in 2011 after serving on the staff at Montana for six seasons.

He coached several positions during his six-year stint at Montana. He spent the 2010 season coaching linebackers after serving as Montana's secondary coach for two seasons.

He also was the football director of operations in 2009, and was Montana's associate head coach while coaching running backs and secondary from 2005-08. During his tenure there, the Grizzlies were FCS Playoff finalists in 2008 and 2009. Montana also won or shared the Big Sky Conference from 2005-09.

In 2010, he coached All-Big Sky Conference linebacker Caleb McSurdy after producing a pair of all-conference defensive backs Shann Schillinger and Trumaine Johnson in 2009.

Hudson went to Montana from Sam Houston State, where he was the defensive coordinator in 2003 and 2004 after serving one year as a defensive line coach. While at Sam Houston State, the Bearkats advanced to the semifinals of the 2004 NCAA FCS Playoffs.

Hudson began his collegiate coaching career as a student coach at Texas State in 1987 and also served as a graduate assistant coach, working full time with the defensive line in 1990 and 1991 under Dennis Franchione.

He also was the linebackers coach at Texas State from 1995-2002, and produced Second-Team All-Americans Ypres Thomas in 1995 and Myron Coleman in 2000 and Greg Pitts in 2002. Pitts also was a Third-Team All-American in 2001.

Hudson also served as defensive coordinator during the last two seasons. In addition to his coaching duties, he handled numerous administrative responsibilities that included serving as the liaison for academics and student services, study hall and summer school coordinator and the director of football camps.

In between his first two stints at Texas State, Hudson was an assistant coach at Trinity University in San Antonio for two seasons before rejoining Franchione as the defensive line coach at New Mexico in 1994.

Hudson earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology at UTSA in 1994. Born in Bryan, Texas and raised in San Antonio, Hudson played collegiate football at Angelo State University in 1983 and 1984. The Rams won a Lone Star Conference championship in 1984.

He and his wife, Dyan, have two children, Lee and Loryn.

Fifth Season at Texas State
Eighth Season Overall
Western Kentucky, 2002

Jason Johnson is in his fifth season as an assistant coach at Texas State after his wide receivers combined to catch 144 passes for 1,563 yards and 13 touchdowns in 2014.

C. J. Best was named to the Sun Belt Conference All-Newcomer team after logging 37 receptions for 355 yards and two TDs. Brandon Smith also caught 36 passes and ranked second on the team with 414 receiving yards, while Ben Ijah caught 27 passes for 289 yards and three TDs. Jafus Gaines added 22 catches for 289 yards and a team-high of four TD receptions.

In 2013, two of his players, Isaiah Battle and Andy Erickson, led the Bobcats with 27 catches and Smith added 22 receptions for 241 yards and two touchdowns as a sophomore.

Johnson's receiving corps registered 139 receptions for 1592 yards and eight touchdowns in 2012 and caught 89 passes for 1,102 yard and nine touchdowns in 2011.

Johnson came to Texas State after serving as the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kentucky State in 2010. While at Kentucky State, Johnson produced one of the top five receivers in the Southern Intercollegiate Conference who was named a Second-Team All-Conference performer.

He went to Kentucky State after serving three seasons on the coaching staff at Sul Ross State. He was the quarterbacks coach in 2009 when he produced an Honorable Mention All-Conference performer after coaching the wide receivers in 2008 and serving as a graduate assistant coach in 2007.

Johnson began his coaching career at Bacone College in Oklahoma as a wide receivers coach in 2002 and a quarterbacks coach in 2003.

The Texas State University System has a long and illustrious history in Texas. In fact, it is the oldest and third largest higher education system in the Lone Star State.

Beginning as an administrative means to consolidate the support and management of state teacher colleges, the System has evolved into a network of higher education institutions stretching from the Texas–Louisiana border to the Big Bend region of far West Texas.

Today, eight System components offer a broad range of academic and career pathways. Throughout the System are professionals committed to preparing students for working and contributing to an increasingly global society.

The academic and professional programs offered help students learn to make sound decisions in life and to become contributors in their communities. Each university, college and institute within The Texas State University System is unique.

The member institutions are Texas State University, Sam Houston State University, Lamar University, Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College–Orange, Lamar State College–Port Arthur, Sul Ross State University and Sul Ross State University Rio Grande College.

The Texas State University System is governed by a nine-member Board of Regents appointed by the Governor. In addition, a nonvoting student regent is appointed annually to the Board. The administration, which is headed by a board-appointed Chancellor, is based in Austin where it provides support to the System components and state government.

Brian McCall, Ph.D., is chancellor of the Texas State University System, the first university system established in Texas, comprising eight institutions with more than 81,000 students and 15,000 faculty and staff.

Dr. McCall previously served in the Texas House of Representatives, first elected in 1991 to represent the areas of North Dallas, Frisco, Allen, and Plano. As a representative, he served as chairman of the House Calendars Committee and as a member of the Higher Education Committee. *Texas Monthly* named McCall one of the “10 Best” legislators of the 2009 session.

McCall wrote and passed one of the largest tax-cut bills in the history of Texas and during his last session secured \$5 million in funding for The University of Texas at Dallas’ Center for Values and Medicine. Other legislative accomplishments include authoring and passing key bills in the areas of health care, biotechnology, high technology, identity theft, and tax and budget policy.

McCall serves on the Board of Legacy Texas Financial Group (NASDAQ: LTXB) and as

chairman of Texas’ Council of Public University Presidents and Chancellors (CPUPC), a position to which he was elected by the state’s 38 public university presidents and six chancellors.

McCall was president of Westminster Capital Corporation, an investment firm focused on acquisitions primarily in software and technology. He and his brother, David, operate Snow Hill Farm north of Dallas.

McCall holds a bachelor’s degree from Baylor University, a master’s degree from Southern Methodist University, spent a year as a visiting post-graduate student at Oxford University, and earned a doctor of philosophy degree from The University of Texas at Dallas.

McCall is the author of *The Power of the Texas Governor: Connally to Bush*, published by University of Texas Press, which examines how various governors have overcome the institutional limitations of the office to achieve significant political power.

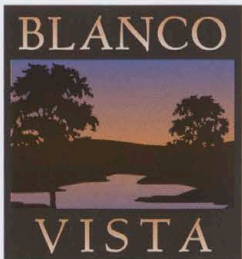
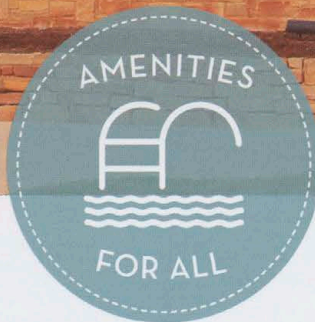
A long-time civic and community volunteer, McCall is founder and chairman of the board of The Empowerment Project, a non-profit organization which has sent more than \$10 million worth of math and science books to disadvantaged schools in the Republic of South Africa, and helped construct a library in Vietnam through the Libraries of Love organization. The Empowerment Project also raised more than \$350,000 to provide direct support for the medical needs of children in north Texas.

McCall is the recipient of the 2012 Distinguished Alumni Award from The University of Texas at Dallas, is a member of The Philosophical Society of Texas, and serves on the Board of Directors of ZACH Theater in Austin.

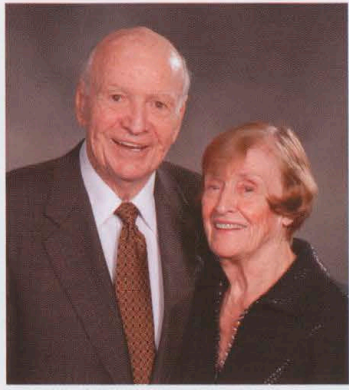

Since Denise M. Trauth was named the ninth president at Texas State University in June 2002, the university has achieved many milestones, including:

- Obtaining recognition of Texas State as an Emerging Research University.
- Leading the transition of the Texas State's athletics program into the ranks of Division I FBS football and the Sun Belt Conference.
- Increasing the diversity of the student body. The university became a Hispanic Serving Institution in fall 2010; forty-eight percent of Texas State students self-designate as non-white, international, or other.
- Increasing enrollment every fall (38,006 for fall 2015), making Texas State one of the 35 largest public universities in the U. S. and the fourth largest Texas university.
- Raising over \$151 million in the Pride in Action campaign, significantly exceeding its \$110 million goal.
- Attracting the largest private gift in university history, \$20 million from Emmett and Miriam McCoy of San Marcos to support the college of business administration that now bears the couple's names.
- Obtaining major gifts from Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields totaling over \$12 million, including more than \$8 million to athletics, which honored them with their name on the West Side Complex of Bobcat Stadium.
- Creating the PACE Center which is an innovative Personalized Academic and Career Exploration Center that helps freshmen clarify their career goals and establish a specific educational plan to achieve those goals.
- Obtaining a gift of 101 acres of prime land from the Avery Family for the University's Round Rock Campus. The first building, the Avery Building, opened in 2005, and the second, the Nursing Building, opened in 2010.
- Gaining approval for a bachelor's degree in nursing, launched by a \$6 million gift from the St. David's Foundation, now enrolling 200 upper-level nursing students, and a Master of Science in Nursing program with a Family Nurse Practitioner major, launched by a \$2 million gift from the St. David's Foundation.
- Creating the Ingram School of Engineering which was made possible through \$9 million in gifts from Bruce and Gloria Ingram, including \$4 million for scholarships.
- Expanding the Wittliff Collections, including a permanent exhibition room for the Lonesome Dove Collection and the acquisition of the Cormac McCarthy Papers.
- Constructing a new Performing Arts Center, launched by an \$8 million gift from Patti Strickel Harrison.



The Terry Foundation, founded by Houston philanthropists Howard and Nancy Terry, have funded over \$9 million in scholarships to Texas State students.

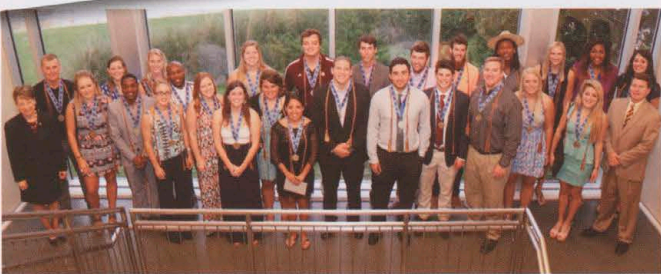
- Constructing other campus facilities including Bobcat Stadium's North Side Complex, the Undergraduate Academic Center, the Chautauqua/Gaillardia Housing Complex, the Falls/Sayers Housing Complex, STAR Park (a technology accelerator for start-up and early-stage businesses), Bobcat Baseball/Softball Stadium improvements, Bobcat Track and Field Stadium, the Student Recreation Center expansion, Concho Green, improvements to the North LBJ bus loop, San Jacinto residence hall, the Student Health Center, the Mitte Complex, expansion of Strahan Coliseum, McCoy Hall and its parking garage, the Speck Street, Matthews Street, and Edward Gary Street parking garages, the Family and Consumer Sciences Building Expansion, the Housing and Residential Life Building, and the Nursing Building in Round Rock.
- Increasing the number of full-time faculty from 694 to more than 1,700.
- Expanding Curriculum, including the addition of seven doctoral programs: in aquatic resources; mathematics education; criminal justice; developmental education; and materials science, engineering, and commercialization; an Ed.D. program in developmental education; and a doctor of physical therapy program.
- Initiating the Common Experience, which is an annual campus-wide focus for classroom discussion, performing arts, exhibitions, invited speakers, and community involvement. This year's theme is "Bridged Through Stories: Shared Heritage of the United States

and Mexico." The theme is a tribute to Dr. Tomás Rivera, a Distinguished Alumnus of Texas State University.

- Obtaining a \$5 million dollar gift from the St. David's Foundation and authorization from the Texas Legislature for \$48.6 million to help fund the construction of a new health professions building on the Round Rock Campus. The St. David's gift is eligible for a \$5 million dollar match under a state program that supports emerging research universities.
- Obtaining gifts valued at \$7.1 million dollars from Gloria and Bruce Ingram to help fund the construction of a new engineering and science building on the San Marcos Campus. The Ingrams' gift is eligible for a \$5 million dollar match under a state program that supports emerging research universities.
- Receiving a \$15 million dollar NASA award for STEM Collaboration between Education and Engineering to support teacher training; the largest grant received by Texas State.
- Creating STAR Park which is a research facility and small business incubator that spurs innovations and commercialization by encouraging partnerships between the university and private companies in Science, Technology, and Advanced Research (STAR).

In addition to her on-campus responsibilities, President Trauth is a member and former president of the Austin Area Research Organization, serves on the Board of Trustees of the Southwest Research Institute, is a member of the Philosophical Society of Texas, and currently serves as President of the Sun Belt Conference. She also serves on the executive board of the Greater San Marcos Partnership and the E3 Alliance Board. She received the Austin Business Journal's Special Achievement Award and the Girl Scouts' Women of Distinction Award in 2011, and was the "Respect" Award Recipient for the First Tee Greater Austin 9 Core Values Awards 2012.

She is married to Dr. John Huffman, professor emeritus at Bowling Green and UNC Charlotte. They have two daughters and four grandchildren.

Fundraising efforts have generated record-setting campaigns in each of the past six years and Texas State enters its third season as a member of the Sun Belt Conference after joining the FBS ranks as a member of the WAC in 2012-13.

The Bobcats joined the FBS after claiming three Southland Conference Commissioner's Cups and six SLC women's all-sports trophies in eight years. In his tenure, Texas State has won 23 conference championships and 14 conference tournament titles.

In addition, over 360 student-athletes have earned a bachelor's degree and over 850 attained a grade point average of 3.0 or higher during the last five years. This past year, the Bobcats had five teams post perfect APR scores for the second straight year. In addition, Texas State's women's golf and tennis teams were publicly recognized by the NCAA for ranking among the Top 10 percent of their sports with multi-year APR rates for the four-year period ending in 2013-14, for the sixth straight year.

The new and renovated facilities include a redesigned court and new seating in Strahan Coliseum, new practice courts for the basketball and volleyball teams, and construction and grand opening of new Bobcat baseball and softball stadiums. In addition, the Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields West Side Complex, which includes 15 luxury suites and 450 club seats, a new playing surface and a new \$33-million North Side Complex were added to Bobcat Stadium to increase the seating capacity to 30,000. The first home game in the new stadium against Texas Tech saw a record crowd of 33,006 thanks to temporary seating in the south end zone for the game. The Bobcats played in front of eight of their 10 largest crowds at Bobcat Stadium during the past two seasons.

A new track stadium was built and Texas State's

track and field teams have new coaching offices, locker rooms, weight room and training room. The Bobcat Tennis Complex features new covered seating, a new \$1 million indoor facility and a new locker room, while the soccer stadium includes a new locker room, weight room and training room.

Since 2008, Texas State Athletics has received two million-dollar gifts with Jerry and Linda Fields donating \$6 million to the program in 2009 after providing a gift of \$100,000 to help fund Texas State's football season tickets drive for the 2008 season. The first \$1 million gift to the department came from Darren B. Casey in 2008. Those donations combined with record-setting corporate sponsorships and the student government approving an athletic fee helped Texas State move to the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

Citing his leadership skills, experience and values as elements that made him the right fit for the position, Texas State President Denise M. Trauth named Teis the Bobcats' eighth director of athletics in March 2004.

A member of Texas State's athletic administration since January 1999, he serves on the President's Council and reports directly to President Trauth.

Teis was honored as the 2005-06 General Sports TURF Systems AD of the Year Division I-AA West Region Winner, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. In 2007, he was honored by the All-American Football Foundation with the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award.

He assumed his current position after serving as associate athletic director for external affairs, and oversaw game management, marketing, promotions, facilities and ticket sales. Teis also was the administrator for the men's and women's golf, baseball and volleyball teams as well as the Strutters. In addition, he oversaw the Bobcat Athletic Foundation from 1998-02.

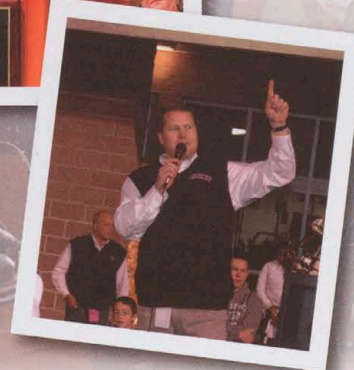
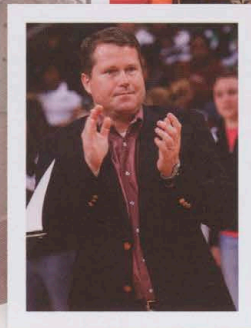
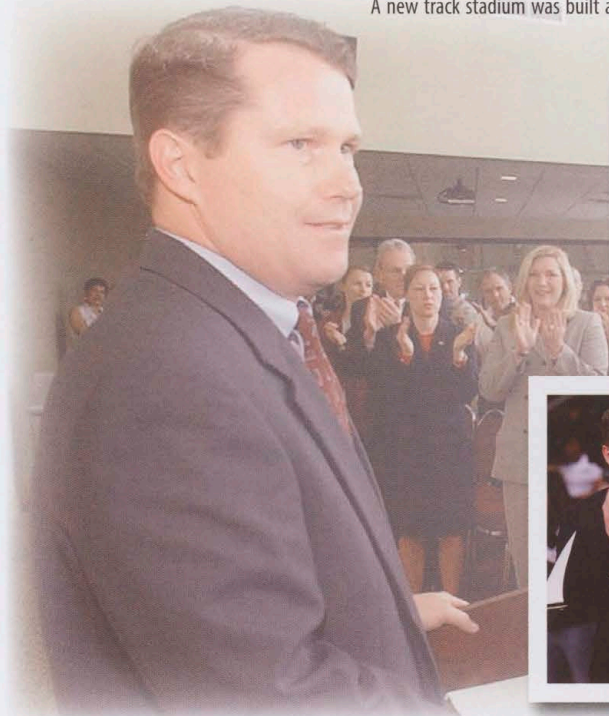
A native of Fort Worth, Teis came to Texas State after spending four years as the director of athletic marketing at TCU, where he developed the marketing plan for all sports that included facility signage, season ticket campaigns, game day operations and corporate sponsorships.

Prior to his tenure at TCU, Teis was the assistant director of New Mexico's Lobo Club for three years.

Teis is an active member of the local community, including serving on the board of directors and as a past chair of the San Marcos Convention and Visitors Bureau.

He holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from TCU, a master's in sports administration from St. Thomas University of Miami, Fla., and a doctorate in health, physical education and recreation with an emphasis in sports administration from the University of New Mexico.

Teis and his wife, Jana, have two daughters, Taylor and Shelby, who are both students at Texas State.

BOBCAT STADIUM

Bobcat Stadium was built in 1981, and is the home of Bobcat Football. With recent additions including the Jerry D. and Linda Gregg Fields West Side Complex and the North Side Complex, Bobcat Stadium has elevated to one of the best 30,000-seat stadiums in the country.

The End Zone Complex was completed and dedicated in 2002. The facility, located in the south end zone of Bobcat Stadium, houses the athletic program's football operations. The Football End Zone Complex also has a full service training center, meeting rooms and coaching staff offices.

In 2003, the playing field in Bobcat Stadium was named Jim Wacker Field to honor Texas State's former football coach and director of athletics. Wacker coached the Bobcat football team from 1979-82. His 42-8 record in the span is the best four-year mark in school history. He led the Bobcats to back-to-back NCAA Division II national championships in 1981 and 1982. His 1982 team finished the season 14-0, and he was named College Division Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association. He also served as director of athletics at Texas State (then Southwest Texas State) from 1998-01. He passed away on Aug. 26, 2003 after a lengthy battle with cancer.

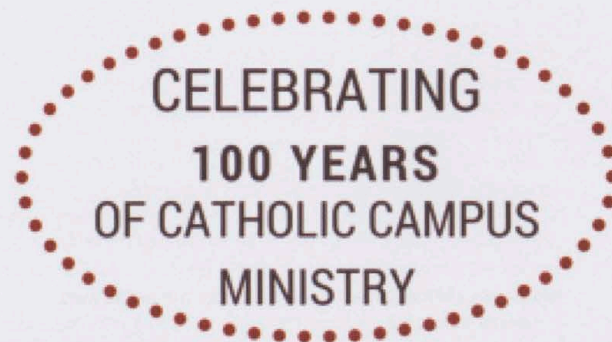

SUN BELT CONFERENCE

Is the Sun Belt Conference a modern-day fixture among the decision-makers in the ever-changing world of college athletics?

Or is the league a long-time innovator, responsible for advancements in many sports that we now take for granted?

Is the Sun Belt home of an alumni base that includes national and international leaders in the areas of government, business and entertainment as well as athletics?

Or is the conference one that has established itself as a national contender in a variety of sports, and one that continues to evolve in ways that directly benefit its institutions and more importantly its student-athletes?

The answer is yes, yes, and yes.

The Sun Belt Conference's "Together We Rise" motto isn't just hyperbole. It's proven fact on many different levels, not the least being its place in the hierarchy of collegiate athletics. As the league prepares to celebrate four decades since its founding in 1976, the Sun Belt occupies a "seat at the table" as a permanent part of the NCAA's 24-member Board of Directors.

That alone insures that the conference has a voice in determining the future as college sports continues to change and evolve.

Changing and evolving have been hallmarks of the league since its existence. College basketball might be a shadow of its current self had the Sun Belt not led the way in the establishment of the shot clock. The conference also wrote history at the start of the century when it inaugurated football as a league sport – becoming the first already-existing Division I conference to take such action.

The Sun Belt was originally founded to give home to some of the nation's premier mid-major basketball teams, and the league's history is dotted with success in many different men's and women's sports through its history. But when the desire for a higher national profile and the desire of its membership brought about football sponsorship in 2001, the conference was figuratively reborn, and now stands as one of the 10 premier college football leagues in the country.

And, with the recent debut of the College Football Playoff, the Sun Belt is guaranteed universal access based strictly on performance. A worthy football team in the Sun Belt can be in the national championship picture, and the league is a permanent part of the "Group of Five" conferences (joining the American Athletic Conference, the Mountain West Conference, the Mid-American Conference and Conference USA) that will send its highest-rated champion to a premier Jan. 1 bowl game.

In only 15 years of football, the Sun Belt has earned ties to no fewer than seven bowl games. In addition to the potential of the College Football Playoff, the league has guaranteed spots in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, the GoDaddy Bowl, the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl and the new Cure Bowl for bowl-eligible teams each and every season. Beginning in 2016, the Sun Belt will also be part of a conference rotation that will send teams to the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl and the Miami Beach Bowl.

No football conference in history has ever boasted as many bowl relationships in its first two decades of existence, but such breakthroughs have been the rule rather than the exception for a league that continues to exceed expectations. Just in the last three seasons, league members have recorded 52 non-conference wins including a record 21 victories outside the league in 2013. The Sun Belt also has a winning record over its fellow "Group of Five" conferences over the past two seasons, and has claimed three bowl victories in those two years.

Gridiron success has grown in the league for several years, but success can also happen overnight. New league member Georgia Southern claimed the Sun Belt football title in its first year in the conference last fall. Appalachian State, another league newbie, rattled off six consecutive wins to close the 2014 football season and finish with a winning 7-5 record. Texas State has finished its two football seasons in the conference as a bowl eligible team, going 6-6 in its inaugural Sun Belt campaign and then 7-5 this past season.

Football, though, is by no means the only hallmark of success for the league. Just this past season, Georgia State knocked off third-seeded Baylor in the NCAA men's basketball tournament and Little Rock defeated sixth-seeded Texas A&M in the women's NCAA tournament.

With the league's postseason tournaments headed back to the conference's home city, the "Big Easy" of New Orleans, and a plethora of standouts returning for this season, the league is poised for another successful hoops season.

Baseball and softball continue to put the league in the national spotlight during the spring season, with deep runs into postseason play and high visibility in the national polls becoming a tradition. UL Lafayette's baseball team was the nation's No. 1 team in the final third of the 2014 season and has reached the NCAA Super Regional round each of the past two years, while the UL Lafayette softball team has advanced to the Super Regional three straight years including a trip to the 2014 College World Series.

Many league sports have made statements on the national level, and that is a tribute to the university and athletic administrators that serve both the league institutions and the student-athletes at each school. That this level of success comes at a time of sweeping change in collegiate

athletics adds even more to these accomplishments.

With those changes, opportunities for student-athletes to succeed both on and off the field have never been greater, and the Sun Belt is well positioned in the areas of scholarship, student welfare and academic success. During the 2014-15 academic year alone, Sun Belt member institutions awarded nearly \$50 million in scholarship funds to over 3,084 student-athletes while also contributing over \$2 million from the Student Assistance Fund (SAF) to over 1,779 student-athletes.

The league and its institutions rewrite the Sun Belt's record book each year in grade-point averages and academic honors, and member schools' success in the NCAA's APR rankings provide even more proof of the league's academic commitment. In 2015, the conference doubled the number of teams that received NCAA Public Recognition Awards, given to teams that post APR scores in the top 10 percent of their sport, as 14 teams were among the national honorees compared to seven in 2014.

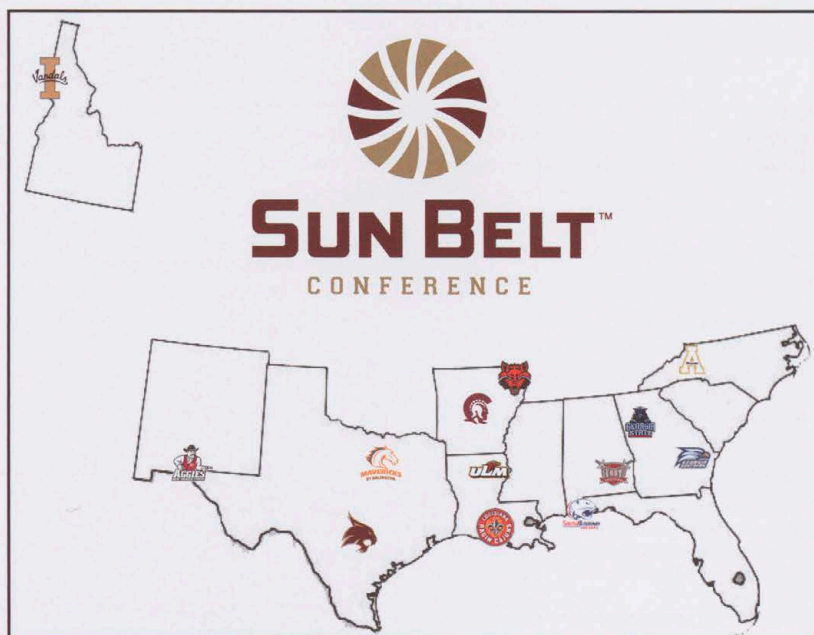
"We have never been as strong as we are now academically and financially, and I believe we are getting stronger all the time athletically," said former Sun Belt Conference president and Troy University chancellor Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr. recently. "I truly believe the best is yet to come."

The strength of any league lies in its membership, with the Sun Belt's 11-school football membership including Appalachian State, Arkansas State, Georgia Southern, Georgia State, Idaho, UL Lafayette, UL Monroe, New Mexico State, South Alabama, Texas State and Troy. Little Rock and UT Arlington compete in all sports as non-football members while Idaho and New Mexico State are football-only members. Those members give the Sun Belt a mix of the "old" and the "new", with many long-time Sun Belt institutions continuing to have success and a solid corps of conference newcomers ready to make their marks on the league and national levels.

The varied campuses and locations reflect another league strength – its diversity. The mix of regions and regional cultures provide a rare opportunity for the league's student-athletes to experience many environments. But those same student-athletes can also experience that without leaving their own campuses.

For every All-Pro linebacker DeMarcus Ware (Troy) and Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Charles Tillman (UL Lafayette), and for every World Series MVP David Freese (South Alabama) coming from Sun Belt campuses, there are also U.S. presidents (Lyndon Johnson, Texas State), business icons (Chick-fil-a president Daniel Cathy, Georgia Southern), nationally-known entertainers (Tim McGraw, UL Monroe, and Ludacris, Georgia State), and there is royalty (Miss America Debbye Turner, Arkansas State).

These proud alumni, as well as the thousands of student-athletes and staff members at all of its institutions, are proof that the Sun Belt Conference continues to gain stature and provide the promise of future success with every sunrise. "Together We Rise" has never been more appropriate.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL
PLAYOFF

After a highly successful debut, the College Football Playoff will once again feature four of the top teams competing for a national playoff. The action begins with two National Semifinal games played in bowl games on New Year's Eve followed by four top bowl games on New Year's Day. The two winning teams meet in a College Football Playoff National Championship game in a different city each year. This year's game will be on Jan. 11 in Glendale, Ariz.

The four teams are chosen by a 13-member Selection Committee comprised of former college football players, coaches and a journalist joining current athletic directors who rank 25 teams each week. The committee also assigns non-contracted conference championship teams to the Cotton, Fiesta and Peach Bowls.

Last season, the College Football Playoff Semifinals and National Championship games were the three most-viewed programs in cable television history.

The Sun Belt Conference is among the 10 premier college football conferences that is part of the College Football Playoff system that guarantees universal access based on performance – there are no automatic qualifiers for the playoff system. Additionally, the CFP means that a spot among the premier bowl games of college football will be guaranteed to the highest-ranked champion from the other "Group of Five" conferences: the Sun Belt Conference, American Athletic Conference, Mountain West Conference, Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

With the College Football Playoff included with the league's other bowl arrangements, the Sun Belt Conference is tied to seven total bowl games. The R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, the GoDaddy Bowl, the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl and the Cure Bowl (debuting in 2015) all guarantee a home for a bowl eligible Sun Belt Conference team each year. Beginning in 2016, the Sun Belt is also part of a rotation of conferences that will send a team to the Bahamas Bowl and the Miami Beach Bowl.

The Red Wolves won two-straight GoDaddy.com bowl games under the direction of current Texas State defensive coordinator John Thompson when he served as an interim coach. Previous head coaches included Gus Malzahn (Auburn), Bryan Harsin (Boise State) and Hugh Freeze (Ole Miss).



GEORGIA SOUTHERN EAGLES

The Eagles beat Florida in "The Swamp" in 2013, 26-20. They were the first team in 2013 to beat an FBS team without completing a pass. They also joined the league on March 27, 2013 along with Appalachian State.



GEORGIA STATE PANTHERS

The Panthers are currently in their sixth year of existence. They played their first game in 2010 and host their games in the Georgia Dome, home of the Atlanta Falcons.



IDAHO VANDALS

Previously coached by NFL head coaches Tom Cable (Raiders, 2000-03) and Dennis Erickson (49ers and Seahawks, 1982-85, 2006). Idaho is a familiar partner of the Sun Belt Conference, having been a football member from the league's inaugural year of football in 2001 through the 2004 season.

UL MONROE WARHAWKS

The Warhawks featured the 2012 Sun Belt Offensive Player of the Year in Kolton Browning. He also was a finalist for the Maxwell Award given to the nation's top offensive player.



NEW MEXICO STATE AGGIES

Quarterback Chase Holbrook ranked second in the nation in passing yards and third in total offense in 2006. Along with Idaho, New Mexico State was a member of the league's inaugural year of football in 2001.



SOUTH ALABAMA JAGUARS

South Alabama is in just its seventh year of existence. The program held its first season in 2009.



TEXAS STATE BOBCATS

The Texas State Bobcats will enter its third season in the Sun Belt Conference in 2015. The Bobcats posted its first winning season as a member of NCAA Division I FBS in 2014 with a 7-5 record.



TROY TROJANS

Troy currently features two alums that are in the NFL who were each drafted in the first round. DeMarcus Ware was taken with the 11th overall pick by the Dallas Cowboys in 2005 and Leodis McKelvin was also taken 11th overall by the Buffalo Bills in 2008.
